### Veterans Due Back Pay

Many Vietnam Era veterans are unaware of their entitlement to back pay, for active military service between Oct. 1, 1972 and Jan. 1, 1973. A recent Federal court decision ordered the Federal Government to pay a salary of approximately 6.14% to all military personnel and veterans who served on active duty between these dates. Military personnel still on active duty will receive the pay automatically, while the veteran whose active duty terminated after October 1, 1972, will have to apply for the pay, according to C. H. Herren, Veterans Service Officer for Haskell County.

### Fall Diapause Spray Program

The Haskell County Boll Weevil Association announces that the fall diapause program is underway. Farmers may sign up now with the deadline being Sept. 9. The cost is \$3.00 per acre for the farmers share and although the cotton crop is not so good this year the group urges everyone to sign up. Failure to participate in the program endangers the future control of boll weevils and also the continuing spray program. Rotarian Fred Boon, program chairman for the day, presented Aubrey Headstream, Executive Director of the Tri-County Mental Health Clinic with headquarters in Haskell. Mr. Headstream recently attended a National Convention or workshop in the state of Wisconsin for rural mental health clinics. He was high in his praise of the headline speaker for the National meet who has been a lobbyist for the milk and cheese industry for the past 20 years. ### USDA Proposes New Food Stamp Regulations

Under a proposed regulation announced today by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, an individual who wants to retain eligibility for food stamp program benefits would have to accept a job which requires joining a bona-fide labor organization recognized by the National Labor Relations Act. The regulation would not require the recipient to join a company union.

In order to participate in the food stamp program all recipients, with certain exceptions, must register for and accept employment. Current regulations, however, permit a recipient to refuse a job in which he is required to join, resign from, or refrain from joining any legitimate labor organization. The proposed amendment is in line with regulations for the Work Incentive Program of the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare.

Public comments are invited on the proposed regulation which is scheduled for publication in the Federal Register on Wednesday, Aug. 21. Written comments may be mailed or delivered to Royal Shipp, Acting Director, Food Stamp Division, Food and Nutrition Service, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, so as to be received not later than Sept. 20, 1974. Comments received will be open to public inspection.

## ACC Offers Graduate Level Courses Here

ABILENE, Texas — Abilene Christian College's Department of Education will offer four graduate level courses in Haskell and Coahoma this fall to meet the needs of public school teachers, administrators and supervisors north and west of Abilene.

Two teams of two professors each will provide these graduate level classes which are acceptable on a master's degree or on a certification program.

These courses will count on programs for public school principals, superintendents, supervisors, elementary and secondary teachers, educational diagnosticians, reading specialists and school counselors.

Dr. Chantrey Fritts, associate professor and head of the ACC Dept. of Education, says that the classes will provide an alternative to the long distance commuting for many public school persons.

He says the college professor will commute and the students can take classes closer to home, thereby providing a service to the schools and the communities of the Big Country area.

Classes will begin Sept. 2 in Coahoma and Sept. 3 in Haskell. The Coahoma classes will meet subsequently on Monday night and the class in Haskell will meet Tuesday night. In both locations, classes will be offered from 6 to 9 p. m. Each course will be for three semester hours of graduate credit.

Dr. W. H. Avinger, professor and ACC coordinator of graduate studies in education, has announced the following teachers for each class.

At Haskell, Dr. Edward E. Coates, ACC associate professor of education will teach "Improvement of Teaching for Elementary Teachers"; while Dr. Fritts will teach "Improvement of Teaching for Secondary Teachers."

At Coahoma, Dr. Milton Findley, ACC associate professor of education, will offer "Secondary Curriculum"; and Dr. Harold Wilkinson, ACC professor of education and coordinator of the elementary division of the education department, will teach "Elementary Curriculum".
