In Sales Tax Revenue....

Top Gains By Talco, Bogata

Rebates of the one-cent sales tax to the city coffers of Bogata and Talco continue ahead of last year, with Talco one of only two Titus County towns showing an increase over the same period of a year ago.

Between them, Bogata and Talco have received \$33,808.83 in reim-

bursement of the penny tax through the first seven months of 1982. This is an increase of more than \$8,900 over the \$24,835.63 the two cities had received through the same part of the year in 1981.

Talco's check for the period ending July 7 totaled \$1,869.04, boosting the total for the year to \$23,327.31. That's an increase of 51.4 percent over the rebates for the first seven months of a year ago, the best percentage of increase in Titus County. Mt. Pleasant is up 24.6 percent, but Winfield, Monticello and Millers Cove are running behind last year.

Bogata's July check totaled \$620.64. This gives Bogata a total of \$10,481.52 it has received in sales tax revenue through the July 7 period, an increase of 11.1 percent over the \$9,427.80 Bogata had received through July of a year ago.

All Red River County towns are running ahead of last year, with the exception of Avery, which is down 47.9 percent. Annona is a whopping 155.8 percent ahead of last year. Clarksville is a healthy 83.4 percent better than last year in its sales tax revenue, having received \$95,785.91 through the July 7 period, as compared to

Computer Purchase Is Studied By Trustees

The era of computers may become a reality in the Talco-Bogata school system in the coming school year.

School trustees heard a presentation on microcomputers by a representative of Marshall Business Machines at the school board's regular July meeting. Although cost estimates were not included in the board meeting report, it was stated that consideration is being given to the purchase of two or three computers for use in the school system for the 1982-83 school year.

In other activity at the board meeting, approval was given to proceed with plans to build dressing rooms for visiting basketball teams at Rivercrest. Plans and specifications for the project will be prepared by the administration and coaching staff, with the assistance of Harrison, Walker & Harper Construction Company. No preliminary cost estimates were stated.

The board accepted bids for two used school buses and also approved the bids of Mrs. Baird's Bread, Cabell's Milk and Ross Ward Oil Company for cafeteria items and school gasoline.

Church Records Offer Valuable Data

Genealogy Begins With U

There are normally three major events in a person's life (birth, marriage and death). All three events also play an important part of a person's religious life. Since churches were normally founded at or near the very beginning of a town's settlement, church records play an important role in genealogical research.

Birth records may be found in baptism records, blessings, or other similar religious practices. These records will usually state the date on this event, date of birth, child or person's name and names or parents, relatives or sponsors.

By following up on these leads, their records furnish unlimited opportunity for further research.

If you find a person's baptism record at a church, write to see if they have any records for their parents,

brothers, sisters, uncles, aunts and grandparents.

Marriage records are often found in the records of a church. This record will normally give you the maiden name of the wife, the age of the bride and groom and it may also give you the name of the parents.

Although death records may include information such as birth, marriage and death dates, it may be more valuable for information on the name of the next of kin, children of deceased, brothers or sisters and the parents. Because throughout their history churches have been taking care of cemeteries, these cemetery records will also be very important.

In the case of genealogical research, persistency pays off. One fact or date revealed today becomes the clue for the next fact or date

tomorrow.

Please remember, when writing a church or any other place for information, be specific. Ask for information on one person or his family at a time. Always begin your research of church records at the local church your relatives attended.

If you have any questions about any genealogical problem, write me in care of your newspaper office and I will answer you. Next week we discuss the seventh genealogical principle - The Newspaper.


Conley Services Held In Blossom



AUTO TIPS

Checking Treadwear

A tire's ability to hold the road decreases as the tire's tread wears down. When the depth of a tire's groove is one-16th of an inch or less, lateral wear bars appear across the grain of the tread. A tire that reaches this point is potentially hazardous, particularly on wet pavement, and should be replaced, according to Bill Woehle, manager of industry standards for Uniroyal Tire Company. The tread depth of a tire can be easily measured with a ruler, or with a Lincoln-head penny, he says. If a ruler is not available, insert the penny with Lincoln's head down; if you can see all of Lincoln's head, the tread is less than one-16th of an inch and the tire needs to be replaced.

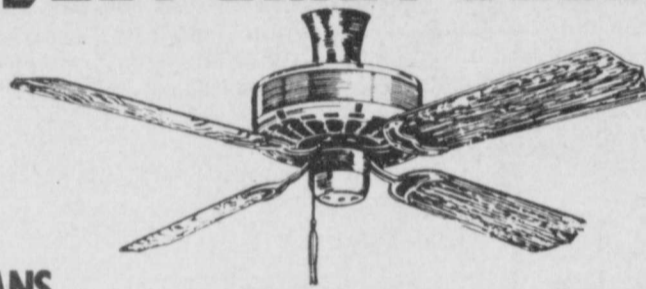

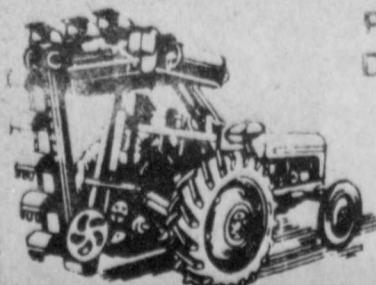

you and the LAW

Q: The Warranty Deed on our home shows only my husband's name. If he should die before I do, would I automatically receive our home

and land?

A: A home bought during marriage is presumed to be community property. It belongs equally to you both, even though your name is not on record.

At his death, your husband's one-half will pass to his children equally. You would retain your one-half and would have the widow's right to occupy the home for your lifetime.

Your husband can leave you his half in his Will. Also, if he has no children, you would inherit all his community property, even without a Will.

Q: I didn't think it would happen to me but it has. My husband of 30 years has walked out on me. I have two daughters still in need of some financial support. My husband has a good job and receives a VA check, but he says the only money I'm entitled to is one-half of what we get when we sell the house. I hope this is not true. Please tell me what may happen on divorce.

A: V.A. disability benefits are not community property and will not be available to you on divorce. You will, of course, seek child support if your daughters are still minors. You may not need to sell the house. In addition to the equity, you also have a claim to half the family's investments, savings and insurance and to half your husband's job benefits,

including retirement.

Q: I am a widow. I have a number of bonds, savings, and a large checking account that I hold jointly with my daughter. When I die, would it be better for my daughter to receive these accounts outright, or to inherit under my Will?

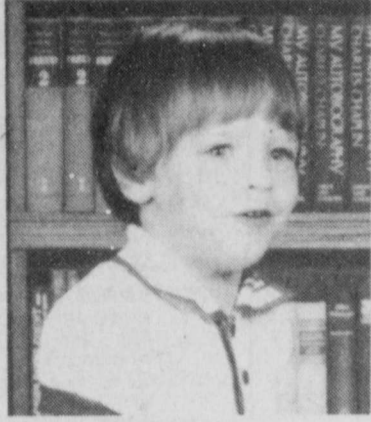
A: The joint tenancy with right of survivorship that you describe will pass your share of the accounts to your daughter if you have signed the correct papers. Simply naming your daughter on the account does not create a survivorship account. Whether the money should pass this way or as directed in your Will can be determined by your lawyer. Your estate will need some cash: how much can be estimated and planned for at the time of will-writing.

Q: Where two one-way streets intersect and the cross street moves from left to right is it legal for both the right hand lanes to make a right turn on red after stopping?

A: No. Only the far right lane is permitted to make a right turn on red after coming to a full stop. Even that is regulated by signs or arrows at the intersection. If a right on red is permitted, it will never include both right hand lanes.

CUPBOARD DESK

The furniture pictured is most often called a secretary, but others refer to it as a cupboard desk. This designation sets it aside from those which are much taller, often with a fourth drawer and glass or solid doors in front of three or more shelves. The turned legs are Sheraton inspired, early 19th century, but we know this form was made as late as the 1850s. Most will be found with pine bodies covered with mahogany veneer, if made after about 1830. In Northern New England, they appear in this period with birch or maple bodies, and possibly mahogany veneer on the drawers. Basically, they were an inexpensive desk, made with woods native to the area where the cabinetmakers lived. However, the years between about 1830 and 1850 witnessed a rise in interest in mahogany furniture. Much in Empire and Victorian style was made from it. Since the wood was expensive in rural areas, cabinetmakers resorted to use of the readily available veneer. The molding around the top is very Empire styled and in keeping with the 1830-50 period. The heavy legs would identify this as New York, New Jersey or Pennsylvania in origin - its proportions add to the feeling that it is not New England.

The glass doors are uninspired as they are simple rectangular panes, rather than the Gothic arch and often pieced work which are much more graceful. The Chippendale wing brasses with bale handles are strictly out of place on this desk as they belong on furniture of a century before. We are happy to see that all four legs are alike as this is paramount in furniture. One can be amazed at how much early furniture features legs in the rear different from those in the front.

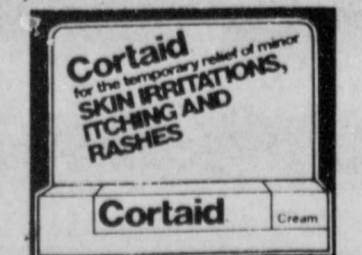
Grandson Wins Contest

In Lamar County, Deport is the only town in that county showing a decline, but only by 1.5 percent. Blossom is up by nearly 40 percent.

Paris remains the area leader, with \$790,400.05 in sales tax through the initial seven months of the year, an increase of 31.4 percent over last year. Mt. Pleasant is second with \$421,512.56, which is 24.6 percent better than a year ago.

On a statewide basis, Comptroller Bob Bullock says sales tax rebates are running 14.4 percent ahead of 1981.

Getting Ready For Fall Gardening

A fall garden often produces better quality and higher yielding vegetables than a spring-summer garden.

Cooler weather means a longer harvest period for many vegetables. Lettuce and leafy greens are sweeter and more tender. Lettuce, collards, spinach, broccoli, Brussels sprouts and Swiss chard will continue to grow to be a part of your Thanksgiving and maybe even Christmas feast.

A fall garden requires careful planning. Planting must be timed to allow frost-sensitive vegetables to mature and be harvested before frost. Those which will tolerate frost can be planted for harvesting to continue after the first fall frost.

Vegetables adapted to fall gardens can be divided into four groups by their tolerance of freezing temperature.

Some warm-season vegetables adapted to fall gardens—but killed by frost—are snap beans, southern peas, summer squash, winter squash, cucumbers, sweet corn and early maturing pepper and tomato varieties.

The second group includes cool-season crops usually damaged by light frost when mature, such as lettuce, cauliflower, kohlrabi, celery, cabbage and broccoli.

The third group contains those which are moderately tolerant of repeated light frosts: carrots, parsnip, beets, Bursells sprouts, leaf lettuce, endive, radishes, rutabagas and turnips.

Members of the fourth group, which tolerate night after night of freezing and have even survived a mild

winter, include bulb onions, green onions, chives, garlic, leeks, multiplier onions, shallots, spinach, parsley, collards, kale and Buttercrunch and Romaine varieties of lettuce.

Seed of snap beans, baby lima beans, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, collards, chard, sweet corn, cucumbers and summer squash planted in mid-summer will produce crops ready for harvest before the first fall frost.

Beets, kohlrabi, leaf lettuce and spinach seed-planted in late summer will likewise provide abundant fall harvests. Mustard greens, radishes and turnips planted in early to mid-September will make it to the table in October and November.

Gardeners have several

choices for starting their fall gardens. Summer vegetable seedlings require constant attention. Sowing seed in the garden in summer is one choice but will require repeated irrigation and careful attention to pest control.

A third choice to help fall gardeners is to buy transplants at local nurseries to set in the garden at the right time.

Additional information on timing of fall garden plantings and recommended varieties can be obtained from the Extension bulletin, "Growing Fall Vegetables and Annuals in Texas," available at the County Extension office.
