

Ramblin 'Round

Paul Hobby, who looks the role of a clean-cut high school or college football linebacker—which he has been, was in Bogata last Friday, on the campaign trail for his father, Texas Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

To many, especially newcomers to Texas, the lieutenant Governor's job is likened to that of what most consider being Vice President—mostly ceremonial, do nothing and echo what the Chief in the White House has to say.

Not so in Texas. Known as the second most powerful office in state government, the Lieutenant Governor potentially can wield even more power than the Governor when the Legislature is in session. Unlike the Governor and other statewide elected officials, the Lieutenant Governor's job is mainly legislative and not centered on the administration and enforcement of laws.

As such, the Lieutenant Governor can exert great influence on lawmaking and general public policy.

In addition to several other important appointment powers, at the beginning of each legislative session, the Lieutenant Governor chooses the chairman, vice chairman and members of the Senate's committees. This enables him to name chairmen who are loyal to him and to indirectly influence legislation on the Senate floor and in committees.

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By deciding which bills go to which committee, the Lieutenant Governor has the power to decide the fate of a bill.

Bill Hobby mans perhaps the most important of all posts in Texas government, when it comes to legislation. Most Texans apparently feel he is doing a good job. Otherwise he wouldn't have held the job for the past 10 years.

Son Paul says his father is doing a great job and is the man for the job in the coming years of important decisions for Texas. That belief is natural, coming from a son; but, then Paul backs it up by saying his father is running for re-election strictly on his record.

"He's not running against George Strake (the Republican challenger), but is running solely on his record. My father thinks that is his best qualification and is not going to get in any mud-slinging with his opponent," says Paul.

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Young Hobby is making the rounds through the grass roots areas of Texas by his lonesome, with no hustling press agent or staff member. He drops in at newspaper offices, radio and tv stations, civic club meetings, maybe even a domino hall, or any place where he can "listen to the people of Texas" and get some feedback on comments and opinions. After a week on the road, Paul goes home to Houston, where he can sit down across the breakfast table and tell the candidate how the people in Red River County or wherever feel about a particular issue.

One gets the feeling that 21-year-old Paul Hobby, who played linebacker on the University of Virginia's varsity football team for three years and graduated from Virginia last Spring with a BA degree in history will have a role of his own in the Texas of the future.

He plans to enroll in law school at the University of Texas in the fall of 1983 and, right now, has plans for a career in communications, particularly media affairs.

Young Hobby is a member of the third generation of well known Hobbys. His grandfather, William P. Hobby, Sr., was Governor; and his grandmother, Oveta Culp Hobby, was the first commanding officer of the Womens Army Corps (WACS) in World War II, later became the first Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, then took up active duties as publisher of The Houston Post. And Paul's father was managing editor, then publisher of The Post before becoming Lieutenant Governor.

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We've always been an admirer of The Houston Post and Billy Hobby, although we once, perhaps unfortunately on our part, rejected an opportunity to join the team.

The opportunity started late one night in 1961 when Hobby called us at our home, then in Vernon, and offered a job on the state editor's desk at The Post, with the offer including complete moving expenses to Houston. Darn good salary offer, too.

We accepted the offer over the phone but before the two weeks notice period was up, we changed our mind—simply because we didn't want to move to a big city.

Some six years later, we went to work for the Post's rival, The Chronicle—but didn't move to Houston, just into the thickly-populated suburbs like Pasadena, League City and Deer Park.

This has nothing to do with Paul Hobby's stop-off in Bogata or his father's job as Lieutenant Governor, but it sure did help to fill up our column for this week.

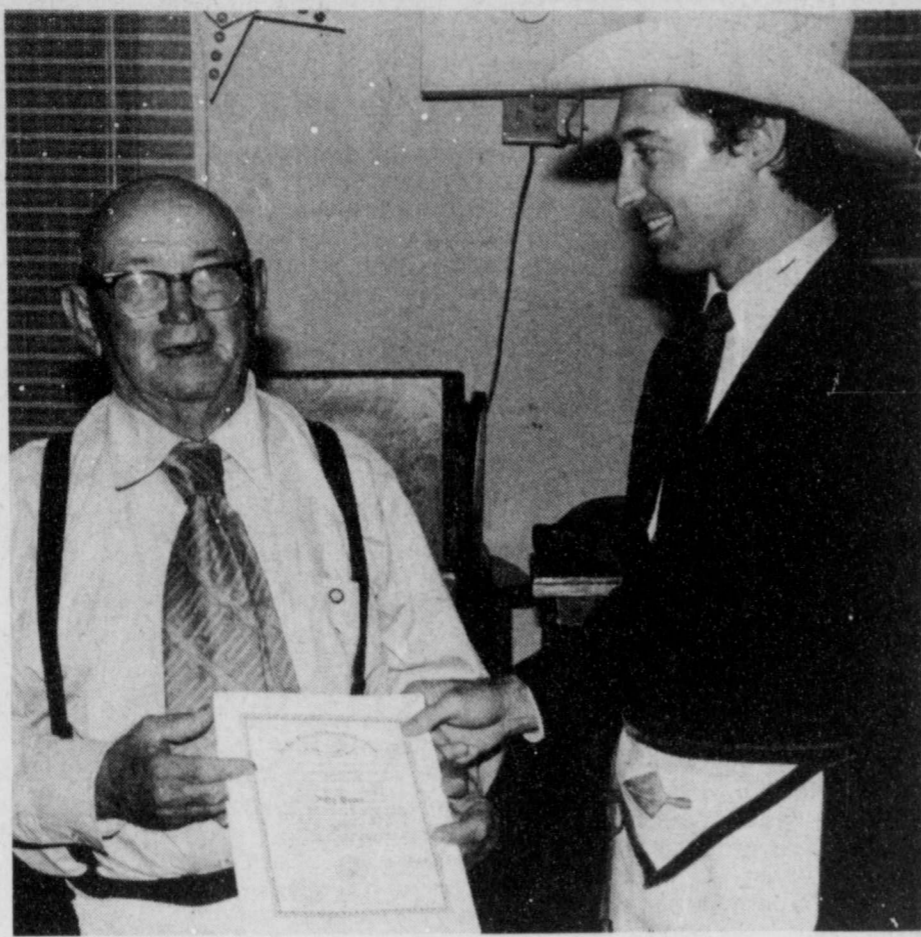

Petitions May Seek Bond Election....

Decision Due Monday On RR Jail Funding

The Red River County commissioners court is expected to decide Monday on the issuance of certificates of obligation for a loan from the Farmers Home Administration for funds to build a new county jail.

Although the commissioners are scheduled to vote on issuance of the certificates, expected to total between \$400,000 and \$500,000, there may be a move by Democratic county judge-nominee W.W. "Scotty" Whiteman to have the jail funding issue turned into a bond election.

The Monday meeting begins at 10 a.m. in the county courthouse at Clarksville.

Whiteman, who defeated incumbent County Judge Connie Sullivan for the

Democratic nomination as county judge in the May primary and is without a ballot foe in the November general election, is reportedly circulating petitions to halt issuance of the certificates and have the jail funding matter submitted to the voters.

Issuance of the certificates will be the cheapest and easiest method to construct the required new jail, Judge Sullivan told the Bogata News.

The money, a maximum of \$500,000, would be in the form of a loan from the Farmers Home Administration at a 5 percent interest rate, says Sullivan.

The exact amount of the needed funds will not be known until construction bids are received, but based

on jail construction costs at Sulphur Springs and Mt. Pleasant, Judge Sullivan believes the amount will be about \$400,000.

Sullivan believes a jail bond issue, if submitted to the voters, would be defeated, even though a new facility is needed.

"No one wants to spend money to build a jail, not even the commissioners, but the certificates of obligation method will cost the least amount of money," says Sullivan. She says she is aware of Whiteman's petitions.

Whiteman, not available for a comment, reportedly has secured some 300 signatures on a petition calling for an election to be held on the jail issue.

Busses will make their regular runs on the morning of Aug. 19, with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual, school officials say, as it will probably take a day or two to establish regular times for each bus

T-B Trustees To Set Lunch Prices

Setting school cafeteria prices will be an agenda item when trustees of the Talco-Bogata school district hold their regular August board meeting next Tuesday.

A decision on the cafeteria prices is one of the few remaining details needed to be completed in advance of the new school year, Supt. Talmadge Morgan says.

All teacher positions are filled with the exception of a Title I vacancy and that is expected to be filled Tuesday, says Morgan.

The B-T trustees are also expected to again discuss plans for constructing dressing room facilities for visiting basketball teams.

Finalization of the 1982-83 budget is not likely for at least a month, Morgan says, due to the lateness in completed valuations from the tax appraisal district.

The Tuesday meeting, open to the public, begins at 7 p.m. in the board room at the Rivercrest school.

route. Should the bus fail to pick-up a student for any reason, the student or parent is asked to contact the appropriate building principal.

Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeterias, starting the first day.

All students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before Sept. 1st of the current year. Students entering the 1st grade must be six years of age on or before Sept. 1st of the current year.

Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled as well as 1st grade students who did not attend Kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling for the first time in the district.

Parents are also reminded that all

children entering elementary schools in Texas must have met the required state immunizations of diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, and rubella. All students in high school must have diphtheria measles, tetanus and polio immunizations up to date.

Pre-registration for new students moving into the Talco-Bogata School district over the summer who will be attending Rivercrest High School for the 1982-83 school term should report to the Rivercrest High School office Wednesday, Aug. 11 or Thursday, Aug. 12 between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Registration for K-8 in the Talco and Bogata Schools will be held on the first day of school, Aug. 19.

May primary for the treasurer's position. Mrs. Varley, completing her 12th year in the position, did not seek re-election.

Mrs. Townes, who was involved in the petroleum leasing industry until the first of the year and previous of that was associated with the Red River County Adult Probation Department, is a native of Clarksville. She graduated from high school there in 1961 and attended Paris Junior College.

GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U

"Trail On Map" Key To Tracing Ancestors

Remember the saying, "where you live will have a lot to do on what you do". This was even more true in earlier centuries. Even though in our early history we had many modes of travel and people crossed

many of miles of ocean to get home, the everyday routines of life was pretty well confined to a certain small area. For example, it would be virtually impossible in the middle 1800's for a person to commute 75 miles to work everyday.

Now this is common place in many areas of the country. Because of this, the main principle of genealogical research is the principle of location.

When starting research on your relatives you need to obtain a map of the county where they lived. In the fifth lesson, I told you how you could obtain the map.

Once you receive the map, you need to find the location of where your relatives lived. Now, locate all cemeteries, schools, churches and libraries near their

location. Proximity of their location to your relatives will be the first rule here. You should check for information on your relative at these local churches, cemeteries and libraries.

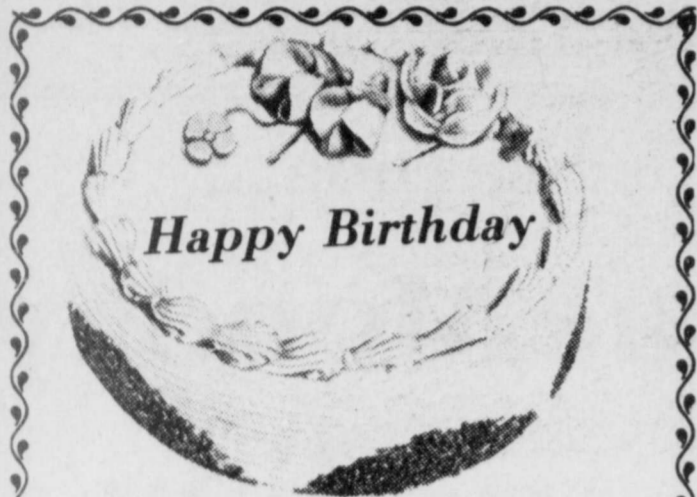
You should be able to eliminate many of these places because of their distance to your location.

When plotting relatives' movement on the large physical map, you should notice four important factors. First, most movement on settlement patterns for the United States were from east to west. Secondly, many people who started to west stayed several

generations in one area. Some of their descendants may still be living in these areas today. Thirdly, many cities develop as "jumping off" points for further western movement. Fourthly, most movement between areas were dependent on physical terrain.

All of these factors played an important part on where relatives settled and why. By keeping these factors in mind, it will be far easier to obtain genealogical information.

Wichita Philanthropist, Gordon W. Evans, Dies

Word has been received on the death of Deport native Gordon W. Evans, recognized as an outstanding civic leader and philanthropist in Wichita, Kans., where he had lived since 1947.

Mr. Evans, 77, died July 10 in Grand Junction, Colo., where he had suffered a heart attack while returning to his home in Wichita after a month-long trip to California.

At the time of his death, Mr. Evans was the retired chairman of the board of Kansas Gas and Electric Company.

He was born in Deport in 1904, the son of W.P. and Alice Evans. He attended Trinity University, the University of Texas, the University of Southern California and studied law and law and accounting at the Oklahoma School of Accountancy and Law.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Jessica Evans of Wichita; one son, Dennis Evans, also of Wichita; one brother, William Evans of Deport; one sister, Mrs. Esther Bird of San Antonio and two grandchildren.

The Wichita Eagle-Beacon newspaper, in reporting on his death and funeral services said: a crowd of more than 400 of Wichita's business and cultural leaders attended Evans' funeral service on July 15, and then, about an hour after the service they celebrated Evans' life with a party in the Wichita Concert Hall - all at the wish of Evans himself.

According to the Wichita Eagle-Beacon, Evans requested "a room large enough to entertain as many friends as you think will come" to a party after the entombment. "This should be a time of pleasure and not sadness. I will have lived a full life," Evans wrote.

Old friend Bill Cochran,

who was in charge of the funeral, was quoted by the Eagle-Beacon as saying, "If Gordon were here, this whole party would transfer to his home, and he'd play the piano all night long."

Evans worked throughout his professional life for public utilities, going to Wichita in 1947 as assistant to the president of K&G&E. He quickly rose to the president's position, even though he was actively involved in numerous civic projects, such as The

Wichita Metropolitan Council, the Music Theatre of Wichita and the United Way of Wichita.

In 1977, when the Eagle-Beacon surveyed a dozen civic leaders an asked, "If you were putting together a civic project and wanted to guarantee its success, what few persons would you have to have on the project? All of them named Gordon Evans. A memorial has been established with Music Theater of Wichita, Century II, 225 W. Douglas, Wichita, Kans. 67202.

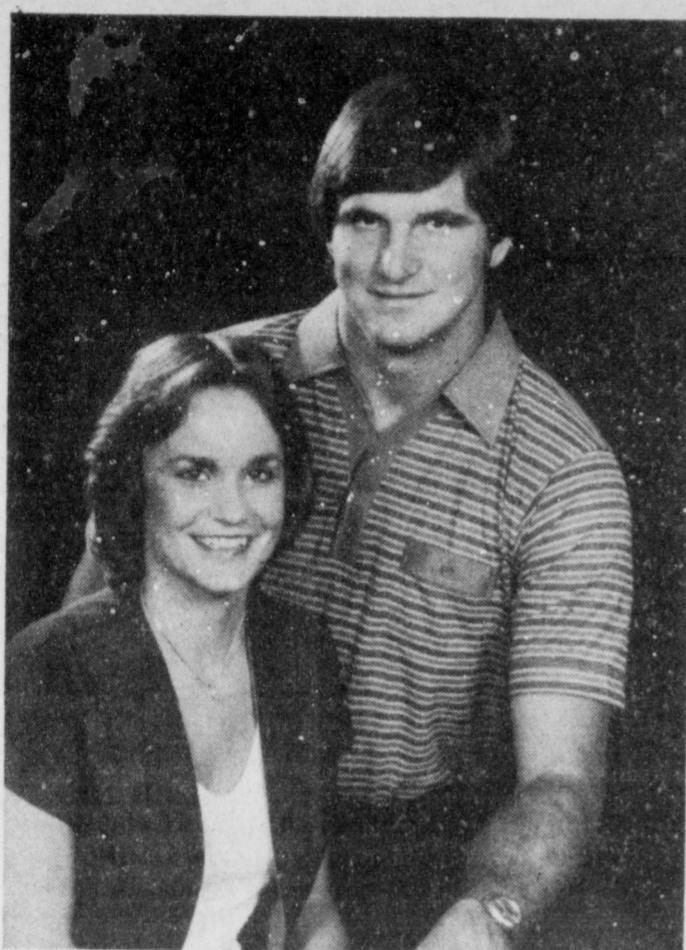

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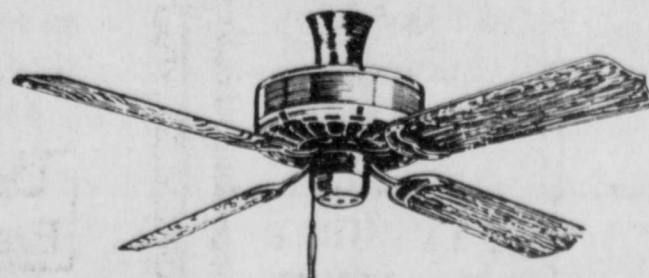

All-Risk Insurance On Wheat

Wheat growers interested in all risk insurance for their 1983 crops should contact their insurance agent as soon as possible, according to F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr., all-risk insurance field operations director.

Although the deadline to obtain wheat insurance isn't until Sept. 15, Crouch suggests three reasons why growers should begin making their plans now. First, early consideration will provide additional time to develop a program of insurance coverage that best meets the individual policy holder's needs.

Secondly, it can be useful to farmers to have their insurance arranged before they visit with their lenders about production loans.

Third, an early application allows additional time for growers to verify yield records that may enable them to qualify for increased insurance protection.

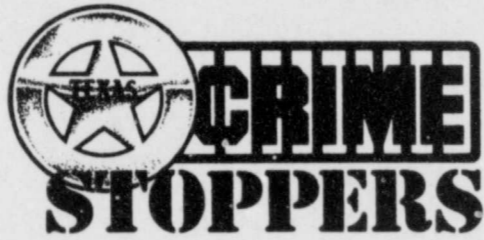

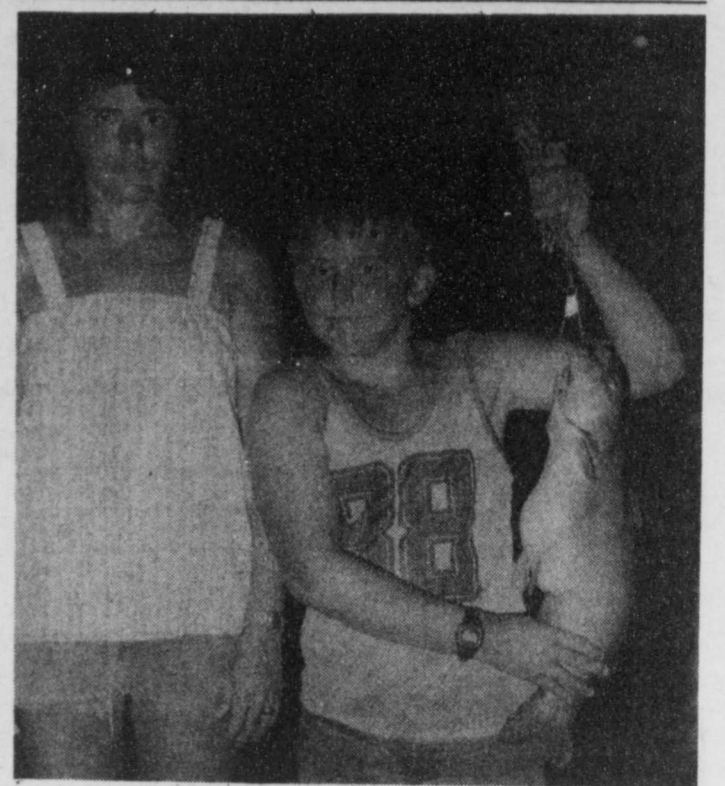

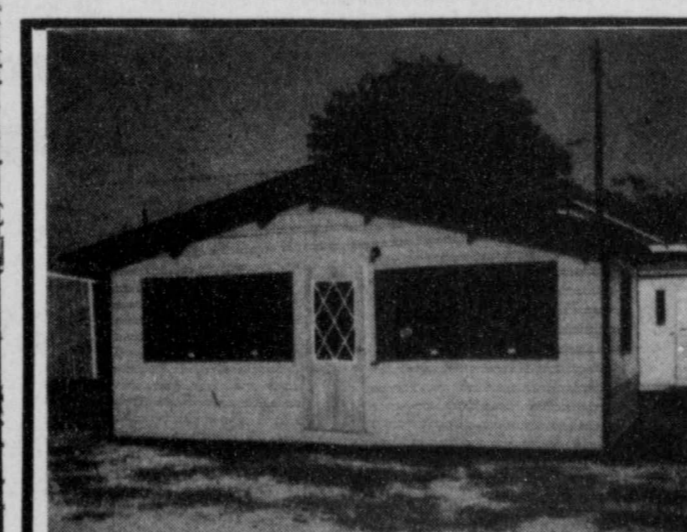

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License Sales Show Fishing Popularity

License sales indicate that more Texans are fishing than ever before. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department data show that sales of resident fishing licenses from Sept. 1, 1981, through April 30, 1982, were more than 32,000 ahead of the first eight months of the previous fiscal year. The total through April was 646,139. Resident Combination Hunting and Fishing Licenses also are ahead of the previous year's pace, and are expected to hit an all-time high. Through April, the department has sold 655,717 combination licenses, representing a gain of 59,130. Officials believe the rise in license sales documents an increased public interest in fishing, and they expect it to continue to grow in the future and place additional pressure on the state's fishery resources. Resident Fishing Licenses cost \$5, and Resident Combination Hunting and Fishing Licenses are \$8.75. For exceptions to the license requirements as well as other fishing regulations, consult the department's Texas Sport Fishing Guide, available from fishing license outlets and department offices.
