

# Fire Hits Landmark Building

Fire of undetermined origin caused extensive damage to a meat processing business on North Main Street in Bogata last Thursday and Friday and may have dealt a death blow to the building that has housed numerous businesses for approximately 70 years.

Firemen from the Deport Volunteer Fire Department joined Bogata firemen in combating the fire that was first discovered about 12:30 a.m. Thursday. Firemen were later twice called back to the scene when flames again ignited in the building.

A meat processing business operated by Charles Guest and "Rooster" Davis was located in the brick structure. Guest and Davis had operated the business for the past few months, having purchased the business from Bob Embrey.

The inside of the building, along with the roof, was totally gutted by the fire which firemen say may have started in the attic area.

There was no immediate estimate on the total loss.

Residents reportedly were alerted to the fire when the flames began to cast a reflection from the water tower.

According to the longtime Bogata residents, the building was constructed about 1912. For several years, in the 1920's, it was used as a garage and Ford automobile agency, D.T. Layton.

A tailor shop was believed to have occupied a part of the building shortly before World War II. It was later the Gibson Grocery Store and Market location for some 25 years.

## Tracie Jones Memorial Scholarship Established

Rivercrest school officials have announced the establishment of the Tracie Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund, with the scholarship to be awarded for the first time to a 1982 Rivercrest senior.

The scholarship is in memory of Tracie Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Jones of Talco. Tracie died as the result of an automobile accident in April of 1980. She was to have been a member of the graduating class in May of that year.

Tracie was an outstanding and popular student at Rivercrest. She had been a cheerleader, FFA Sweetheart, as well as a member of the band, FHA, Future Teachers and was an officer of the Allied Youth group.

She exemplified good citizenship throughout her career at Rivercrest.

The scholarship, as set up by the Jones family, will amount to approximately \$400 each year and will be awarded to a different student annually.

The scholarship recipient must have a need for scholarship

Also, the student must have an exemplary record of achievement in academics, citizenship and organizational memberships similar to those displayed by Tracie during her years of membership at Rivercrest High School.

## June 5 Runoff Lacks 'Feature'

Red River County voters will go back to the polls June 5 for the second Democratic runoff primary, but the attraction will be slim and the voter turnout is expected to be light, according to county officials.

There is no runoff for a countywide office, with the Pct. 3 county commissioner's race between Bobby Yarbrough and Jackie Barton the only one involving a county office. That vote will be confined to that precinct.

Other runoff duels will include the vote battle between Alex Short Jr. and John L. Cunningham for the right to

become the Democrat candidate for the District 1 state representative's chair being vacated by the retiring Hamp Atkinson; and four statewide races.

The statewide races will have John Hannah and Jim Mattox in the runoff for the state attorney general nomination; Pete Snelson and Garry Mauro for state land commissioner; John Humphreys and Charles Campbell for Place 1 on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals; and Chuck Miller and Bill Black for Place 2 on

Three Talco residents were seriously injured in a one vehicle accident on FM Road 71 last Sunday afternoon.


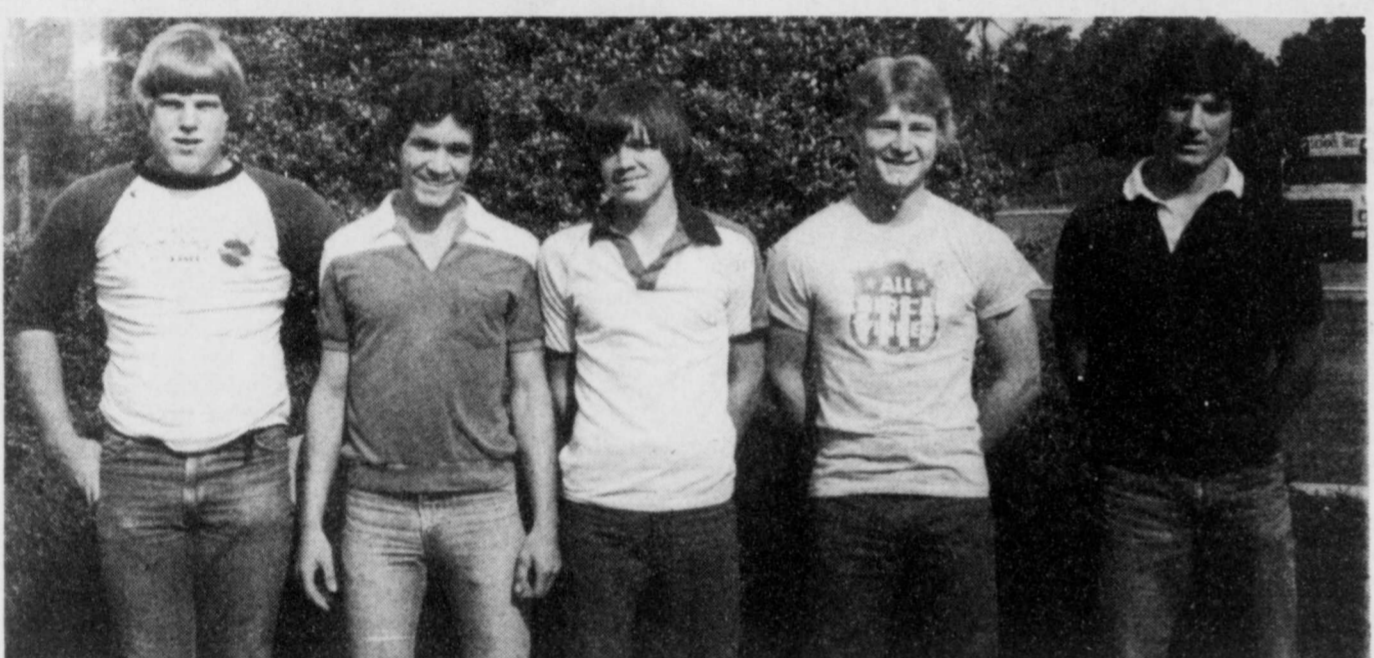

the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

The Pct. 3 county commissioner area is in the northwest part of the county, including Detroit, Bagwell, Negley, Manchester, Kanawha, Kiamatia and Woodland communities. Yarbrough was the vote leader in the May 1 primary with 222 votes, while Barton was a close second in the seven-candidate chase with 196 votes.

The District 1 state representative's race, Short was the May 1 leader on a district basis with 8,832 votes or 47.9 percent of the vote. Cunningham, who won the Red River County vote with 1,637 ballots to 1,407 for Short, finished second in the district-wide tabulation with 6,759 votes for 36.6 percent. The third candidate, Oran Clent Caudle, Jr., polled 15.5 percent to force things into the runoff.

Election officials point out that a registered voter is eligible to vote in the June 5 runoff, even if he (or she) did not vote on May 1.

However, persons who voted in the Republican primary are not eligible to vote in the Democratic runoff.

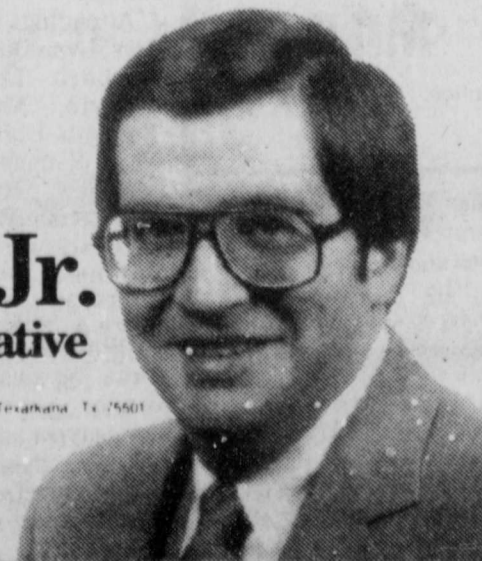

### Crunchy Corn Bread

- One 8-inch square
- 1 cup yellow cornmeal
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tbs. sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 6 slices bacon, cooked, drained and crumbled
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 2 tbs. butter, melted
- 1/2 cup (2 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup finely chopped peanuts
- Butter

Preheat oven to 400°F. Combine dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl. Stir in sour cream, bacon, milk, egg and butter; blend well. Spread evenly in buttered 8-inch square baking pan. Sprinkle cheese and peanuts over top. Bake 20 to 25 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm with butter.
