Bingo Question Vote Set

Under new laws, Bingo was made unquestionably illegal after January 26, 1982 unless sponsors have obtained the proper license from the State Comptroller's office following a vote of approval in a town, precinct, or county.

Those governmental entities in which Bingo is approved may levy a two

percent sales tax on the gross receipts from the sale of Bingo cards at licensed games, if desired.

An election on the question could have been held on January 16 and a number of governmental sub-divisions, 13 municipalities and all or a part of 19 counties, did vote on the question, generally giving approval by wide

margins.

The Bingo question will come to vote for Bogata on Saturday, April 3, 1982.

Towns, precincts and counties which did not make the January 16 election deadline are required to wait until the April 3 date to make a decision.

The election will be held in Justice Precinct No. 2.

The polling place for the Bingo Election will be Bogata Elementary School Gym. The polling place will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

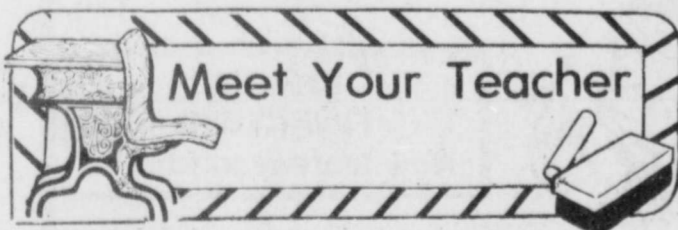
Hearron is a plant operator at the New Hope plant. He joined the company in 1947 as a roustabout in Talco and he assumed his

All interested in planning these activities for these communities are invited to attend.

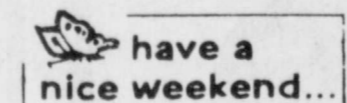
Aging Advisory Council To Meet

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be con-

ducted at the Bogata City Hall, Bogata on April 8, 1982 from 2 to 4 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age,

beginning at two months of age.

All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

Taxpayers Can Extend Deadline

Taxpayers who need extra time to file their federal tax return may receive an automatic two-month extension, the IRS says.

The application for an extension beyond the April 15 deadline is filed on Form 4868. The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file, not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. The taxpayer must compute

the tax expected to be owed for 1981 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

Taxpayers eligible to file the shorter Form 1040A are allowed the automatic extension, but must use the Form 1040 instead of the 1040A when filing after April 15.

U.S. citizens outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their tax deadlines can receive an automatic two-month extension of the filing deadline without filing Form 4868. Taxpayers who qualify for this type of extension must attach a statement to their tax return when they file, explaining that they were outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the filing deadline.

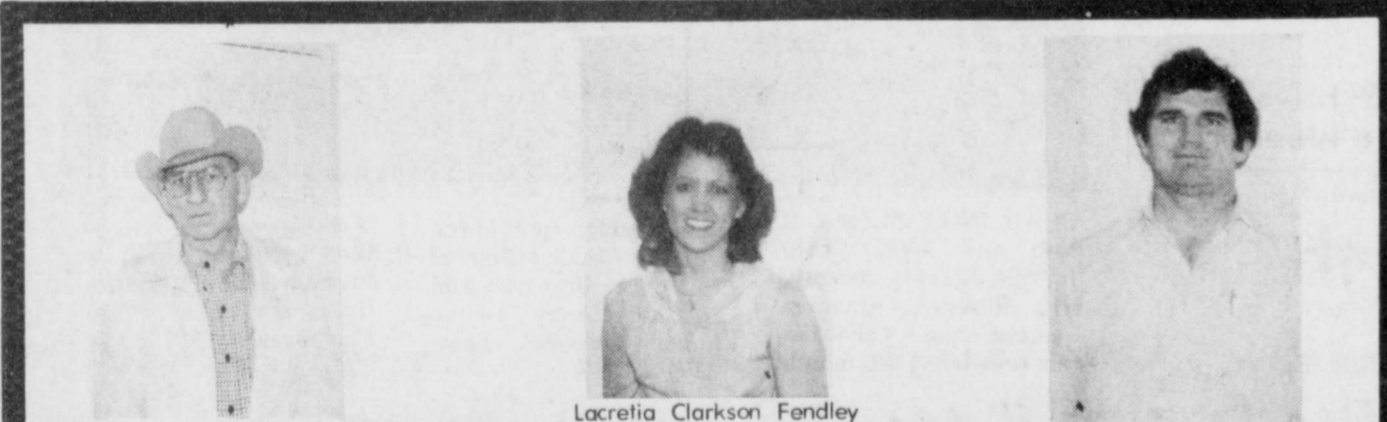

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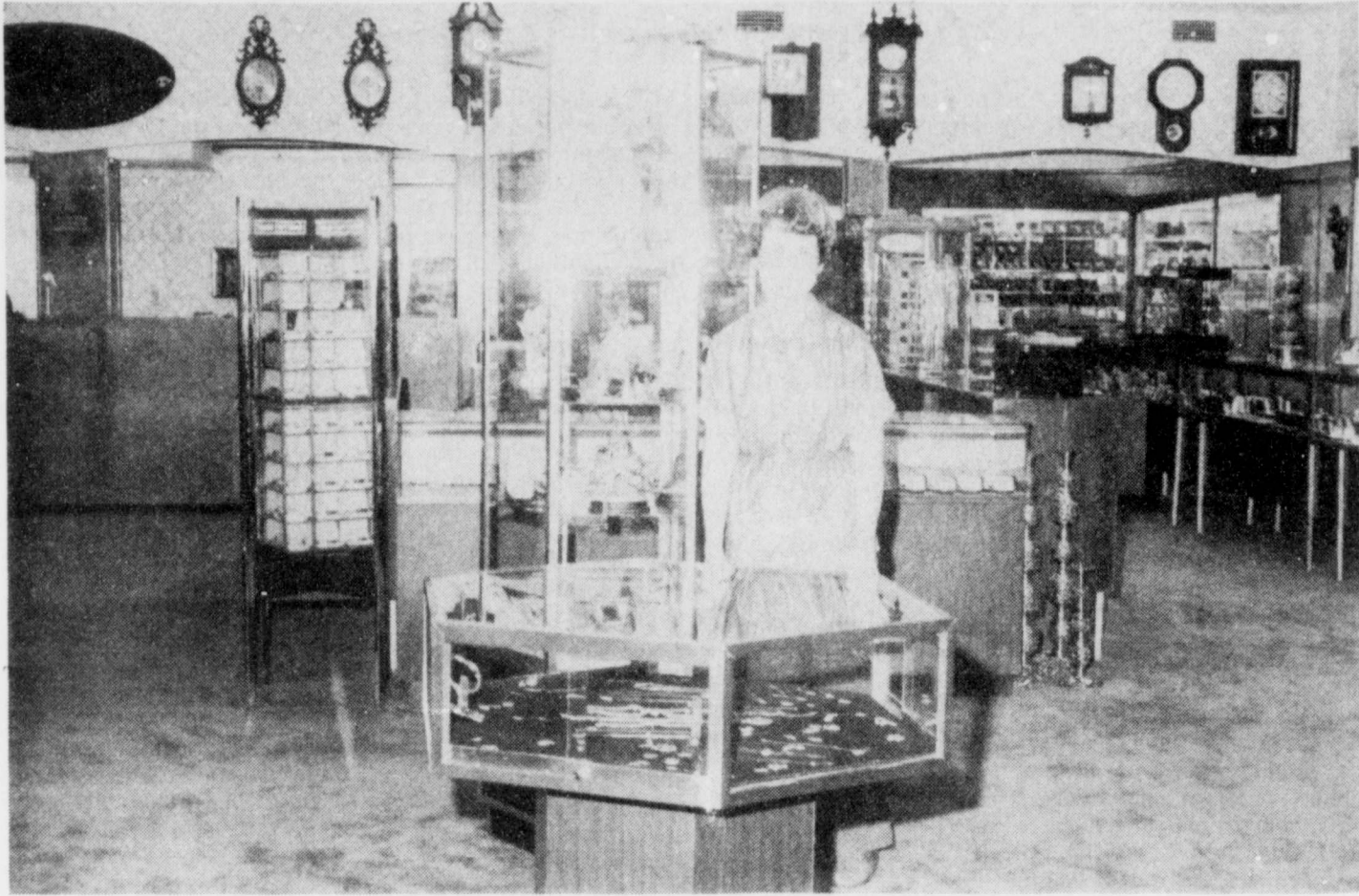

PRICES UP AND DOWN

Marketbasket prices have had some ups and downs in recent months, but no drastic changes.
 Look at 10 of the most commonly used: coffee, eggs, flour, ground beef, margarine, bread, milk, orange juice, sugar and pork chops.
 The cost for these 10 items, when name brands were purchased, was \$14.11 in January 1982. In October 1981 it was \$13.68, 43 cents less.
 But if we bought store brands when available, we spent \$12.44 in January, compared with \$12.65 in October. That's a drop of 21 cents.
 Sugar showed a definite 10 percent decrease.
 This survey may not match everyone's experience, and there are seasonal price changes. It does, however, give an overview of the changes we all note on weekly trips to the supermarket.

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Check Yourself On 1981 Tax Return

The Internal Revenue Service offers a two-pronged approach to avoiding time and money consuming errors on your federal income tax return.

First of all, be fully prepared before you start filling out your return. Start as soon as possible—and before you begin, check the following items:

- Do you have all necessary records and forms easily accessible.
- Do you have plenty of time.
- Have you received a Wage and Tax Statement from each employer you worked for during the past year.
- Do you anticipate any questions or problems. Are you puzzled about any particular law changes. If so, check your instructions.
- Also, check with IRS. They may have a free publication that will answer your questions.
- And before you send it, do this final check.
 - Are all W-2 forms attached.
 - Are all supporting schedules attached to your Form 1040.
 - Is the arithmetic correct.
 - If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently.

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Leaving Shingles On Caused A Roofing Problem

Some 12 years ago, I purchased a home that was about 60 years old. I knew at the time that I would have to replace the roof, which was cedar shingles. Two years ago, when I could put it off no longer, I looked for the most economical way to do it, and accepted the word of a roofing contractor that I could solve my problem for another 20 years by letting him put plywood over the shingles as a support for new roofing material. The price was right, but now there are big "humps" here and there, which indicates I have problems. A carpenter friend tells me that the contractor probably used nails that were too short and the plywood foundation is pulling apart at the joints. Is he right and, what do I do?

He could be right. What you should do is consult a qualified roofing contractor.

Should ordinary galvanized metal be treated before painting and, if so, how?

Unless the surface is treated, paint will quickly peel off ordinary galvanized metal. A simple method of treatment involves nothing more than sponging the metal surface with ordinary vinegar, letting it stand for one hour, rinsing off with plain water and allowing to dry before painting.

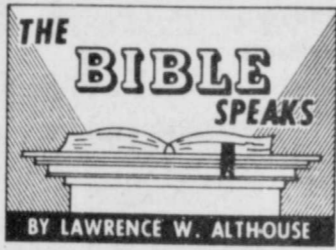
What is a spiral ratchet?

A most versatile screwdriver — fitted with a ratchet which may be adjusted so that simple downward pressure on the handle will either drive or draw a screw.

MANY REBUKED HIM!
April 4, 1982

Background Scripture: Mark 7:31-37; 10:46-52
Devotional Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:1-13.

Bartimaeus, the blind beggar, angered the crowd. They had come to hear Jesus of Nazareth and he had the effrontery to call to the Nazarene: "Jesus, son of David, have mercy on me." How could they hear Jesus if this beggar was to keep up his wailing? Mark tells us that "many rebuked him, telling him to be silent" (10:48). Don't bother the Master with your personal problems; we want to hear him preach to the crowd! The blindness of Bartimaeus was considered by the crowds to be a matter of relatively little importance. Jesus was there to talk about religion, not to become involved with individual problems.

Sometimes, it seems to me, that is the impression given by many of Christ's followers today. We may get so preoccupied with handling the crowds that we have neither time nor energy left for the needs and hurts of the people who make up those crowds. As a pastor, I enjoyed preaching to the crowd that sat silently in front of me every Sunday morning. Yet, as I came to know each one of those people, I realized that behind those usually impassive faces there was fear, disappointment, depression, and pain. The circumstances might vary, but in each life there was pain.

Above the Clamor
I came to realize that Christ was probably much more concerned with those

individuals and their pain than with our building program, our board and committee meetings, our arguments over Sunday school curriculum or our budget. I'm not saying these things are unimportant, but that the needs in individual lives ought to have an even higher priority. We would like to rebuke these individuals and tell them to be silent so that we can get on with the work of the church.

Yet, the fact is that Jesus heard Bartimaeus above the clamor of the crowd and answered him, asking: "What do you want me to do for you?" Note that Jesus did not say, "Bartimaeus, I am concerned only for your soul, it is not in my province to heal your body." Nor did he say, "It is not God's will for you to be healed, for he has a plan for you in your blindness." Neither did he say, "Bartimaeus, your blindness is good for you; it will build your character and increase your faith."

Jesus Chose Wholeness
No, what Jesus said to Bartimaeus was: "Go your way; your faith has made you well." The blindness of this beggar was not important to the crowd, but it was important to Jesus. For Jesus wants us to be whole persons; mind, body and spirit. In the Gospels, Jesus never chose illness for his followers and he does not choose it for us now.

The desire to be healed is not the insignificant or inappropriate desire some people seem to indicate. And, if we are not successful in experiencing that wholeness, it does not mean that he has withheld it, or does not will it for us. It means only that for reasons of our finite humanity, His perfect will for us may not be fulfilled in us, just as we may not become as righteous as he calls us to be.

Let us never doubt that Jesus hears our cries and cares about our pain.

Agricultural Briefs

There will be no Guar contracts for Paris area farmers this growing season. Representatives of Celanese Plastics and Specialties Company, Vernon, Texas, made this announcement Tuesday morning in a telephone conversation.

They cited a company decision to limit acres contracted for 1982 as a reason for the cutback. They hope to be able to offer contracts in future years.

We are disappointed in the company's decision because Gar did offer another crop alternative for the farmers

on the lighter soils of the area. Yields in 1981 hit the 800 pound average. We believe higher yields could be produced in our area under "normal" weather.

The extreme wet October and November weather, reduced yields as well as test weight. Producers in a wide area of Texas and Oklahoma

experienced the same problems.

Producers can still plant Guar as there are no acreage restrictions. However, it is not advisable to plant without a place to market the crop.

Beef Cattle Short Course
There is still ample time to

enroll in the 1982 Beef Cattle Short Course to be held April 5 and 6 on the campus of Texas A&M.

A major speaker will be Larry Cundeff, research geneticist with the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center. He will discuss "Cattle Breeding For The Future."

Others will be J.D. Sartwelle of Sealy, a long time leader in the Texas cattle industry and Dr. John Hopkins, head of the Agricultural economics department at Texas A&M.

Zinc on Pecan Trees
Individuals with pecan trees are reminded to spray this spring with zinc sulfate on NZN. The first spray

application should be made after bud break and when the new terminal growth is from one and one-half to two inches in length. The second application to be made prior to pollination and the third the last of May when an insecticide is applied for case-bearer control.

Applying zinc to a pecan tree is probably the one best management practice that can be carried out with pecan trees. Homeowners with a tree or two in their yard can effectively apply the material to the tree by using one of the hose-on type applicators.

If cows are with calf, both doses can be given in less than four months pregnant. One dose can be given during the fifth and sixth month, but none after that time.

Mineral and feed supplements containing one of the tetracycline

(Aureomycin) fed prior to and during the fly season do a very effective job of preventing the disease. The key point to remember with these materials is to make it available prior to fly season.

Dairymen, for all practical purposes, are unable to feed the tetracycline supplements to lactating dairy cows because of antibiotic traces in the milk. However, dairymen can use it if consumption of the tetracycline is limited to 70 mg. per head a day. Prior to using, a dairyman should read the label and following the instructions to a "T". It is my personal opinion that a dairyman having a Fly Fever problem has only one choice and that is to vaccinate. A dairyman in this situation can no longer take a chance of losing a \$1500 dairy cow.

Back in the 1920's, life was quite different. There were no good roads or cars to take people where they wanted to go. When you ran out of something you needed, you didn't just jump in the car and run to town.

The country stores carried some of the basics, and the "chicken peddler" as we called him, had some more. A wagon or an old Model-T truck served as his store, and he carried a variety of goods.

The peddler's wagon had bins on each side with big doors that folded down to make a counter. There were pins, needles, thread and cloth to be used as a farm woman decided it was necessary, to sew on patches or even make new dresses or shirts.

We called them chicken peddlers because they all had a big chicken coop on the back of their wagon. If you had no money, they would take chickens instead, or they would sell you a big fat chicken for Sunday dinner. A kind of traveling drug

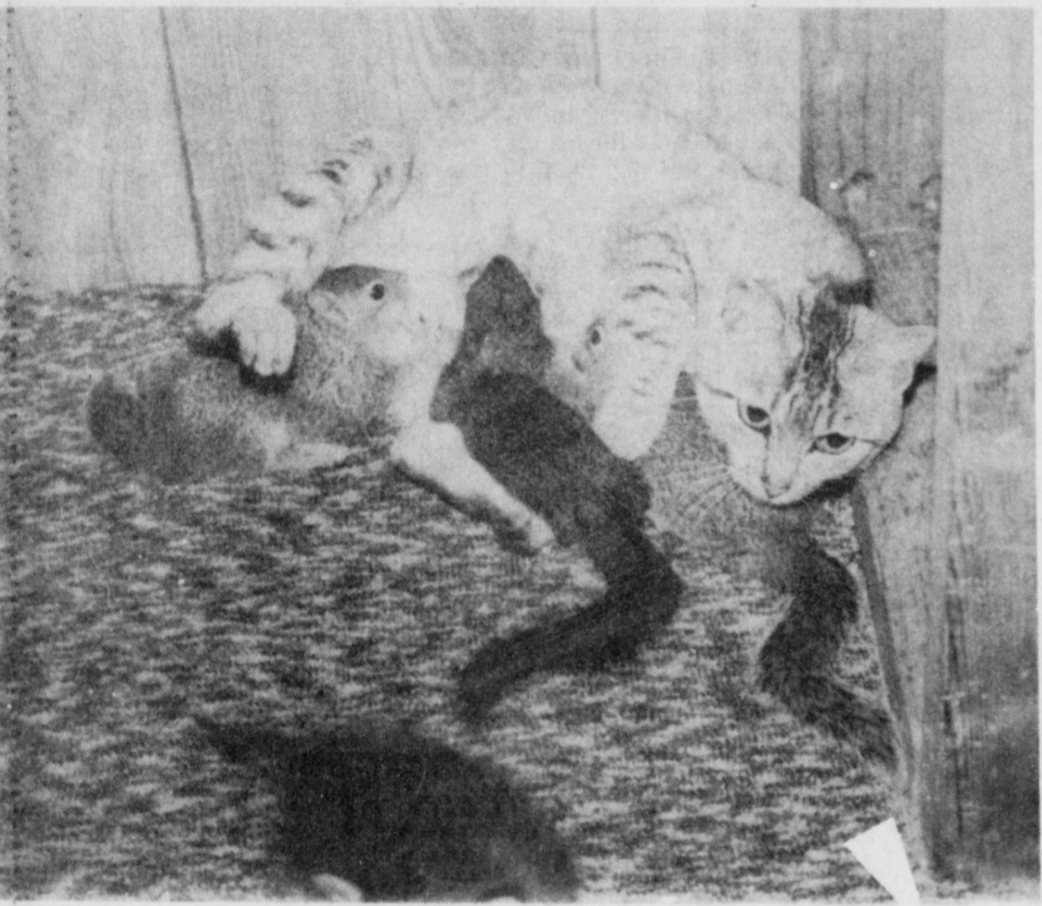
store also would take chickens as payment. They sold Raleigh products and had something for just about whatever ailed you.

In the part of the country where we lived, there was a man who came around every summer selling peaches and watermelons. In the fall, he would be back with a wagonful of apples. As a kid, I think those were the very best apples I ever ate. I never knew his name, but just called him Peg. The reason for that was he had a peg leg. One year he didn't come around anymore. We never found out for sure, but figured that he died. We missed him, because he always camped on our property when he came. Like all the peddlers, he was an independent type, and paid his own, if not with money than with work.

Almost as important as the goods the peddlers brought were their stories and news of what was happening. Without television, radios or the modern phone, we were always starved for news and gossip, and the peddlers always knew it all!
