Rebelettes Take First, Rebs Consolation At Tourney

The Rivercrest Rebelettes took top honors, and the Rebels settled for the consolation trophy from the Mt. Vernon Invitational Basketball Tournament December 10-12.

The Rebelettes shot their way through games with Detroit, Greenville, and Mt. Vernon to claim the championship. Three major contributors to the team's performance on the court, Pam Warden, Jean Norman and Veronica Howerton, were named by coaches and tour-

namment officials as members of the All Tournament.

The girls met with Detroit in the first round of tournament action. Rebelettes edged ahead with a 21-18 lead at the half and continued to edge ahead of their opponents in the second half.

Veronica Howerton led the team in points scored with 13 field goals and four free throws for 30 points. She was followed by Jean Norman with three field goals and five free throws for 11 points.

In round two of the tournament the girls defeated Greenville 45-35 after taking an early lead. The score stood 24-16 at the close of the first half of action.

Again leading the team in scoring was Howerton with eight field goals for 16 points. Other scoring for the team were Jean Norman and Kim Reeder with eight points each, Nelda Anderson and Jackie Via with four points each, Pam Ward and Rhonda Branch with two points each and Karen Caddell with

one point.

A see-saw battle for the Championship was held between Mt. Vernon and the Rebelettes. The game was close throughout with Mt. Vernon leading in the first two quarters 11-8 and 24-22. The Rebelettes pulled ahead in the third quarter 37-36, but appeared in foul trouble early in the fourth quarter with the loss of Howerton.

Eight of 13 attempted free shots for the Rebelettes were good in the fourth quarter of play, while only four of nine attempts for the Tigerettes were good.

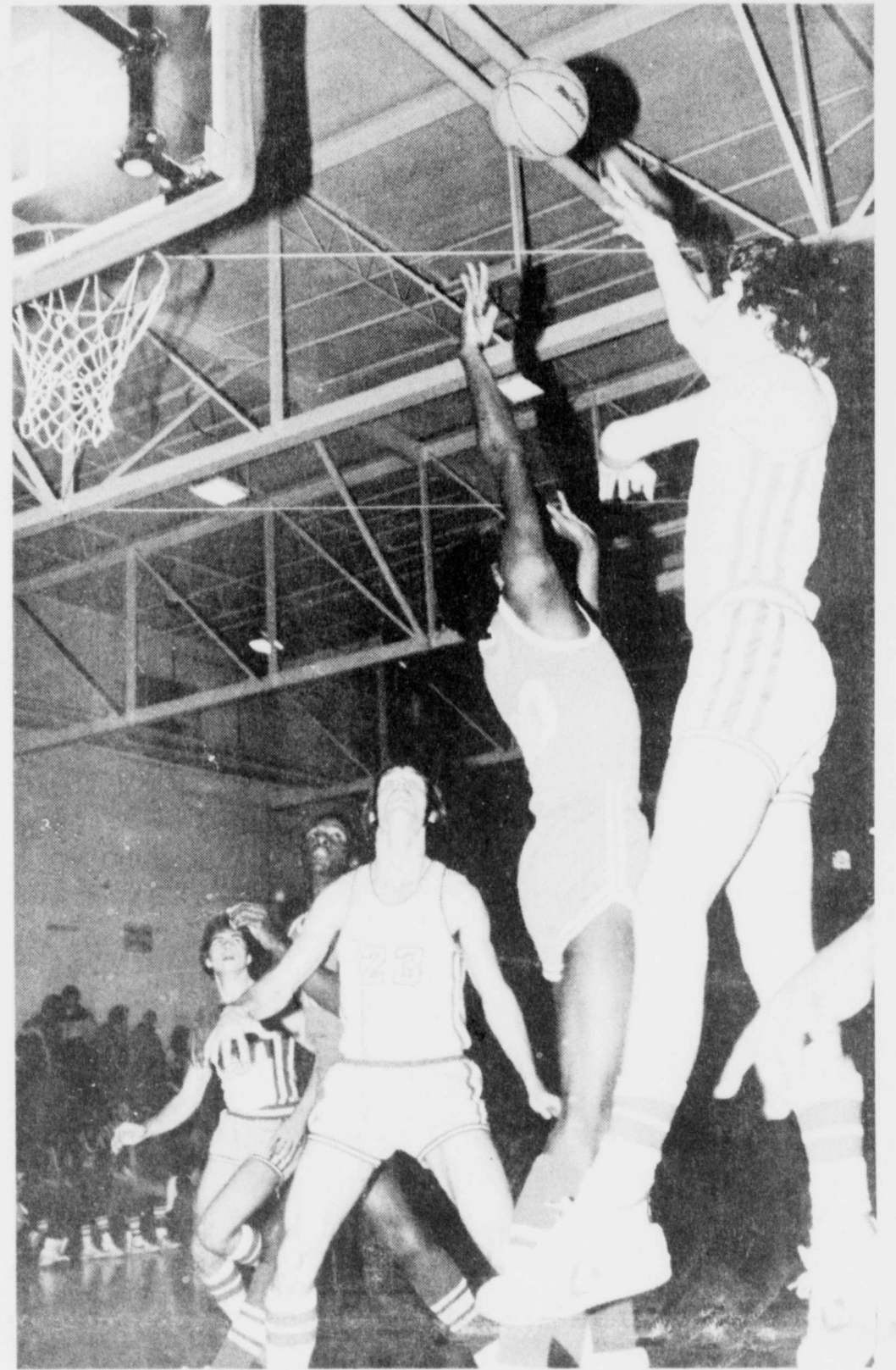
The Rebel boys lost to Detroit 63-58 in the first round of play, and were declared winner in their second round schedule after illness prevented the return of the Clarksville JV team for play in the tournament Friday. In the final round of play in the boys consolation bracket the Rebels defeated

Quitman's Bulldogs in a squeaker game 54-52.

David Rozell led the team in points scored against Detroit with seven field goals and one free throw for 15 points. Other top scoring players were David Wisinger with 12, Stan Wood with 11, and John Hines with 10.

High point honors in the game against Quitman were earned by Stan Wood with seven field goals and four free throws for 18 points. Other scoring players were James Strickland with 12, John Hines, 10, David Wisinger, 8, David Rozell, 4, and Bradley Moore, 2.

Stan Wood was selected by officials and coaches for All Tournament honors. Both boys and girls named to the All Tournament teams were awarded a medal to commemorate the tournament and their honor.

JV Having Good Season

We all know how the Rivercrest Rebel and Rebelette varsity teams have high hopes of repeating their district championships, but there are three other teams at Rivercrest who work just a shard for less recognition. These teams are the boys and girls junior varsity teams, and the freshman boys team.

The freshman boys, under the direction of assistant coach Perry Cowan, post a 3-1 season record, with their only loss coming this past Friday night in a tournament in Atlanta. But the squad overcame that loss and defeated Mount Vernon's Tigers in front of a home crowd Monday night. Six foot one center Anthony Brown led scoring for the Rebels with 17 points. John Easley added nine and James Anderson put in eight more.

The other boys team is the junior varsity, led by the newest member of the RHA coaching staff, Andy Jones. The junior varsity team is made up of mostly sophomores and ineligible juniors. The team traveled to Celeste this past weekend and brought home the consolation trophy. Thursday they lost to Anna 59-55, but Saturday they came back to post a 50-38 victory over Westminster for the consolation spot. Kelly Jeffery led scoring for the two games with 25 points

total. Shan Wilkins added 20 and Dwayne Wilson had 19 for the two games. The JV also played Mount Vernon Monday night in the nightcap and defeated them 50-37. Roger Tipton led scoring with 15 points, while Jeffery added nine to that. The victory boosted the junior varsity's record to 2-4.

And last, but certainly not least, is the last of the three "hardly noticed" teams...the junior varsity girls. Girls coach Frank Stubblefield, with two trips to the state tournament under his belt, must be doing something right, and these girls are no exception. The all-freshman team boasts a 8-1 season record with their only loss coming this past weekend in the Celeste tournament against the Celeste varsity for the first place trophy.

Last Thursday the young team met the varsity team from Anna and quite handily defeated them 75-41. Five foot nine center Staci Thompson, and five foot five center Mary Savage, led scoring for the Rebelettes with 16 points each. Carla Belcher put 12 more in. In semi-final action Friday the girls met Bells varsity and won in a close contest 46-45. Belcher led scoring with 14 points and Becky Brooks added 11 more. This sent them to the finals when they played the host team Celeste varsity on Saturday. They

put up a hard battle and led scoring several times, but fell short by one point at the last buzzer 53-52. Scoring was led by Staci Thompson with 12 points. Brooks put in 11 and Jerry Smith and Mary Savage each put in 10. The girls brought home the second place trophy and placed two players on the all-tournament team. These players were Staci Thompson and Becky Brooks. The Rebelette JV played Mount Vernon Monday night and handed them a 57-13 loss. Thompson led the scoring with 17 points. Brooks and Savage each had ten.

The junior varsity teams usually play almost the same schedule as the varsity, but either the day before the varsity or the same day at an earlier time.

Activities And Plans Discussed At Rivercrest Board Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, December 8, 1981 at 7:00 p.m.

Kay Kennedy, Curriculum and Community Education Coordinator met with the Board to discuss progress and plans being made for various activities that will be offered through the Community Education Program. Mrs. Kennedy said that plans call for courses and programs to be offered to the public in Horticulture, Meat Lab Course, and Mirror Painting. Other ideas and suggestions will be obtained from the public through a community survey that will be conducted in the near future. Also, Mrs. Kennedy briefly reviewed the Gifted & Talented Program for 4th and 5th grade students which is to get underway in January.

Principals Tillman Hale, Gerald Stegall, and Robert Giddens met with the Board

to give preliminary teacher evaluation reports for their respective campuses. While the Talco-Bogata CISD has required formal teacher evaluations for a number of years, S.B. 341, known as the Term Contract Nonrenewal Act as passed by the 67th Legislature, has added new provisions and requirements related to the evaluation of all certified school personnel.

Bids were opened for the sale of a two bedroom house and lot belonging to the school in Block 3 of the James Gieger Addition in Talco. A bid in the amount of \$4500 was accepted by the Board pending various provisions before the sale is finalized. Also, a bid was accepted for new carpet for the business offices at Rivercrest.

In matters concerning personnel, Lucille Jones was employed as a teacher for the remainder of the 1981-82 school year replacing Fredrika Hudson, whose family will be moving from the community at mid-term. Also, the resignation of Francis Smith, Rivercrest teacher aide, was accepted. She has been employed by the Red River County Appraisal District. Plans do not call for a replacement for this position.

A recommendation was made by the administration that a Rivercrest student be suspended because of disciplinary reasons for the remainder of the semester. Board approval was given to the recommendation.

The annual audit report of various school funds and programs made by the firm of McClanahan & Holmes of Paris was approved. The audit revealed the records to be in good condition.

In final action, approval was given to the various financial reports, a Textbook Committee for the 1981-82 school year, and the purchase of drafting tables for the Industrial Arts Program and a copy machine for the business office with the use of Title IV-B Funds. The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, January 12, 1981 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

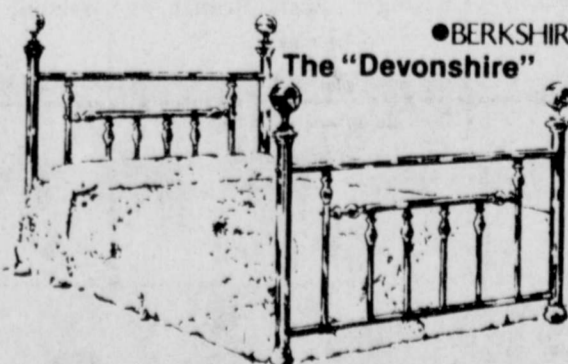

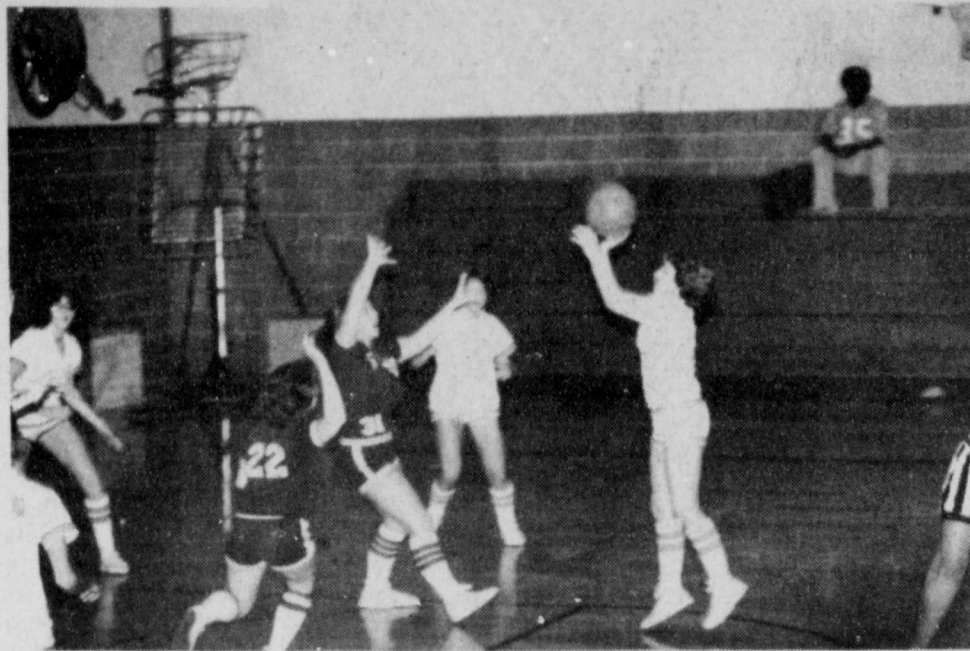
The couple's four children, A.C. Tiffie of Bogata; Mrs. J.C. (Mattie) Williams of Estelline; Mrs. A.F.

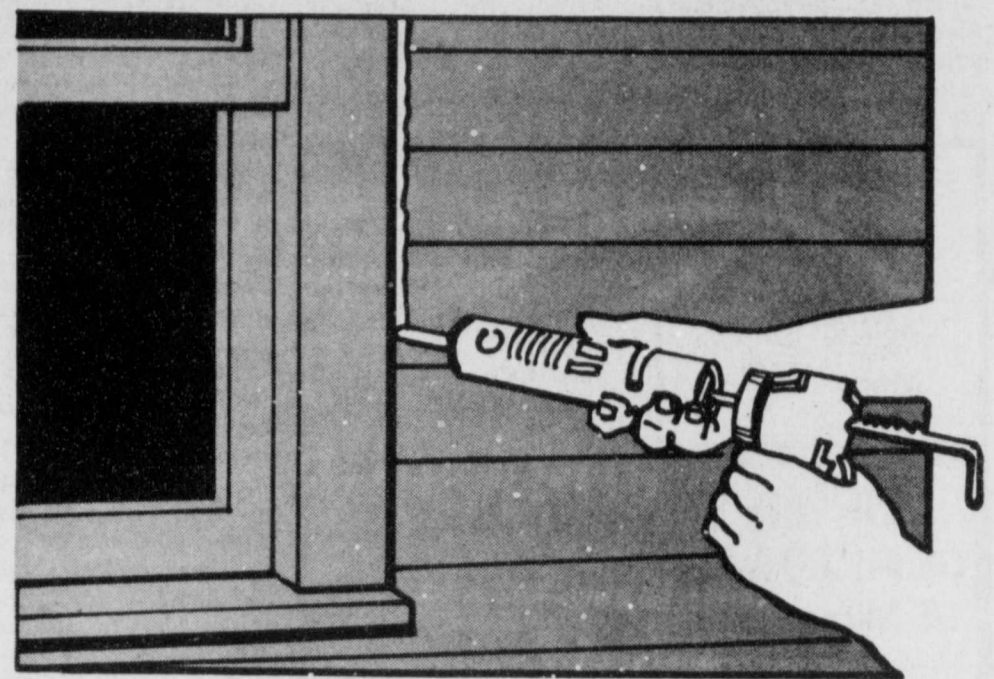

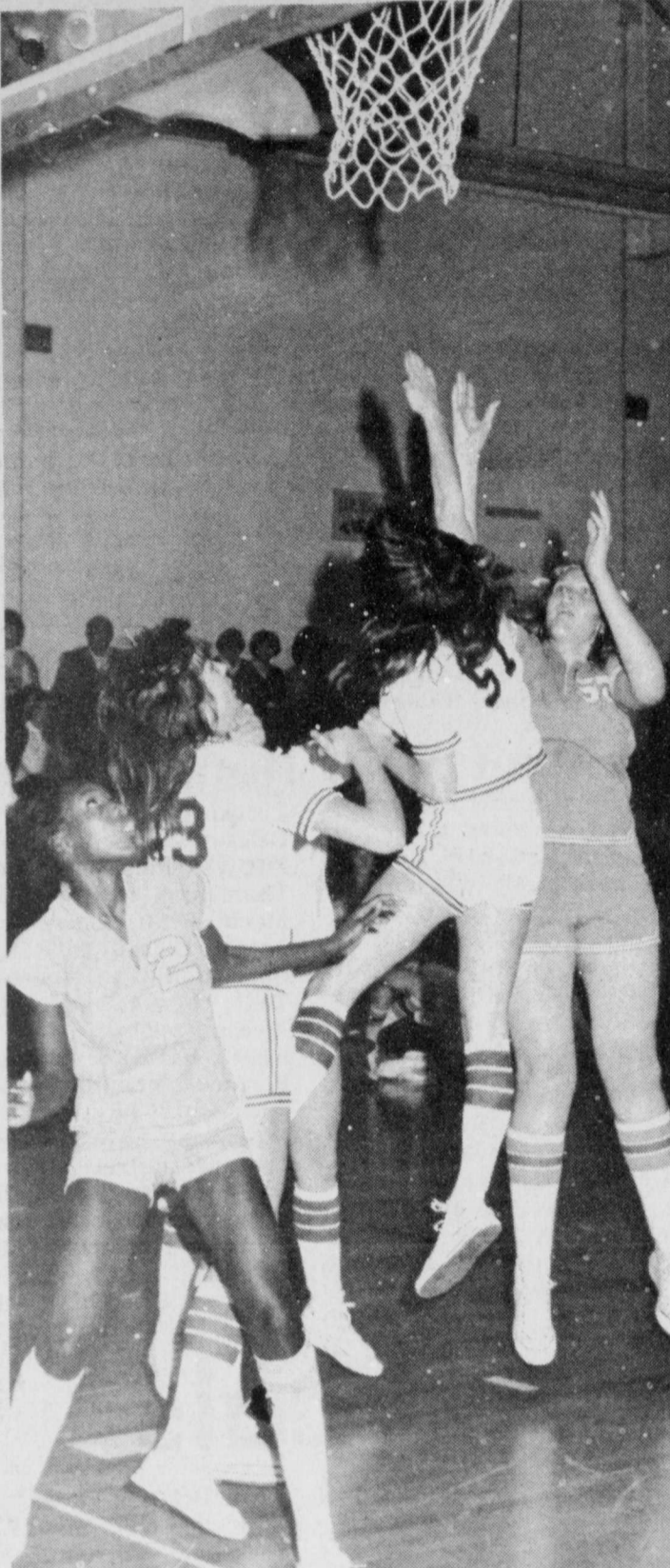

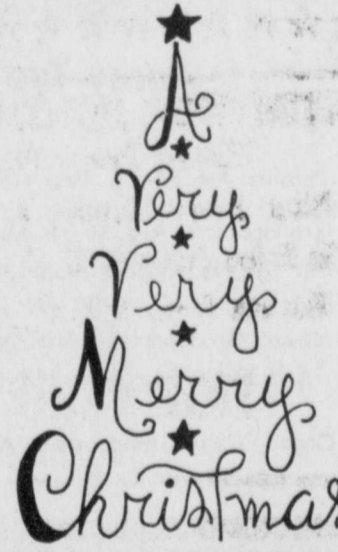

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.



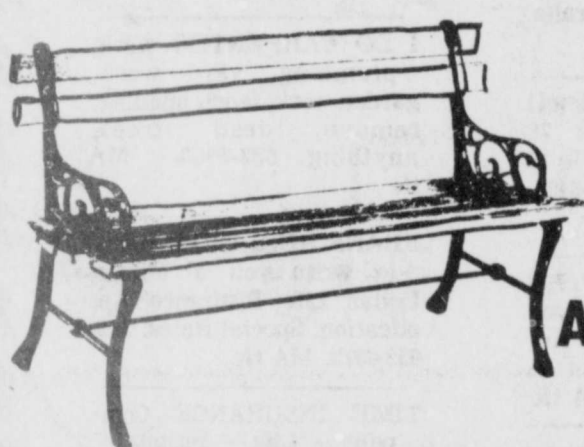

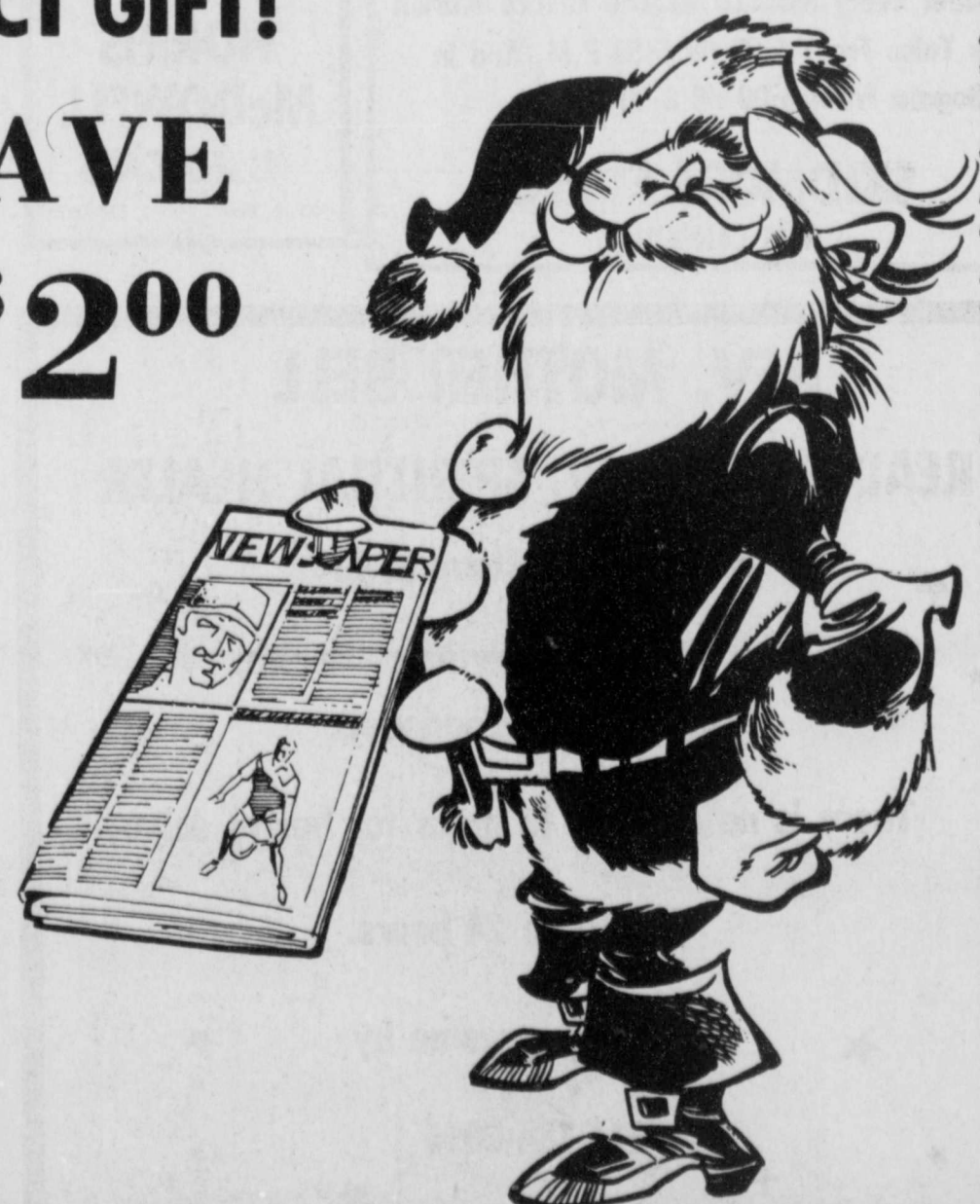
