Farmers Are Urged To Protect Their Land

Farmers in the area who participate in the 1983

Reduced Acreage Program should consider planting their conservation use acreage to soil improving cover crops this spring, a local conservation leader said this week. Charles VanDeaver,

district conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in Clarksville, said crops of forage sorghum, guar, cowpeas and hubam sweetclover reduce erosion while adding badly needed organiz matter to the soil. VanDeaver said personnel on his staff use a formula

called the Universal Soil Loss Equation to preduct water erosion. It considers such factors as erodibility. average annual rainfall, kind of soil length of slope, slope gradient, and the type of cover on the land.

The equation, developed by USDA's Agricultural Research Service shows that erosion on fallow land can be enormous compared to land protected by a close growing drilled crop.

CATARACTS AND HOPE

For the great majority of people, having a cataract does not mean they will become blind. The record for cataract surgery is one of the best in medicine. Vision is restored in 95 percent of all cases. This is true for elderly patients, too, if their general health is good.

People who have a cataract in one or both eyes find their vision blurred. This is caused a cloudiness or by opacity of the lends of the eye. There is not enough light for a clear image. When the cataract is removed, so is the lens. This means a substitute lens must be used to see again. Sometimes the eye surgeon will implant a substitute lens in the eye itself. But most people compensate for the loss of the eye's lens by Hours 9 a.m. To 6 p.m.
