Thoughts About Next Spring's Vegetable Garden

The debate carries on and at this point in time there appears a fairly equal division of opinions as to whether the 1981-82 winter season will be moderate and short-lived or cold, long and hard. For the avid vegetable gardener, it is always long. One can spend only so much time poring over seed catalogues and outlining a garden plot on paper.

There may be things that need doing, however. In the warm climates of the southern states some garden work now can set the stage for increased quality and production next growing season.

Plant stalks, vines, weeds and stems left in the garden serve as a winter home for both insect eggs and disease organisms. These should be removed, or shredded and used as part of a mulch. When weather and soil con-
