So keep a grip, turn on the air conditioner, read a good book, and remember that cooler, better days really are approaching!

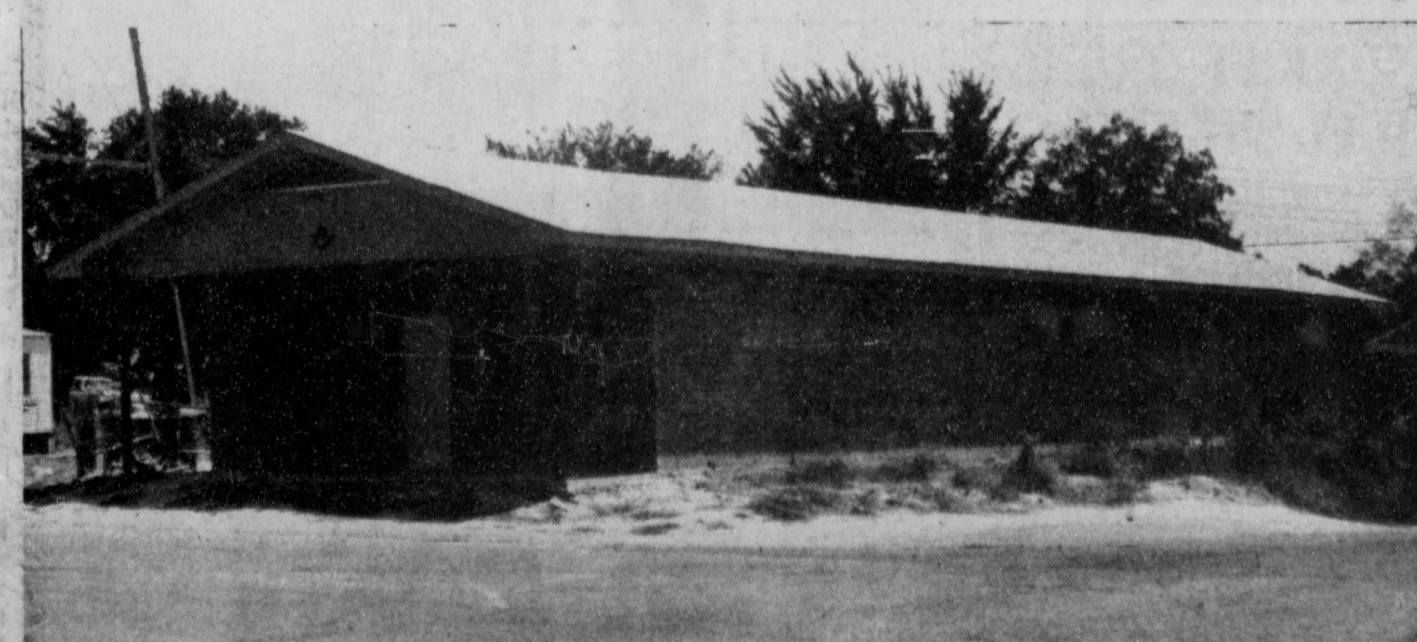

Council Seeks Improvements For City

For the past year, the Bogata City Council has spent many long hours striving to make the city a place for its residents to be proud of and to provide better living conditions. Among the many projects of the Council, a grant was secured in the amount of \$265,896.00 for city water and sewer improvements for those residents who have never had that service. The

City has also been able to provide water service to some residents who previously had to haul their own drinking water. From the original grant, there was enough money left over to enable the Council to authorize laying a sewer line to some people on Douglas Street. Bids on this work will be opened on August 9, and work will begin as soon after that date as possible.

The Council also sought and received \$135,000.00 to help people in a targeted area upgrade their homes. The grant will also enable the City to clean up some health problem areas, tear down several abandoned buildings and houses. The council has purchased some equipment to overhaul the streets in Bogata. Work has already begun in this endeavor and other streets

will be reconstructed as time permits. One street was worked on last year, but it was too late in the year, and the street will have to be reworked. The City was called to Austin earlier this year concerning defects in the sewer system. Those problems have been corrected, however, and the City is awaiting another grant that was applied for. Final approval will be an-

nounced somewhere around the first of October. Bogata now has a City Judge and is in the process of hiring a city policeman. The city was recently turned

down by the Red River County Commissioner's Court, when the city asked for a constable. The City Council is working hard to improve

Bogata. Members of the council spend many hours on City business, with their only remuneration being a pat on the back from City residents for a job well done.

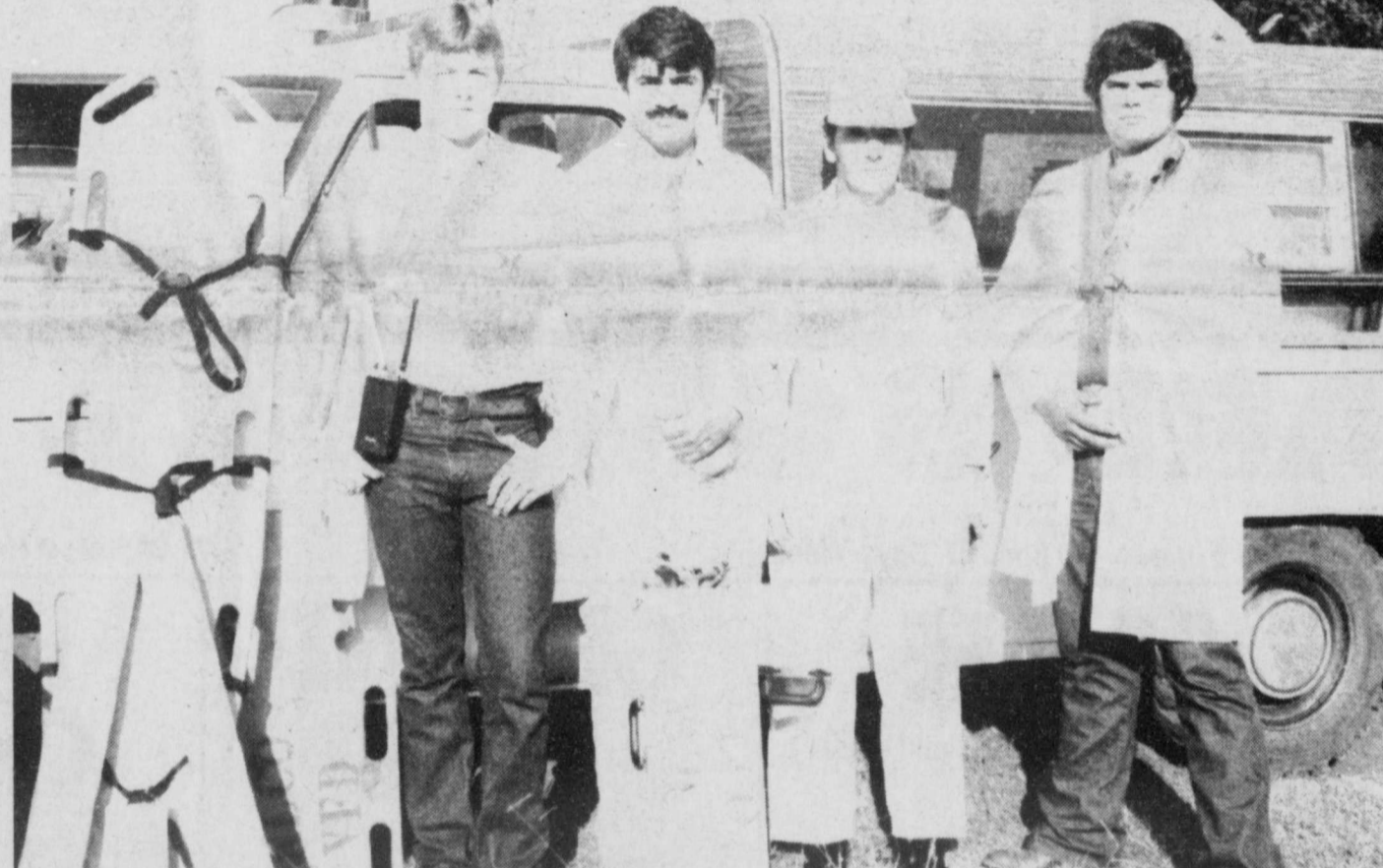
"First Responders" Aid Talco Area

Randy Carroll, Terry Barnett, Jim Carroll and Mark Brown are like most men in Talco. With the exception of Mark, all are married and have families and varied jobs. Randy is a truck driver for Dorchester Oil Company, Terry is pastor of the First Baptist Church, Jim is an electrician and carpenter and Mark just graduated from high school. Together, they have formed a first aid group called "First Responders", working in cooperation with the Titus County Ambulance Service.

Their duty is to respond to any medical emergency, giving basic life support until the ambulance arrives from Mt. Pleasant. They are all volunteers in the Talco Fire Department and receive no salary for their time and effort. Each man has 15 weeks of training in standard first aid, multi-media service, advanced first aid, C.P.R. and have trained in the emergency room at the Titus County Memorial Hospital and made calls with the Titus County

Ambulance Unit. They are all trained in recognizing different medical symptoms, reacting to the situation and treating the victim until the paramedics arrive. In the next few weeks, the group will further their training by taking an Emergency Medical Technical Course. Although their truck is equipped with resuscitation equipment, trauma equipment, back boards, splints, O.B. kit and assorted bandages, they still

need more. Items needed are suction equipment, cardiac-monitor, booster for radio and road stretcher for extraction. The First Responders have already responded to thirty calls within the past year. Emergency numbers in Talco are 379-5671, 379-3321, 379-4337 and 379-6381. Donations for educational costs and equipment would greatly be appreciated for the group as well as for the area residents. If anyone would wish to donate, they may contact the Fire Department in Talco.

Tractor Pull Promises Excitement

The Eighth Annual Paris Young Farmers Tractor and Truck Pull is set for July 29 and 30 at the Lamar County Fairgrounds. This year's event will feature about eight two-wheel drive trucks in the competition, according to pull organizers. Several new tractors will be at the event, according to Audie Neisler, one of the event's organizers. Several "smokers" will also return to the event this year. The tractor and truck pull is a nationally sanctioned event which attracts trucks and tractors here from several states. A new class has been added to this year's event. This is the first time that

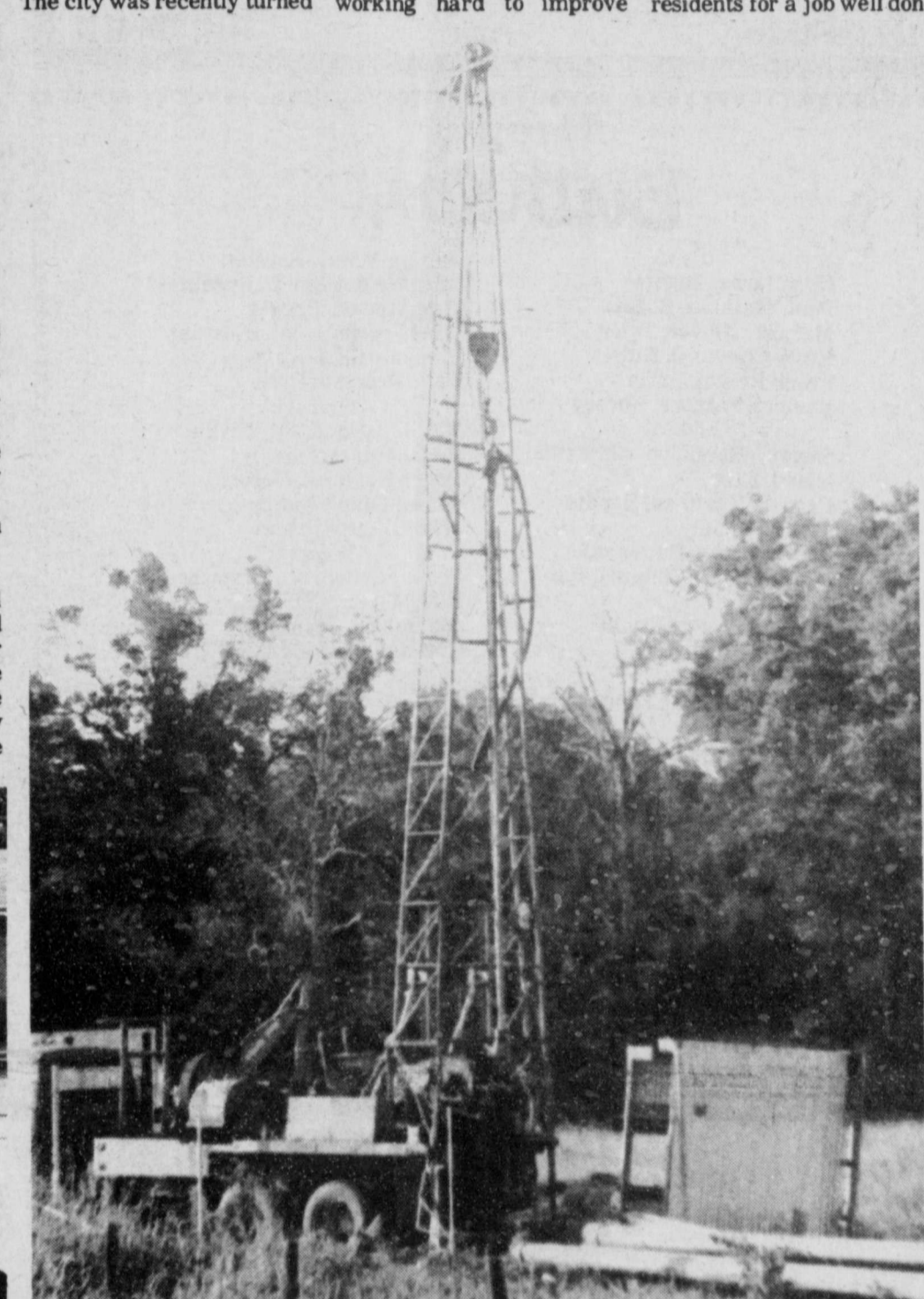
two-wheel drive pick up trucks have competed in the Lamar County pull. Last year, Neisler said, competition involving four-wheel drive trucks generated much excitement. The two-wheel drive trucks are "even more exciting" Neisler said. "From what I understand, these trucks are pulling so hard that they go down the track on their back two wheels. The only way they follow the course is by looking at the lights on top," Neisler added. The purse of the tractor-truck pull is \$9,400, a first prize of \$800 for each class except for the econo class

which has a first prize of \$600. Classes competing Friday night, July 29, will be the 5500 Mod, 5500 Super, 9200 Mod, 9500 Super, 6200 Mod P.U. Competing Saturday night, July 30, will be 7200 Mod, 7200 Super, 7500 Open, 12000 Super, 6200 Mod P.U. and 6200 Econo. Advance tickets are now on sale at local farm equipment dealers and from Young Farmer members. The show will begin at 7:30 each night. The Paris Young Farmers is an organization for young people interested in agriculture. The group is open to people who are out of high school through age

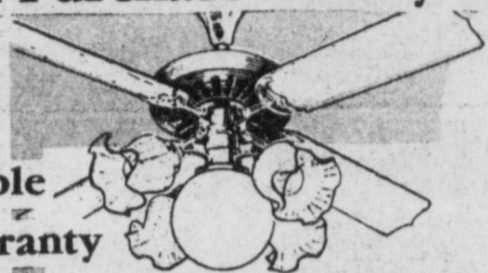

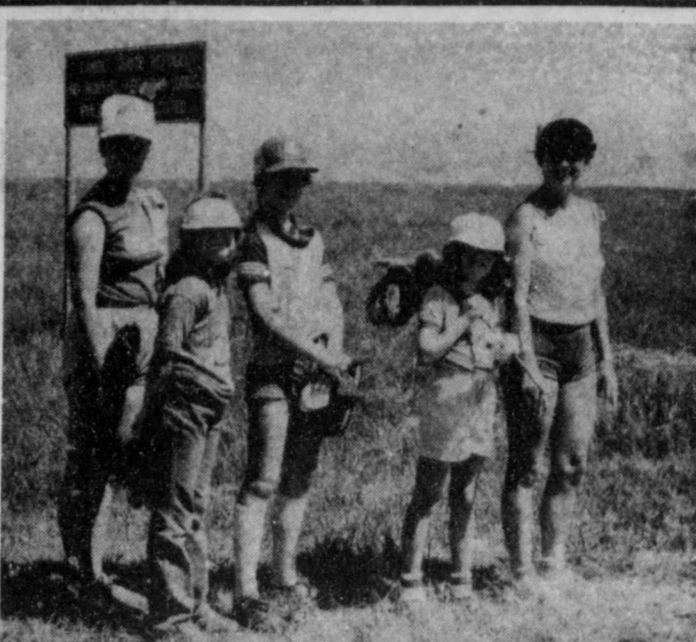

East Texas Eating

Every once in a while, an especially good home-grown cookbook crops up. "Cookin' Wise", the beautiful volume put together by the Texarkana YWCA, is such a book.

"Cookin' Wise" is chock full of the kind of recipes that you want to do for supper, Round Steak Sandwiches, Chicken Spectacular (casserole), Crunch Salmon Patties, and Frosty Strawberry Squares, to mention just a few.

I found recipes for several of the foods I have encountered the last year and would like to do at home—Pita Bread, Pocket Sandwich Filling, Pennsylvania Dutch Potato Dumplings, and marvelously crisp Red Pickle Rings.

A number of particularly good traditional East Texas dishes are included in the book, including Old Fashioned Bread with Starter, Cheddar Corn Pudding, Skillet Cabbage, Jalapeno Jelly and Peach Cobbler.

The concluding chapter of the 318 page book, "Pot-pourri", includes menus, pointers on feeding 50 or more, and directions for some delightful vegetable and fruit garnishes—even the tomato roses which give an elegant note to even the simplest plate.

The Texarkana YWCA folks have graciously given us permission to share some of their recipes with you. Do try them. They are good!

Easy Crunchy Salmon Patties

1 (15-16 oz.) can pink salmon
1 egg
One-third cup minced onion
1/2 cup flour
1 1/2 cups flour
1 1/2 tsps. baking powder
1 1/2 cups cooking oil, Mazola, Crisco, etc.
Drain salmon; set aside two tablespoons of the juice. In a medium mixing bowl, mix salmon, egg and onion until sticky. Stir in flour. Add baking powder to salmon juice; stir into

salmon mixture. Form into small patties and fry until golden brown in hot oil. This makes 6 to 8 patties, but you may need more. They are delicious!

I first met the delicious red pickle rings at a church women's luncheon in Texarkana a couple of years ago. The crisp, red pickle rings looked pretty on the plate. Their sweet, cinnamon taste was a little mysterious. The crisp texture added to the mystery. "What are they?" we were all asking. They look like apple rings, but they are too pleasantly crisp, someone chimed in. "They are pickled cucumber rings," one of the hostesses told us.

So, I was particularly happy to find the Red Pickle recipe in "Cookin' Wise".

Red Pickles
15 large cucumbers, peeled, seeded and sliced 3/4 inch thick
2 cups pickling lime
8 1/2 quarts water
1 cup white vinegar
1 (1 oz.) bottle red food coloring
1 Tbsp. alum
Water
SYRUP:
3 cups vinegar
3 cups water
15 cups sugar
12 sticks cinnamon
1 (10 oz) bag red hot candies

Soak cucumber rings in solution of pickling lime and water for 24 hours. Drain, rinse, pour cool water over and soak for 3 hours. Drain again. Combine vinegar, red food coloring, alum and cucumber rings with enough water to cover. Heat and simmer for two hours, then drain. Combine all syrup ingredients and bring to a boil. Pour over cucumber rings and let stand overnight. Drain syrup, reheat and again pour over rings and let stand overnight. Do this for three more nights. On the last day, bring syrup to boil with rings. Pack in sterilized hot jars and seal. These taste similar to spiced

apple rings. Makes about 5 quarts.

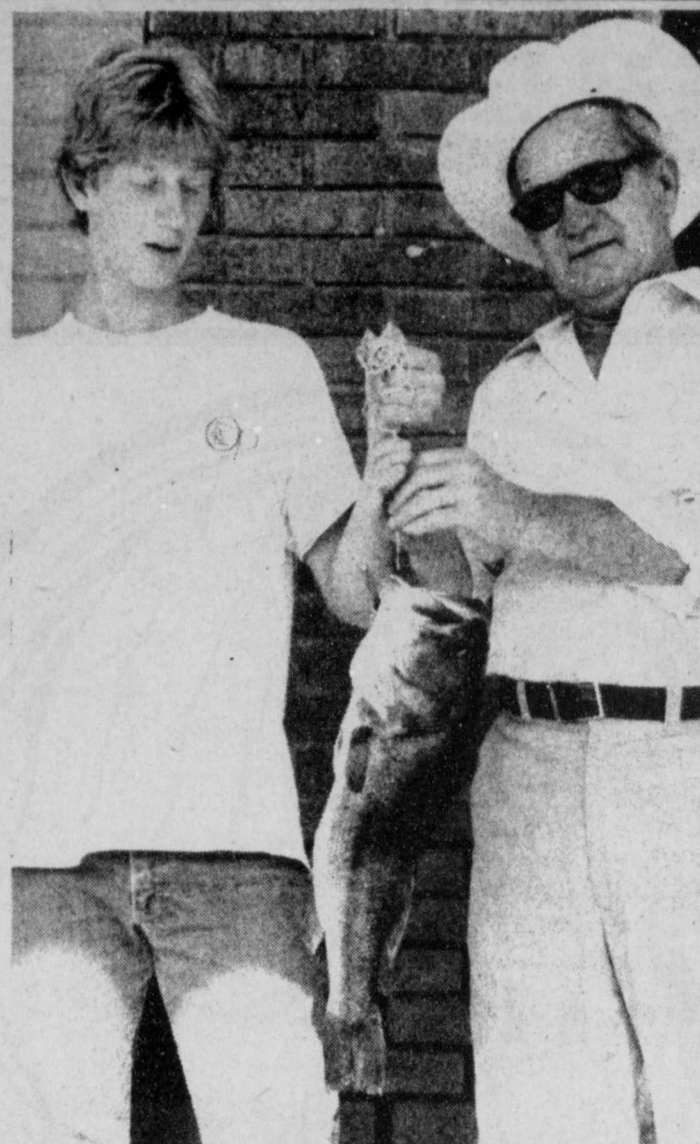
Monte Allums Honored On 21st Birthday

Posey. The youth choir from "Happy Birthday" by all. The church sang three special songs. The program was closed with the singing of refreshments.

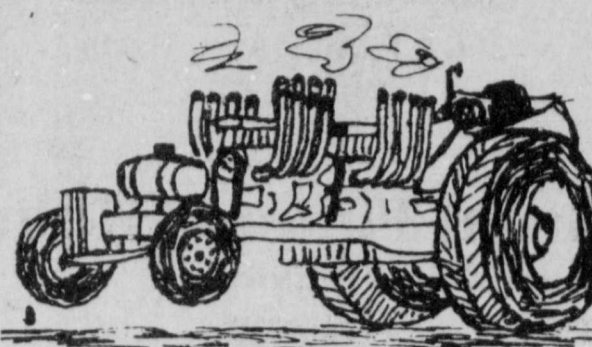

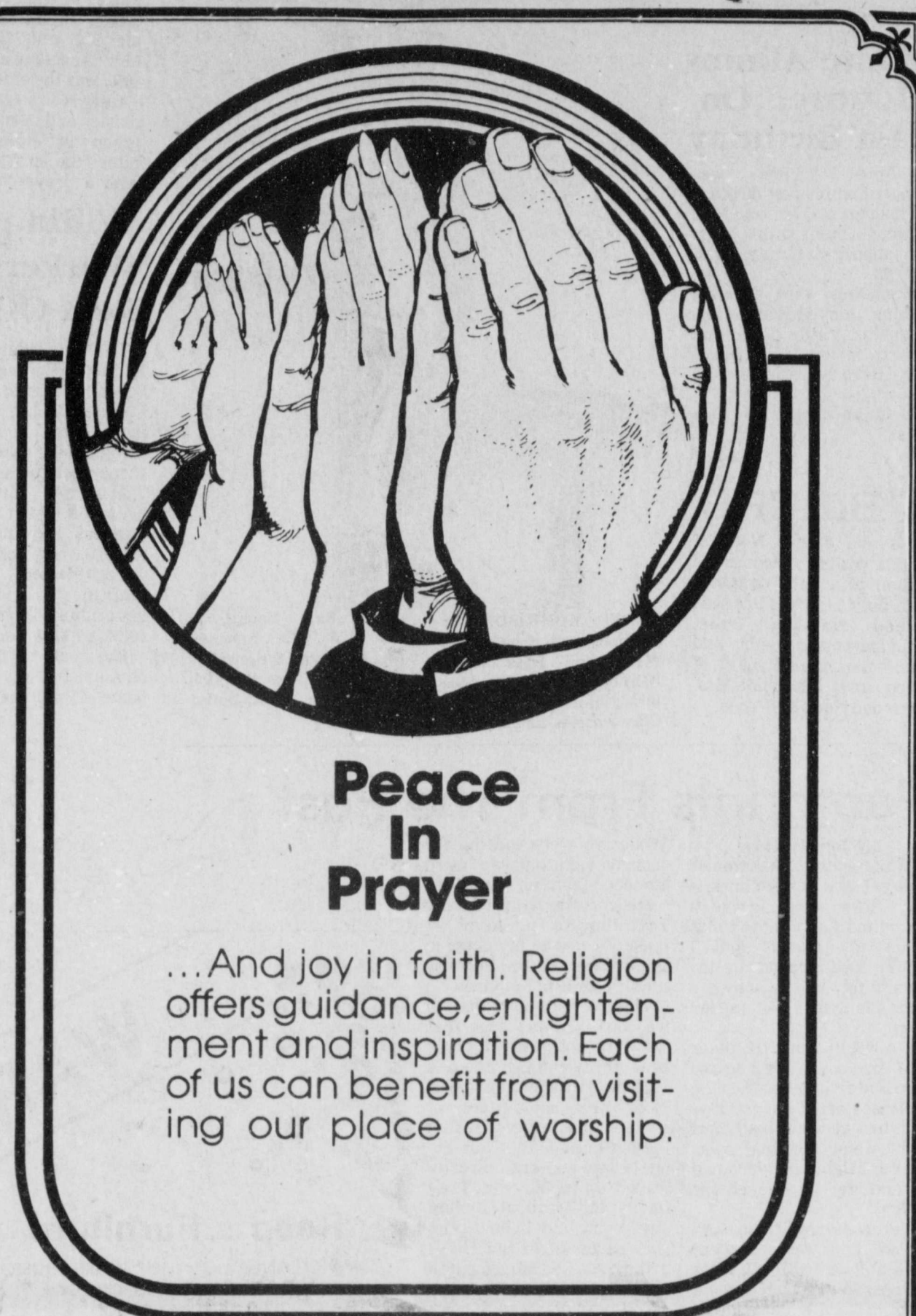

Paris Rodeo Will Begin August 3

The Paris Rodeo and Horse Club Rodeo will open its gates wide next Wednesday, August 3, through August 6 for its 24th annual Paris Championship Rodeo.

Pre-rodeo festivities start at 2 p.m. Sunday, July 31 when the 1983 rodeo queen and princess will be crowned at the Paris Rodeo and Horse Club arena.

A street dance downtown on Culbertson Square follows on August 1, starting at 8 p.m. with the sounds of Bobby John Floyd and The Quintet. On Aug. 3, a parade starting from the fairgrounds at 4 p.m. will kick off the first night's rodeo action.

Rodeo performances will start at 8 p.m. each night. Co-sanctioned by the Central States Rodeo Association of Tulsa, Okla., and the Central Rodeo Association of Texas, the rodeo will attract CSRA champion cowboys and cowgirls from a seven-state area. The all-around champion will be rewarded with a trip for two to Acapulco, courtesy of

Odyssey Travel Agency and the Paris Rodeo and Horse Club.

Advance tickets are available at Young's Western Wear, Cavender's Western Wear, Brand's Western Wear and Glass Implements. Tickets will go on sale at the clubhouse on Monday, Aug. 1 at 8 a.m. and will be available there the rest of the week. Prices are \$1 for children under 12, \$2.50 for general admission, \$3 for reserve seats and \$4 for a box seat.

Books will be open the week of the rodeo from 10 a.m. for riding event entries and from 2 until 6 p.m. for timed event entries.

Each night of the rodeo there will be special attractions. The Texas Sunshine Girls, the national olympic drill team champions from Canton, Texas will appear nightly, along with the Gilley's El Toro bucking bull used in the movie "Urban Cowboy" and a calf scramble for children under 12.

The first night of the rodeo is also children's night. Children under 12 will be admitted free when accompanied by a parent or legal guardian on a general admission ticket.

Thursday is ladies night, all escorted ladies being admitted free, and senior citizens night, those over 64 holding a general admission ticket will also be admitted free.

The next evening, Friday, is Ronald McDonald night. The McDonald's mascot will appear at the rodeo while a rodeo clown look-alike contest is being held. Each child under 12 that comes dressed as a rodeo clown will be admitted free. The children's faces will be painted from 12 until 6 p.m. that day at McDonald's. Each participant will receive a gift certificate from McDonald's, and first, second and third prizes will be awarded.

The Wing Ranch Rodeo Company, 1981 and 1982 Producer of the Year in the Central States Rodeo Association, will be the stock contractor. Wing's bull No. 4, K-Bob, remains unridden in the 1983 rodeo season, and will be on hand during the Paris rodeo to uphold his record. Possibly the rankest bull in the world of rodeo today, K-Bob has been successfully qualified on twice in the last three years, one time in 1982 and one time in 1981.

EPA To Allow Pesticide Use On Sorghum Midge

In response to a formal request from the Texas Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Environment Protection Agency agreed Wednesday to allow the use of a pesticide called Pydrin to fight grain sorghum midge, a pest that can severely damage a sorghum crop.

Pydrin, a compound already approved for use on a number of other crops, is not yet registered for use on sorghum. TDA Assistant Deputy Commissioner Ron White, however, urged in a letter to EPA that the agency authorize emergency use of Pydrin because it can reduce the unnecessary use of pesticides when used as one component of an integrated pest management strategy. Under existing EPA rules, White pointed out, an emergency use designation is not allowed if there are other products on the market designated for use against the sorghum midge. The products already approved for midge control, however, also kill beneficial insects which help fight headworm in sorghum and

bollworms and tobacco budworms in cotton. White said. Thus, if farmers have to fight midge with insecticides that also kill the beneficial insects, they then must also treat their cotton for bollworms and tobacco budworms.

"For the first time, EPA has recognized the need to take IPM principles into account when they consider insecticides for emergency use," said Jim Hightower of the EPA decision. "Ron White's letter stated the case very clearly, and we're very pleased that EPA is now going to include IPM benefits in their criteria for those designations. Because of the late spring, the sorghum midge problem is very severe this year, and this emergency approval of Pydrin for midge control, while a little late for some sorghum producers, will help a lot of farmers salvage more of their sorghum crop without having to use additional pesticides on their cotton crops. And we congratulate EPA for its positive response to our request for this change."

1 cup uncooked regular rice
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed olives

1 can (6 1/2 oz.) tuna, drained
2 tsp. snipped parsley
2 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. salt
Dash of pepper

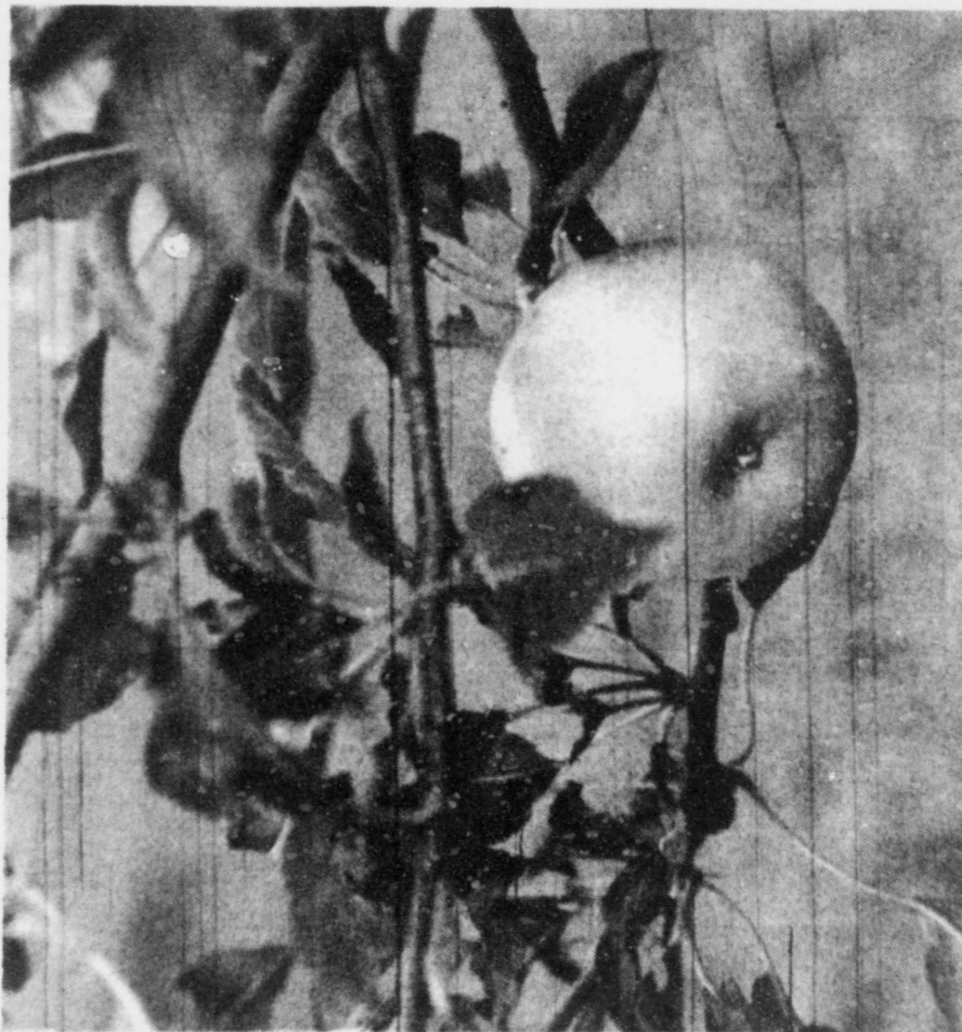
