
The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.





Lettuce has gone up a bit in price, so why not switch to Waldorf salads or cole slaw until prices moderate again. If the recent jump in bread prices poses a problem for you, look for bargains at discount outlets or stores with their own bread. If you have storage space, purchase enough bread to last three to four weeks. Bread to be kept more than a few days should be rewrapped and stored in the freezer. Bread without preservatives and unrefrigerated will mold quickly during humid weather. Check bargain produce. Often bargain vegetables simply mean wilted leaves have been trimmed and the vegetable has been repackaged for quick sale. Fruits or vegetables with a few blemishes may be a bargain but avoid moldy food. Mold spreads quickly and may not necessarily be restricted to one area on the fruit.
