Talco-Bogata Board Approves Budget

One of the major purposes of the Talco-Bogata School Board meeting was to hold the public hearing on the adoption of the official school budget for the 1981-82 school year and to set the tax rate. The budget was approved calling for expenditures of \$1,723,652 as compared to \$1,459,381 for the previous school year which is approximately \$264,000 more than the 1980-81 school budget. Of this amount, about \$150,000 would go for salary increases approved by the 67th Legislature along with salary supplements paid by the local district. Another major expenditure will be 70,000 for the partial air conditioning-heating of the Talco elementary School. Also, \$16,000 more was

budgeted off the transportation fund and \$30,000 as part of the cost of the Red River County Appraisal District for the reevaluation of property in the school district. While there are other increases in various phases of the budget due to inflation, the above mentioned items attribute to the greatest increase.

Total funds for the 1981-82 school year are estimated to be \$895,000 from Local Funds and \$869,000 from State Funds for a total of \$1,765,021 in revenue for the school year. The budget is tabulated on a taxable value of \$81,000,000. A tax rate of \$.92 for maintenance and \$.08 for debt service as approved by the Board for a total rate of \$1.00 per \$100 of values.

This is an increase of \$.05 in the tax rate over the previous year.

In matters related to school personnel, the following changes and/or additions have been made in school personnel. Kay Kennedy, who has been a teacher in the system for the past 10 years, will be the new Community Education and Curriculum Coordinator for the school district. Patsy Groves has been employed to fill Mrs. Kennedy's position. Monda Roberts has been employed as an English and Speech teacher at Rivercrest. Donna Miller has been employed to work with handicapped students from the district in the Red River County Plan A Coop in Clarksville. Other changes in

personnel from the previous year will be Claire Jessee, Band Director; Jamie Huddleston, Title 1 & Language Arts; and Sue Wilkins, Art & Reading at Talco. Mildred Birchfield and Duane Roesler will be new additions to the maintenance staff.

In other matters, the price of school meals will be increased 5 cents with reduced price lunches and breakfast having a somewhat larger increase. A separate articles in this weeks paper will give the details of the school lunch program for next year.

In final matters, the Board approved the purchase of an ice machine, 53 passenger school bus, and gave ap-

proval to the various financial reports. The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, September 8, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the general public cordially invited to attend.

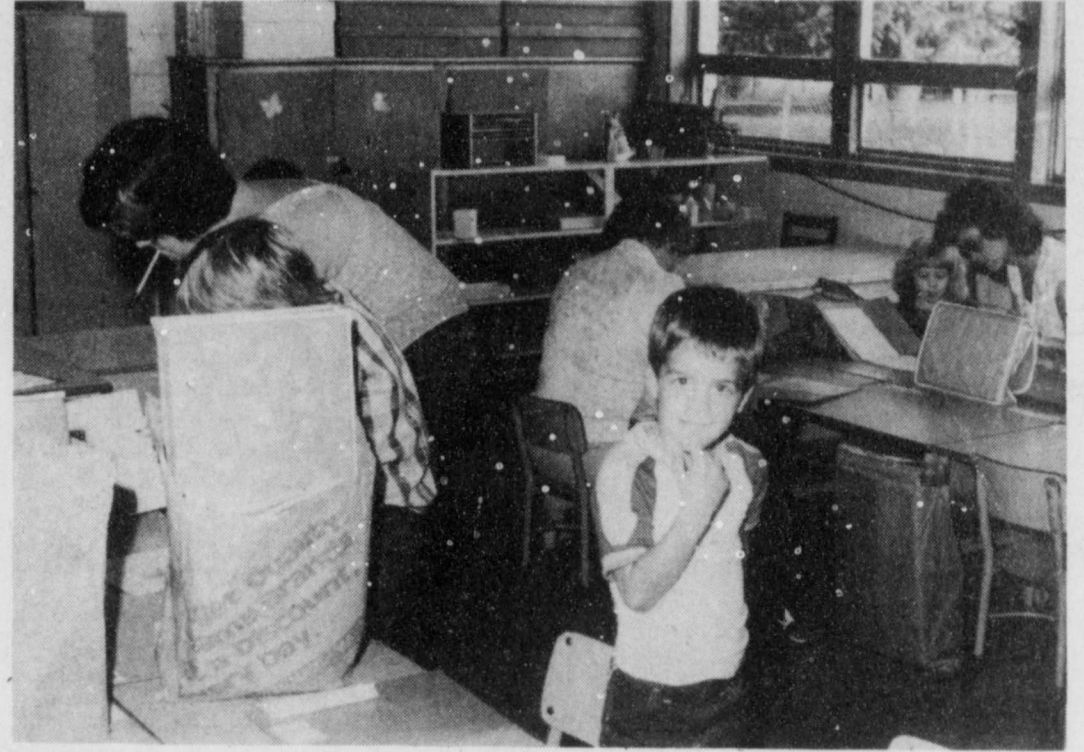

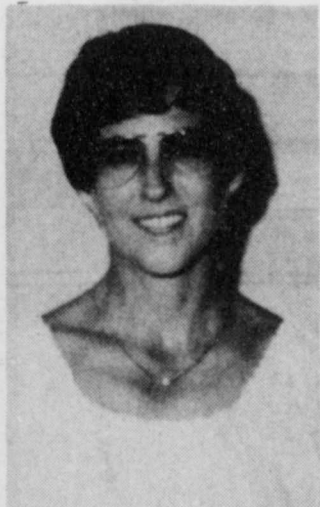

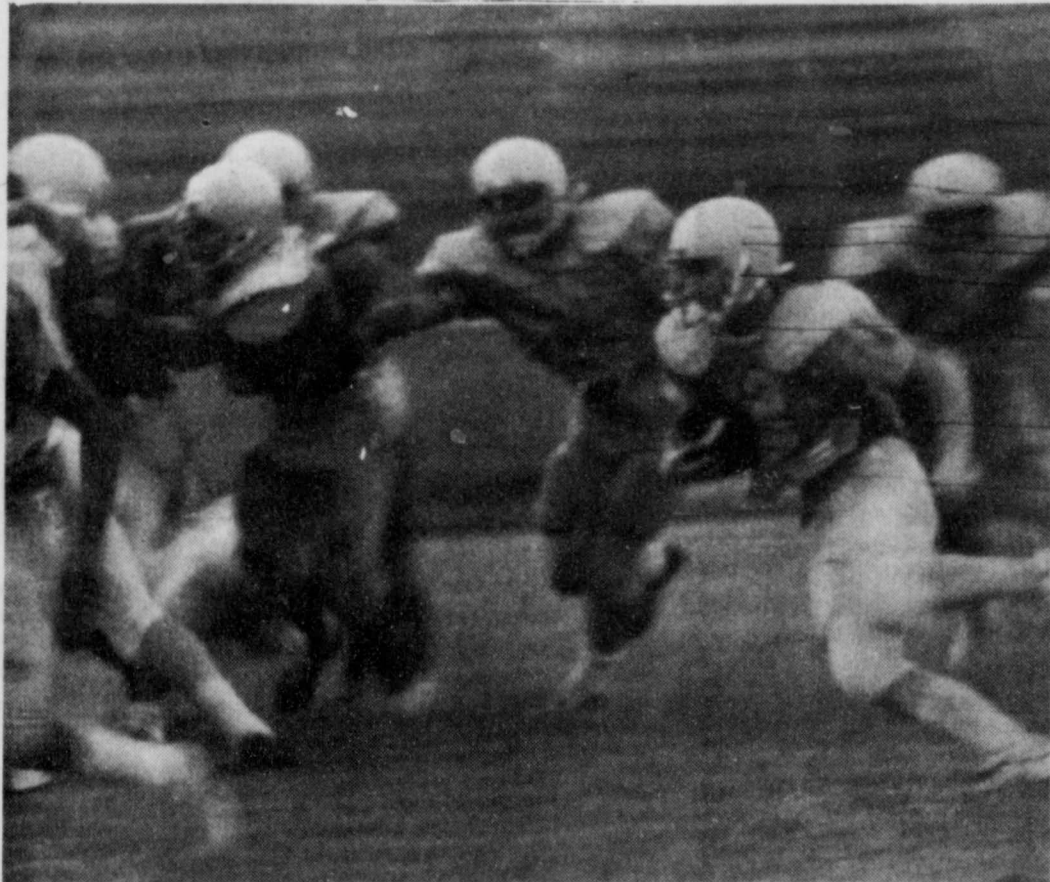
Rebels Begin Season

The Rivercrest Rebel varsity kicked off its 1981 season with the Blue-Gray intr-squad scrimmage here Friday night with the Blue taking a 1 to 0 edge. The game was run under normal scrimmage conditions with each team running 25 plays before relinquishing the ball to the other. The Rebel coaching staff tried to match the first team offense in blue against the first team defense in

gray. The main purpose of a scrimmage is to give the coaches a look at the players from a different view than in practice. The coaches believe they accomplished this goal. They found out some players are better than they thought, but others did not live up to expectations. Head coach Milford Groves said he was very pleased with the overall performance of the Rebels. He also says the teams' number eight ranking in

state can be a help and a hinderance. An opposition team is naturally going to put out 110 percent to beat a highly ranked team, but that ranking usually puts more inventive into the players to keep the position.

The Rebels first real test comes next Friday night as the team travels to Honey Grove to play their last scrimmage under normal game conditions.

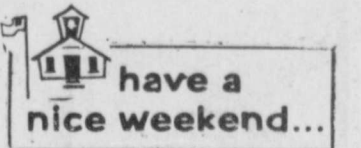

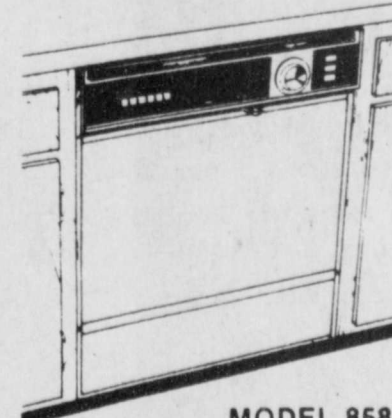

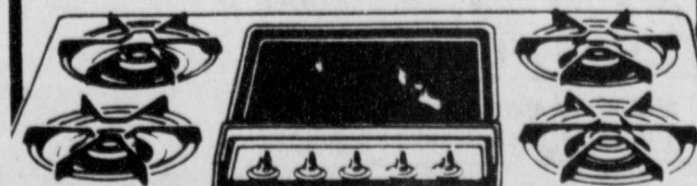

FACTS ABOUT VINYL SIDING

Remodeling the old house starts to look more and more attractive when you go shopping for a new one. Because of the current economic situation, more people are staying in older neighborhoods and going about the creative task of remodeling to fit their needs.

One of the fastest ways to show a marked improvement in an older home and raise its value is to start on the outside. Re-siding a wood house with a low-maintenance material will eliminate painting and give it a clean, bright look for years.

Once you decide to reside, what factors should you consider? If low maintenance is what you want, eliminate the idea of new wood siding. It does need substantial upkeep. The other two most popular choices are metal and vinyl siding.

Aluminum siding used to be considerably cheaper than vinyl siding, and many homeowners chose it out of concern for their pocketbooks. But with the materials shortages, the prices have come close to being equal. Therefore, the homeowner should consider the qualities of vinyl that make it a superior siding material.

Vinyl siding is solid color clear through, about 40 times thicker than the coating of color applied to metal siding. It doesn't show scratches or marks because the color can never wear off.

Vinyl is chemically inert - immune to the things which can corrode, warp and ruin metal siding. Vinyl resists the damaging effects of acids, salt water, sunshine, rain and airborne industrial pollutants.

Ease of cleaning is another factor in solid vinyl's favor. Suddy water will restore its bright finish quickly. Abrasive cleaners can be used to remove stains without damaging vinyl siding, but they would be destructive to the painted finish on metal siding.

A stray baseball can make a dent in metal siding that cannot be fixed without removing the entire panel of siding. Most vinyl siding, however, will absorb the shock and show no damage. Select a vinyl siding that has a shock-absorbing bottom edge.

Test these factors for yourself by experimenting on a sample piece of siding. It will be on your house for many years, and you have the right to test the material yourself before buying.

Safety is also a factor to consider in your siding choice. Metal siding will conduct electricity and in some areas of the country must be grounded by an electrician. It also magnifies the rattle sounds of rain and hail. But vinyl siding does not transmit sound or conduct electricity.

Consider building codes. You will want to buy a siding that has the approval of the important building codes, such as Building Officials Conference of America, Inc. (BOCA), Federal Housing Authority (FHA), International Conference of Building Officials (ICBO), and the Southern Building Code Congress (SBCC).

A guarantee is also important. This vinyl carries a full 40 yr. guarantee (non-prorated). This means after 39 years this vinyl has still got a full guarantee. This guarantee is also transferable if you decide to sell your home.

What about insulation value? One manufacturer had its vinyl siding tested by the American Society for Testing and Materials. The results showed that vinyl provided 34.8 percent greater insulation against heat and cold than metal siding.

Consider all these factors when you choose siding for your home. Ask questions and test the products for yourself before making a decision.

We probably ran off more business that he got from us, because a hamburger or a bowl of chili was what we ordered. If we had chili we would pour almost a full bottle of catsup in and no telling how many crackers so it would go further, cause we were always hungry and usually broke.

Whenever we see each other now, all us old football "Stars" have to talk over the old days, and they are good memories.
