





Flood Losses Are Great

Each year flood losses in this country average over flooding is there are no \$3.4 billion, and since 1925, floods in the United States have killed over 4,000 people, a local conservation leader said this week.

"The irony of all this is that most all of the loss and damage could have been cur back to back during the avoided had citizens, same season. builders, developers, planners, and America's real estate community heeded the advice and warnings of several public institutions," Henry Catlett, District Conservationist for the USDA have been safe as long as Soil Conservation Service at Mt. Pleasant said.

"For close to half a century, conservationists and only moderately heavy planners have urged that rains. 





PORK AND MICROWAVE COOKERY Cooking pork in the

microwave? It's important that it reaches a temperature of 170 degrees F. throughout. This is to insure all microorganisms are destroyed.

Preliminary studies have shown that live trichinae (parasitic worms) can be present in fresh pork cuts which are cooked in several ways. Cooking instructions in some cookbooks may not guarantee sufficiently high temperatures to kill all organisms.

USDA has notified the microwave oven industry of potential problems with pork cooking instructions.

Microwave ovens cook by exciting the water molecules in food. Variations in the distribution of water in the pork, the uneven energy distribution in microwave ovens and potential energy blockage by bone may result in uneven cooking.

Therefore, it's important that the entire piece of meat reaches a temperature of at least 170 degrees F. Let me know if you have
