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

chill to crawl up the spine as yellowed page. The headline Honolulu knew all to well. is huge, and it has only one thing to say WAR.

Underneath is a slightly smaller headline that reads 'Oahu Bombed By Japanese

The time, December 7, 1941, the newspaper, the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, The event, obviously, was the entry of the U.S. into war with Japan.

It is an event with which almost everyone familiar...the bombing of Pearl Harbor is in every history book, and in the minds of all who can remember those days.

But the newspapers brought in by Murl Roach, in incredibly good condition, provide a look at the bombing that is personal, from a different standpoint than the history books or papers on the mainland.

Under the headlines it is reported that Transpacific telegraph has said that "President Roosevelt announced this morning that Japanese planes had attacked Manila and Pearl Harbor". Most Americans didn't have any idea where Pearl Harbor was, but the people of

The fear and uncertainty came through the papers, no matter how hard the journalists tried to be calm and professional.

The list of the island's dead and injured was a long way from complete, but already the column was lengthy.

Over 400 were said dead on Oahu. Blackouts were announced, and what was moveable of the U.S. Fleet was moving out to sea. Attacks on Manila and

Guam were printed.

Warnings to boil water because of contamination were run, and mainland papers carried no accounts of terrified civilians hiding from a fiery rain. There were no first hand accounts of damage to the governor's mansion, or unexploded bombs in the U.S. papers,

there were. The second edition ran a huge headline too...."SABOTEURS LAND HERE'' Beneath that..."Britain, Australia Declare War!"

An entire page of photographs showed the devastation of naval vessels, base buildings and business

Reports of Japanese submarines off the West Coast of America added to fears that a full-scale attack on the U.S. was underway.

It is an oddly eery paper, from long ago, loaded with history that was not history then. Then it was worry, insecurity and no one knew what the outcome would be.

There was no assurance that the war would be won by the U.S., no promise of victory, only reports of what was happening...day by day, week by week while it sometimes seemed that the world was going up in smoke.

The old paper provides a fresh look at history now. For those who cannot remember that far back it is a view from outside the school books. For those who can remember it is a revival of old memories...of where... of when...but very few can ever really understand why.
