## Rivercrest Captures Two Big Games

The Rivercrest Rebels took advantage of a good opportunity Tuesday night to post a district opening 55-42 victory over the Ore City Rebels in Ore City.

Double figure scoring from post man David Rozell, 18 points, and point guard Stan Wood, 11, overcame an early 14-9 deficit. The win on the road boosted Rivercrest's season record to 14-6.

After the hometown Rebels got their five point lead, Rivercrest battled back and took a three point lead before the half. But a couple of missed shots and turnovers allowed Ore City to tie it up at 27-all at the half.

The Rebel defense held up against a slow down defense. Rivercrest limited the hosts

to only eight and seven points in the last two quarters respectively.

Stan Wood got ten of his points in the final two quarters. Wood hit several break away layups during the final half including one that gave the Rebels a 40-35 lead just before the third period ended. Rivercrest continued to pull away in the last period by hitting several mor ceasy inside baskets to keep their five point lead.

With 5:50 remaining in the game, Ore City had cut the lead to 44-39 and had the ball. But Rivercrest got the defensive rebound and Wood completed a three point play off a layup and a foul to boost the lead to 45-39 and close the door on any comeback attempt.

The Rivercrest Rebels

surprised the fifth ranked New Diana Eagles Friday night by taking a district game away from them 61-49. The Rebels attacked the talented Eagles and controlled the game from the beginning.

Coming into the game, Wood's team was inconsistent. Part of it he attributed to self-inflicted pressure, another portion he said was due to a heavy reliance on postman David Rozell. The rest of the starting five had to get into the act. "If all we do is go to Rozell, we don't play well," Wood says.

To be effective, the Rebels had to be active, and they couldn't do much when their opponents played conservative ball. That's a problem he never had to

worry about with New Diana, which wasted no time in putting up shots. The fired-up Rebels jumped out with a 15-9 first quarter lead that left the Eagles wanting. Rivercrest stretched the margin to 34-23 by half time. As usual, the Rebs looked often for Rozell, the 6'5" senior who seems to improve with every game. Getting good position under the goal, Rozell drew four first half fouls on New Diana's Ken Johnson, 6'6", and turned those into eight of ten from the three throw line. Johnson was one of four Eagles to foul out.

"We didn't play very well, but when your big man gets in foul trouble early, you don't really expect to play well," said Eagles coach Phoney Harrell. "Johnson

had never fouled out of a game until tonight. In fact, we average only about nine fouls a ballgame."

But Friday night, the Eagles were called for 28 fouls, most of which were due to the Rebel's aggressiveness. Led by Rozell's 12 of 14, Rivercrest made 21 of 30 from the free throw line.

The Eagles did cut the lead to 44-40 early in the fourth quarter but the Rebs came back with six straight points to take a 50-40 lead. The Rebels were never seriously challenged after that.

"I was pleased we weren't flat in the second half," Wood said. "Everytime it looked like they were making a run at us, we came up with the big baskets." "We reacted to loose balls better than we have all year," said Wood's assistant, Andy Jones.

It was the team movement that carried the Rebels to their victory. Although the scorebook may appear otherwise, Rozell's 22 points didn't make him the sole factor on the Rebels side. Instead of standing still while Rozell fought off double-team harrassment, the other four starters swarmed the boards and took shots when they were open. "The win was a complete team effort for the Rebs as Wyatt Bush, Larry Davis and David Rozell controlled the inside, and Bradley Moore, Kelly Jef-

fery, John Hines and Stan Wood controlled the outside." Wood said.

Bradley Moore contributed 10 points, Stan Wood had eight in addition to a fine floor game, and Wyatt Bush also added eight.

The win gives Rivercrest a district record of 2-0. Other undefeated teams in the district are Big Sandy 2-0 and Redwater 2-0. The Rebels traveled to Big Sandy Tuesday night for their third district challenge. Scores were unavailable at time of publication.

## Rivercrest Rebelettes Take Win

The Rivercrest Rebelettes shut out Ore City's squad 13-0 in the first quarter of the game en route to a 56-23 victory Tuesday night.

The win boosted the Rivercrest district record to 3-0 as Ore City joined Redwater and Como-Pickton as district teams defeated by Rivercrest this season. The Rebelettes' overall records stand at 7-7.

Jackie Via led all the Rebelette scorers with 14

points. The Rebelettes added another 24 points while holding Ore City to seven in the second quarter to ice the game.

"Play was pretty ragged out there tonight," said Rebelette coach, Frank Stubblefield. "We played alright in the first half but didn't in the second. We didn't work out over Christmas and this is our first game back."

The Rebelettes, usually in

a man to man defense, tried to run a zone in the second half that accounted for some of the ragged play, Stubblefield said.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Via with 14, Belcher with nine, Ward and Savage with eight each, Anderson with six, Simpson with five, and Smith, Reeder and Brooks each adding two.

Frank Stubblefield's Rebelettes, now 8-7 and 4-0 in

the District 17-AA girls race took the New Diana Eaglettes, 58-55, last Friday night in the local gym.

Carla Belcher, just promoted from the junior varsity, proved it was a wise decision by scoring two baskets in the final 1:15 to bring her team victory.

The Rebelettes trailed most of the way, thanks mostly to New Diana's hard-driving guard, Angela Johnson. A player of Johnson's quickness and desire makes a lot of things happen on court—some good and some bad. In the first half, the results were positive as she drew numerous fouls, hit 12 of 14 free throws and finished the half with 18 points.

But the Rebelettes, led by the outside marksmanship of Becky Brooks, inched closer in the third period and headed down the stretch trailing just 42-40. Mary Jane Savage kept the Rebelette squad in touch by effectively controlling Angela Johnson in the second half.

Belcher put the Rebelettes ahead, 56-55 with 1:15 to go when she made a turn-around shot in the lane. Johnson, called for charging, gave the ball back to the Rebelettes. Belcher came back with a difficult leaning layup with 28 seconds left to cinch the win.

Brooks closed with 17 points, while Belcher and Nelda Anderson both added 11-point support. The loss left New Diana 8-10 overall and 2-2 in district.

"I felt this week we were starting to get it together," said Stubblefield.
