Rebelettes Take Second, Rebs Third In Tournament

The 1981 Rivercrest Invitational Tournament was held this past weekend at Rivercrest High School. The Tournament was labeled quite a success by basketball coaches Frank Stubblefield and Wake Wood. "We had a good turnout for most of the games and overall good sportsmanship by the fans as well as the players," said Wood at the conclusion of the event.

The three day, double elimination tournament kicked off Thursday at 10 a.m. with the Rivercrest Rebels and Rebelettes playing that afternoon. The Rebelettes played the Delmar Eagles at 1 p.m. with the boys game following at 2:30 p.m. The Rebelettes handed Delmar a 59-42 loss and advanced to the semi-finals. Six foot five center, Veronica Howerton led scoring for the girls with 45 points. Others adding to the total were senior forward Jean Ann Norman, junior guard Rhonda Branch, and sophomores Nelda Anderson, Jackie Via, and Kim Reeder.

The Rebels added insult to injury by defeating the Eagles in the boys game 61-60 in a come-from-behind fourth quarter rally. Stan Wood, Bradley Moore, and John Hines all had 12 points for the Rebs with David Rozell adding 11 more.

Other games in the girls bracket included a 57-43 North Lamar victory over

Roxton, a 29-24 Honey Grove defeat over Prairiland, and a thrilling 63-62 Cooper win over Detroit. The boys bracket held equally close scores as Honey Grove defeated Prairiland 64-62, Detroit edged by Cooper 63-60, and Roxton pounded North Lamar 52-31.

Friday the Rebelettes advanced to the finals with a 49-46 over-time victory over the North Lamar Pantherettes. Senior Center Veronica Howerton again led scoring for the Rebelettes with 23 points with Jean Norman adding nine more. In the nightcap, the Rebels were defeated by Roxton 55-52 in another close contest. David Wisinger led scoring for the Rebs with 25 points while James Strickland and Bradley Moore added eight each. The win advanced Roxton to the finals and put the Rebs in contention for third place.

In the girls bracket for Friday, Honey Grove earned the right to play Rivercrest in the finals with a 46-38 win over Cooper who moved to the third place battle with North Lamar. Roxton defeated Delmar 60-47 and moved into contention for the consolation trophy with Prairiland who put Detroit out of the tournament with a 49-35 win. The boys bracket also placed Honey Grove in the finals with a 62-60 win over Detroit who moved in to play Rivercrest for third place. Prairiland boys also earned a spot for the consolation trophy by defeating

Cooper 69-44. North Lamar defeated Delmar 50-45 and placed their bid for consolation against Prairiland.

In Saturday's games Roxton girls won the Consolation Trophy by defeating Prairiland in an exciting contest 47-43. But Prairiland boys made up for the loss with a whopping 68-49 defeat over North Lamar for the Consolation honors. Cooper girls then defeated North Lamar 63-53 for the third place trophy. Then the Rivercrest Rebels took the court and quite handily gave Detroit a 59-39 defeat and walked away with the boys third place spot. Stan Wood led scoring for the Rebs with 20 points. David Wisinger put in 15 and David Rozell added another 13.

From then on it was Honey Grove all the way. Despite the 30 points that Howerton put on the board for the Rebelettes, it was not enough to hold off the Warriorettes as they defeated the Rebelettes 42-39 for first place. Others scoring for the Rebs were Jean Norman and Nelda Anderson. And in the final game of the tournament, Honey Grove boys took home the first place trophy with a 61-54 win over Roxton.

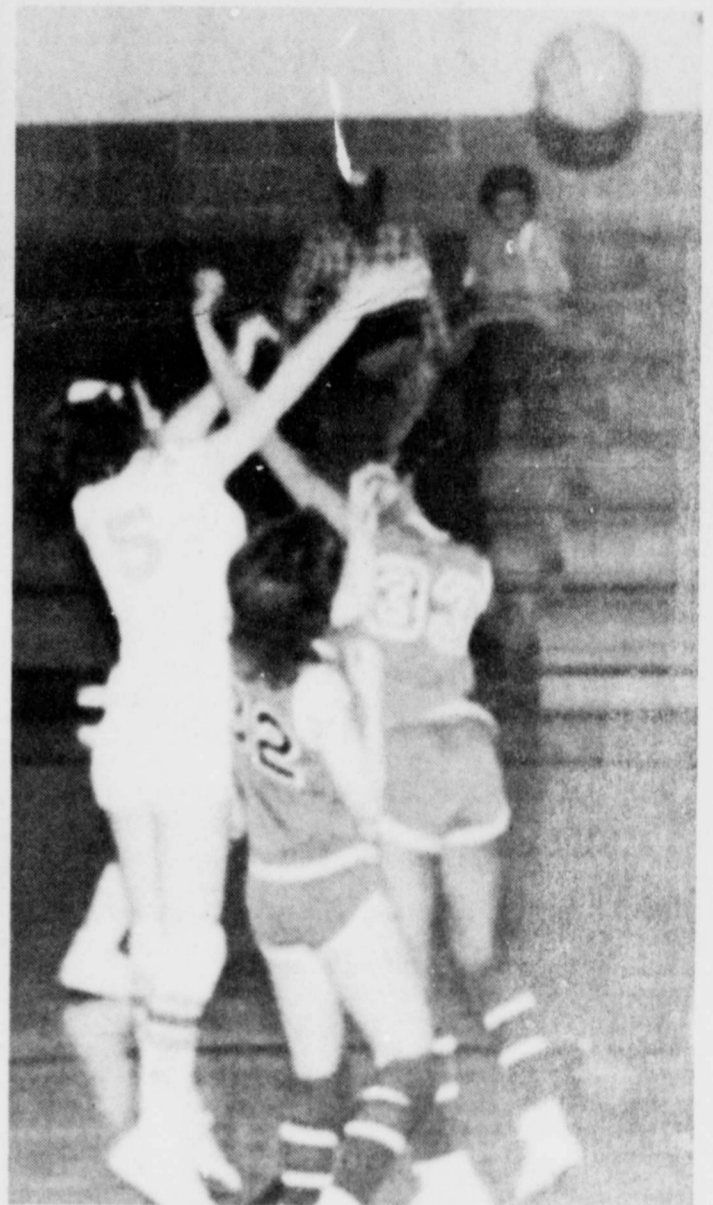
Veronica Howerton was the only player from Rivercrest to make the all-tournament team. For the three games, Howerton accumulated 98 points. For the boys team in three games, David Wisinger had 45 points, Wood had 35,

Rozell put in 28, and John Hines added 23 more. The coaching staff would like to thank the communities for the fine turn out of the tournament. Girls coach Frank Stubblefield commented that he is very pleased with his Rebelettes' performance. With only one returning starter and the majority of the team made up of sophomores, you can not expect a whole lot from a team at first, but Stubblefield said, "If we keep improving and the girls keep learning to work as a team, we will win district." Boys coach Wake Wood said after the tournament, "I believe we had a real good tournament. The teams were evenly matched and all the games were good ones. I feel our (Rivercrest) boys did a good job. We've only been practicing two weeks and with the Thanksgiving holidays off, we will not reach our full potential until later. But I think under the conditions we have a real fine ball club."

So the curtain has closed, the orchestra has finished the last bars of song, the applause has faded, and history has been made. The 1981 Rivercrest Invitational Tournament is over, but the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat still remain in the hearts of the players, coaches, and fans.

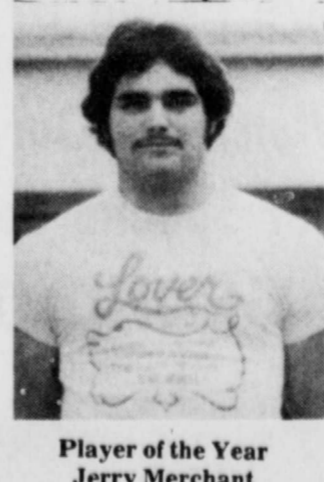

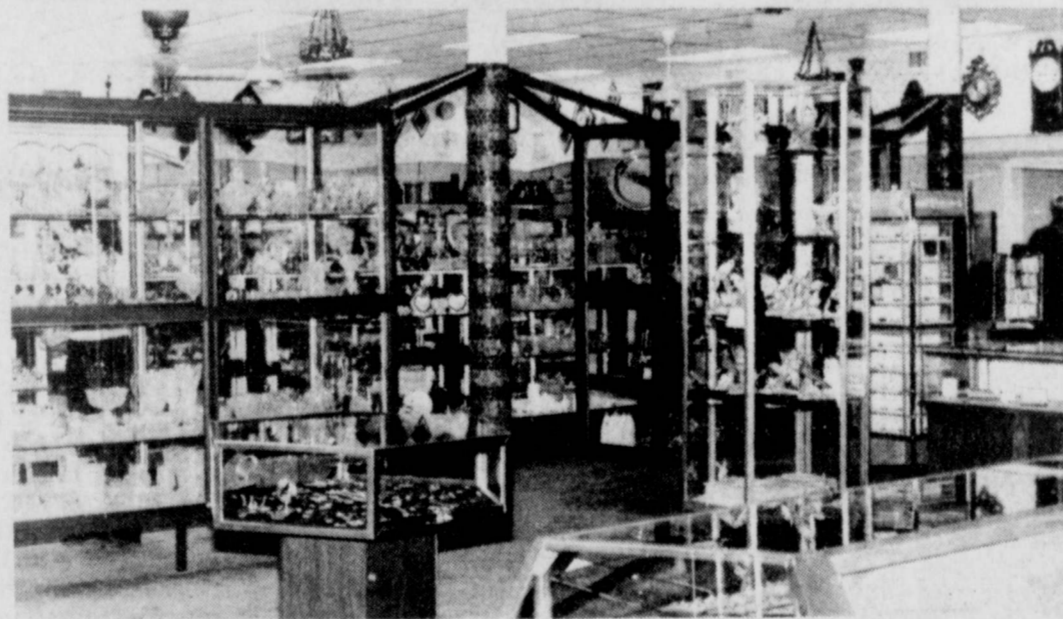

Christmas Is The Time for Greetings!

It's Christmas! Time to shop for gifts, decorate the house... and send out greeting cards.

There are always many religious themes to be found in yearly card selections: the madonna and child, the wise men, manger scenes and the star of Bethlehem, are among the more pious subjects.

Then, there are the "cute" cards: amusing Santas, kittens and puppies, reindeer, and youngsters hanging up their stockings by the chimney with care, for instance.

Victoriana seems to represent the spirit of Christmas to many. Hence, there will be the usual complement of Dickensian carolers, horsedrawn carriages and ice skaters adorning cards this season.

Christmas decorations are also favorite greeting card subjects: wreaths, Christmas trees, holly and poinsettias, among others.

Nature scenes of snow-covered meadows or a doe in contemplation... artists always find inspiration in such subjects for Christmas greetings.

Tips from the Florist

When ordering a flower arrangement from a florist in winter, it is best to be flexible in the choice of flowers.

Chrysanthemums, especially pompons, are usually plentiful in florist shops in winter; so are carnations. Both are suitable for almost any occasion. They are good keepers when water is changed and stems are trimmed daily. Snapdragons are generally a good buy, particularly if purchased fresh-cut at a greenhouse.

Fuel Saver

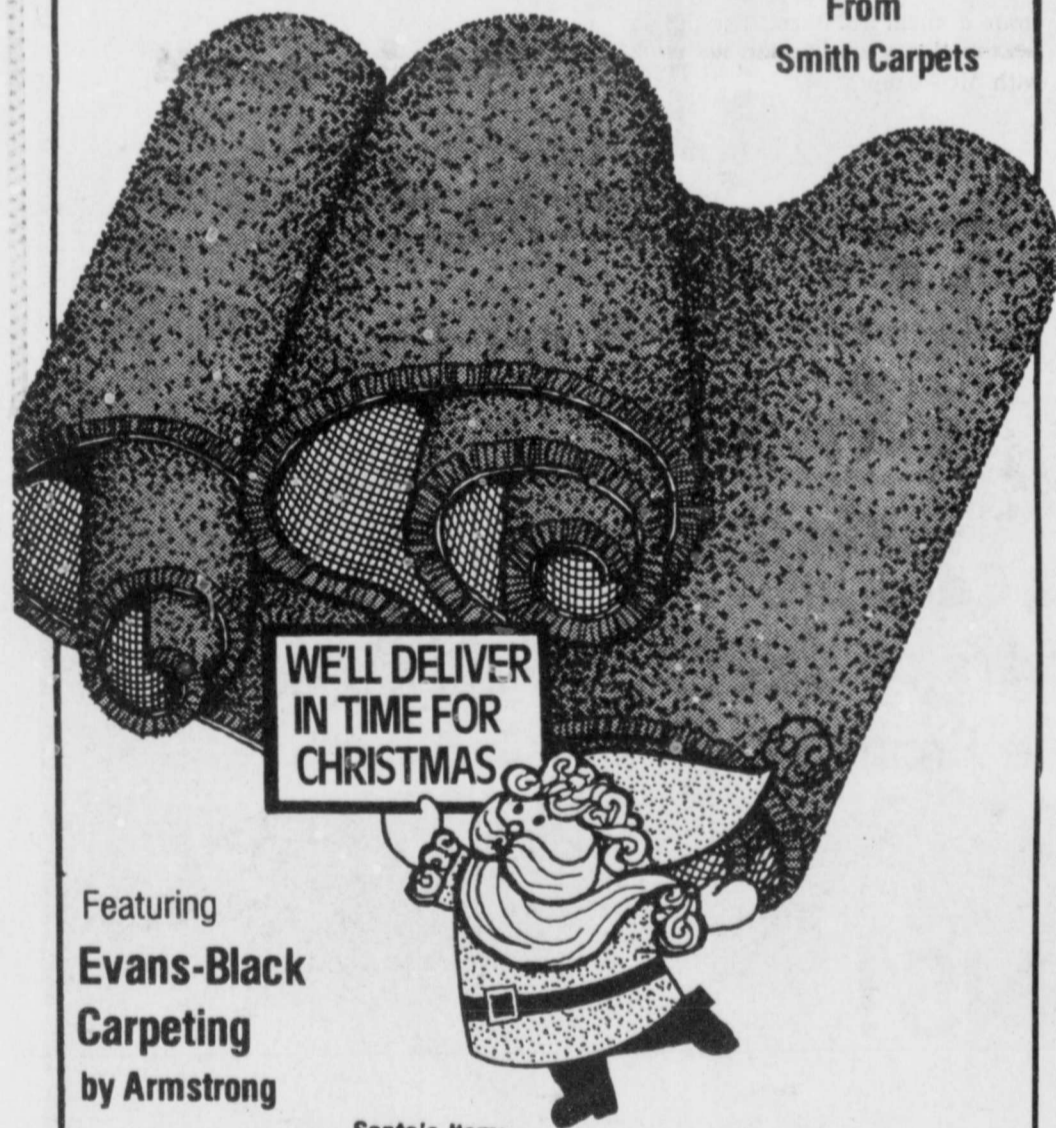

It is receiving a handmade sweater or scarf, reflecting the hours of love and time spent in its creation.

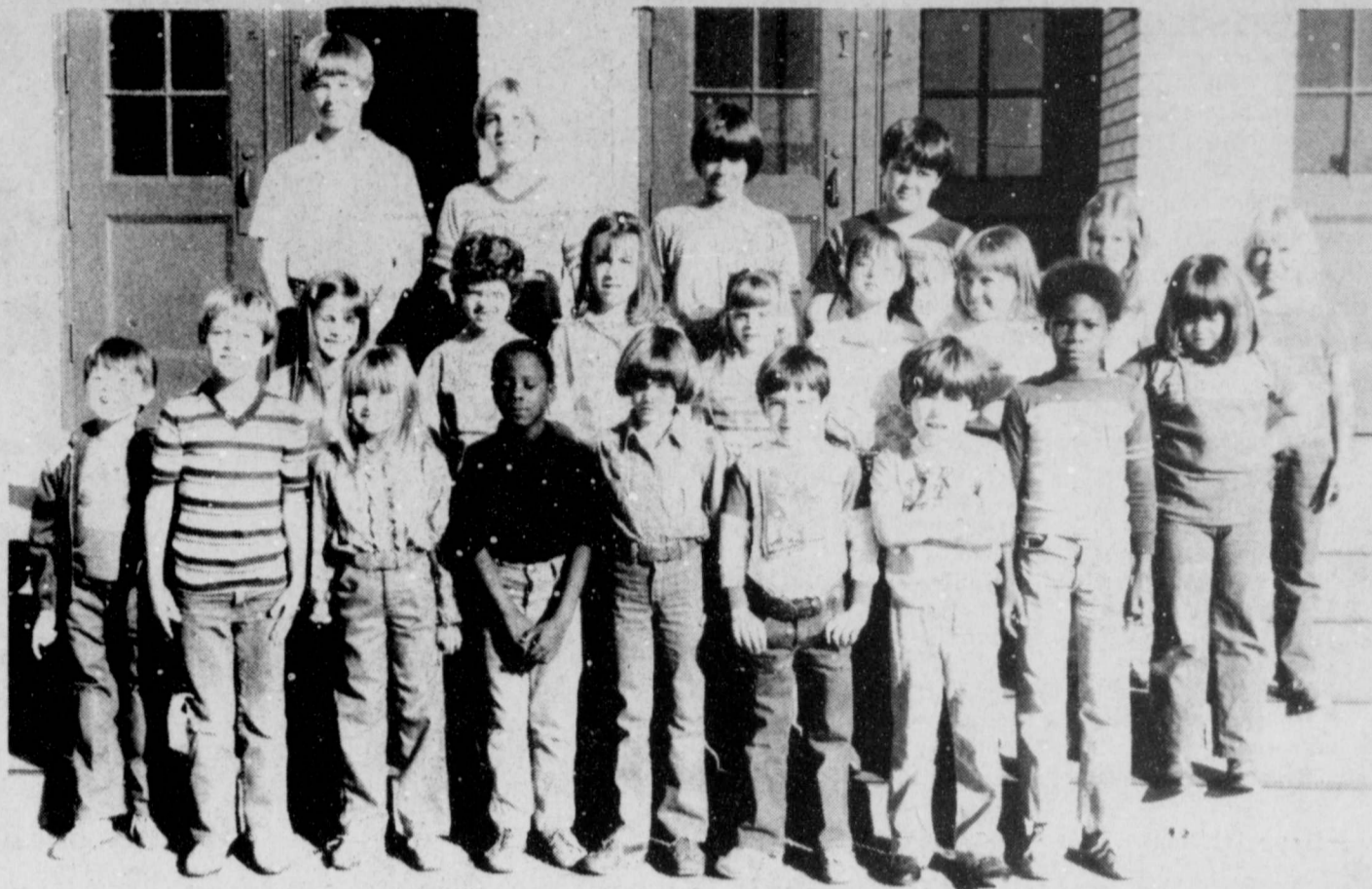
It is the face of a child, listening wide-eyed to Mom or Dad reading a favorite Christmas story.

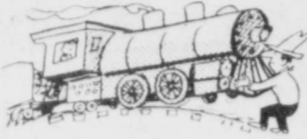

Holiday List Of Tips for Fire Safety

Every year, more than 650 Christmas trees catch on fire, according to the National Fire Data Center. These fires cause more than 40 deaths and 90 injuries, and damage is estimated at approximately \$5.1 million.

Don't let your Christmas go up in smoke. Protect your family by following these tips, which are part of the Burger King Fire Safety Program.

- Buy only a fresh Christmas tree—one whose needles are moist and soft. Stand it in a water-filled container to keep it from drying out.
- If you buy an artificial tree, be sure it is certified as flame retardant.
- Place the tree in a cool area. NEVER near a heater or the fireplace.
- Never set up electrical toys, such as trains, near the tree where sparks could ignite them.
- Check Christmas lights for worn wires and loose sockets.

- Always keep a screen in front of the fireplace, even when the logs are just smoldering.



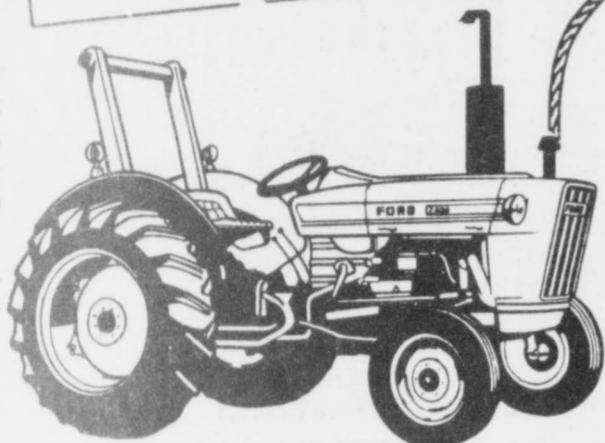

Focus on Christmas Season

Christmas is one of the most memorable celebrations of the year. It is also one of the most photogenic and Christmas photos and slides will be prized for years to come.

Here's a Christmas shooting schedule from the technical staff of Canon U.S.A. They say that almost any camera can document Christmas, but they suggest a 35mm single lens reflex such as the new AE-1 Program. It automatically selects both the shutter speed and lens opening, an arrangement that is ideal for quick candid shooting and that's what you'll be doing most of.

The Canon experts suggest you start several days before Christmas Day. Accompany another member of the family on a Christmas gift shopping expedition. A good shot would be Mom or Dad coming out of

a store with a stack of presents. Get some shots of store decorations.

Take A Camera

When it comes time to buy the tree, take your camera. Trimming the tree can be good for a couple of rolls of film by itself. And then you'll want to shoot it at night with its lights on and the room lights off. That's when a Christmas tree is at its magical best.

You'll need to make a fairly long exposure to pick up the relatively dim tree lights and to give them a chance to illuminate the branches a little. Use ASA 400 film, a tripod and cable release. With the lens set at f/8 expose for 1/2 second and then from one to eight seconds in one second intervals. One shot should be right.

Other shots you can

make are of the gifts being wrapped, Christmas cookie baking, caroling and partying. Make sure you get a picture of the wrapped presents at the base of the tree.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.
