Red River County's Farm Bureau Queen, 20-year-old Staci Brooks, of Bogata, added the District V Bureau queen laurels to her collection of honors Friday and will now advance to the state Farm Bureau queen competition. Miss Brooks, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E.E. Brooks, was chosen over four other county winners for the district crown in the district competition held at Rivercrest High School Friday night. In addition to being chosen district queen, Staci won runner-up honors in the talent division of the district contest with her medley of Hank Williams' songs. The new district queen is a 1980 graduate of Rivercrest High School and attended East Texas State University this past school year. She plans on enrolling in the nursing school at the University of Texas this fall, where she will be a junior. The state Farm Bureau queen contest will be held in Dallas in either late November or early December. County Okays Loan Method For New Jail

New jail facilities for Red River County advanced another step toward reality this week when the county commissioners court unamiously voted to issue certificates of obligation for a \$500 .,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration for funds to construct a new jail.

The loan, which County Judge Connie Sullivan does not believe will need to be for the full \$500,000, will bear five percent interest.

The commissioners court approved the loan method for financing the new jail, under which the county has been ordered to build by the Texas State Commission on Jail Standards, after apparently reaching an acceptable

Under the proposal adopted by the commissioners at their well-attended Monday meeting, the jail size will be reduced from 5,100 square feet to about 4,100 square feet, plus a sally port (enclosed entrance for vehicles).

The commissioners agreed to eliminate one of two proposed doors on the sally port, if the cost per door exceed \$1,000.

The revised jail plans will still retain nearly all of the original cell requirements, a kitchen and areas for dispatching and booking prisioners, although the latter areas will be reduced in size.

Construction costs for the new jail are expected to be somewhere between \$80 and \$90 per square foot, based on comparision studies with other new jails that have been built in northeast Texas areas.

Judge Sullivans says the changes are not expected to delay the construction timetable. The jail architect will be asked to submit the amended plans to the Texas Jails Standards Commission and the FHA for final approval as soon as possible.

Following approval by the two agencies, construction bids will be taken.

It may be possible for the contract ot be let and construction get underway later this year, county officials say.
