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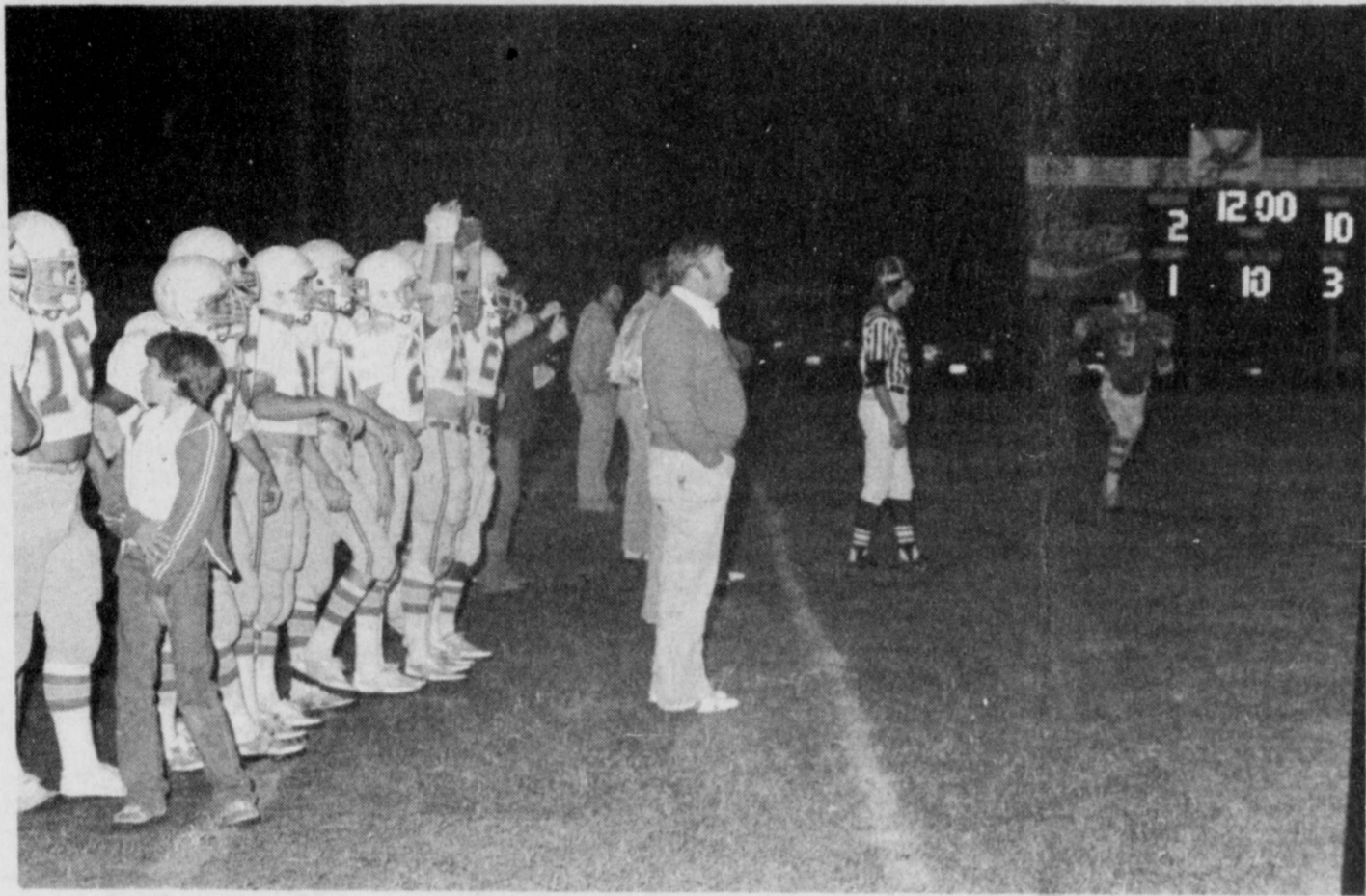

Hopes For District Title Dashed

## Rebels Fight To Finish Against New Diana

The Rivercrest Rebels fought to the finish against the tough New Diana Eagles Friday, Oct. 22, but the 10-2 loss dashed any hopes that the Rebs had of retaining their district title.

The loss brings the Rebel record to 3-2-0 for the season, not quite good enough for a berth on the top of the heap.

Still tied for first place in the district are New Diana and Big Sandy. Big Sandy beat James Bowie last week 20-12. In upcoming action, Big Sandy will play Comopickton and New Diana will play Maud. The team which will represent the district, provided both teams win their next two games, will be the Big Sandy Wildcats, as they had more first downs in their tie game with New Diana.

Both Big Sandy and New Diana now have a 4-0-1 district record.

There was little question that the Rebels were primed for the New Diana, as the two teams fought a firm

defensive battle throughout the first quarter. Late in the period, however, the Eagles trapped Rebel quarterback Bradley Moore behind his own goal line for a safety.

After a lengthy delay because the officials seemed unsure of the procedure following a safety (the first in a long series of delays caused by officiating), the Rebels free kicked the ball, giving the Eagles good field position again. The field position led to the single Eagle touchdown in the game, followed by a quarterback end around run for two points.

The Rebels demonstrated the ease with which they could move the ball against New Diana in the next series, as they settled down to a steady running game that destroyed the Eagle defense. Randy Galloway and Richard Mays alternately picked apart the Eagle line, pushing to the one yard line, where the ball went to the Eagles on downs.

Still not discouraged by their inability to score, the entire Rebel line and backfield kept the Eagle quarterback from reaching the goal line and got on the scoreboards with a safety.

The Rebels might have scored again before the end of the half, but the free kick after the safety was fumbled and the Eagles recovered on the Rivercrest 49 yard line. The possession was of no value to the Eagles, however, as they penetrated only to the Rebel 26 yard line, and had been pushed by the Rebel defense back to midfield when the halftime whistle blew.

The Rebels took the kickoff after the half and again began a steady drive to the New Diana goal line, but a touchdown pass from Bradley Moore to Larry Davis was intercepted by the Eagles at the Rebel five yard line. The Eagles were unable to cross mid-field, however, and punted the ball to the Rebels, who took possession

## Newspaper Ownership Changes

The Deport Times, Bogata News, Talco Times and Blossom Times have been returned to Four Corners Publishing Co., owned by Bob and Pat Wright of Mt. Vernon.

The return of the assets to the Wrights from Bert West and Red River Publishing Co. was completed at 6 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 24. A writ of sequestration was issued at noon Friday, Oct. 22, from the Franklin County District Court of Judge J.N.

Thompson, and the equipment used in the publication of the newspapers was secured Friday afternoon by Lamar County Constable Al Parks in the old First National Bank building in Deport. The sequestration was the first step in the process of returning the newspapers to the Wrights. Bert C. and Betty West returned the operating assets of the company to the Wrights through a bill of sale on Sunday.

Operation of the Newspapers in expected to remain basically the same, with the same employees working for the Newspapers.

Nanalee Nichols will be the managing editor, and Vera Grogan (when she returns from the hospital) will operate the office in Bogata. Joyce Alexander will be the Talco editor and Shelley Vaughn will be the Blossom editor.

## Local Sales Tax Reflect Slow-down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent \$35.6 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for October.

Although the 1982 statewide total so far this year is up 11 percent over the 1981 total through the same date of last year, on a local basis the nation-wide economic slow-down may be showing up a little, as none of the smaller cities in the area received a check. Checks are not issued if the amount of sales tax is payable is less than \$500.

In Lamar county Blossom and Deport received no check for the period of taxable sales in August and reported to the state by the end of September.

Neither Bogata in Red River County nor Talco in Titus County received a check.

The larger cities of Clarksville and Paris received checks, but the percent was down slightly from the same period last year.

Clarksville received a check for \$9,456.38 and Paris \$66,899.56.

The city of Dallas, the closest major city to the area, received a \$4.2 million payment, up 8.9 percent so far this year.

The statewide figures included the impact on border cities brought about by the devaluation of the Mexican peso in August.

Bullock noted that in the past devaluations have had an immediate impact on border sales, but have returned to pre-devaluation levels within a year in the past.

# Green Light Given For RR Army Depot Project

Representative Sam B. fiscal year 1983 Defense Hall, Jr. today praised Department construction Congress and the President authorization and ap- for finishing work on the propriation bills before

adjourning for the November elections.

According to Congressman Hall, the President signed both the authorization and appropriation bills for military construction on October 15th. This action means that a \$39 million construction project at Red River Army Depot has the green light.

"I am especially pleased that Congress completed work on the Defense Department construction request, which includes money for the Red River Army Depot, because only a handful of appropriation bills passed before Congress adjourned for the elections. This means that the \$39 million maintenance modernization program at Red River can proceed according to schedule."

Congressman Hall said that the Texas Delegation pulled together to keep the RRAD request intact in both the DoD authorization and appropriation bills.

"I've been lobbying everyone who would stop for a moment and chat with me about the modernization project, but it is Colonel Jerry Lindsey and his team who deserve all the credit for making convincing arguments to the Pentagon and Congress as to the need for this program."

According to the Department of the Army, this construction project is required to provide centralized facilities for the overhaul and conversion of light tracked vehicles and for the reconditioning and rebuilding of rubber roadwheels and track.

The light track vehicle shop is needed to provide a complete restoration and conversion center for the armored personnel carrier family of vehicles.

In addition, the rubber operations building is required to rebuild 402,000 rubber track shoes and 92,000 rubber roadwheels each year.

## Lamb Show Rules

Area 4-H and Future Farmer members are being reminded by Red River County Agent Chris Bull about the rules and regulations for the 1983 Lamb Show, with initial registration required by Nov. 1.

Complete rules for the show are listed as follows: All exhibitors must be enrolled in public schools by Nov 1 and either reside in Red River County, attend schools therein or be active member in 4-H or FFA in the county.

Ewes or wethers will be allowed in the market lamb show.

All lambs must be owned by exhibitors by Nov. 1, 1982.

Exhibitors must also register their lambs at the County Extension Office by this date.

All lambs must be verified by a Vocational Agricultural Teacher, County Extension Agent or 4-H Adult Leader on Feb. 1, 1983. All lambs having their milk teeth at this time only, are eligible for the market lamb show and sale.

The lamb show will be limited to two lambs per exhibitor.

The top 20 lambs in the show will sell at the auction. The judge will set the sale order, beginning with the No. 3 lamb to No. 20, followed by the reserve grand champion and finishing with the grand champion.

All decisions of the judge

and superintendent will be final.

Animals must be shown when and in such a manner as the judge may require.

The weigh-in will begin at 9 a.m., April 9, unless special permission is obtained from the superintendent. All sheep should be in the barn by this time.

Lambs will be divided into three weight classes: Lightweight, Mediumweight and Heavyweight.

All lambs prior to the show must be sheared to one-quarter inch at show time.

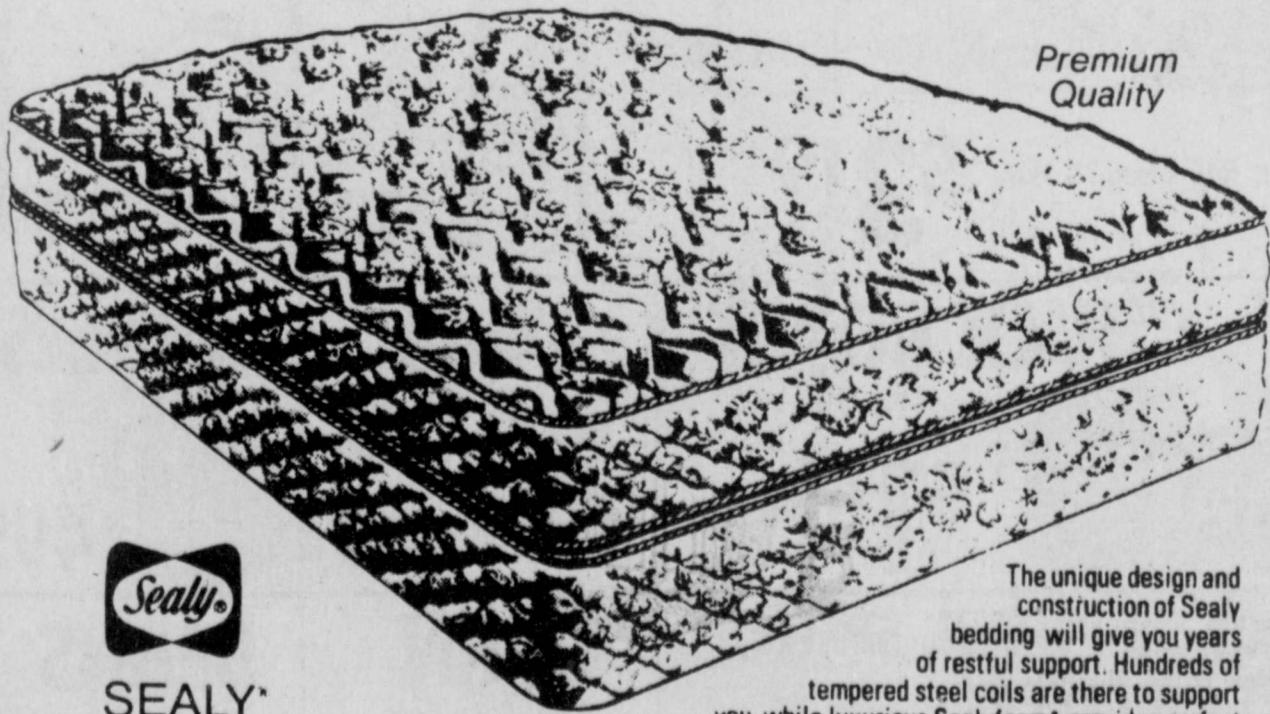
One grand champion and one reserve champion will be selected from the lamb show.

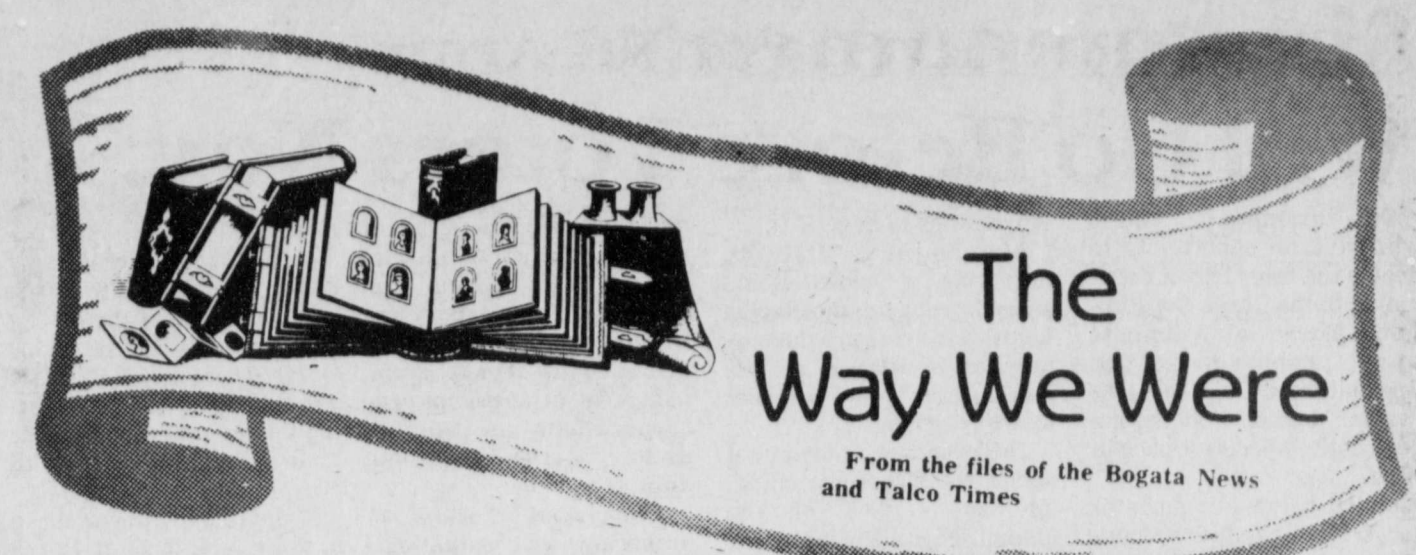

**Red River Co. Oil Sale No Small Matter**

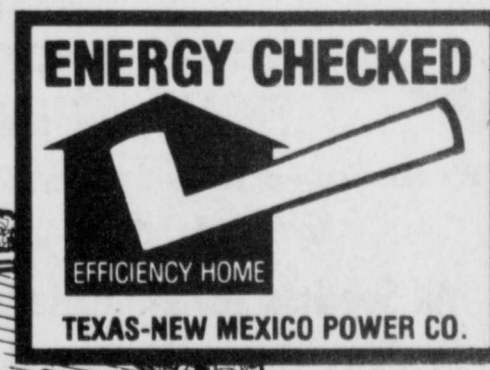
In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid Continent Oil and Gas Association said the County ranked 192nd among Texas 254 counties on the basis of value of its marketed petroleum production. This production includes condensate and chsinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 69,067 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$2,382,121, and 3.1 million cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$5,570. Owners of royalty in the county received 1298,461 as their share of the output, the Association noted.

"Although the oil and gas industry is suffering through a slowdown in drilling attributable in large part to a worldwide decline in demand for petroleum products it continues to be the cornerstone of the economy of Texas and many of its counties," said the Association's chairman, Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo. 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# Six Amendments Will Go Before Voters Nov. 2

On November 2, voters will have an opportunity to decide the fate of six amendments to the Texas Constitution. These amendments were proposed by the Legislature during the 1981 regular session and the second special session in 1982.

Listed below are parts of the Texas Legislative Council's analysis of these resolutions so voters will have an opportunity to review them before the election.

**Amendment 1, HJR 1, proposing a constitutional amendment to repeal the state property tax.**

The proposed amendment repeals the Texas Constitution so that the only remaining state property tax is abolished. This state property tax has not been collected for the past three years, and failure of this amendment to pass would result in collection of millions of dollars in back taxes.

The money set aside for this tax is pledged for funding construction and repair of structures at 17 state universities, with East Texas State University at Commerce being one of the

universities to benefit.

**Amendment 2, HJR 62, proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for assistance grants, medical care, and services to needy persons.**

The proposed amendment removes the present ceiling, adopted in 1969, on the amount of state funding for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. The ceiling would be \$160 million in 1982-83 and 1% of the state's budget in subsequent bienniums.

In addition, the amendment removes a provision, thus allowing the Legislature to enact laws enabling the state to cooperate with and accept and expend funds from the federal government in establishing assistance programs.

**Amendment 3, SJR 8, proposing a constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry from ad valorem taxation.**

The proposed amendment would grant an exemption from property taxation of the implements of farming or ranching that are used in

the production of farm or ranch products. It would also expand the current implements of husbandry tax exemption by making it available to all taxpayers, including partnerships and corporations as well as natural persons, without limit as to value.

**Amendment 4, HJR 77, proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms of office not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and other conservation and reclamation districts.**

The Texas Constitution provides that terms of office for governmental officers may not exceed two years unless the Constitution specifically authorizes longer terms. In recent years, however, elections of members to governing boards of some water, conservation and reclamation districts have been characterized by low voter turnout and large financial costs.

The proposed amendment is designed to allow the Legislature to determine those districts that suffer from low voter turnout and considerable election expense and to provide by law for terms of office of up to four years in the hope that less frequent elections will generate more voter interest and reduce election costs.

**Amendment 5, HJR 119, proposing a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of County Treasurer in certain counties.**

The proposed amendment abolishes the office of County Treasurer in Tarrant and Bee Counties and transfers the powers, duties and functions of the office to the County Auditor or its successor. If the amendment is adopted, a separate election will be required in each of the affected counties at which the local voters will be permitted to make a final decision on the matter.

**Amendment 6, SJR 6, proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds.**

The proposed amendment raises the maximum rate of interest on certain general obligation bonds from a weighted average annual interest rate of 6% to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%. The proposed change would affect water quality enhancement and water conservation bonds, park development bonds, and student loan

bonds.

It has been increasingly difficult for the state to sell bonds because of the low interest rate ceilings set by the Constitution, and this amendment attempts to bring the interest rate on other state bonds into line with current market conditions.

## School Achievement Test Time

The fall testing program, under the direction of Bonnie Huddleston, counselor, has been underway during the past few weeks in the Talco-Bogata schools.

Talco and Bogata Elementary and Junior High students were given SRA Achievement Tests on Oct. 5-6-7, with Rivercrest ninth through 11th grades being tested on Oct. 13.

The testing program consists of Science Research Associates tests for Grades 1-8. Grades nine and eleven take the Iowa Test of Educational Development and Grade ten takes the Differential Aptitude Test.

On each campus the classroom teachers administered the tests and will be able to use the information gained from test results in many ways.

Test scores will be returned to the schools from the computer center, where they are scored, in approximately six weeks.

Parents and students alike may see these test results by appointment, as the information must be processed and placed in each student's permanent folder.

In addition to the achievement testing, Rivercrest seniors took part in a testing program on Oct. 13 called the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB), provided by the department of defense. The tests were administered at the high school by representatives from the Armed Services with the help of Bonnie Huddleston, high school counselor and guidance director.

The Department of Defense has developed and offers this service to interested schools both as a means of sharing extensive service experience on aptitude testing and occupational information. It can also serve as a means of stimulating student interest in exploring their own aptitudes for occupations. Experience indicates that the results of this testing can be a valuable tool which can be used in counseling both career-oriented and college-bound high school students.

Eleven juniors from Rivercrest and four students from North Hopkins High School were given the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude and National Merit

System Tests on Oct. 19 at Rivercrest High School by Mrs. Huddleston.

This test was sponsored by the College Entrance Examination Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation for the purpose of helping schools obtain information helpful to students in planning their education beyond high school and furnishing students the opportunity to enter scholarship competition. 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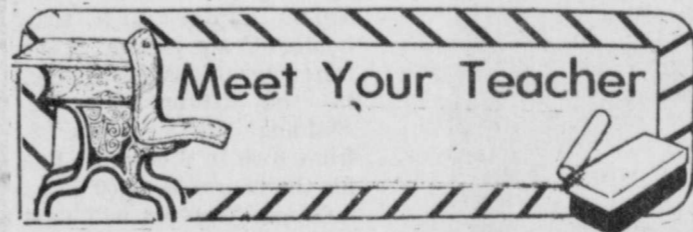
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Coach Wake Wood is a graduate of East Texas University with a Masters of Science Degree with math as a major.

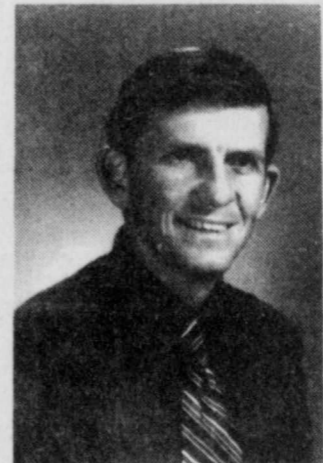

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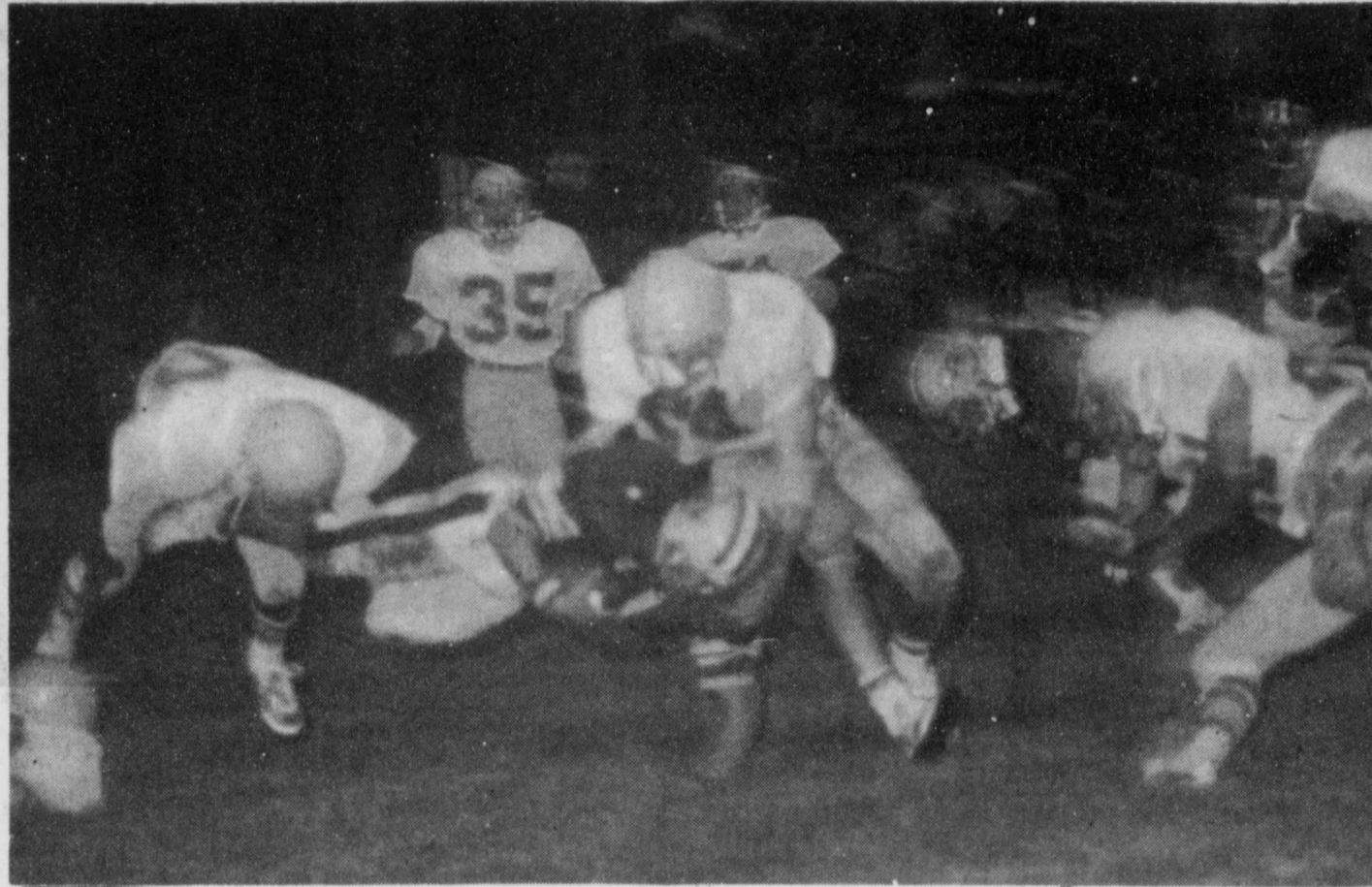
