All over the United States Future Farmers of America will begin celebrating FFA week February 19. Rivercrest High School FFA has a good reason to celebrate.

Their program has a total enrollment of 90 members. David Bell serves as the district officer and the chapter won second in district talent contest. They have six members receiving area awards next week in Paris. Jena Mangrum serves as district co-sweetheart.

The overall program, in addition to its regular courses, offers free employment training in meat

lab and ag mechanics.

FFA, a national organization for students studying vocational agriculture in public high school, provides some exceptional learning experiences for its members.

This is the 55th anniversary of FFA, which is run by student-members with adult guidance.

At Rivercrest, L.P. (Pete) Taylor, Craig Ingram and Vincent Lum are the advisors for the members of the program.

The FFA program provides practical training beyond the traditional

At Rivercrest, a meat processing lab is one of the program's features.

Students actually process meat, trimming, packing, wrapping the meat.

The FFA provides a unique opportunity to develop the potential of young people, and it is a growing, expanding and improving program.

Rebels Still Heading For District Rebelettes Compete For Bi-District Tonight

The Rivercrest Rebels varsity team swept the Como-Pickton team with a 94-24 victory at Rivercrest Tuesday night. The Junior Varsity won their game with almost as large a margin, winning 80-20.

At the half, the varsity game was 58-8, and played the second string for the entire second half. Coach Wood said that all of the players performed well during the game.

Wood also stressed that Friday night's game against the Redwater Dragons is extremely important, determining whether the Rebels will come out in first place in the district, or be in a three-way tie. He urges all fans to make the trip to Redwater to root for the Rebels, who appreciate fan support.

The Rivercrest Rebels claimed a victory last week over James Bowie, 65-42. They were led by Stan Wood with 18 and Bradley Moore with 16 points.

The first quarter ended in a tie ballgame, 12-12. Stan Wood hit for four and Bradley Moore and Kelly Jeffery each added two.

The Rebels took a three point lead at the half, 27-24. Stan Wood led the pack with eight points. John Hines added four and David Rozell hit for three.

Bradley Moore cut loose in the third period with eight points. Wood and Hines added four each and Davis hit for two. The score was 45-33 at the buzzer.

In the final stanza the Rebs came up with 20 points and held their opponents to nine. David Rozell contributed seven and Bradley Moore six. Stan Wood, John Hines and Larry Davis each added two. Scott Brown hit one from the foul line.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Stan Wood with 18, Bradley Moore with 16,

David Rozell and John Hines each with 10, Larry Davis with eight, Kelly Jeffery with two and Scott Brown with one.

Rivercrest pushed its record to 24-7 on the year and 11-1 in district play last Friday in Rebel gym as they put away the Maud Cardinals, 81-44.

David Rozell scored an impressive 24 points for the night. Bradley Moore made a showing with 16.

The Rebels scored 213 points in the first quarter to their opponents eight. Moore hit for eight in the first period and Rozell for five. Wood, Hines, Davis, Jeffery and Galloway added two each.

Rivercrest racked up another 20 points in the second stanza while holding Maud to 9. The Rebels led at the half 43-17. David Rozell connected on eight points and Bradley Moore added six. Wood, Davis and Galloway each added two.

David Rozell led the Rebel squad in the third period with 11 markers. Stan Wood, Bradley Moore, John Hines and Larry Davis added two each. The quarter score read 62-31.

Rivercrest connected for 19 points in the final period while the Cardinals managed only 13. Mark Brown hit the hoop for six, Scott Brown contributed four, Kelly Jeffery hit for five and Wyatt Bush and Randy Galloway each added two. The final tally was Rivercrest 81-Maud 44.

All ten Rebels added points to the scoreboard as David Rozell led with 24. He was followed by Bradley Moore with 16. Other scorers were Kelly Jeffery with seven, Stan Wood, Larry Davis, Mark Brown and Randy Galloway each with six. John Hines and Scott Brown added four each and Wyatt Bush hit for two.

The Rebels have two games left in season play. Tuesday, the Rebs host Como-Pickton and Friday

they travel to Redwater.

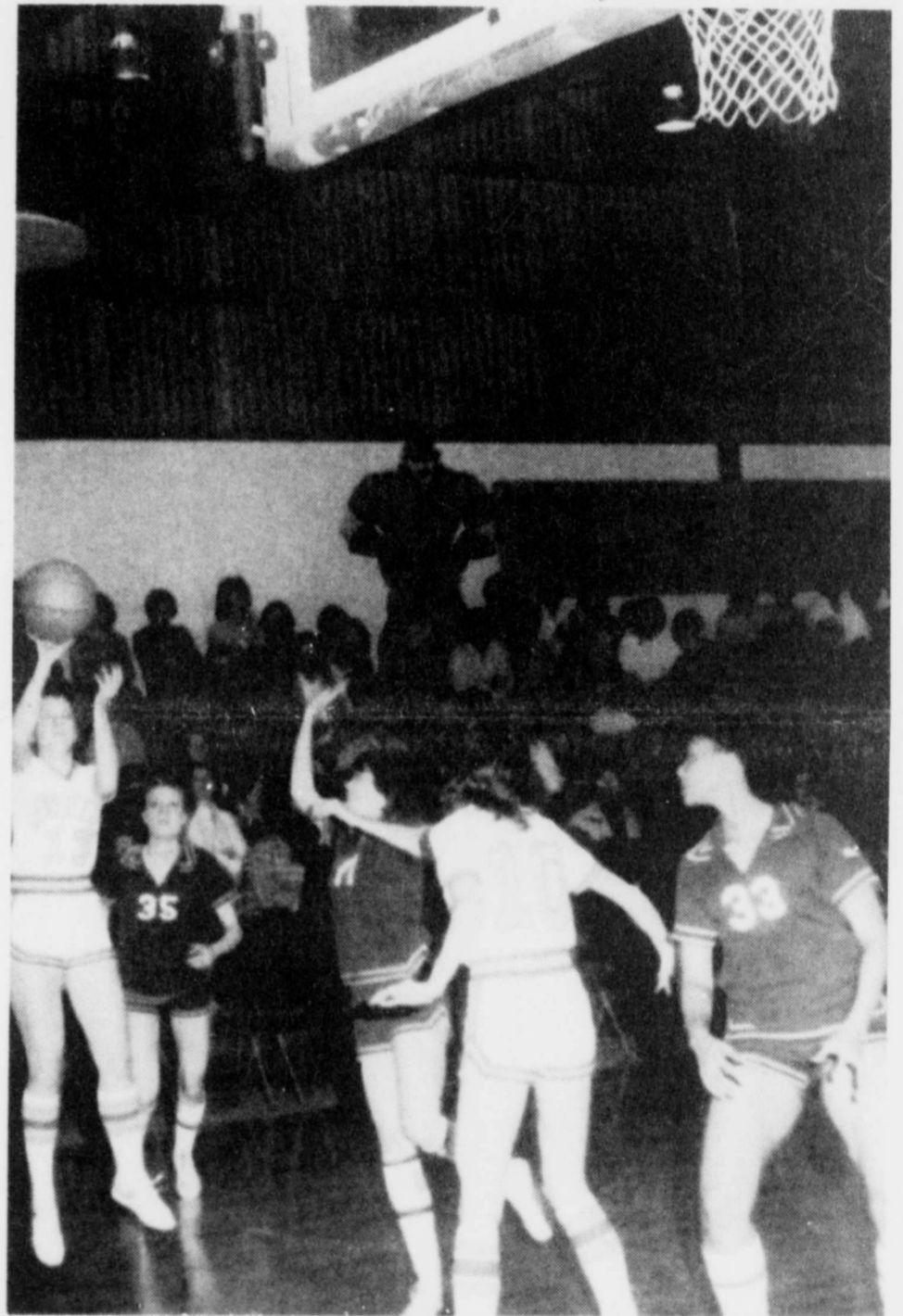

Changes In IRS Pension Withholding This Year

For 1983 there are changes to the method of withholding on pensions, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Prior law did not require a company to withhold tax on a pension it paid, even though the person receiving the pension could ask the payor to withhold tax.

The IRS says that the new law turns the situation around, and requires payors to withhold on a pension unless the recipient tells the payor not to. The payor must notify all who receive the pension of their right to opt out of withholding. Whether or not the recipient chooses withholding, the payor must send a statement to both the Internal Revenue Service and the pension recipient, telling them how much was

paid during the year.

The IRS points out that there are different rules for withholding on pensions paid periodically and for "lump sum" payments. The new rules used for withholding on periodic payments will generally be the same as those used for wage earners.

Where there is no certificate saying how much should be withheld, the payor will treat the recipient as married claiming three exemptions.

As for "lump sum" payments, the new law requires a flat 10 percent withholding, the IRS says.

However, there are special rules for total distributions from a pension plan allowing use of 10 year income averaging and capital gains treatment.

Money Frozen Because Of Unpaid Loans

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said today he has \$1.5 million worth of state checks he can't give the people they're made out to because these people owe money to the state.

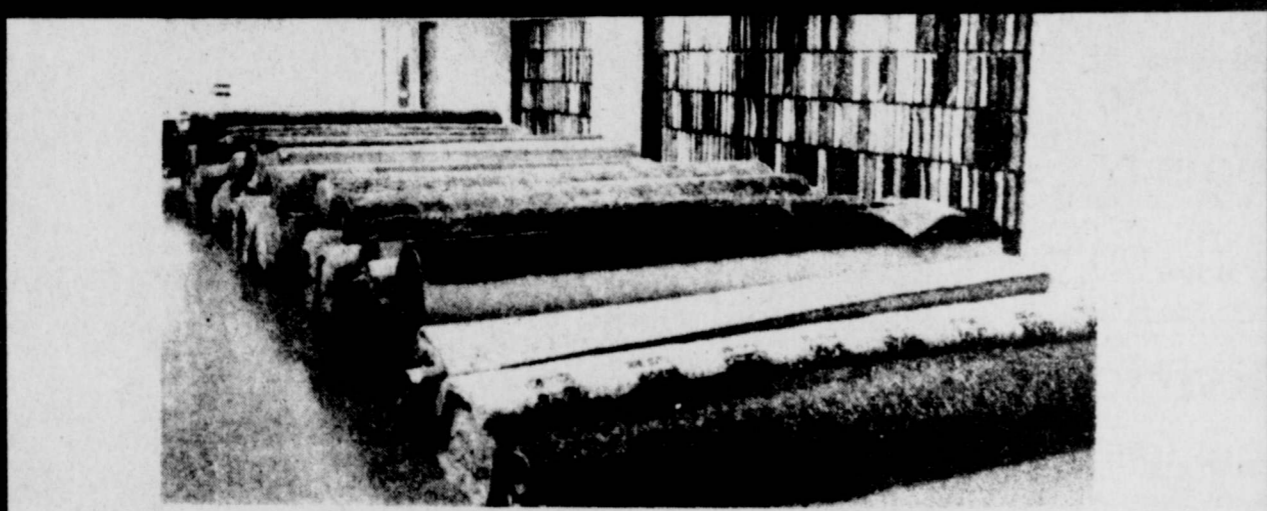
"The law says I can't issue a state check to anyone indebted to the state and I intend to collect every penny due before I turn

loose of this money," Bullock said.

About 71 percent of the 5,000 checks Bullock is holding can't be sent to the payees because they are behind in their sales or franchise taxes. If these delinquent taxpayers would pay their overdue taxes, Bullock would release checks worth \$899,000.

Bullock said there's almost \$630,000 frozen because people haven't repaid loans obtained under the Hinson-Hazelwood and National Direct Student Loan programs.

He said \$5.3 million owed Texas has been collected since 1978 when the law became effective.

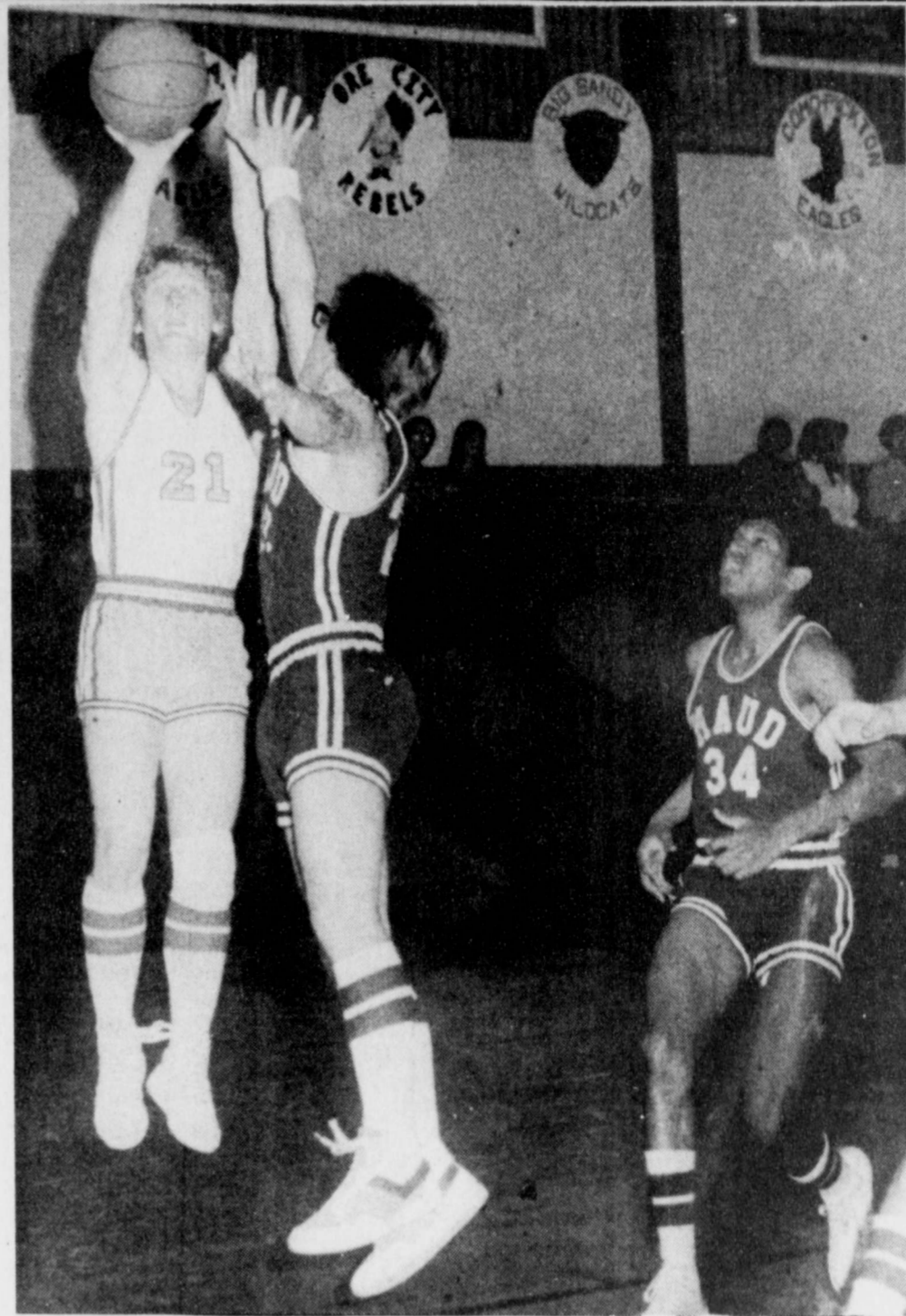

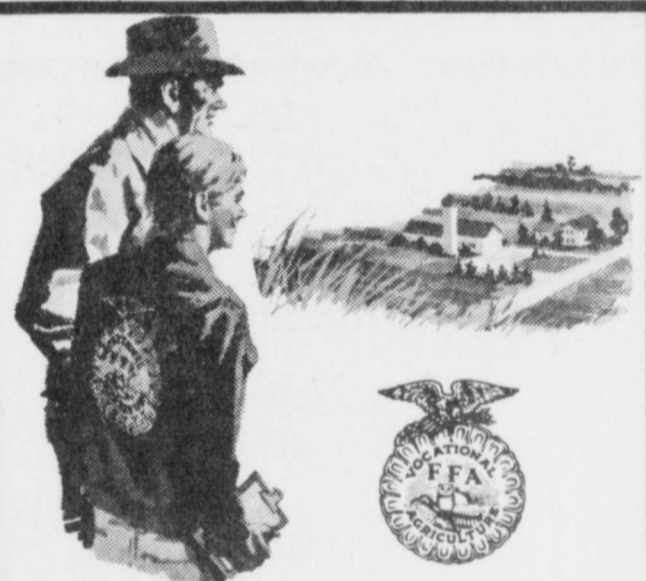
Second Place Essay Shows Dedication

Jody Thornton, a 13 year old 4-H member from Bogata, will participate in the calf scramble at the 1983 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Jody will "scramble" during the March 6 evening performance in the Astrodome. Not only will he have the opportunity to catch a calf, but he also will be a part of the outstanding entertainment package that includes the best rodeo contestants in the world and stars The Oak Ridge Boys as the featured entertainment.

Always a favorite with rodeo audiences, the calf scramble begins as an athletic event in the rodeo arena. However, for the contestants who manage to catch a calf, halter it and drag it across a finish line, the scrambling is only the start of a year long educational experience.

Each winner in the calf scramble receives a \$600 calf purchase certificate which enables the winner to purchase a purebred, registered heifer that he or she agrees to feed, fit, groom and return to the Houston Livestock Show for special show ring competition the following year.

Through the 1982 show, winners in the calf scramble received more than \$1.9 million to purchase more than 9,000 quality beef or dairy heifers.

Most heifers become the basis for future cattle herds; thus, a one year learning partnership is stretched into a lifetime career. For those youngsters who decide not to continue their cattle program, the learning experience is invaluable and many times serves to stimulate a career in some other agricultural occupation.

The Livestock Show opens February 19 and runs through March 6, with rodeo performances in the Astrodome beginning on February 23.

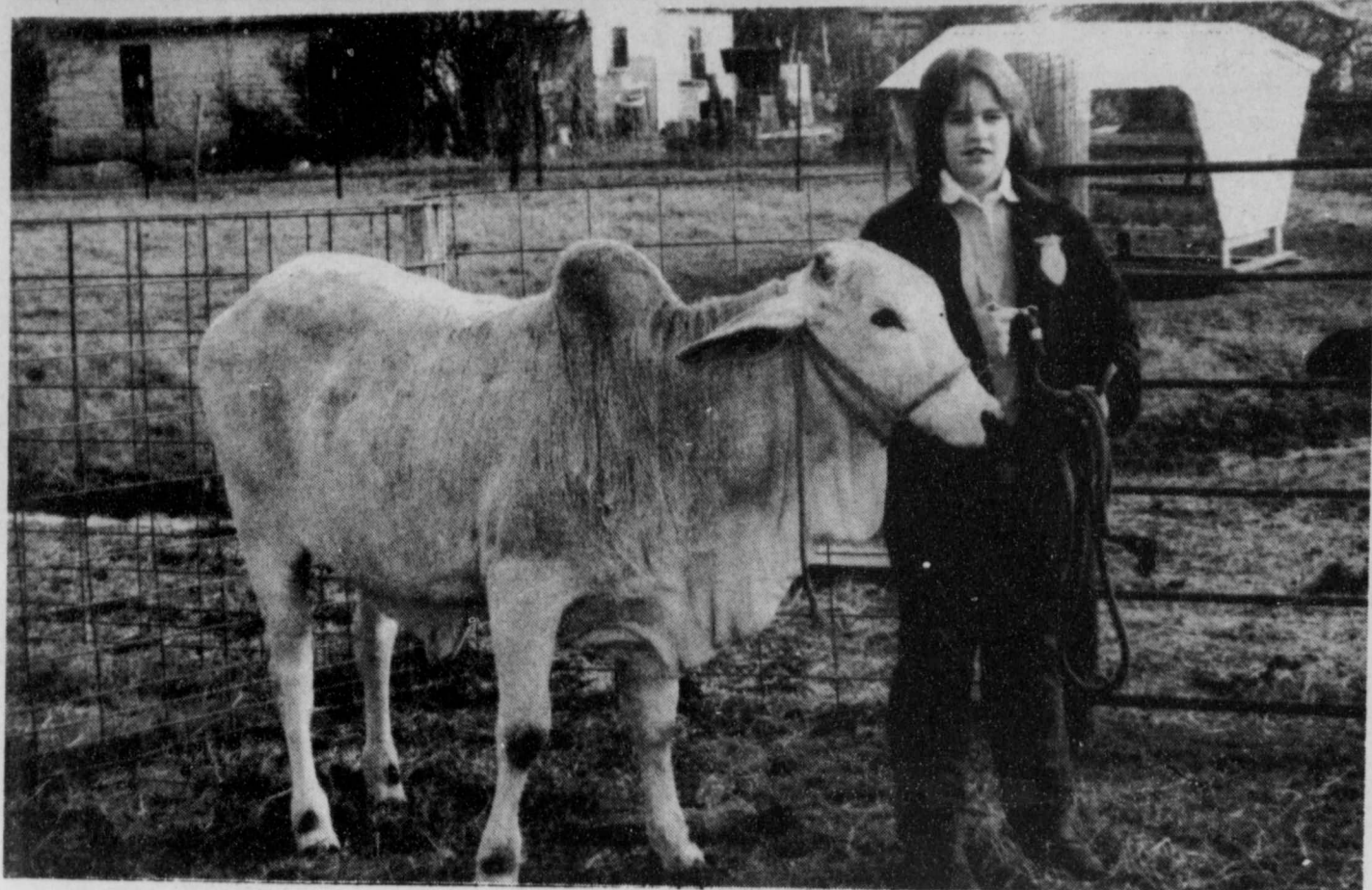

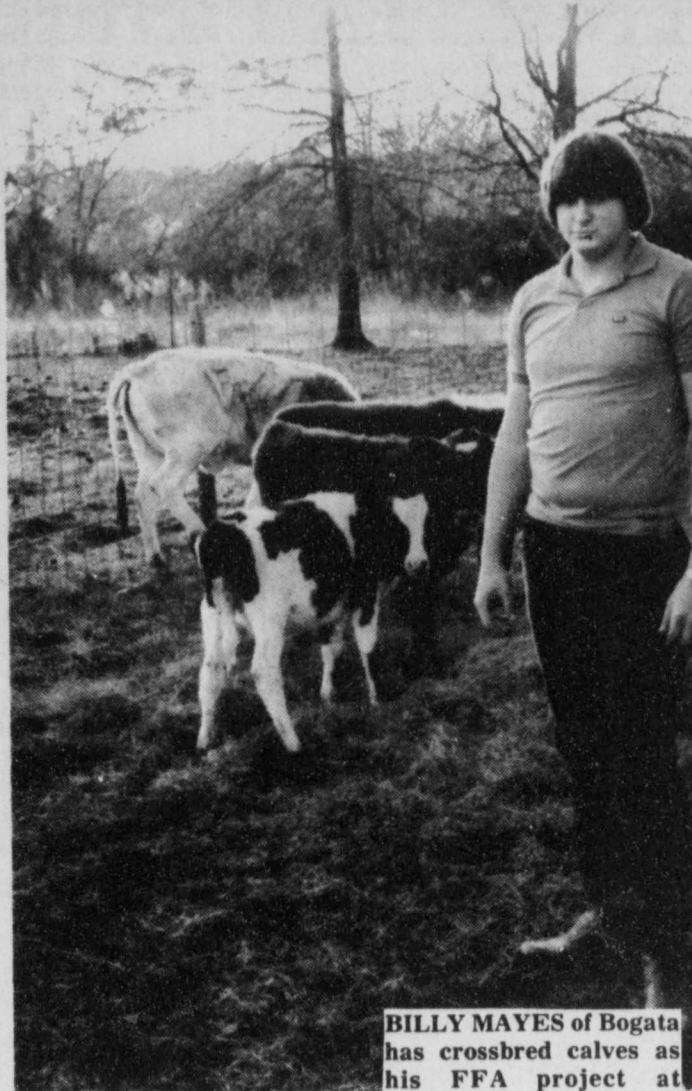

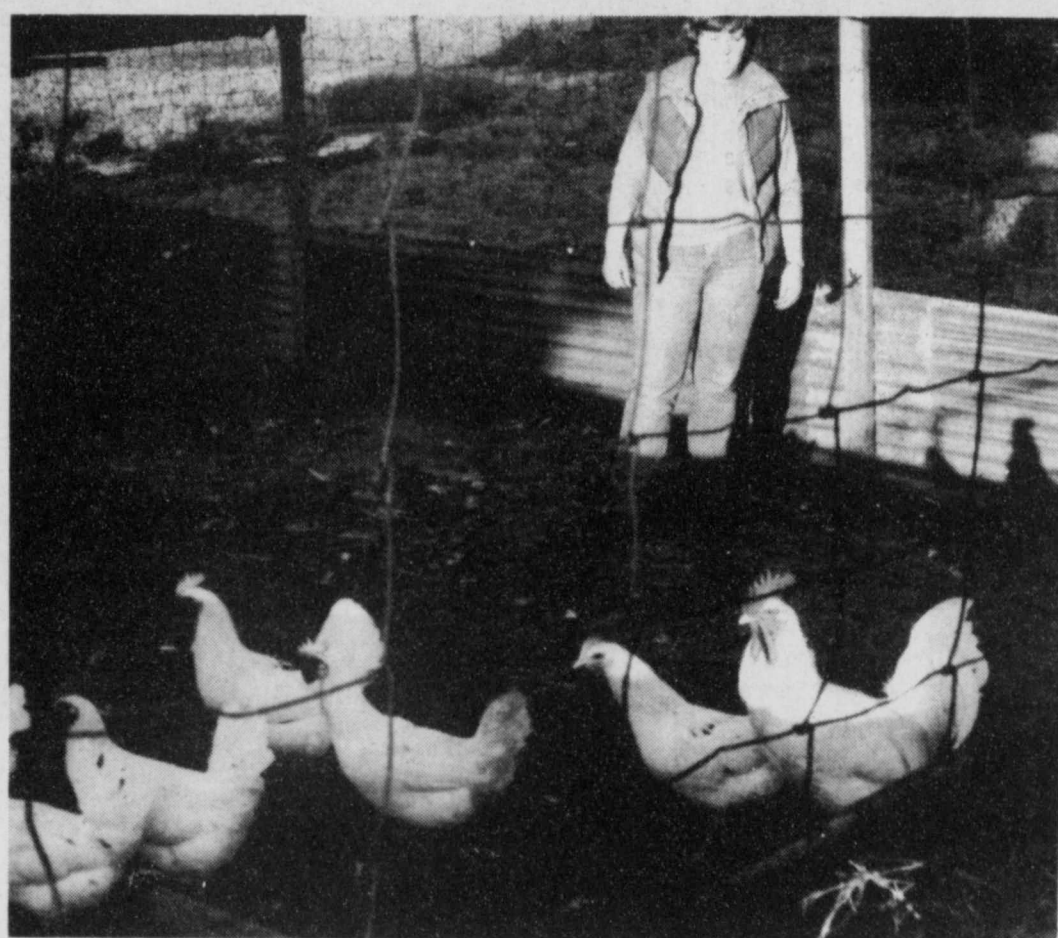

The U.S. Dollar is somewhat like the U.S. commodity market system. Supply and demand control the price of both the commodities and the money market. The big difference in the two is that the commodity market just has a certain amount that is produced by the farmers each year and this is effected by the elements. The money market is controlled by the Federal Reserve Bank. We call it the Fed. The Fed has a number of ways it can control the money supply, and what it choses to do -- either increase it or shrink it -- affects every person in the country.

If the money supply is allowed to grow too rapidly, and interest rates go down sharply, there is the possibility that this so-called "cheap" money will set off another round of inflation. On the other hand, if the Fed gets too tight with the money supply, and the cost of money goes up, then there is the danger of recession. Because money becomes too expensive for industry to borrow for increased production, and thereby creating fewer new jobs.

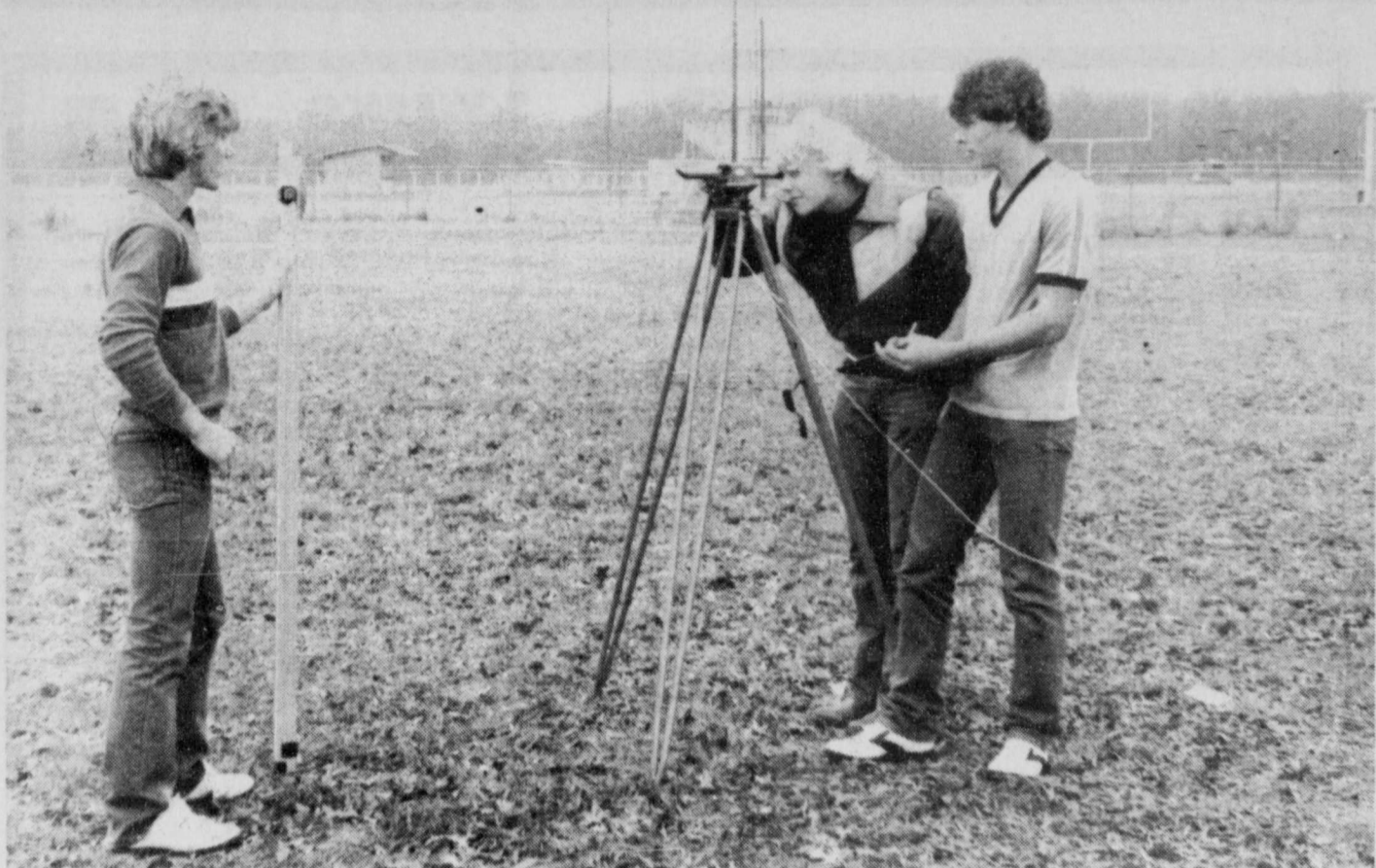

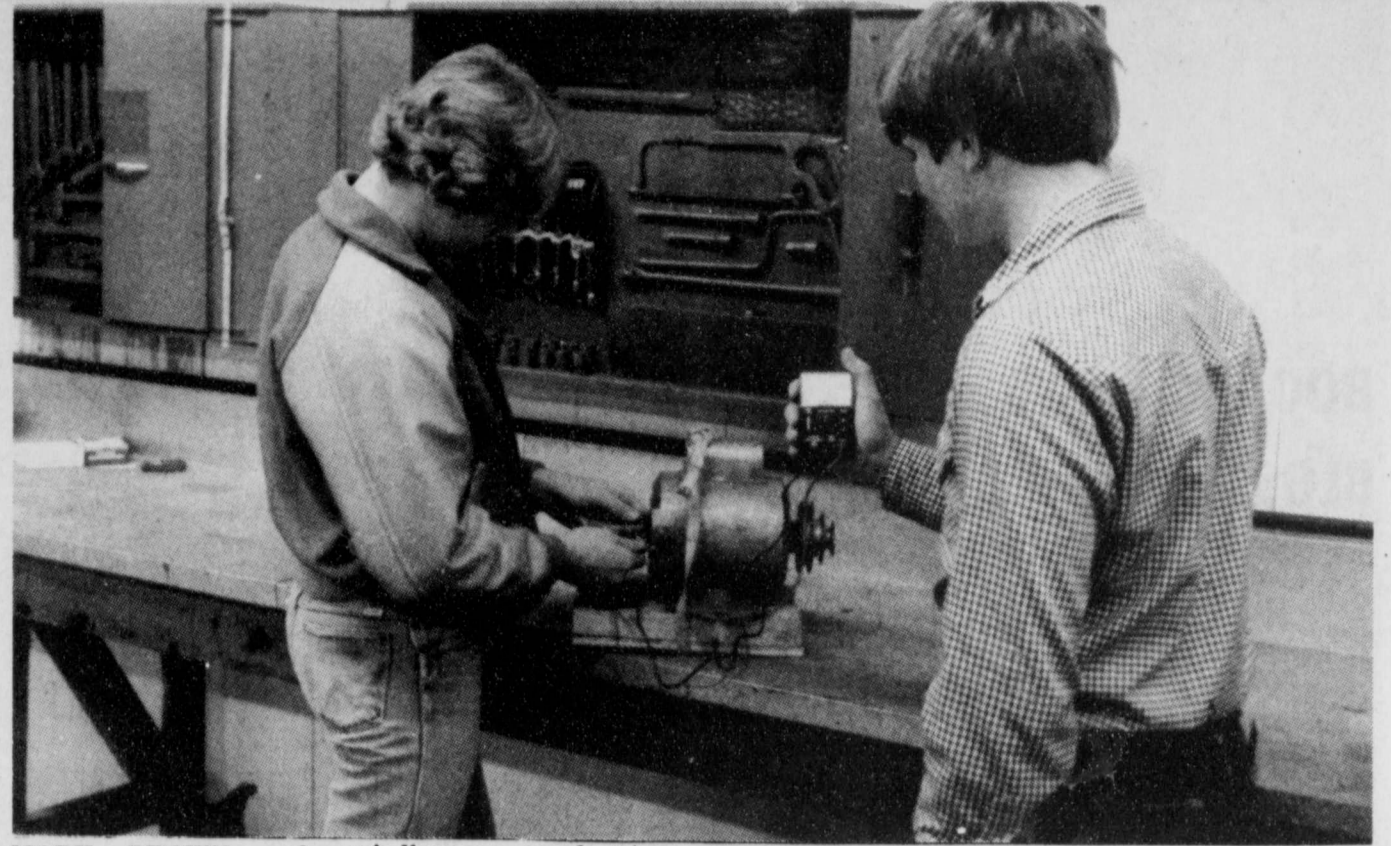

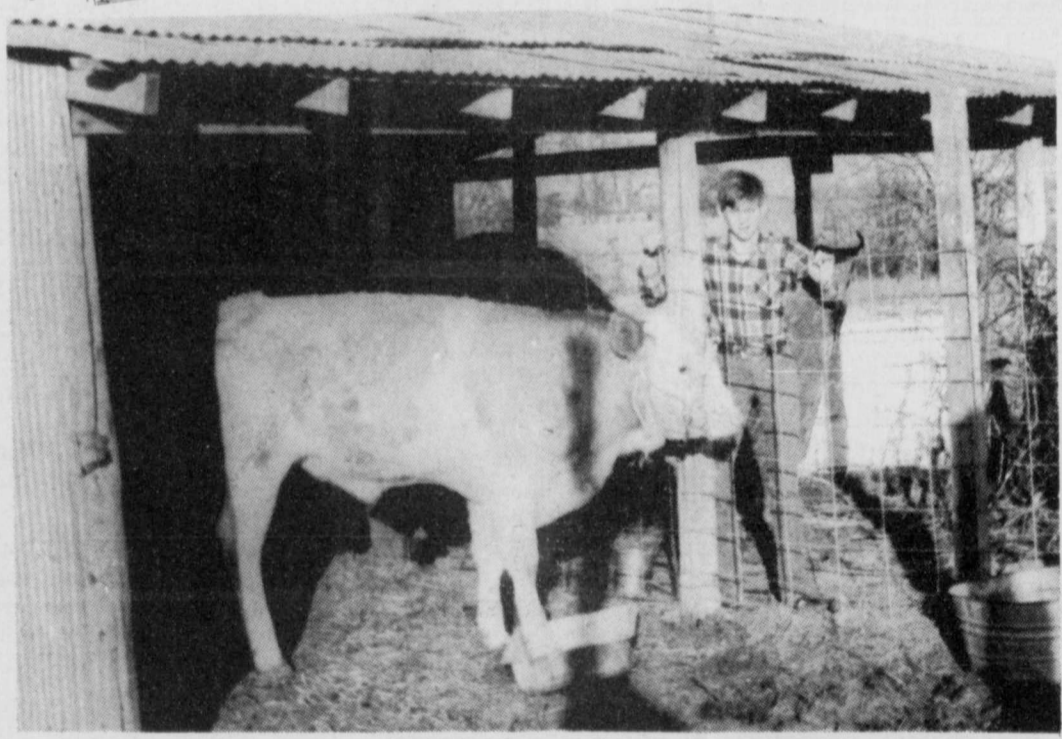
