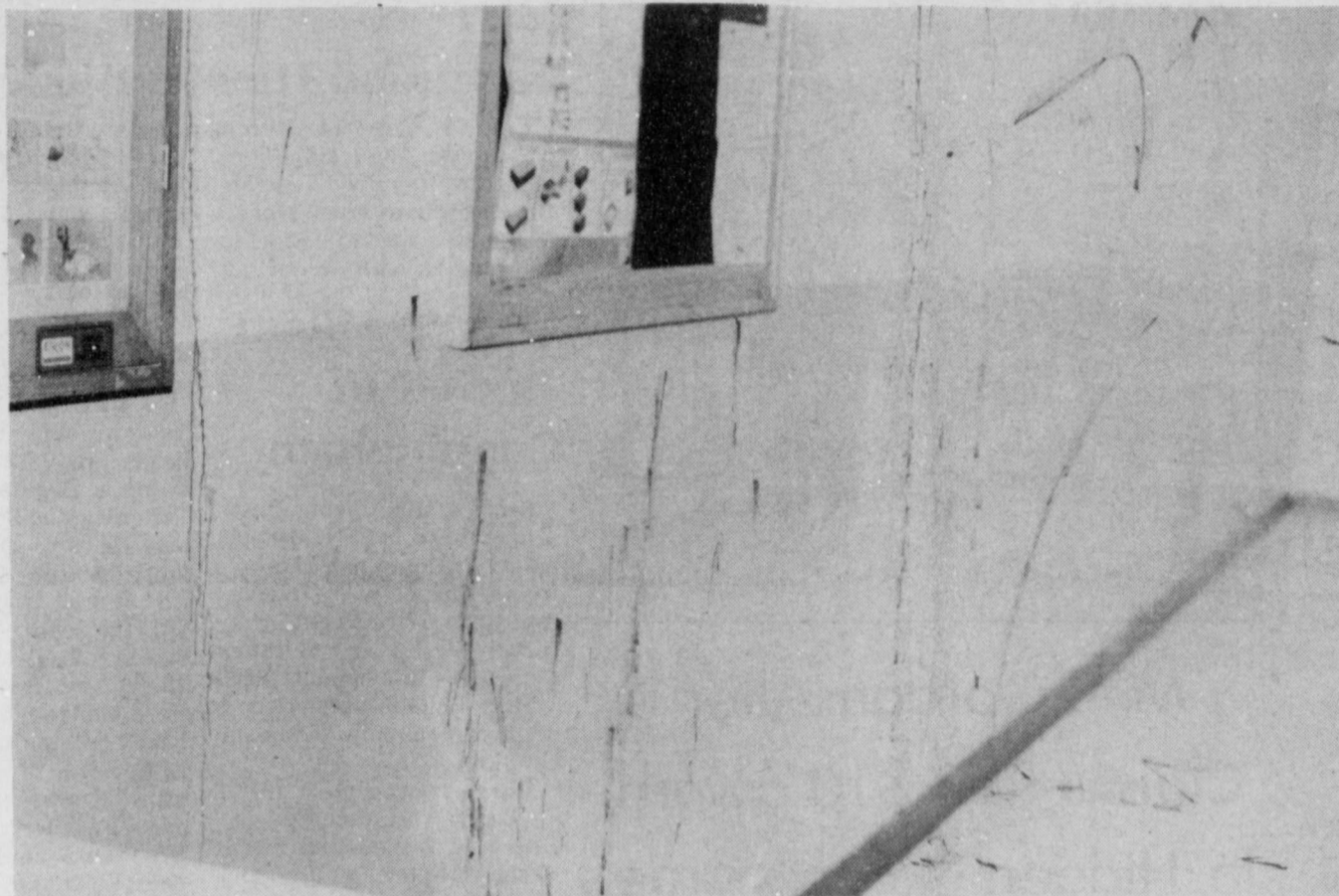

Wisinger.

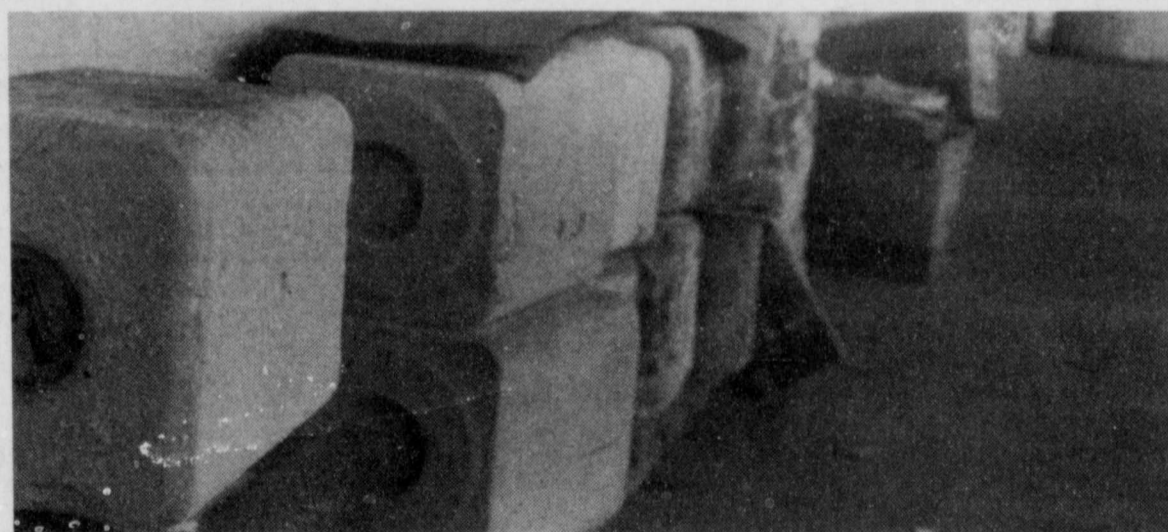

# 3 Candidates In School Race

The Aug. 14 special election to fill a vacancy on the Talco-Bogata School Board has acquired its second and third candidates for the ballot with the filing of two more Talco men, Gene Smith and Lyndon "Pinkey" Reed.

Smith, who filed last week and Reed, who registered for ballot line-up Tuesday, join Gerald Martin, also of Talco, in the special election to select someone to complete the unexpired term of the resigned Donald Jones.

Next Wednesday, July 14, is the final day for candidates to file for a position on the ballot. Candidacy application forms are available in the superintendent's office at Rivercrest High School.

Smith served two three-year terms on the school board before stepping down last April. While a member of the seven-person school board, he served as vice president.

Smith, who operated Talco Butane, is the father of two daughters, one in college and the other will be in the seventh grade this fall.

Reed is making his initial bid for an elective office. A former math teacher at Rivercrest, he is vice president and general manager of Ray's Pipe Supply, Inc., and Ray's Oilfield Services, both of Talco.

Reed has three children, two of them in the T-B school system, one in the first grade, the other in the third grade.

The candidacy of Maritt, first candidate to file for the special election, was announced in the News-Times newspapers last week.

The winner of the Aug. 14 election will complete Jones' term on the school board, which runs until the regular April, 1984 election.

Although candidates for the vacant position must come from the Talco areas of the school district, voting will be by all eligible voters throughout the district.

Residents of the school district have until next Tuesday to register in order to be eligible to vote in the special election. The registration applies to eligible persons who have moved into the district, changed addresses or who will be at least 18 years of age on the date of the election and not registered.

Absentee voting will begin July 21 and continue through Aug. 9, with absentee ballots to be cast at the Rivercrest school.

Voting on the Aug. 14 election day will be at the Talco School and in the Bogata School Gym.

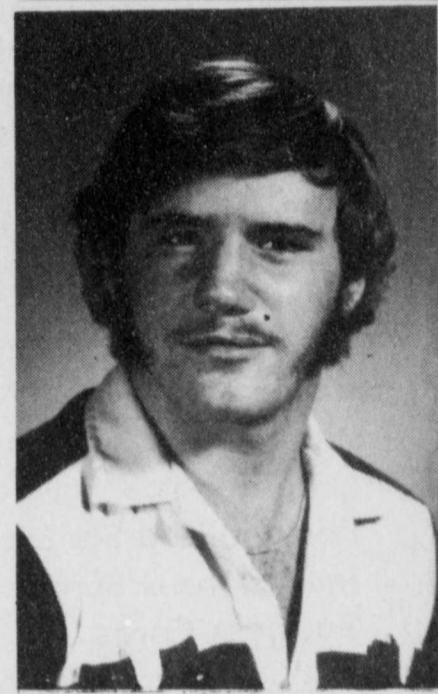

## Youth Dies In Freak Accident

A 17-year-old Bogata youth, Timothy Wayne Williams, was fatally injured in a freak crop-dusting accident on the Cross Arrow Ranch, off FM Road 412 some 10 miles northeast of Bogata, last Thursday.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold J. Williams of Bogata, was serving as a flagman for an airplane crop-dusting a wheat field on the ranch when he was apparently struck in the head by the rear wheel of the plane as it pulled up after completing an extremely low pass over the field.

Young Williams was pronounced dead on arrival at Red River General Hospital in Clarksville about 2 p.m. Thursday after being found unconscious by the pilot and other members of the ground crew.

Deputy Sheriff Barry McClure said only one plane was involved in the incident. McClure said Williams, reportedly on his first day as an employee of the Cross Arrow Ranch, formerly Magic Valley Ranch, was acting as flagman at one end of the field for the pilot, Danny Halley of Clarksville. McClure said Halley was flying across the field at about a three-foot height, which was needed to provide a good application for the type of spray chemical being dispersed, and the plane was flying in the direction of young Williams.

The pilot told authorities that as he pulled up after completing the pass across the field toward young Williams he felt a bump. The pilot immediately landed his plane, McClure said, and with the aid of a second flagman began looking for Williams.

The youth was found after nearly 20 minutes of searching and he was taken by pick-up truck to a nearby road where he was placed in a Red River Ambulance Service unit and rushed to the hospital.

McClure said the youth was apparently struck over the right eye.

A Federal Aviation Administration investigator, called to probe the incident, said such accidents are more common than generally believed. McClure said investigation into the accident has been closed.

Young Williams, born Sept. 20, 1964 at Fort Hood, would have been a junior at Rivercrest High School this fall. He was a member of the Rebel football team and was active in both, FFA and FHA.

Survivors in addition to the parents include one brother, Darl Williams of Clarksville; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Williams and Mrs. G.M. Shupp, all of Bogata, Mr. and Mrs. H.E. Morphew and Mrs. W.E. Shupp, all of Comanche.

Funeral services were held Saturday at the Bogata First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Bob Posey officiating. Interment was made in Cuthand Cemetery, with Bogata Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Active pallbearers were members of the Rivercrest High School coaching staff, with the Rivercrest junior class named honorary pallbearers.

# GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U Courthouse Records Valuable In Research

The fourth principle of genealogical research will be termed--Courthouse Records. These are normally birth, death and marriage certificates. However, deeds, wills, abstracts and administrations may also offer a lot of information. I combined all of these records together in this article because normally they are all found at the county court house. They are normally in the county clerks' office (some parts of the country call this office Probate Judge Office and District Clerks Office, etc.).

Let us consider birth and death certificates. Ever since man has been on the earth, there have been births and deaths. However, not until within the last 100 years did localities have to legally keep any of these records.

Because of the settlement patterns of the United States, most of the older birth and death records were kept in areas that were first settled (Virginia, Bay area, etc.).

When looking for a birth or death record, keep four things in mind. First, remember the people at these offices will not look up information. This may be like asking for John Jones' birth record in Flemingsburg, Kentucky. You need to have some idea of a date of birth or at least a

five year span of which to look.

Second, only try to obtain birth records which contain the information you need. Birth records vary greatly on what they contain, some simply state, Boy Baby born to Mr. and Mrs. Bishop, 1899. This does not help much.

Third, consider your source in death certificates. Normally, death certificate information may not always be correct because the informant is normally going through a terrible feeling of loss. In a case where the relative is very old, the informant may not actually know very much information.

Fourth, always remember to follow up your leads you receive in these documents. These may include--address of next of kin, place of birth of parents, total number of children born to this family, and spouses name.

Wills are a very good source of information. This is especially true because normally a person leaves

something to all of his family. It may list the names of every daughter, son, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, etc. They also list what the person owned and where it

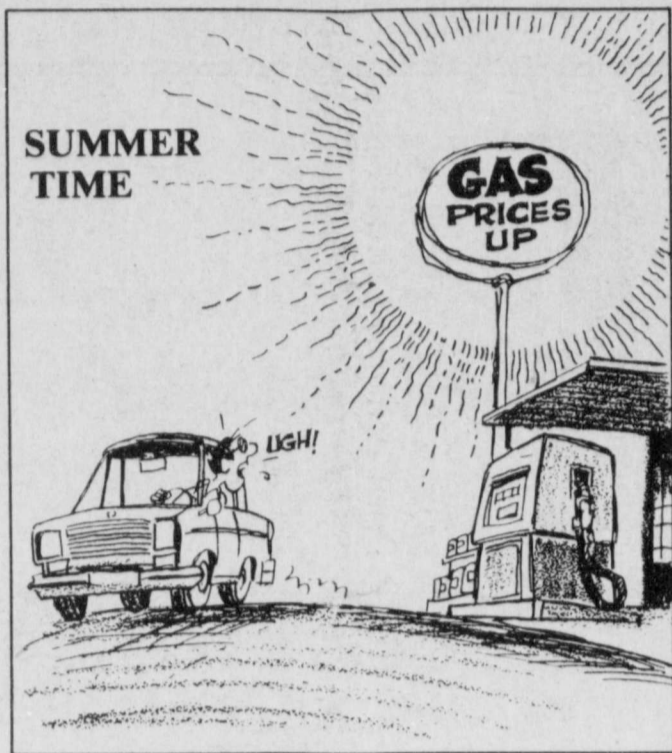
was located. Location as we will learn later plays a lot of importance in our research. Deeds, administrations, and abstracts are very good sources for finding out where

our relatives lived. They also establish the date and times when they lived there.

Remember, when you obtain information from these records to file all information in the proper folders. You should also fill out your family tree charts and put your tacks on the map.

After doing all of these things you will notice that

you may have a lot of incomplete information. For example, you may find a will of John Bishop. In this will he leaves a 300 acres farm in Fauquier Co., Virginia to his sons. This is an excellent piece of information to combine with the research principle we will talk about next week--the fifth genealogical principle--The Chamber of Commerce.

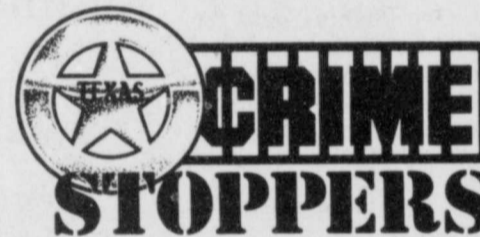
Mr. Tucker died at his residence in Ruston, La. Wednesday morning.

# Sports Corner:

## Would you believe: it's time to talk schoolboy football!

To most Texas sports fans the arrival of July means only one thing: Football season is just around the corner and the annual reviews and previews by such magazines as Dave Campbell's "Texas Football", "Texas Sports", etc., will be hitting the newsstands within the next few days.  
After all, kickoff of the 1982

schoolboy pigskin season is a mere 8 weeks from this Friday!  
The 1982 football season will mark the start of the biggest change in history in the selection of state champions for Texas high school teams in all sports. For the first time, the runner-up in each district will also enter the state playoffs. Locally, this means that both the champ and runner-

up in Prairiland's District 13-AAA will advance into the bi-district round, while the same will apply to the champ and runner-up in Rivercrest's District 17-AA.  
It will be possible for the 1-2 teams from a particular district to meet in the quarterfinals of the state playoffs.  
Starting with the first state championship football game in 1921 when Bryan defeated

Dallas Oak Cliff, 35-13, there have been 170 state championship games in 61 years, excluding the 6-man and 8-man football playing schools.  
The UIL currently turns out state champs in five

classifications each year (not counting the few schools that still play 6-man football.)  
In the past 61 years, 104 different high schools have won outright state football championships and four

others have either tied for a title or been declared co-champion. Eighty-three schools have played in the finals but have never won a title—all of which makes for 191 different schools that have played in state championship games over the past 61 years.  
Wichita Falls holds the record for the most title game appearances, 10, with the Coyotes winning six and losing four. Waco, from years ago, ranks second in title game trips, nine; while Abilene and Brownwood have each been there eight times, followed by Breckenridge, Amarillo, Temple and Odessa Permian, each with six.

Brownwood took over first place with the most titles last year when Gordon Wood's Lions won a record-setting seventh crown. Brownwood's first title came in 1960, also with Wood as coach, which gives the Lions an incredible record of winning a state championship an average of once every three years!  
Last year was a season for "newcomers" to the title games as seven of the 10 state finalists in the five classifications reached the championship showdown for the first time. And, three of them—Richardson Lake Highlands, Bremond and Cameron, won state crowns. The other two titles went to Brownwood and Pilot Point.  
Pilot Point became the first school since China Spring in 1978-79 to make back-to-back trips to the state finals. Pilot Point

Lubbock, 1951-52; Breckenridge, 1951-52; Deer Park, 1954-55; Stamford, 1955-56 (also had a double going in 1958-59, but had to forfeit the 1959 crown); Albany, 1960-61; Dumas, 1961-62; Garland 1963-64; Austin Reagan, 1967-68; Brownwood, 1969-70; and Cuero, 1973-74.

The closest this immediate area has come thus far to claiming the state football jewels was the Paris team of 1980 which lost the Four-A shootout to Huntsville, 19-0; and the 1973 Mt. Pleasant team that lost the then Triple-A finals to Cuero, 21-7. Some, however, might want to claim kinship to Pittsburg's great defensive team of 1980 that won the Triple-A gems.  
We'll have more about past years and the 1982 season next week.

### PJC Registration To Start Aug. 16


Registration for the fall semester at Paris Junior College will begin on Aug. 16, according to Max Mabry, director of counseling at the college.

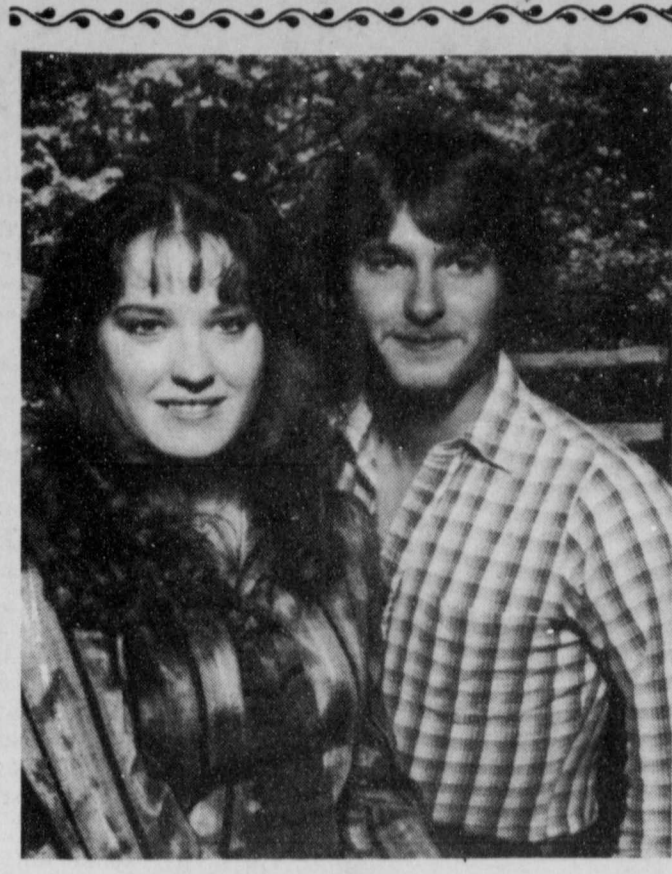

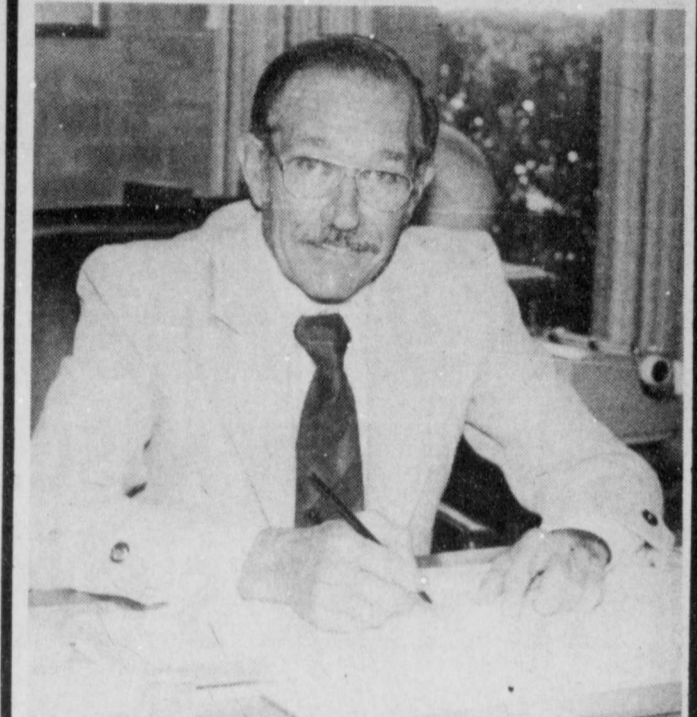

Moore Completes Erosion Control

By RAY HADDOCK Dalton Moore has completed an erosion control dam on his farm about three miles west of Avery. The dam was built during early spring to control active gully

erosion. Moore has also done an excellent job of establishing a bermudagrass cover on the dam and spillway.

The dam is 772 feet long and contains 13,852 cubic

yards of fill. It contains a drop pipe structure for erosion control and flood storage benefits. A 42 inch diameter riser and 24 inch diameter barrel through the dam will take care of most

rains. A very large rain that could be expected once in 25 years may cause the emergency spillway to function. Richard Harvey of Annona was the contractor and built the dam with bulldozers.

"The gully will stop now," Moore recently stated as he viewed the nine surface acres of water impounded by the dam. "This will keep the gully from extending further into my pasture," Moore continued.

Moore was eager to answer when asked if the recent rains had tested his newly built dam and structure. "After one rain, water rose to at least one and one half foot above the riser," he stated.

The Soil Conservation Service furnished Moore technical help on design layout and construction inspection.

Cost share help was provided by the local Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District with funds furnished by the Resource Conservation and Development program.

The RC&D program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Technical and financial assistance is available in area plans that have been approved and funded by the state Conservationist.

Four such plans have been approved in Red River County. They are: Langford Lake, Line Branch, Kickapoo Creek and Cuthand Creek.
