## Runoff Elections At Talco

Talco voters will return to the voting booth on June 5 to decide the November finalists in at least four Titus County races, including three for local precinct level representation.

Voters were unable to give a clear majority to candidates for county judge, Pct. 3 county commissioner, justice of the peace and constable in the first Democratic primary last Saturday.

The countywide race for county judge, there will be a June 5 runoff between James R. (Jimmy) Shields and Bill Harper, who emerged as the top two runners in the five-man race for that post.

On the Talco level, 348 of the 612 registered voters in the Talco precinct went to the polls.

In the Pct. 3 county commissioner's race, it will be Ronnie Logan and Roy Price in the June 5 runoff. Logan led the Saturday vote, precinct wide with 39 percent of the vote to 25 percent for Price. At Talco, Logan was the winner with 196 votes while Eugene Mankins was second with 57 votes while Price tallied 52; Horace Milner, Jr., 27; and Earl Anderson, 12.

Johnny Mac Brown will face Hubert Martin in the justice of the peace runoff. Brown topped the Saturday vote with 41 percent and Martin had 24 percent. However, in the Talco voting, Colean Dixon carried Talco with 146 votes to 77 for Brown. Others were George Bond, 71; and Martin, 42.

In the constable's race for the area, there will be a runoff between Jack G. Daniel and Steve Stephens. Daniel carried the first round with 47 percent while Stephens finished second in the three-man race with 30 percent. Daniel and Stephens finished 1-2 among Talco voters, with Daniel receiving 126 votes and Stephens, 118, while the third man, Robert R. Kennedy, polled 65 votes.

## Whiteman Beats Judge Sullivan

William S. "Scotty" Whiteman, a retired deputy U.S. marshal making his initial bid for an elective office, scored a somewhat surprisingly easy victory over incumbent Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan in the county's Democratic primary Saturday.

Whiteman, 55, posted a better than 2-1 win over Judge Sullivan who was seeking her second full year term as the county's chief administrative officer. The unofficial returns gave Whiteman, a resident of Clarksville Route 6, a total of 2,782 votes to only 1,426 for Sullivan.

The Johntown precinct apparently was the lone voting box in the county to give Judge Sullivan an edge and that was by a single vote, 28-27.

The duel was close in Bogata, but Whiteman was the winner, 153-148. In other area precincts, Fulbright favored Whiteman, 44-17; Rosalie gave Whiteman a 38-17 margin and Cuthand favored a change in the judgeship by a 30-20 vote.

Bogata election judge Roy Marris reported 305 votes were cast in the local precinct.

Incumbent County Treasurer Donna Townes defeated challenger Bobby Lillard by some 1,200 votes countywide. She won easily in Bogata, 229-52; at Fulbright, 44-17; at Rosalie, 45-17; at Johntown, 43-7; and at Cuthand, 33-14.

In the close race for county Democratic chairman, Mary M. Sturdivant won at Bogata, 126-117; at Johntown, 26-17; and at Cuthand, 24-20; but Pace won at Fulbright, 30-25; and at Rosalie, 32-24.

Bogata voters joined their fellow county citizens in favoring Buddy Temple for the governor's chair. Temple easily carried the county with 2,016 votes to 884 for Mark White and 824 for Bob Armstrong. Bogata voters cast 153 ballots for Temple, 58 for

White and 54 for Armstrong. John Hannah was favored by Bogata voters to become the next Texas attorney general, with 111 votes to 83 for Jim Mattox. The two also ran 1-2 in the county wide count. Jim Hightower nudged Reagan Brown in the commissioner of agriculture race among Bogata voters, 131-122.

Although Bogata area voters were not involved in the voting, Jackie Ray Barton and Bobby Yarbrough led a field of seven candidates in the race for County Commissioner of Precinct 2 and are apparently headed for a runoff race on June 5. Barton led the Saturday race with an unofficial total of 222 votes to 196 for Barton.

Bogata voters gave incumbent State Senator Ed Howard a 250-34 edge over his challenger, "Peppy" Blount; and also favored incumbent Congressman Sam Hall by sweeping 261-22 margin over his rival, Jim Zorn.

The closest statewide race for Bogata voters was for the Place 3 post of the Texas Supreme Court, where Woodrow Wilson Bean was favored by 109 Bogata voters and 107 others voted for Charles W. Barrow.

## News, Times Newspapers Sold To West

Sale of the Bogata News and Talco Times, along with the Times newspapers in Deport and Blossom, to veteran Texas newspaperman Bert C. West and his wife, Betty, effective April 29, is announced today by Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Wright.

West, who has been a daily, weekly and semi-weekly newspaperman in Texas since 1954, is no stranger to the area. Until Nov. 1, 1979, he was owner-publisher of the semi-weekly Steel Country News-Ledger at Daingerfield and had joined a son, Nick, in establishing the weekly Ore City News-Ledger.

After selling the News-Ledger papers, West was general manager of the Johnson City Record-Courier for a while and for the past 15 months was managing editor of the Moore County News-Press at Dumas in the Texas Panhandle.

"My wife and I have been anxious to return to northeast Texas ever since we left. We love this area of the state and its people, and we welcome the opportunity to return," West says.

A native of Indiana, where he began his newspaper career 35 years ago, West moved his family to Texas in 1954 and became managing editor of the Stephenville Daily Empire-Tribune. This was followed with editorships on such newspapers as the El Campo News, Port Lavaca Wave-Times, Bay City Tribune, San Benito News and Pasadena News-Citizen.

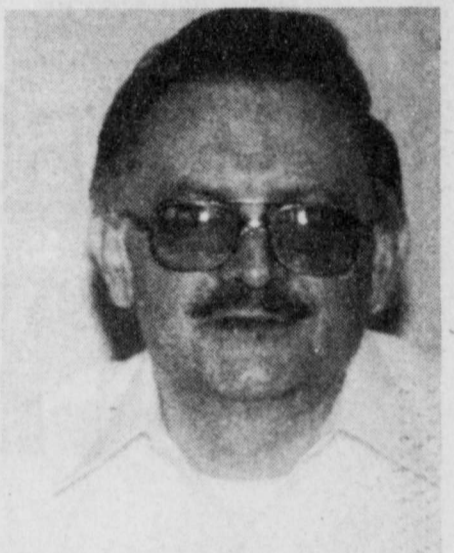
At Pasadena, West converted five weekly newspapers owned by the News-Citizen and located between Webster and Galveston into the daily SpaceLand Star. He also covered the Houston Astros for the Pasadena paper for two seasons.

He later became manager of the Houston Chronicle's news bureau at the Manned Spacecraft Center (now Johnson Space Center) where he reported on U.S. spaceflights through the first three manned landings on the moon.

Along with his Chronicle duties, West was the space center news correspondent for news agencies in France, Turkey and Japan, along with Newsday and the U.S. Information Agency.

West left the Chronicle to become managing editor of the St. Charles, Mo., Journal, which he converted from a weekly into a three times a week publication before returning to Texas and assuming ownership of the News-Ledger that served the Daingerfield, Lone Star and Hughes Springs areas.

In addition to his newspaper chores, West has been active in various

community activities. He is a past president of Jaycee and Optimist Club organizations, a city-county library board and the Calhoun County Fair at Port Lavaca; along with being both an officer and director of three chambers of commerce; a city court judge and national chairman of the public relations committee for the trustee division of the American Library Association.

The Wests are parents of three sons and four daughters. Among the sons, Nick is managing editor of the Palacios Beacon on the Gulf Coast; Pat lives at Jenkins and works for Lone Star Steel; and Larry is a senior at Dumas High School where he has lettered in football and baseball.

Among the daughters, Karen (Mrs. Jacky Hiles) is a dispatcher-jailer with the Morris County sheriff's department in Daingerfield; Deborah (Mrs. Keith Capps) graduated from East Texas State University last year and resides in Lone Star; Dodi (Mrs. Ron Aubuchon) lives in O'Fallon, Mo.; and Leidon (Mrs. Jerry Lange) lives in St. Louis where she and her husband work for the Journal Newspapers.

Another daughter, Tina, died in 1975.

"Despite a seemingly long and active career, we are not looking to the News and Times newspapers as a lazy, retirement-type job," West says.

"We will be an active and enthused publisher, reporter, ad salesman, photographer, janitor and everything else it takes to put out a good product.

"We will do our best to maintain the wonderful acceptance these papers have earned over the years and continue to build them into the best full-service community newspapers possible," he adds.

### Red River Tract In Vet Land Bids

A 41.5 acre tract in Red River County is among 96 forfeited veterans tracts or which sealed bids will be taken June 8 by the Texas Veterans Land Board.

The land parcels are all 10 or more acres and are located in 49 different counties.

Only veterans will be allowed to bid on 84 of the

tracts and the land board will finance 95 percent of the successful bidding price at seven percent interest for 40 years. The other 12 tracts will be available to veterans at the seven percent rate and to non-veterans at eight and one-half percent interest for 40 years.

The Red River County tract is listed as out of the

James W. Gamble Survey, Abs. No. 359; conveyed to the Veterans Land Board by deed recorded in Vo. 302, Page 756 of the Deed Records of Red River County. It is described as being some two miles north of the Negley Community.

Details on how to bid on the tracts and where they are located may be obtained by writing to Texas Land Commissioner Bob Arm-

strong, in care of the Veterans Land Board, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Tex. 78701.

The Red River County tract is the only one in the area included in the forfeited sale.

Armstrong, who sits as chairman of the board, says this is the first forfeited land sale the board has held in nearly five years.

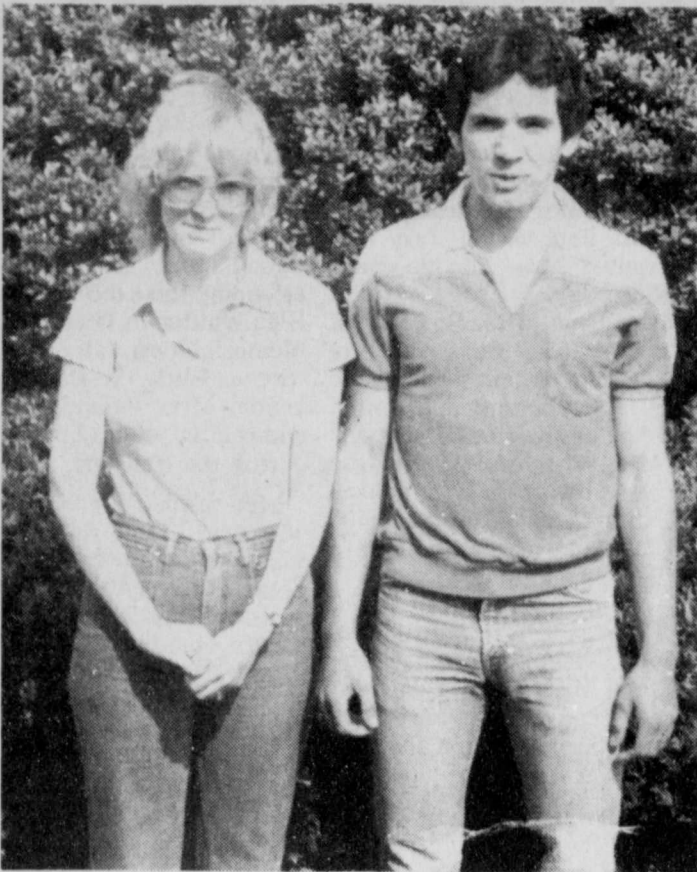
26-28. The TCEA conference is the major statewide workshop for inservice training of community school directors, school administrators, community council members, and other advocates of community use of public

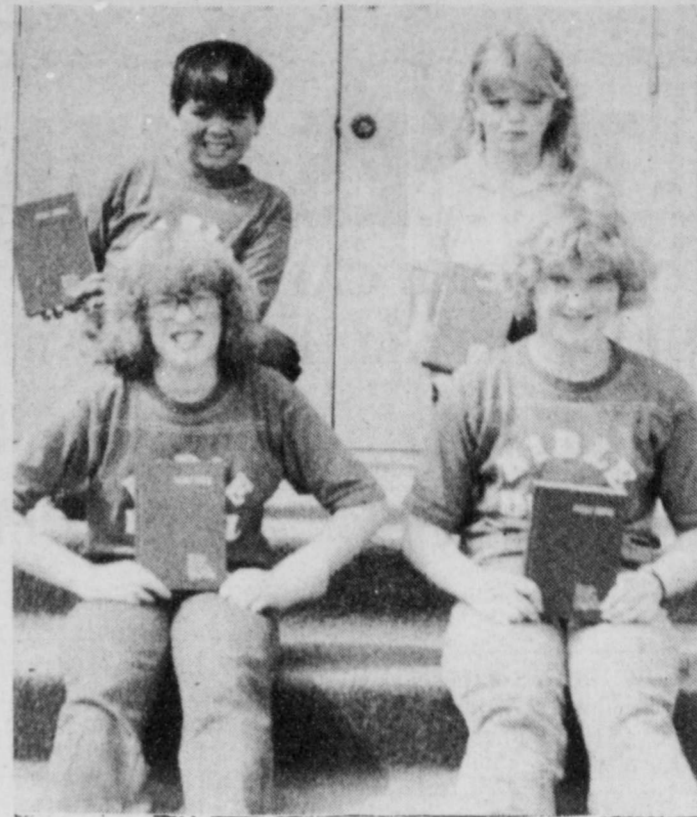
