Advances To State Finals....

Bogata Girl Chosen District FB Queen

Red River County's Farm Bureau Queen, 20-year-old Staci Brooks, of Bogata, added the District V Farm Bureau queen laurels to her collection of honors Friday and will now advance to the state Farm Bureau queen competition.

Miss Brooks, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E.E. Brooks, was chosen over four other county winners for the district crown in the district competition held at Rivercrest High School Friday night.

In addition to being chosen district queen, Staci won runner-up honors in the talent division of the district contest with her medley of Hank Williams' songs.

The new district queen is a 1980 graduate of Rivercrest High School and attended East Texas State University this past school year. She plans on enrolling in the nursing school at the University of Texas this fall, where she will be a junior.

The state Farm Bureau queen contest will be held in Dallas in either late November or early December. The state queen will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and the runner-up will receive a \$1,000 scholarship.

Shawn Sides of Van Zandt County was runner-up to Miss Brooks for the district beauty honors. Other contestants were Paula Box of Wood County, Cynthia Orms of Harrison County and Beverly Nymeyer of Hopkins County.

In the talent contest, Miss Brooks was second to Gena Herman of Hopkins County who won that competition with her piano recital. Other contestants in the talent division were Doris Ellis of Van Zandt County and Miss Box from Wood County.

County Okays Loan Method For New Jail

New jail facilities for Red River County advanced another step toward reality this week when the county commissioners court unanimously voted to issue certificates of obligation for a \$500,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration for funds to construct a new jail.

The loan, which County Judge Connie Sullivan does not believe will need to be for the full \$500,000, will bear five percent interest.

The commissioners court approved the loan method for financing the new jail, under which the county has been ordered to build by the Texas State Commission on Jail Standards, after apparently reaching an acceptable

"compromise" with a group of opponents headed by W.S. "Scotty" Whiteman, the Democratic candidate for county judge in the November general election.

The present commissioners court agreed to various modifications in the original new jail plan, expected to reduce the overall cost of the project, a suggestion that had been proposed by Whiteman.

The Democratic nominee for judge, who has no ballot opponent in the November election, reportedly had secured enough signatures on petition that would have resulted in a bond issue election on the jail question if the petitions were submitted to the county

commissioners court.

Under the proposal adopted by the commissioners at their well-attended Monday meeting, the jail size will be reduced from 5,100 square feet to about 4,100 square feet, plus a sally port (enclosed entrance for vehicles).

The commissioners agreed to eliminate one of two proposed doors on the sally port, if the cost per door exceed \$1,000.

The revised jail plans will still retain nearly all of the original cell requirements, a kitchen and areas for dispatching and booking prisoners, although the latter areas will be reduced in size.

Construction costs for the new jail are expected to be somewhere between \$80 and \$90 per square foot, based on comparison studies with other new jails that have been built in northeast Texas areas.

Judge Sullivan says the changes are not expected to delay the construction timetable. The jail architect will be asked to submit the amended plans to the Texas Jails Standards Commission and the FHA for final approval as soon as possible.

Following approval by the two agencies, construction bids will be taken.

It may be possible for the contract of be let and construction get underway later this year, county officials say.

Voters throughout the Talco-Bogata school board go to the polls this Saturday to select one of three Talco men to fill a vacancy on the seven-member school board.

Voting, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m., will be held at the Talco School and at the Bogata School gym.

Candidates are Gerald Martin, Gene Smith and Lyndon "Pinkey" Reed. Smith is a former board member, who stepped down earlier

this year after serving two three-year terms.

The winner will take up the chair vacated by Donald Jones of Talco, who resigned earlier this year upon moving to Mt. Pleasant.

The winner in the special election will complete the unexpired portion of Jones' term, which extends through the regular April, 1984 school district election.

GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U...

Valuable Genealogical Data In Libraries

During the last several weeks we have discussed several different phases of genealogical research. Because of its essential position, library research is the 10th principle of genealogy.

Preparation is a vital element in any research program. You need to prepare before you go to the library. If you do not, you can easily spend several hours in unproductive work.

A major point of this preparation is to write down all the names, dates and places you are going to look up before you go.

The larger libraries will have four major features which will help any genealogist. First they will have microfilm readers. If they have the readers, they will normally have microfilm copies of census,

wills and various other information. If they do not have a copy of what you need, they may be able to order it.

Secondly, they should have a large amount of out of state telephone books. These books will give you addresses of churches, libraries, and distant relatives who may supply additional information.

Thirdly, they should have many good resource books (American Compendium of Genealogy, Burkes, "Extinct Barontages and Peerage," other books on peerage and indexes to censuses, etc.) These books may prove to give you invaluable leads.

Fourthly, probably the most important source of information is the librarian. They can be very helpful and their expert guidance will be

priceless.

Local libraries will have a lot of information on the area surrounding the library. Here, the best thing to do is to go talk to your librarian and tell him or her what you are doing and ask for some professional advice.

If by chance you are unable to find the information you are looking for at your library, let me know and I'll try to help you.

Next, we will discuss the 11th genealogical principle—overseas research.

Talco-Bogata Lunch Prices Set

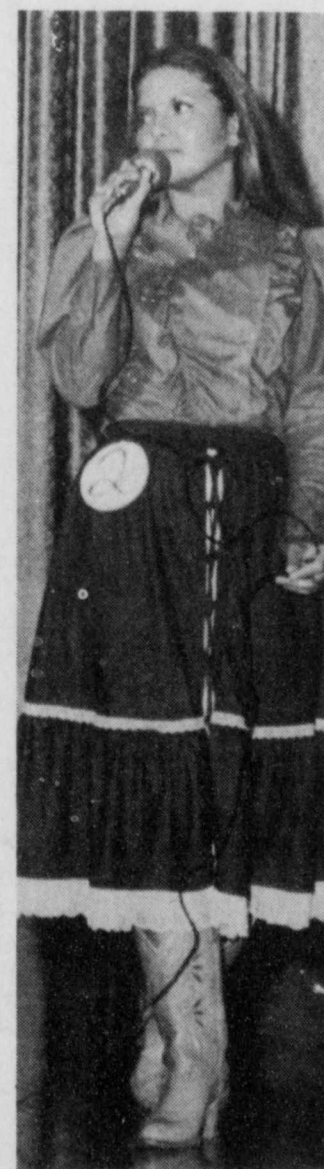

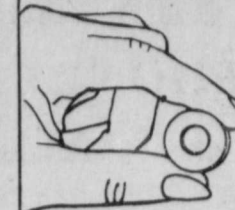
