## Engineers Agree To File Request For River Funds

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers says it will request federal funds to assist with channeling, improvements and clean-up of the Sulphur River from Highway 37 near Hagansport downstream to Texarkana.

The additional channeling, along with improvement to existing channeling and levees before the Sulphur reaches the Hagansport area, and the establishment of Cooper's Dam in Delta County, is the focal point of petitions turned over to the Corps by the Talco-based Sulphur River Basin Association.

The petitions, circulated by the SRBA in a several county area have been turned over to the Fort Worth office of the Corps of Engineers, containing several hundred names of area citizens.

"The people in the Corps' division office at Fort Worth are interested and concerned about our problem and they have been in the area several times within recent weeks, looking over the area," says John David Wright of Talco, president of the SRBA.

The chief of the Corps' operations division at Fort Worth, Allie Majors, says his department is taking steps to

file an official request for federal funds.

"We will make the request," Majors has said.

There is, however, no speculation on how much time will be required before such a request is acted upon in Washington or if the request will be approved.

Wright says Congressman Sam B. Hall has pledged his support and cooperation with the SRBA efforts.

The lack of channeling along the Sulphur from the Hagansport area has caused extensive flooding problems once the river passes into the Red River and Titus counties areas and other sections as the river winds on toward Texarkana.

Farmers are losing crops everytime it rains in Northeast Texas because of the flooding along the river, a member of the SRBA has declared.

The problem, contends the SRBA, is the existing channeling of the river at its headwaters is forcing the runoff water and debris from storms down the river. When the channeling stops at Highway 37, the excess water floods the land, ruining crops and pasture

However, at mid-week, there were a couple of late-hour problems. Two teams, one from Paris and the other

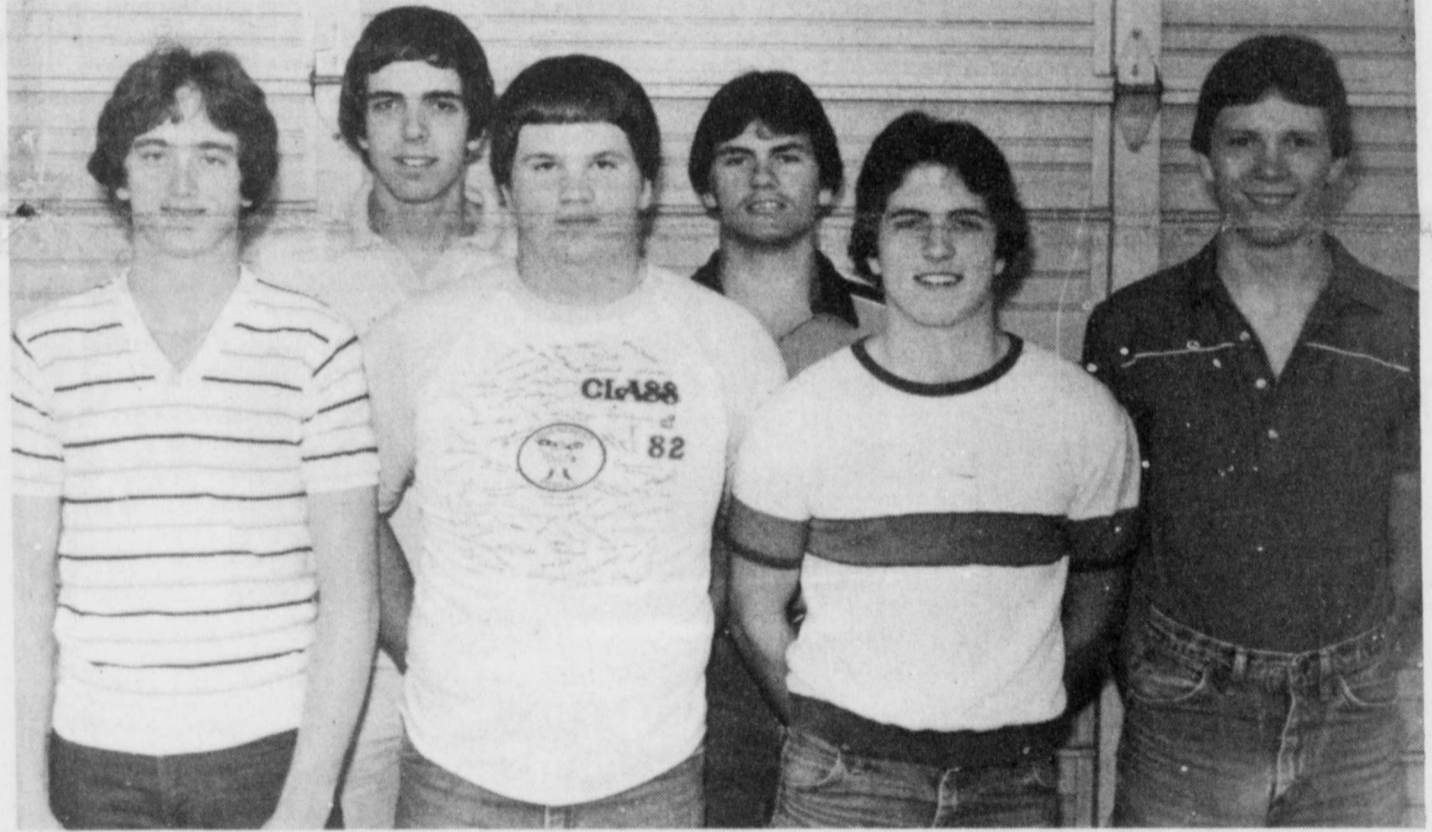
from Hooks, had changed their mind and said they would not compete.

## Candidate Field Unchanged

The candidate field for the special election to fill a vacancy on the Talco-Bogata school board remained at three early Wednesday as the filing deadline for interested candidates was later in the day.

The special election is set for Aug. 14, to select someone to complete the unexpired term of Donald Jones of Talco, who resigned earlier this year upon moving to Mt. Pleasant.

Candidates who had filed for the vacancy prior to the Wednesday deadline were Gerald Martin, Gene Smith and Lyndon "Pinkey" Reed, all of Talco. Smith had stepped down from the board earlier this year after

completing two three-year terms on the seven-member board.

The winner in the election will complete the unexpired portion of Jones' term which extends through the regular April, 1984 school district election.

Although candidates for the vacancy must come from the Talco area of the T-B district, the Aug. 14 voting will be on a district-wide basis. Ballots will be cast at both the Bogata School Gym and at the Talco School.

Absentee voting is scheduled to begin next Wednesday and will continue through Aug. 9. Absentee ballots will be available at Rivercrest High School.

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GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U

Chamber of Commerce Is Good Source For Leads

Few people think of the Chamber of Commerce as a vast depository of genealogical records. This may surprise many when we call the Chamber of Commerce our fifth principle of genealogical research. The information you can obtain from the Chamber of Commerce is very good for developing leads and tracking down further information. When you write to the Chamber of Commerce ask for information on schools, housing districts, churches, a map of the area and a telephone book if possible.

Locate all of the schools, colleges and universities. If you know which schools your relatives went to, write them and ask for any information about your relatives they may have.

Once you have obtained a map, locate where your relatives lived. Here, you may have to refer to the courthouse records (wills or deeds).

After you have established

where they lived you need to ask the following questions. Did your relatives live in a rural or urban area? If they were rural, you may want to draw a four mile radius circle around their house. Most all of their daily business (including going to church) would transpire inside of this circle.

If you know what religious preference they were, then write for information about this at the church of this persuasion nearest to them. Invariably churches traditionally have kept

records much longer than any political entity in this country. Using what we have just learned, always start with the nearest church first.

After obtaining a telephone book, look up all the surnames of your relatives which lived in that area. If you find any people living there today with the same surname contact them for additional family information.

Remember to file all information in your folders. Next week we will discuss further on what type of information you may obtain from our sixth principle church records.

"All the uncles and aunts are dead now. But before they died, they said nothing about Grandpa; they said Grandpa never talked about his early life or George. George has a son named Homer Ary and he lives in Howe, Okla. I've been to see him and we talked, but he said he never heard Grandpa talk about his childhood or about brothers and sisters. "My father, Earl Ary, and

my uncles and aunts, were born in and around Wilburton, Okla. I've been there to the county courthouse, but no records. Have both my grandmother and grandmother death certificates. His birthplace one is listed as Illinois and the death certificate as Tennessee. The information was given by my grandmother's sister.

"There are several other "Ary's" that I've been in contact with, but no relation as far as we know. I've been told that there are more Ary's in Stigler, Okla. Several weeks ago I wrote to the Stigler newspaper requesting information and charges for running an ad in their paper, but have not heard from them.

"I'm searching for any brothers or sisters or other relatives of Lee Ary, born Jun 17, 1860 in either Illinois or Tennessee."

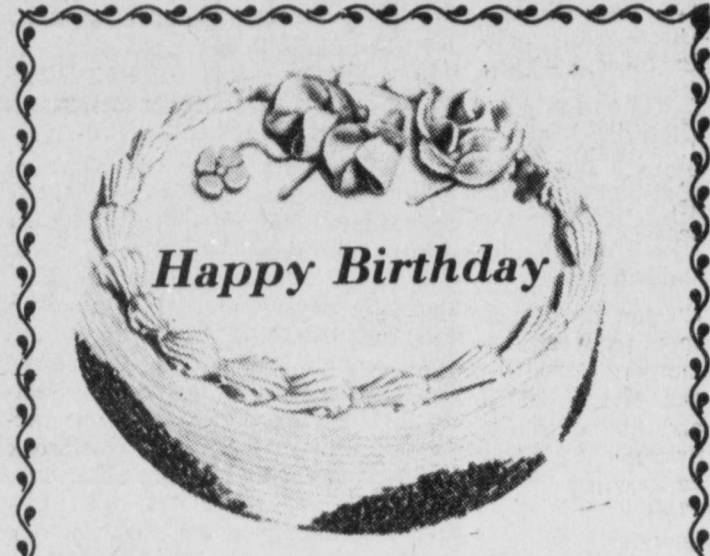

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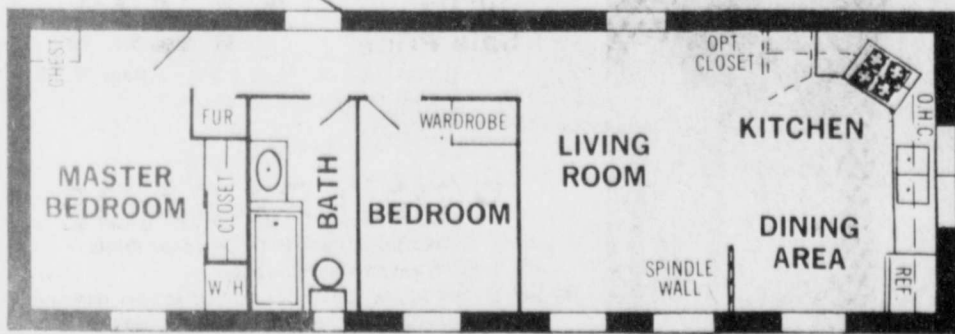

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## Weevil Control Key To Good Pecan Crop

The pecan weevil is one of the most destructive pecan insects, and sampling for this insect usually begins in mid-July and lasts until October.

The pecan weevil life cycle starts with adult emergence from cells in the soil during August and September. Adults then mate and begin laying eggs in pecan nuts. Approximately 42 days after eggs are laid, full grown larvae emerge from the nut and enter the soil. The following August and September, most of these larvae transform to adults and the year after that they emerge to attack the nuts.

Adult emergence must be established before insecticides can be applied properly. Two sampling methods are tree trunk

handing and cone emergence traps.

Tree trunk banding with burlap is a good sampling method. Attach a bag to the pecan tree to be sampled by wrapping it around the trunk 2 feet from the ground. Tie a place and staple or tack the bottom edge to prevent weevils from crawling between the burlap and tree trunk.

The burlap is then cut and layered to allow the weevil to place to crawl and hide. To detect emergence, these panels are lifted and the number of weevils hiding underneath are recorded.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service Fact Sheet No. L-1808, available at the County Extension Office, shows this method in detail.

Perhaps the most widely accepted method of accurately determining adult weevil emergence is the use of cone traps. These are

constructed in a variety of designs using different materials, but they all have a pyramidal shape and over a specific area of the soil surface. As weevils emerge from the ground, they are trapped in the cones.

They seek the highest point which ultimately leads them to confinement in a jar or container at the apex of the cone. By collecting at this point, they can easily be

counted. Fact sheet No. L-1808 also shows how to build and place these traps.

When sampling, growers are also advised to check the nut development. Upon reaching the late gel state in the nut and when adult weevils are found either in the trees or emerging from the ground, the insecticide treatments should begin.

Do not assume you have caught the first weevil and

can wait 3-5 days to treat. Start spraying immediately.

Carbaryl has been shown to be the most effective labeled insecticide for pecan weevil control. Its residual has been found to remain active for 8-12 days following application.

## Prep Grid Finalists Play Longer Season Than Colleges

The big 2-year experiment by the UIL, which will admit the No. 2 team in each sports district in each classification into the state title playoffs—doubling the number of teams going into bi-district, starts with the 1982-83 Texas school year.

Actually what the expanded playoffs mean, in football, is no more open weeks during the regular season for most schools and the addition of one more week to the playoff season.

For teams in conferences Five-A, Three-A and Two-A, the playoff season will be six weeks, starting with the usual bi-district, then comes a new round, "area", followed by regional, quarterfinals, semifinals and finals. There will be one less playoff week for Four-A and One-A schools.

It is somewhat startling to realize that the two teams playing for the state championship in each of the Five-A, Three-A and Two-A conferences, will have played a 16-game high school football season! That's the same number of regular season games that the pros play and four or five more than a college team that even goes to a bowl game will play.

Tack on the two pre-season "Scrimmage" tests, and that makes for 18 straight weeks of football for high school boys on teams that make it to the state finals.

There are some who will claim that is just too much for teen-age high schoolers.

Under the new UIL realignment which will

remain in effect for the next two school years, membership in District 13-AAA remains the same as last season: Prairiland, Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Pittsburg, North Lamar and Winnsboro.

Pittsburg, as predicted by the Harris Rating System, won district last year; although Texas Football Magazine had picked North Lamar not only to win district but tabbed the Panthers as the No. 2 team in the state—before the season started; and Texas Sports Magazine had guessed Clarksville would win.

This year, the 13-AAA champ goes into bi-district against the runner-up in 14-AAA, while the 13-AAA runner-up will meet the 14-AAA winner in Bi-district. District 14 has a new member this year in Daingerfield, which has been demoted from Four-A to Three-A and the Blue Tigers will replace Jefferson which was shifted to another district.

The remainder of District 14 will be the same as last year: Paul Hewitt (the defending champ), DeKalb, Hooks, Hughes Springs, Linden-Kildare, New Boston and Queen City.

Rivercrest will operate in the new District 18-AA this season, along with five fellow members of the old 20-AA, plus two new additions. Holdovers from the old district with the Rebels are Ore City, Maud, Redwater, New Diana and Bowie. Joining the group are Comopickton, promoted from the

One-A ranks; and Big Sandy, which has been moved from the old 19-AA that included Hawkins.

This year, the 17-AA champ will play the 18-AA runner-up and the 17 runner-up will meet the 18 champ in the bi-district round.

The District 17 members this year are Cooper, Quitman (Down from the Triple-A ranks), Grand Saline, Rains, Wolfe City, Edgewood, Honey Grove and

Leonard. Cooper is the returning king.

Another area district of much local interest and one that has undergone substantial changes under the UIL shuffle is District 7-AAAA. The family members in this loop are Paris, Mt. Pleasant, Atlanta, Hallsville, Sulphur Springs and Liberty-Eylau.

COMING DATES: The

start of high school football activity is just around the corner. Here are some official UIL dates:

Aug. 4 (three weeks from yesterday)-first day to issue shoes and socks.

Aug. 9 (three weeks from next Monday)-first day for conditioning drills, although contact activities are not legal until Aug. 13.

Aug. 19 (five weeks from today)-first day for interschool scrimmages.

Sept. 2 (seven weeks from today)-first day for official games, although most schools won't fire-up until Sept. 3.

VOLLEYBALL, TOO: There also are some official UIL start-up dates for volleyball playing girls.

Aug. 9 is the first day that volleyball workouts can start.

First volleyball scrimmages or games can be played on Aug. 16.

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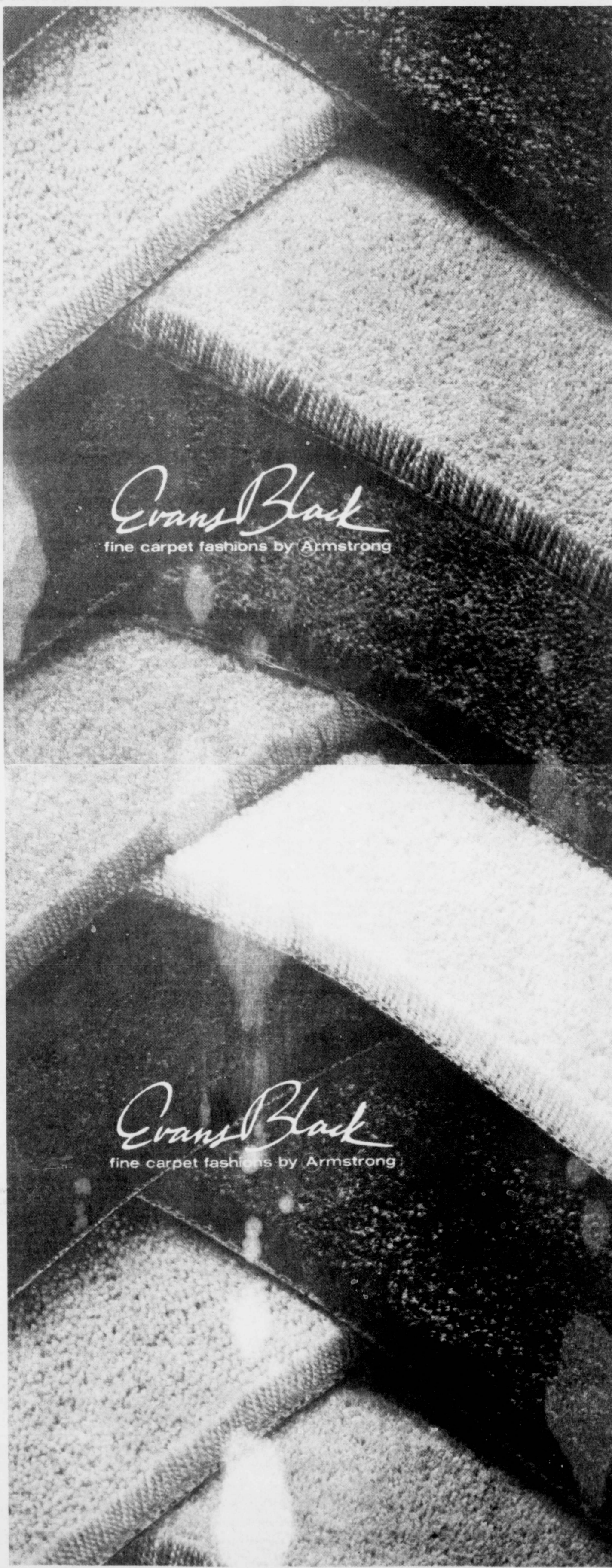

Diabetics dependent on insulin must keep a close watch on the level of sugar in their bloodstream. Scientists for years have sought ways to monitor sugar levels quickly, accurately and inexpensively.

Until now, urine tests were used, but they are not exact and often do not provide the current information needed to adjust insulin dosage precisely.


