

Disbanded Club Sells Building...

Bogata Garden Center...time takes its toll

A Bogata landmark and community focus point for nearly two decades is vanishing, or rather moving away, this week with the removal of the Garden Club Center building.

The disbanded Garden Club sold the historic old building, at one time the post office in Fulbright, to E.L. Bullard of Bogata. Bullard is moving the building from its 18-year site on

what was the right-of-way of the old Paris and Mt. Pleasant Railroad, at Howison and 2nd SW, to his property near the rodeo grounds. There Bullard plans on remodeling it into a dwelling for his daughter and son-in-law.

The Bogata Garden Club, organized 27 years ago, played an active role in local community service activities,

disbanded about a year ago but the sale of the building permitted the club to accomplish at least one more community service.

The club last week donated \$500 from the sale of the building to the Bogata Lions Club, to assist the Lions in their work at the Community Center.

Development of the Garden Club Center not only came through the hard work of the club members but reflected an overall project of community togetherness and cooperation.

Efforts for a clubhouse building were launched by the then 18-member Garden Club in 1963 when it obtained a lease from the Paris and Mt. Pleasant Railroad for a site at the Howison and 2nd SW location.

The then club president, Mrs. E.L. Holder named a committee composed of herself, Mrs. O.E. Barnard, Mrs. Britt Lassiter, Mrs. Gordon DeBerry

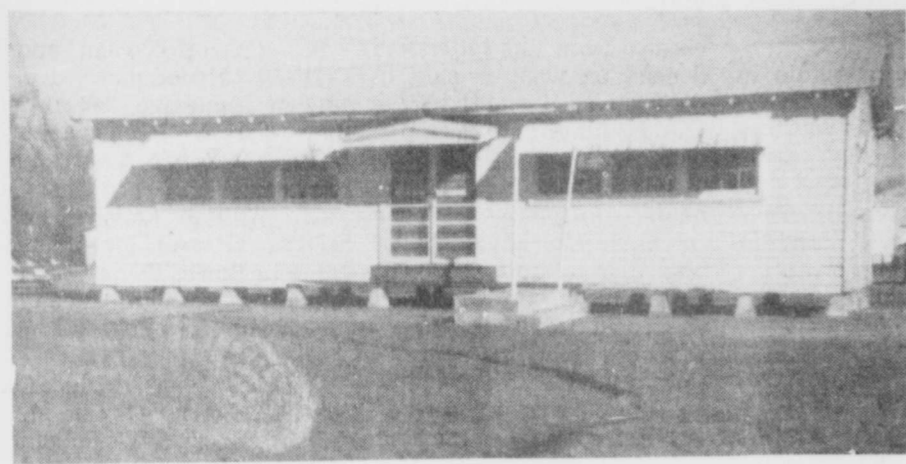
and Mrs. R.F. Hale to look for a suitable building. Purchase of the former Fulbright post office building was made from Mrs. Lelia Rozell of Fulbright on Jan. 2, 1964 for \$1,200.

The building was moved to Bogata the following day at a cost of \$250.

There were several cash pledges to help the club with its clubhouse project. In addition, the Garden Club members held a bake sale, sold birthday calendars, raffled off a quilt and a rifle. The rifle winner donated the gun back to the club and tickets were sold on it for a second time.

Cookbooks were sold, the Garden Club catered the Chamber of Commerce banquet and did numerous other things to help raise funds. Several items of furniture and other furnishings, along with labor, various materials and equipment, were donated to the Garden Club. The

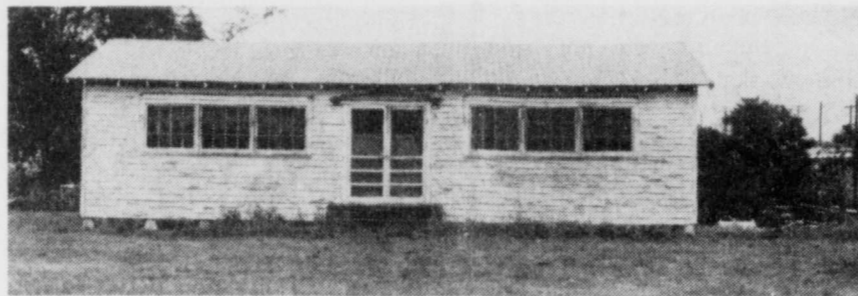

The area cotton harvest, now winding down and perhaps a bit earlier due to the rains, has produced 2,031 bales of cotton at the three areas as of Tuesday afternoon.

Rivercrest Rebels play to another breed of Rebels--Ore City's high-scoring machine, this Friday.

The annual shoot-out between the two Rebel camps is billed for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff and is the final home game of the season for Rivercrest.

Although Ore City is all but out of the playoff scene with its 1-2 league mark, the pass-minded Upshur County Rebs are the highest scoring team in the district, averaging 31 points a game while giving up an average of 14--which is the per game scoring average for Rivercrest.

Ore City had its rude awakening last week when it was clobbered by Big Sandy, 31-19, and will be aiming to take out its frustration on Coach Milford Groves' lads.

In order to keep their title claim alive, the 2-1 Rivercrest Rebs not only have to beat Ore City, but must count on New Diana to halt the Big Sandy express. New Diana's Eagles, currently tied with Big Sandy for first, each with 2-0 tags, hosts the Wildcats this week and are seen as the last major hurdle that could prevent Big Sandy from rambling to the district jewels.

An Eagle win, coupled with a Rivercrest win, would lift New Diana into undisputed first place, with Big Sandy and Rivercrest tied for second--and Rivercrest has yet to play New Diana. A New Diana loss and Rivercrest win would place those two teams in the running for the runner-up spot, which also goes into the playoffs this year.

On the other hand, if Rivercrest

loses to Ore City, the local Rebels might as well start concentrating on basketball because their football playoff hopes will have, for all practical purposes, expired.

The two Rebel teams struggled to a 13-all deadlock last year, were likewise tied in penetrations, but Rivercrest picked up a couple of first downs in the last minute to gain that all important statistical edge, 17-15.

Rivercrest had a difficult time with stubborn Maud in the second annual "Mud Bowl" between the two teams last Friday but managed to slip away with a 20-0 shutout victory.

The Rebs had 236 rushing yards and 67 aerial yardage to only 90 yards, all on the ground, for the Cardinals, but still didn't get the game safely tucked away until the final quarter.

After a mostly defensive show in the first quarter, Rivercrest finally got things rolling in the second quarter when the Rebels drove 70 yards. Most of the yardage came on the running and passing of Bradley Moore, with John Hines romping around end for the final three yards with 39 seconds left in the half.

An attempted run for two points was dropped short of the goal but Rivercrest

Letters For Family Info Should Be Brief, To Point

The ability to be able to find information of your relatives has a lot to do with the amount of time you spend looking for the information.

Normally a person could not go into a library and find a listing of everyone of his relatives in one book or in that case even several books. This does not however, stop a person from obtaining the same information by following a simple plan over a course of a short period of time.

First, treat every piece of

information or fact as a lead or a clue to discovering future facts. For example, Mary Ann Claypoole was baptised at Christ Church, Philadelphia, Penn. on 8-8-1748. You can contact that church for more information on her family (such as parent's names, ages, place of birth etc.).

Second, do not under

estimate the power of the pen or the written word. If a person were to write 20 letters a day to 20 different people (relatives and places where one might find information of your relatives: Chamber of Commerce, Newspaper, Library, and Genealogical Society) they would receive at least 60 names of their relatives.

Thirdly, when writing be as short or brief as possible. Just get the who, what, where, and when in the letter. I've found the following to be a good letter to use.

Dear Sir:

I'm writing to obtain information on my relative — (He or she) was born in (place of birth) in (year or 5 year approximation). He moved to (the area where he lived) in (year). Any information on (him or her) or their family will be greatly welcomed. Sincerely, (Your Name)

Here a person can briefly read over this letter and see if they have any knowledge on this person. Of course, any response to or reply you

receive from this letter will depend on what is said in their letter. It is at that time you should go into great detail.

By this time if you have been following these columns you should have been able to start receiving quite a bit of information on your own family history. What are you doing with it? How are you preserving it for future generations?

Over the course of the next six weeks, we are going to interview several genealogist and several county clerks. We will learn from these people first hand how to obtain genealogical information and how to assemble all together into a book.

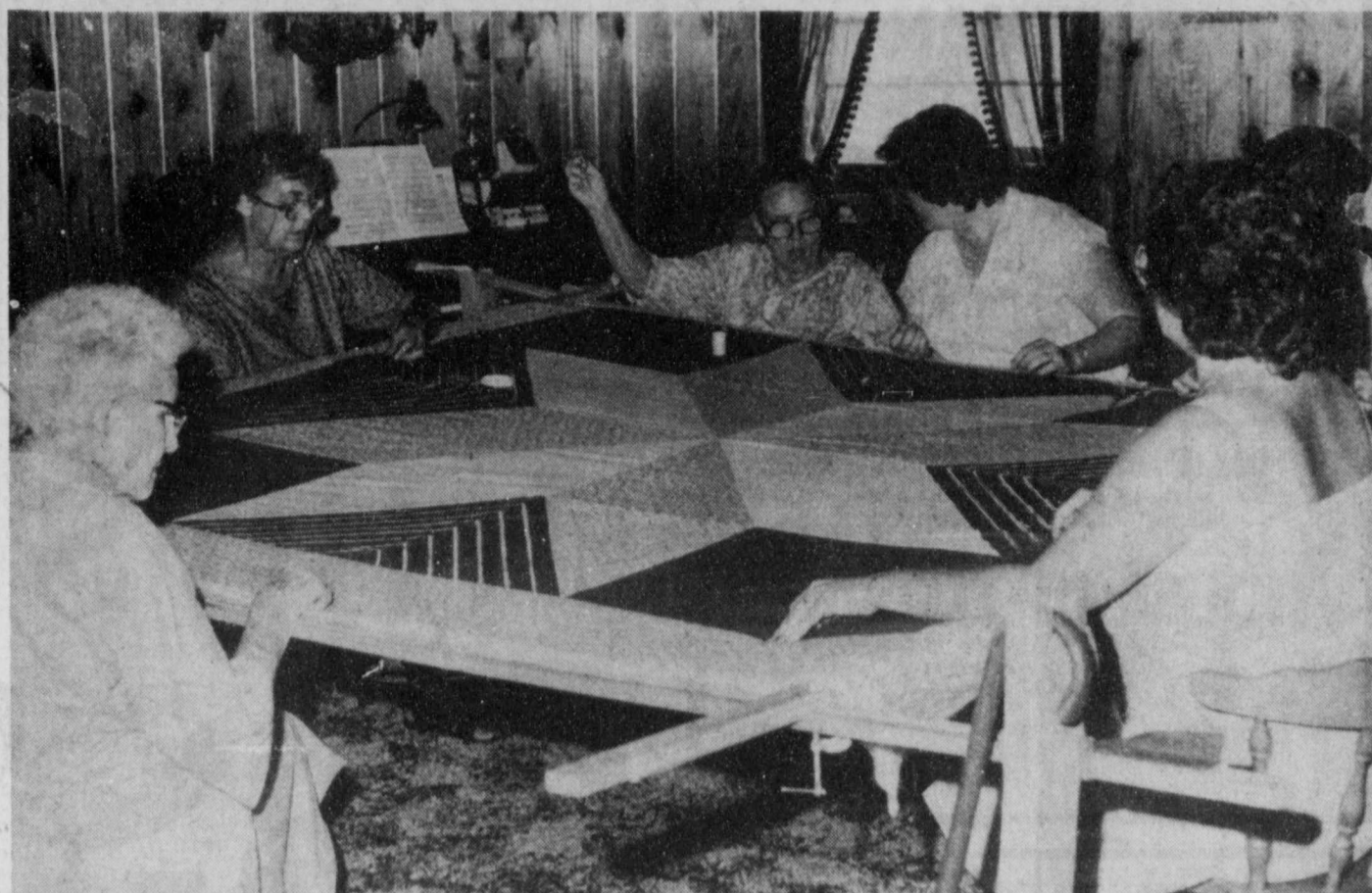

Water Sewer Project Nearing Completion

The water and sewer construction project that has been in progress in south Bogata since June of this year is now nearing completion, according to city engineers.

The area benefited by this project is along State Highway 37, from Tanglewood Lane south to 7th Street from Highway 37 to the sewage plant road; and South Bryson Street from the Roach Trailer Park to the Free Hope Baptist Church and Cemetery.

The area had just recently been incorporated into the city, and was without adequate water and sewer services as well as fire protection. Some of the houses on South Bryson Street and Effies Alley had no water service of any kind and had to haul water or depend on rain barrels.

The improvements were first requested by citizens of the area in 1974, but it has taken eight years to bring it to pass.

The work as completed consists of 9,064 linear feet of 6-inch water main; 3,245 linear feet of 2-inch water line; six new water services; 36 upgraded water services; nine fire hydrants

(protecting 50 houses); 2,678 linear feet of 10-inch sewer outfall line; 5,380 linear feet of 8-inch sewer line; 2,114 linear feet of 6-inch sewer line; and 22 new sewer services.

Incidental to the completed work is the elimination of the sewage lift station that serves the Castleman addition in southwest Bogata.

The facility had become overloaded and was subject to malfunction from time to time, causing sewage back up

into some of the houses in the area. The new sewer lines are constructed on a grade that allowed the lift station to be eliminated.

The project was financed by a grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, (HUD), for \$262,332. Engineering was by Hayter Engineering Inc. of Paris, and the construction was by Tri J. Construction Company of Paris.

Current members of the board are James E. Pearce, W.H. Hammer,

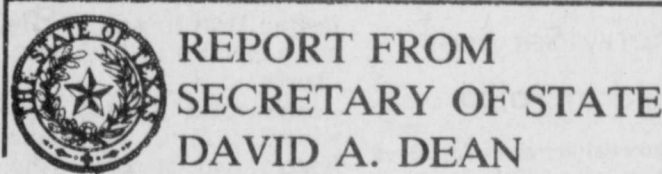

Elections Update

The Secretary of State Election Central (SSEC) project involving vote tabulation beginning with the November general election is well under way. The formats of the ballots to be reported on election night are in final testing stages. Clerks across Texas have been contacted, and an overwhelming 251 of the 254 clerks will report vote totals to the SSEC on election night. In addition, volunteer election inspectors will be available in many county clerks' offices throughout the State to assist in the reporting of votes to the Secretary of State Election Central. To date, 17 separate news media will be on hand in the Secretary of State's Office on November 2 to receive first-hand vote totals and in turn pass on these most up-to-date totals to the citizens of Texas. In addition, the Associated Press and United Press International will be making results available to the Texas media via their direct computer hookup to the Secretary of State's computer.

All registered voters are reminded that the absentee voting period by personal appearance for the November 2 general election is October 13 through October 29th. Voters should contact their county clerks to confirm the time and location for absentee voting in their county.

On election day, polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. In Harris and Dallas counties, polls will open one hour earlier at 6:00 a.m. and remain open until 7:00 p.m.

The Elections Division of the Secretary of State's Office will be fully staffed on election day and throughout election night. Any citizen having an election question may call toll-free at 1-800-252-9602. Bilingual assistance will be available.

Texas voters are encouraged to determine and confirm in advance of election day the location of their polling place. A list of polling places by address will no doubt be printed in your local newspaper.

Any citizen observing an election irregularity on election day is encouraged to contact the Elections Division toll-free at 1-800-252-9602. It is the goal of the Secretary of State's Office to have over 300 volunteer election inspectors across the State to assist election officials on election day.

Six amendments on your November 2 ballot

One of the best kept political secrets is that Texans will have a chance Nov. 2 to make six changes in the state constitution while they are balloting for governor and U.S. senator.

Only one of the proposals — No. 2 — has attracted enough public interest to cause an organization booster group to try to get it passed.

Proposition No. 2 would remove the present \$80 million ceiling on the amount of state aid that can be matched with federal money for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or AFDC.

Three of the proposed constitutional amendments were passed by the regular session of the 1981 Legislature and the other three in the special May session.

Should the six proposals pass in November, that would make a total of 253 changes voted in the constitution since it was adopted in 1876.

Five of seven other constitution amendments approved by the 1981 regular session were approved by voters in November 1981.

"I think chances are excellent for passage of the welfare amendment," said Phil Strickland, head of Citizens Concerned About Children, which claims the support of the governor, lieutenant governor and House speaker.

"Because of inflation, cutbacks in federal assistance and population increases, Texas is fast approaching the present (\$80 million) ceiling," says Strickland, who also is director of the Texas Baptist Christian Life Commission.

"Unless Amendment No. 2 is adopted, the average \$34 per month benefit, which ranks Texas 49th among the states, will be cut or truly needy children will be dropped from the program and denied assistance."

The proposed amendment removes the present ceiling on the amount of state aid to dependent children and their caretakers and sets a new ceiling of \$160 million for the 1982-83 period and 1 percent of the state budget after that.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby estimated the next Legislature will need about \$100 million for matching funds.

Arguments against the amendment come from those who think welfare spending should be reduced instead of raising the ceiling on assistance grants.

The proposal to repeal the state property tax is part of a long, bitter fight over financing of construction at state colleges not in the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems. In these two systems, construction is paid by income from the Permanent University Fund, which has been built up mostly from oil and gas leases on state-owned lands.

In 1956 the Legislature authorized a state levy of 10 cents per \$100 valuation to help 17 state colleges outside the two systems, and it was approved by voters. The tax was challenged in court, and in 1980 the Legislature reduced it to .0001 percent.

claiming the Legislature had no right to change a tax rate that was set by popular vote in the constitution.

The proposed constitution change on the Nov. 2 ballot would repeal the 10 cents tax, still in the constitution, and would authorize the Legislature to make general revenue appropriations to the 17 colleges for building funds.

The special legislative session in May also approved a bill, effective only if voters change the constitution, to appropriate about \$151 million to the 17 colleges for building purposes.

Although no organization is pushing approval of the amendment, Gov. Bill Clements mentions it frequently in his campaign speeches.

"There's no such thing as too much tax relief in my opinion," he says.

ballot include: — No. 3, exempting agricultural machinery and equipment from ad valorem taxes. This would expand the present exemption of "implements of husbandry" owned by individuals to include partnerships and corporations.

— No. 4, limiting terms for members of governing boards of certain water districts and other special districts to four years. Currently most are limited to two years.

— No. 5, abolishing the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties and shifting the duties to the county auditor, if voters approve.

— No. 6, increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to 12 percent annually. The current limit is 6 percent, and bonds have been increasingly difficult to sell.
