PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.



CHRIST'S **'SOMETHING MORE'** December 6, 1981

Background Scripture: Matthew 14: 28-33; Mark 1: 1-Devotional Reading: 1 Corinthians 1: 20-31.

At one time it was fashionable in some circles to regard Jesus as nothing more than a fictional or mythical character. Apart from the Bible itself, there is no proof that such a man actually lived and died in the first century A.D.

Nevertheless, today, if I can judge from what I see, hear and read, there doesn't seem to be much doubt among most people that Jesus was an actual historical figure. The conflict and disagreement today seems much more to be over the question: Who was this man? or, depending upon your approach, Who is this Christ?

The Son of God

Christians often attempt to answer either or both of these questions by listing one or more of his titles. Jesus, we say, is the Christ, the Messiah, the Lord, our Savior, the Incarnate Word of God, the Master, and the Son of God. (Although we do not usually use this title, we are aware that the Gospels, particularly Mark, also call him the Son of man at times.)

But titles are not answers in themselves. For when we say that Jesus is the Son of

the Gospel of Jesus Christ,

the Son of God" (1: 1). At Mark's recounting of the baptism of Jesus, there is "a voice from heaven, 'Thou art my beloved Son; with thee I am well pleased,' " (1: 11). And on the Mount of Transfiguration, there is another voice, saying of Jesus, "This is my beloved Son; listen to him' (9: 7). What is Mark trying to say to us about Jesus?

In Daniel 3: 25 King Nebuchadnezzar saw in the firey furnace besides Shadrach, Meschach and Abednego a fourth person whose appearance was that of a "son of the gods," indicating that there is something divine about him. In the books of Job and Psalms the term "sons of God" indicates beings who are divine but subordinate to God. In other Old Testament sources, to be God's "son" or "sons" implies simply a special relationship with God (the nation of Israel, Exodus 4: 22, 23; the Davidic king, Psalms 89: 26, 27; etc.). The Divine Become Human

Mark, however, implies something more when he uses this term. This "something more" was a special, filial relationship between Jesus and God ("Father" being the term Jesus used most in referring to God). It also indicated that the disciples realized that, in dealing with this man Jesus, in some way virtually indefinable they were dealing with God Himself. As John would later put it, they found that the Word had become flesh in Jesus, the divine expressed in human

The title "Son of God" is impossible to precisely define, but it does not matter that we cannot define it, so long as we are able to experience for ourselves the 'something more' of Jesus, the Son of God.







Agricultural Briefs

By Paul D. Payne

The special local needs label for Sencor in wheat in Texas has been revised for 1981-82. The important points from the revised label are: (1) Use only on dryland winter wheat on the varieties TAM W101, TAM W105, and Newton, (2) Do not use on high calcareous soils or soils with a pH greater than 7.7, (3) Do not use on soils containing less than one percent organic matter, (4) Application may be made in the fall or spring, but wheat should have developed at least three tillers and four secondary roots that measure two in length to avoid injury, apply prior to jointing, (5) apply before weeds are two inches tall or have a two inch dismeter rosette to assure effective treated fields for 14 days after treatment, (7) Temporary chlorosis may occur, especially if frost occurs, (8) Weed control may not be observed for two to six weeks upon rainfall frequency. Winter Weed Control

herbicides that can be applied in the fall or winter to control cool season weeds that have a state label.

Shell, can be applied either pre-emergence or post for henbit control in land to be planted to cotton, grain sorghum, or corn. The weed should be sprayed before it is six inches tall. It will be necessary to use a herbicide for spring weed control at

Igran, manufactured by CIBA-GEIGY, is another herbicide that can be fall applied to Blackland for control of henbit, seedling dock and cunual thistle

where sorghum is going to be planted. Weeds should be less than six inches tall and a herbicide will also be needed in the spring.

Applicators should add a surfaclant or agricultural oil to both of these herbicides

for best results. Three more weeks of dry weather is needed by area food and fiber producers in order to get the 1981 crops harvested and the winter wheat crop planted. Most farmers would welcome a longer period than that, but a light shower in about three

The 1981 County peanut crop which looked like a record breaker back in September could turn out to be a disaster. Producers are reporting in excess of 15 percent loss of nuts due to the extended wet season.

Harvesting activity picked back up this past weekend. Late planted milo, soybeans, guar and peanut harvest is under way while other farmers attempt to get the 1982 wheat crop in the ground.




