

Locals To Participate In Paris Rodeo

 Well, folks, it has happened again. School time has sneaked up on us once more. Probably it sneaked a little faster this time because we took a vacation, and haven't had our minds on things just lately.

But since this is the sixth time that I have witnessed the opening of school from the vantage point of the newspaper business, one would think that it wouldn't just rear up so suddenly...but it always does.

It means sports, admittedly not the major doings of professional athletes, but rather the achievements of local youngsters, known by face and name.

The gates of action swung open at 8 p.m. Wednesday, August 3 for the opening performance of the Paris Championship Rodeo, sponsored by the Paris Rodeo and Horse Club.

With pre-rodeo festivities already underway, the queen crowning and street dance on the square in the downtown area, and a gigantic rodeo parade on Wednesday afternoon, the action will now focus on the arena floor for four performances of the best rodeo action to be found anywhere.

This year's version of the rodeo has attracted past champion, current champions and title threats of the Central States Rodeo Association, because of the lucrative prize money being offered, \$500 per event, and also because of the added attraction, a trip for two to Acapulco for the All-Around winner at this year's rodeo, courtesy of the Paris Rodeo and Horse Club and Odyssey Travel Agency in Paris.

Among champion contestants entered are Jack Foreman of Bixby,

Oklahoma, former All-Around and Calf Roping Champion; Paul Lee Foreman, cousin to Jack, of Barnsdalle, Oklahoma, Team Roping Champion; Jim Martin of Canadian,

Texas, three times Bareback Riding Champion; Mike Hemann of Miami, Oklahoma, Saddle Bronc Riding champion; Carolyn Rose of McAlester, Oklahoma, former Barrel Racing Champion; Kelly Allred Ray of Lavaca, Arkansas, three times Barrel Racing Champion and current leader in point standings for 1983; and Gary Hiner of Cuthand, Texas, 1981 Bull Riding Champion and current leader in bull riding standings for 1983.

With a total of 400 contestants entered in the seven championship events, a number of local people have signed up for the tough competition.

Local entries include Tracy Norwood, Scotty Norwood and Ricky Norwood, along with Brit Skidmore, all from the Deport area and Mike

Fenner and Kenny Dearman from the Bogata area.

Ten ladies are entered in the queen and princess contests for the 1983 rodeo, including several from the area. They are, in the princess division: Mendy Norwood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Norwood of Cunningham; Georjeana Oats, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ray Oats of Cunningham; Donna Kay Presley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Presley of Cunningham.

Queen contestants include Klarissa Keys, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul R. Keys of Deport; Kristi Bankhead, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bankhead of Cunningham; Kenda Allen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Allen of Deport; Darlene Brooks, daughter of Doyle and Nancy Brooks of Bogata. The queen and princess will be crowned at the opening performance of the Paris rodeo on Wednesday.

Thursday, (tonight) is ladies night at the rodeo, all escorted ladies being ad-

mitted free, and senior citizens night, those over 65 holding a general admission ticket will be admitted free.

Friday, Ronald McDonald will be present to judge a clown look-alike contest. All participants under 12 years of age who come to the rodeo dressed as a clown, will be admitted free. The children's faces will be painted from 12 noon until 6 p.m. that day at McDonald's in Paris. Each participant will receive a gift certificate from McDonald's.

Wing Ranch Rodeo Company of Bogata will be furnishing the livestock again this year for the rodeo.

As previously advertised, the bull No. 4, K-Bob, possibly the rankest bull in the world of rodeo today, owned by the Wing Ranch,

was scheduled to compete during the Paris rodeo. However, the bull had eye surgery only last week, and his owners, Jerald and Joan

Smith, felt that he was not physically up to competing. Though the bull may be on hand for the rodeo festivities, it will be only in a celebrity capacity, and will be introduced during the bull riding at each performance.

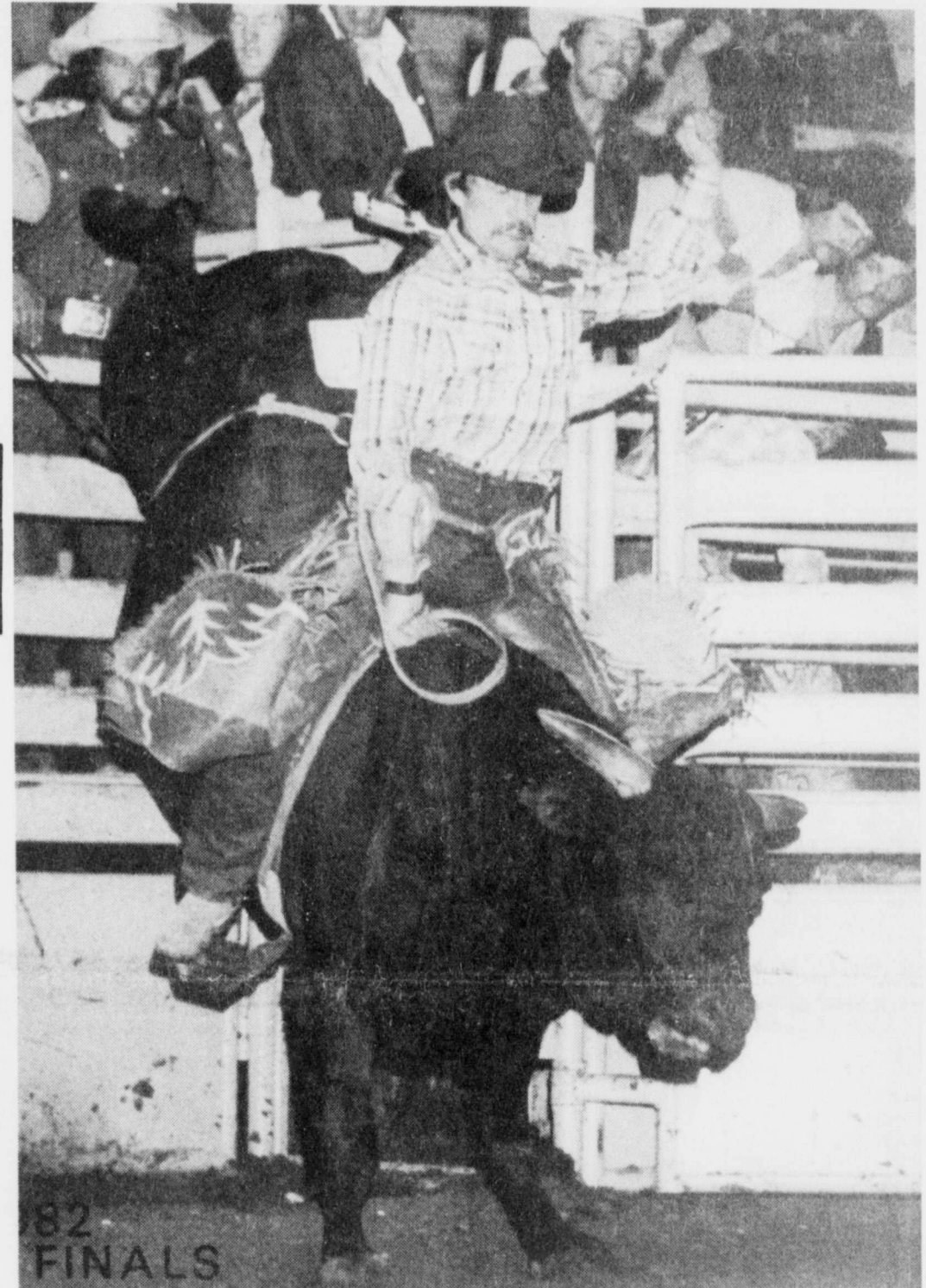

Talco-Bogata CISD Announces School Schedules

The Talco-Bogata Schools will hold the first day of classes for the 1983-84 school year on Thursday, August 18. Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeterias.

Buses will make their regular runs on Thursday morning with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual. It will probably take one or two days to establish regular times for each bus route. Should the bus fail to pick up a student for any reason, please contact the appropriate building principal.

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are now to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School 632-5204 for information regarding bus routes during the week of August 8-12.

All students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled as well as first grade students who did not attend Kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling for the first time in the district.

Registration for K-8 in the Talco and Bogata Schools will be held on the first day of school, Thursday, August 18, 1983.

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan also announced the calendar for the 1983-84 school year as follows:

August 15, 16 and 17, teacher inservice training; August 18, first day of school; September 5, Labor Day; September 28, end first six weeks; November 4, end second six weeks; November 24-25, Thanksgiving holiday; December 15, end third six weeks; December 15, end first semester; December 16, teacher inservice workday; December 19-30, Christmas holiday.

January 2, classes resume; February 10, end fourth six weeks; March 12-16, spring break; March 30, end fifth six weeks; April 20, 23, Easter holiday; April 23, teacher inservice workday; May 17, end sixth six weeks; May 17, end second semester; May 17, junior high graduation; May 18, high school graduation; May 18, 21, 22, teacher inservice workdays.

Talco-Bogata Meals, Reduced Prices Announced

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for 95 cents per day or \$4.75 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.10 per day or \$5.50 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 45 cents and high school students may buy breakfast for 55 cents. (To be recommended for Board approval).

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, applications will be presented to students on the first day of school, which must be filled out, signed and returned to the school as soon as possible. Please answer all the questions on the form. An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household

members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the school.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Talmadge

Help with Application: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact us. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

Verifying Information on Application: Schools will be required to verify a minimum of 3 percent of the number of approved free and reduced-price applications on file as of October 31.

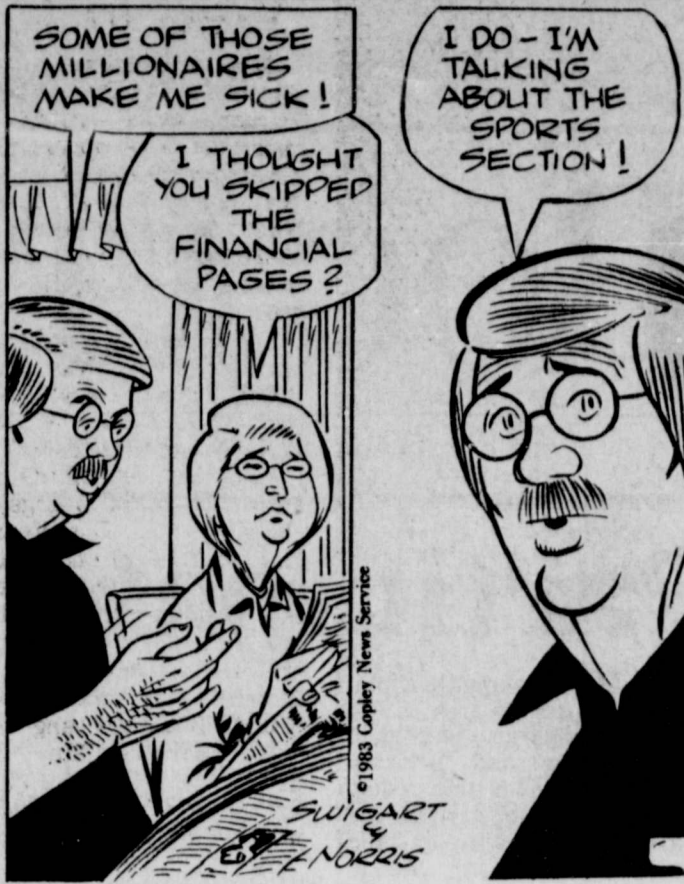

- Refrigerator Dills**
20 or 22 firm fresh cucumbers, 3 1/2 inches long
3 tbsps. white vinegar
3 cloves garlic, peeled
2 tsp. mixed pickling spices
1 tsp. mustard seed
3 bay leaves
3 bunches fresh dill
3/4 cup pickling salt
3 pints water
- Wash and drain cucumbers and pack lengthwise in three hot, sterilized quart jars. Add 1/2 of the garlic, spices, mustard seed, bay leaves and dill to each jar. Make brine of salt and water, heat to a boil and pour over cucumbers to within 1/2 inch of top. Seal immediately. Store in refrigerator one week and use within the next week or two. Makes three quarts.

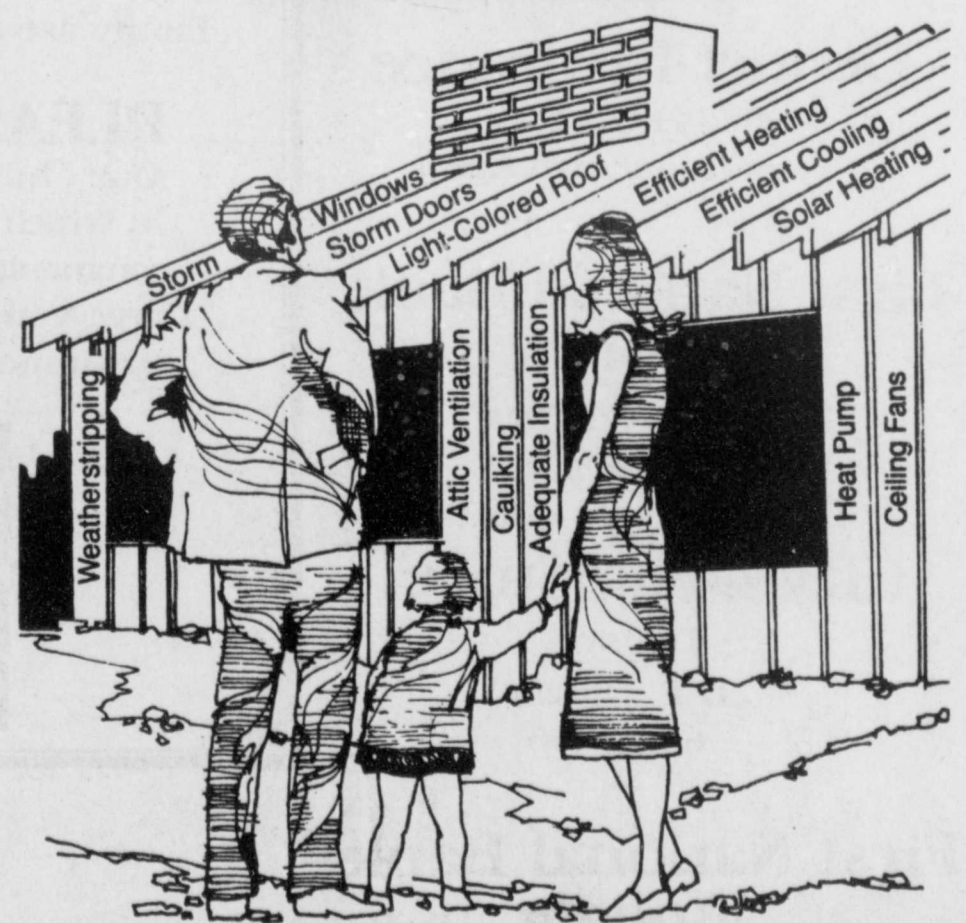

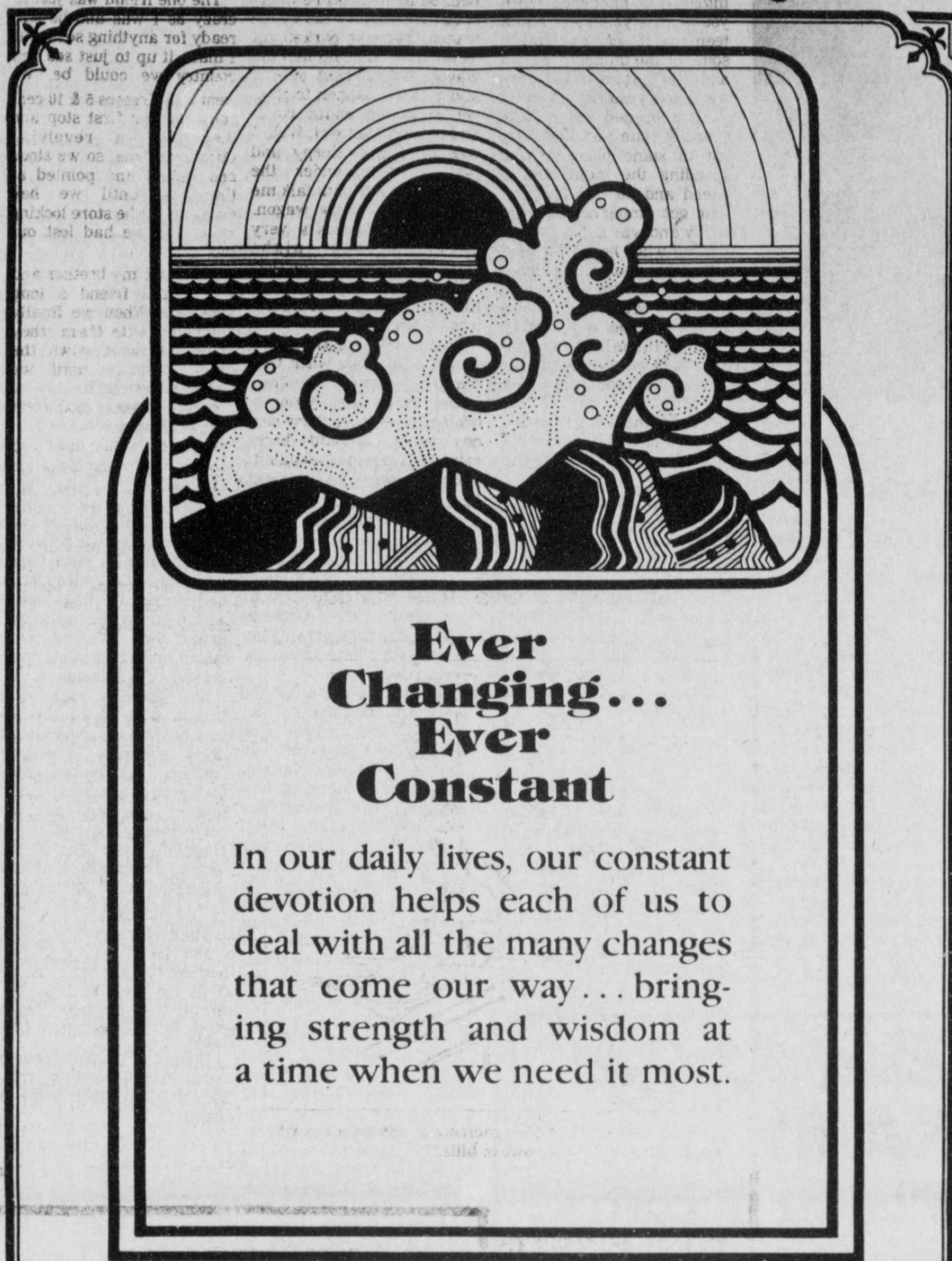

The Newsletter is a venture of Carroll Abbott, the pioneer commercial collector of Texas wildflower seeds and plants, and the magazine has acirculation all over the United States and some foreign countries.

You can order a year's subscription by sending a check for \$7.50 to Green Horizons, 500 Thompson Drive, Kerrville, TX 78028.

Although Abbott was stricken with lung cancer last year, he resolutely kept plugging away and has now brought his magazine back on the proper production schedule. His illness caused him to form an advisory board which guarantees continued publication.

The Newsletter has received the Golden Quill award for horticultural excellence from the Men's Garden Clubs of America.

The current issue features a story on the Yuccas of

Texas by Benny Simpson, renowned native plant expert with the Texas A&M research center at Dallas, and an article by Edith Bettinger on the 10 rules for successfully starting wildflower seeds indoors. It also gives details on how to join the endangered plant rescue effort and when to expect the publication of Wildflowers of Texas and the Southwest, a new book in the Audubon guidebook series.

Buy Your Steaks Now

If you plan on treating yourself to a steak in the next few months, now may be the time to buy it.

Steaks cost less than they will two months from now. The long range forecast is that beef and pork will increase in price.

A good buy in steaks is when the market manager reduces the price for quick sale. Most stores do this after the meat has been in the case for two days.

These steaks are dark in color due to oxidation, but they are still good to use in a day or two or to rewrap and freeze.

Other good beef buys are ground beef, chuck and sirloin tip roast. In the pork section, ham is one of the best buys, as well as Boston butt and picnics.

The best overall meat buy is liver. Beef liver, which costs more than pork liver, is running about 30 cents per serving.

High prices are still the rule for fresh fruits and vegetables. And, as in previous weeks, the best buys are in the frozen and canned food sections.



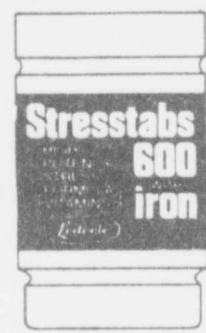

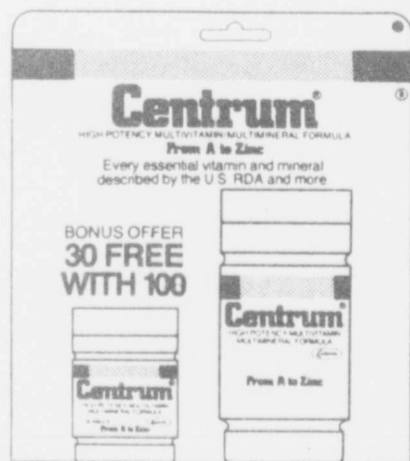

Travel In Britain Proves English Not Always English!

All too often in life, it seems that the dreams we pick as special, don't pan out when they actually take place. And then, sometimes, they actually exceed expectations.

That, for us at least, was the case when we finally took a long-dreamed of, long-saved-for, trip to Great Britain.

This is a travel story, of sorts, aimed at the fact that since almost all of us have one or more ancestors from England, Scotland or Wales, perhaps an account of some of the differences, and similarities, of our overseas relatives might be of interest to readers.

Upon arriving at Gatwick Airport near London, my husband and I, along with another couple, rented an auto, and not realizing just how brave we were being, set out to learn to drive on the left hand side of the road...but...n, that will make another story.

The most obvious difference we noticed, of course, was that although all of us were supposed to be speaking English, somewhere upon the path there have been some rather serious divergences!

It required all our attention to decipher what a Britain has to say...and then we noticed that even with our "drawing" Texas speech, they were having to concentrate quite as hard to understand us!

Some of the basic language differences were ones most people have probably heard before...petrol instead of gasoline, lift instead of elevator. But, how about the fact that the first floor is actually our second floor...the first floor being ground floor?

Translated that means to drive on and take a left or right hand turn. We soon became used to being ad-

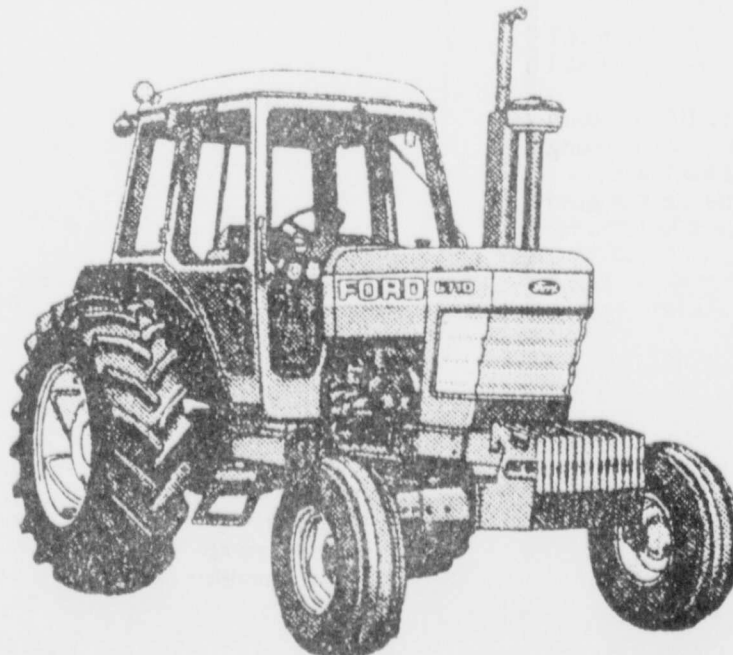

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Paul D. Payne

Texas soybean producers are encouraged to enter the Texas Soybean Yield Contest sponsored by the Texas Soybean Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The yield contest is open to all soybean producers in the state and entries should be made prior to September 1. Entry information is available from your County Agricultural agent.

The top producer in the state will receive 20 gallons of Treflan plus a trip. Details of the trip to be announced later.

Each entrant must grow at least 50 acres of soybeans but as little as five acres can be designated for the contest. The area designated must be measured by a county contest committee appointed by the County Crops Committee. It must be a one block and convenient to measure.

Additional contest information and entry blanks are available from our office in the County Courthouse.

Area farmers interested in milo and corn production will want to go on the tour Friday, August 5 in Delta County. The tour will make six stops to inspect milo and corn result demonstrations.

The first stop will be at Gary Thompson's farm to inspect 11 milo varieties. This will be at 8 a.m. His place is located south of Lake Creek on FM 198.

The second stop will be at L.D. Malone's to evaluate the use of Temik 15 G and on control of chinch bugs and aphids.

From there the tour will proceed to Mike Rushing's farm near Klondike for a look at his 15 variety corn demonstration. Robert Wright's milo variety demonstration and Don Cauley's milo insect control demonstration will be the last two stops. Both of these are located in northwest Delta County.

The final stop will be at the Delta County Civic Center for Ernie's Barbecue. The tour is being put on by the Delta County Crops Committee.

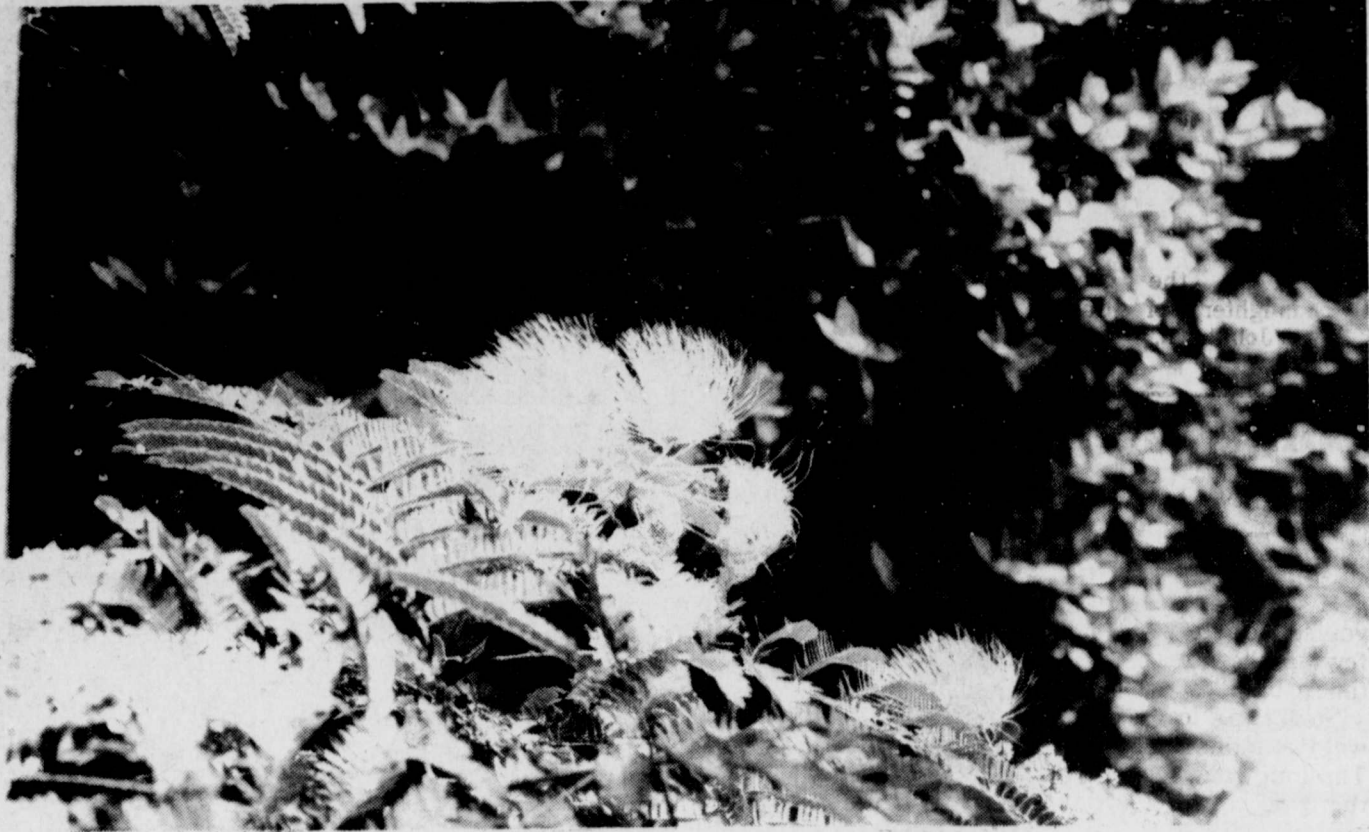

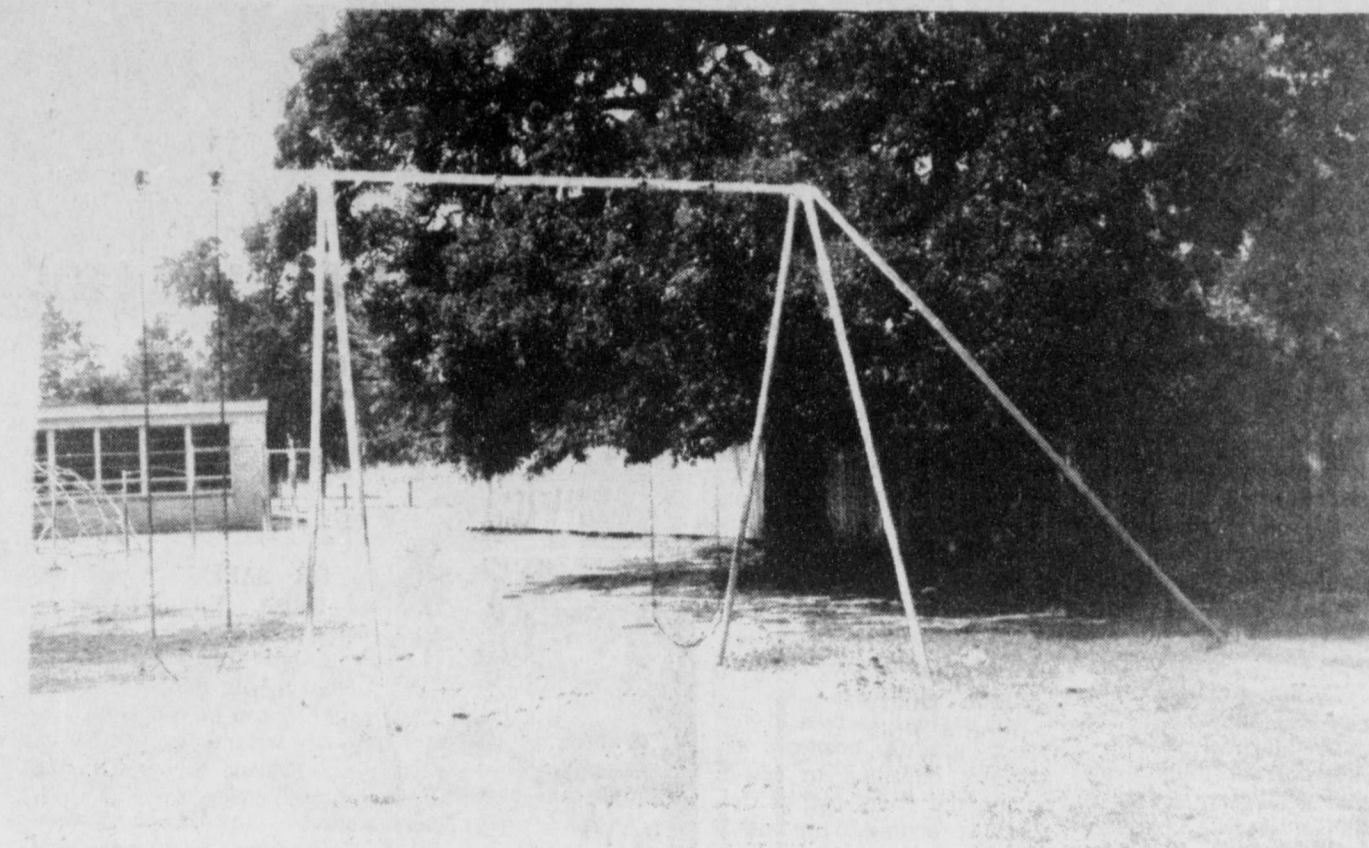

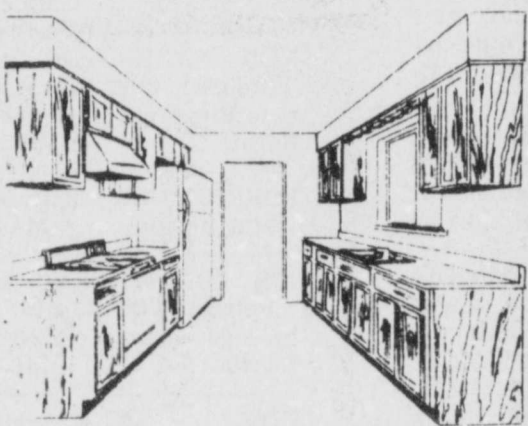
NEW ROOF—The First Baptist Church of Bogata is receiving a new roof at present. The old, flat,

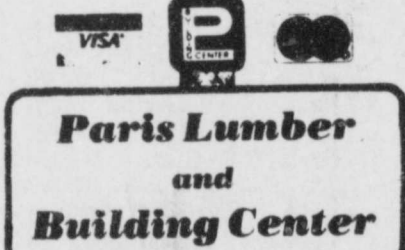

Fly Fever Season Is Approaching

Fly Fever season cannot be too far off as hot weather settles in the Red River Valley area. This disease of cattle is more correctly termed Anaplasmosis, and it

does the potential of costing area cattlemen thousands of dollars.

The disease first appeared in cattle herds in our area of the state about twenty years ago and cases have been reported annually since that time. It can be devastating to a herd if control measures are not taken.

The disease is caused by a small parasite that destroys red blood cells in cattle. The parasite is carried by infected cattle and is transmitted by horseflies, ticks, mosquitoes and man. Horseflies are the main culprit in our area and they have appeared for the first time this summer. Entomologists tell us that there could be a serious horsefly population this summer and that is not good news.

First signs of the disease can be abortion and small, weak calves. As the disease progresses, animals become weak, separate from the herds and refuse to eat. Others may become overly alert, belligerent and even charge.

Other signs to watch for are pink to yellowing of tissue around the eye, inside the nose, vulva or teats. This is due to anemia.

The animals themselves serve as a carrier even though it will never show signs of having the disease. The horsefly and other carriers carry the disease from the carrier animal to other animals within the herd and to adjoining herds. It is believed that the time period from animal to animal must be a very short period, (minutes at the most).

Most cattlemen feed a low level Aureomycin supplement to their herds. The feeding period should begin about a month prior to the start of the fly season. This is necessary to get the proper build-up in the animals systems of the medication.

Another treatment is vaccination. There is not total agreement among people in the know about vaccination. There have been some side effects where the vaccine has been used in previous years. However, it is my opinion that where a cattle producer cannot use aureomycin and has Fly Fever in his herd, there is no other alternative to vaccination.

It could be too late this year for cattlemen to begin aureomycin feeding or vaccination since it will take about a month for animals to build up immunity. On the other hand, one of these may be the only option available.

was scheduled to compete during the Paris rodeo. However, the bull had eye surgery only last week, and his owners, Jerald and Joan

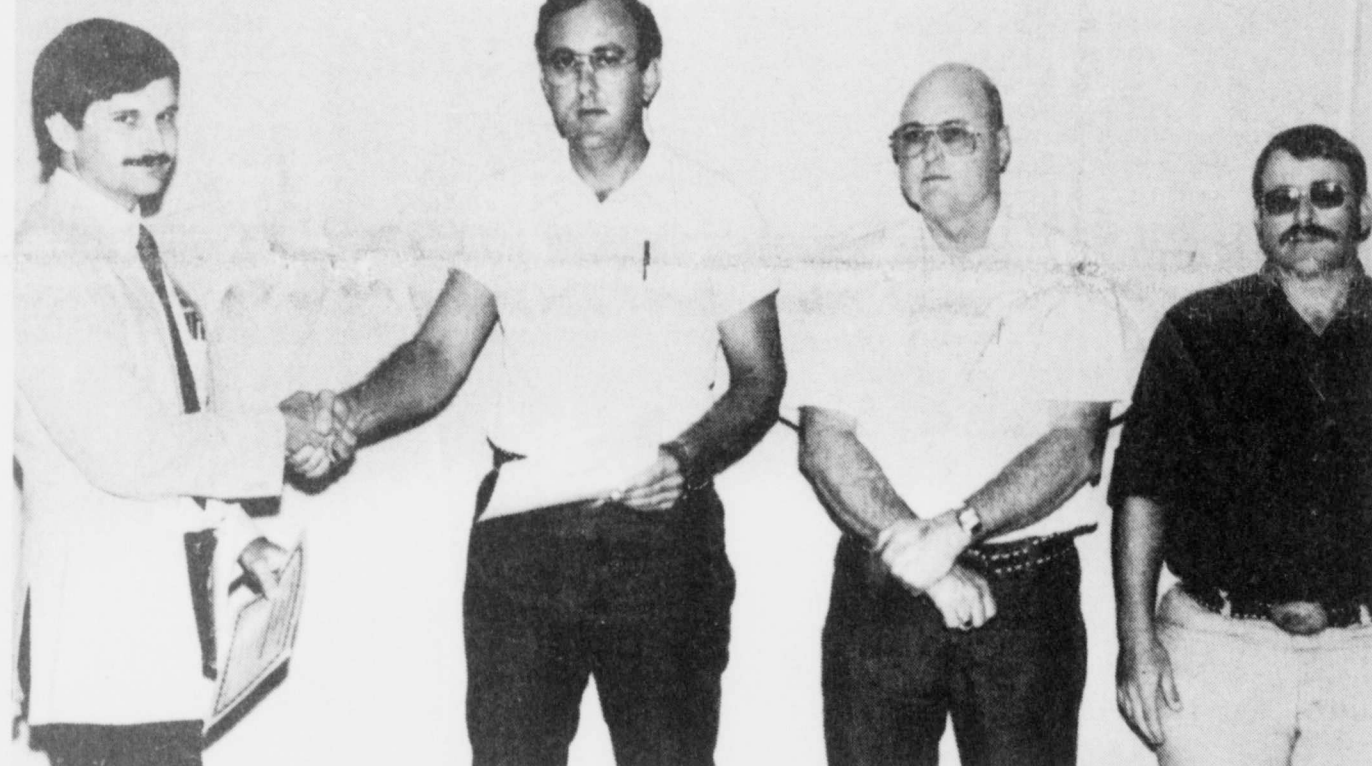
Smith, felt that he was not physically up to competing.

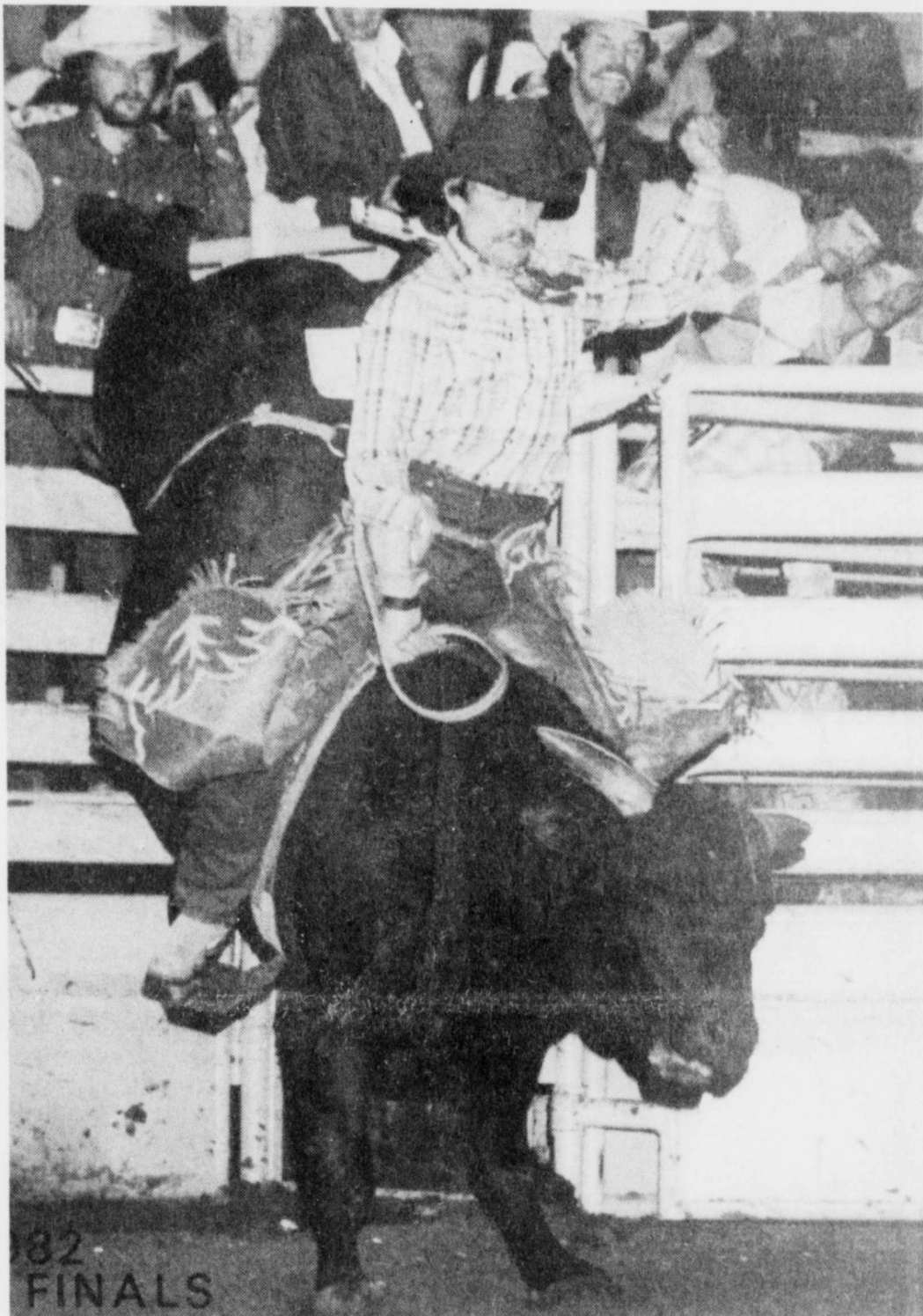


VOCATIONAL agricultural teachers recently attended a workshop on basic wiring and safety in Sulphur

Talco-Bogata CISD Announces School Schedules

The Talco-Bogata Schools will hold the first day of classes for the 1983-84 school year on Thursday, August 18. Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeterias.

Buses will make their regular runs on Thursday morning with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual. It will probably take one or two days to establish regular times for each bus route. Should the bus fail to pick up a student for any reason, please contact the appropriate building principal.

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are new to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School 632-5204 for information regarding bus routes during the week of August 8-12.

All students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1 of the current

year. Students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled as well as first grade students who did not attend Kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling for the first time in the district.

Parents are also reminded that all children entering Elementary Schools in Texas must have met the required State immunizations of diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella. All students in high school must have diphtheria, measles, tetanus and polio immunizations up to date.

Pre-registration for new students moving into the Talco-Bogata School district over the summer who will be attending Rivercrest High School for the 1983-84 school term should report to the Rivercrest High School office Wednesday, August 10 or Thursday, August 11 between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Registration for K-8 in the Talco and Bogata Schools will be held on the first day of school, Thursday, August 18, 1983. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan also announced the calendar for the 1983-84

school year as follows: August 15, 16 and 17, teacher inservice training; August 18, first day of school; September 5, Labor Day; September 28, end first six weeks; November 4, end second six weeks;

November 24-25, Thanksgiving holiday; December 15, end third six weeks; December 15, end first semester; December 16, teacher inservice workday; December 19-30, Christmas holiday.

January 2, classes resume; February 10, end fourth six weeks; March 12, spring break; March 30, end fifth six weeks; April 20, 23, Easter inservice workdays; May 17, end sixth six weeks; May 17, end second semester; May 17, junior high graduation; May 18, high school graduation; May 18, 21, teacher inservice workdays.

Talco-Bogata Meals, Reduced Prices Announced

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for 95 cents per day or \$4.75 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.10 per day or \$5.50 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 45 cents and high school students may buy breakfast for 55 cents. (To be recommended for Board approval).

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, applications will be presented to students on the first day of school, which must be filled out, signed and returned to the school as soon as possible. Please answer all the questions on the form. An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household

members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the school. Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, or become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Talmadge

Morgan at Box 125, Bogata, Texas or call 632-5205.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

Help with Application: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact us. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

Verifying Information on Application: Schools will be required to verify a minimum of 3 percent of the number of approved free and reduced-price applications on file as of October 31.

 20 or 22 firm fresh cucumbers, 3 1/2 inches long
 3 tbsp. white vinegar
 3 cloves garlic, peeled
 2 tsp. mixed pickling spices
 1 tsp. mustard seed
 3 bay leaves
 3 bunches fresh dill
 1/4 cup pickling salt
 3 pints water

Wash and drain cucumbers and pack lengthwise in three hot, sterilized quart jars. Add 1/2 of the garlic, spices, mustard seed, bay leaves and dill to each jar. Make brine of salt and water, heat to a boil and pour over cucumbers to within 1/2 inch of top. Seal immediately. Store in refrigerator one week and use within the next week or two. Makes three quarts.

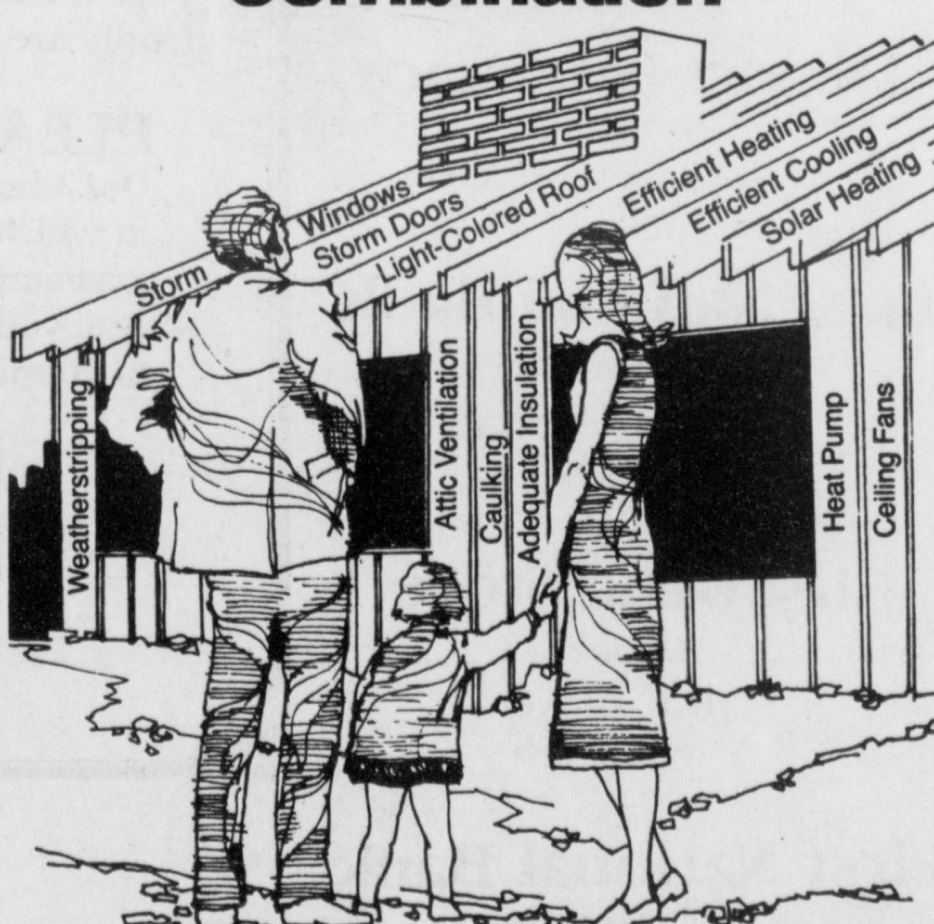

Wildflower Newsletter Has Offer

The Texas Wildflower Newsletter, now close into entering its eighth year, is a unique quarterly publication: it is the only magazine devoted exclusively to wildflower and native plant propagation and uses, and each issue offers free wildflower seeds to its subscribers.

Currently, subscribers can get a package for only the postage of scarified Bluebonnet seeds, enough to sow 100 square feet.

Since it was first published in the centennial year of 1976, the Newsletter has distributed an estimated 10,000 packages of free seeds. Many of the wildflower seeds are rare; some are so uncommon they are available only to Newsletter subscribers and no other.

One offering earlier this year was seeds of a plant...a giant white Allium...si new that it had not yet been assigned its botanical name.

The Newsletter is a venture of Carroll Abbott, the pioneer commercial collector of Texas wildflower seeds and plants, and the magazine has circulation all over the United States and some foreign countries.

You can order a year's subscription by sending a check for \$7.50 to Green Horizons, 500 Thompson Drive, Kerrville, TX 78628.

Although Abbott was stricken with lung cancer last year, he resolutely kept plugging away and has now brought his magazine back on the proper production schedule. His illness caused him to form an advisory board which guarantees continued publication.

The Newsletter has received the Golden Quill award for horticultural excellence from the Men's Garden Clubs of America.

The current issue features a story on the Yuccas of

Texas by Benny Simpson, renowned native plant expert with the Texas A&M research center at Dallas, and an article by Edith Bettinger on the 10 rules for successfully starting wildflower seeds indoors. It also gives details on how to join the endangered plant rescue effort and when to expect the publication of Wildflowers of Texas and the Southwest, a new book in the Audubon guidebook series.

Buy Your Steaks Now

If you plan on treating yourself to a steak in the next few months, now may be the time to buy it.

Steaks cost less than they will two months from now. The long range forecast is that beef and pork will increase in price.

A good buy in steaks is when the market manager reduces the price for quick sale. Most stores do this after the meat has been in the case for two days.

These steaks are dark in color due to oxidation, but they are still good to use in a day or two or to rewrap and freeze.

Other good beef buys are ground beef, chuck and sirloin tip roast. In the pork section, ham is one of the best buys, as well as Boston butt and picnics.

The best overall meat buy is liver. Beef liver, which costs more than pork liver, is running about 30 cents per serving.

High prices are still the rule for fresh fruits and vegetables. And, as in previous weeks, the best buys are in the frozen and canned food sections.

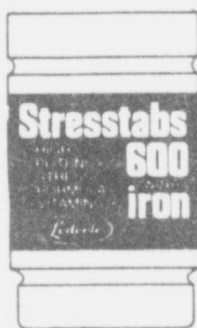

Travel In Britain Proves English Not Always English!

All too often in life, it seems that the dreams we pick as special, don't pan out when they actually take place. And then, sometimes, they actually exceed expectations.

That, for us at least, was the case when we finally took a long-dreamed of, long-saved-for, trip to Great Britain.

This is a travel story, of sorts, aimed at the fact that since almost all of us have one or more ancestors from England, Scotland or Wales, perhaps an account of some of the differences, and similarities, of our overseas relatives might be of interest to readers.

Upon arriving at Gatwick Airport near London, my husband and I, along with another couple, rented an auto, and not realizing just how brave we were being, set out to learn to drive on the left hand side of the road...but then, that will make another story.

The most obvious difference we noticed, of course, was that although all of us were supposed to be speaking English, somewhere upon the path there have been some rather serious divergences!

It required all our attention to decipher what a Britain has to say...and then we noticed that even with our "drawing" Texas speech, they were having to concentrate quite as hard to understand us!

Some of the basic language differences were ones most people have probably heard before...petrol instead of gasoline, lift instead of elevator. But, how about the fact that the first floor is actually our second floor...the first floor being ground floor?

"Oh" she exclaimed, "you want more serviettes."

Trucks are lorries, baby buggies (which are huge, spring hung, old-fashioned kind) are prams...and diapers are nappies.

While asking for road directions...something we did VERY often...we learned that we were to "carry on" and "vary to the left...or right!"

Translated that means to drive on and take a left or right hand turn. We soon became used to being ad-

ressed as lass or luv, and the boys as blokes, chaps or lads.

We did not drive up to Scotland, we motored. Farmers do not unload their grain at the elevators...they

tilt it!

But all in all, due largely to the friendly, helpful attitude of everyone we encountered, we had a lot of fun, and very few problems.

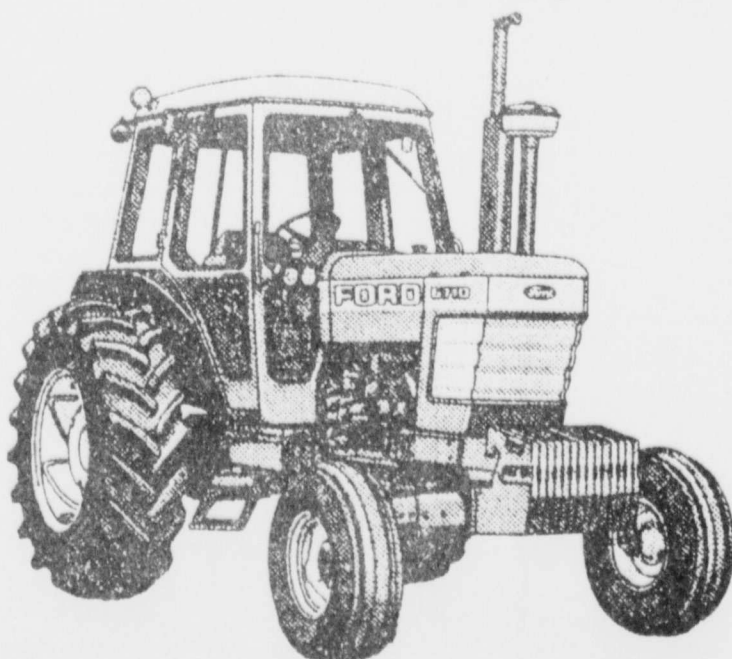

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Paul D. Payne
Texas soybean producers are encouraged to enter the Texas Soybean Yield Contest sponsored by the Texas Soybean Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The yield contest is open to all soybean producers in the state and entries should be made prior to September 1. Entry information is available from your County Agricultural agent.

The top producer in the state will receive 20 gallons of Treflan plus a trip. Details of the trip to be announced later.

Each entrant must grow at least 50 acres of soybeans but as little as five acres can be designated for the contest. The area designated must be measured by a county contest committee appointed by the County Crops Committee. It must be a one block and convenient to measure.

Additional contest information and entry blanks are available from our office in the County Courthouse.

Area farmers interested in milo and corn production will want to go on the tour Friday, August 5 in Delta County. The tour will make six stops to inspect milo and corn result demonstrations.

The first stop will be at Gary Thompson's farm to inspect 11 milo varieties. This will be at 8 a.m. His place is located south of Lake Creek on FM 198. The second stop will be at L.D. Malone's to evaluate the use of Temik 15 G and on control of chinch bugs and aphids.

From there the tour will proceed to Mike Rushing's farm near Klondike for a look at his 15 variety corn demonstration. Robert Wright's milo variety demonstration and Don Cauley's milo insect control demonstration will be the last two stops. Both of these are located in northwest Delta County.

The final stop will be at the Delta County Civic Center for Ernie's Barbecue. The tour is being put on by the Delta County Crops Committee.

It is basically a case of the "poor getting poorer" as farmers continue to come out on the short end of the stick. According to the latest figures, the American farmer gets only 28 cents on every dollar spent on food in 1982.

The situation for 1983 does not look any different as the marketing cost of food is expected to increase from four to seven percent while the farm value of food increases from one to four percent.

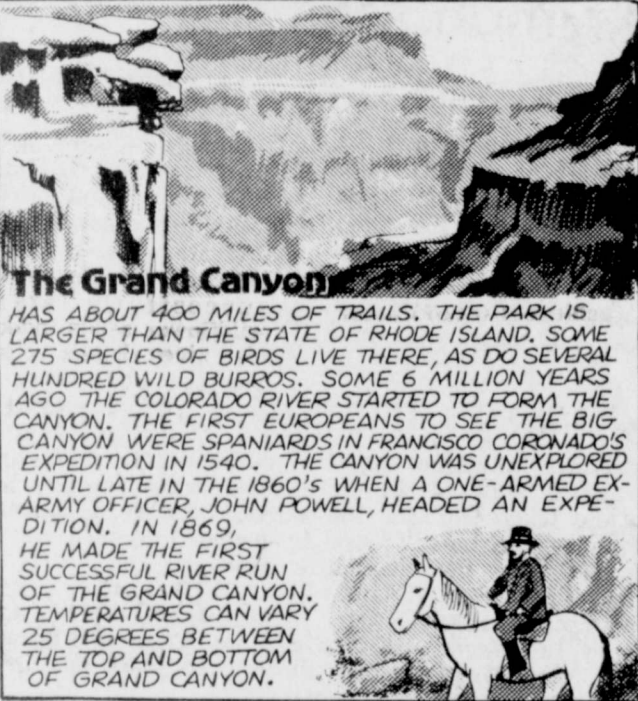

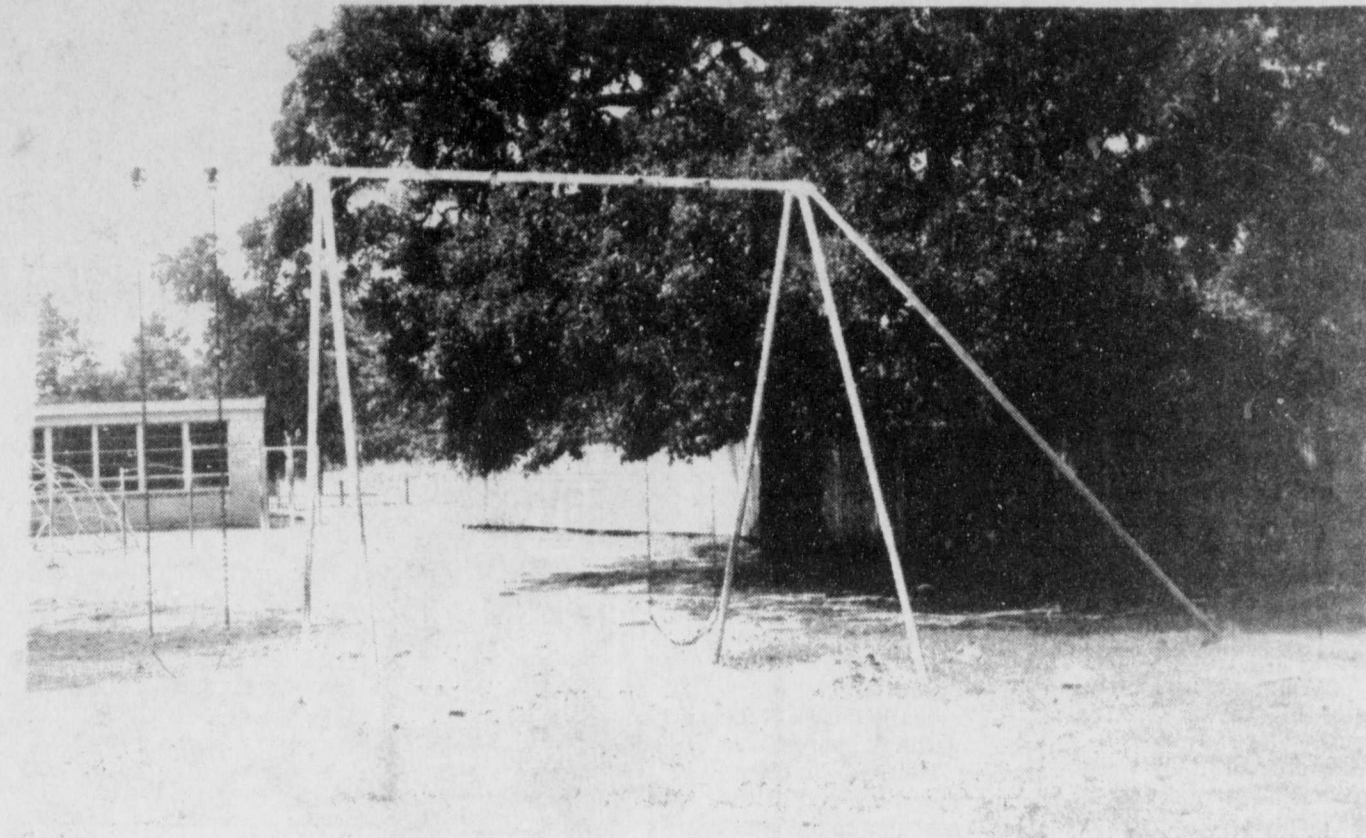

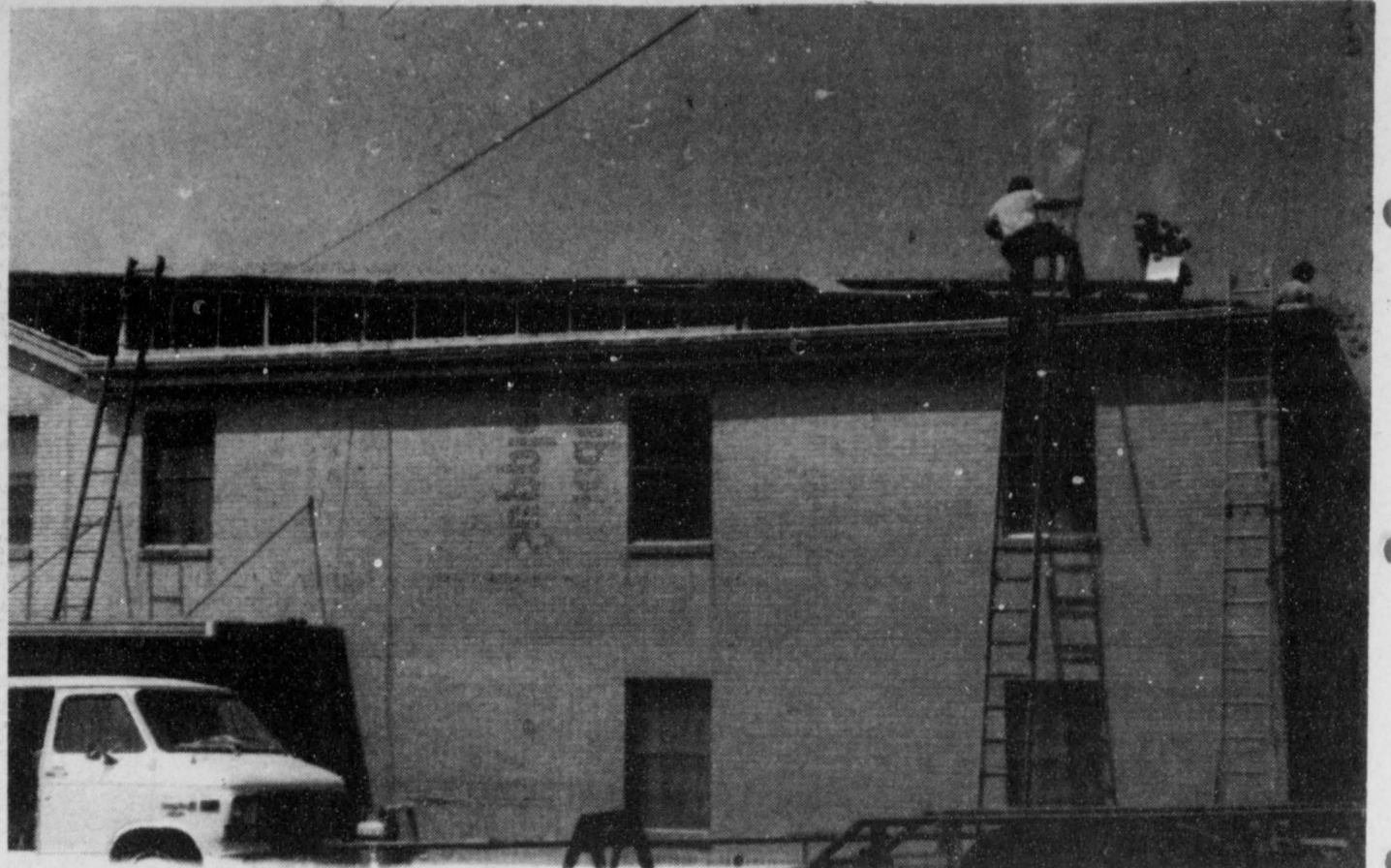

Fly Fever Season Is Approaching

Fly Fever season cannot be too far off as hot weather settles in the Red River Valley area. This disease of cattle is more correctly termed Anaplasmosis, and it

does have the potential of costing area cattlemen thousands of dollars.

The disease first appeared in cattle herds in our area of the state about twenty years ago and cases have been reported annually since that time. It can be devastating to a herd if control measures are not taken.

The disease is caused by a small parasite that destroys red blood cells in cattle. The parasite is carried by infected cattle and is transmitted by horseflies, ticks, mosquitoes and man. Horseflies are the main culprit in our area and they have appeared for the first time this summer. Entomologists tell us that there could be a serious horsefly population this summer and that is not good news.

First signs of the disease can be abortion and small, weak calves. As the disease progresses, animals become weak, separate from the herds and refuse to eat. Others may become overly alert, belligerent and even charge.

Other signs to watch for are pink to yellowing of tissue around the eye, inside the nose, vulva or teats. This is due to anemia.

The animals themselves serve as a carrier even though it will never show signs of having the disease. The horsefly and other carriers carry the disease from the carrier animal to other animals within the herd and to adjoining herds. It is believed that the time period from animal to animal must be a very short period, (minutes at the most).

Most cattlemen feed a low level Aureomycin supplement to their herds. The feeding period should begin about a month prior to the start of the fly season. This is necessary to get the proper build-up in the animals systems of the medication.

Another treatment is vaccination. There is not total agreement among people in the know about vaccination. There have been some side effects where the vaccine has been used in previous years. However, it is my opinion that where a cattle producer cannot use aureomycin and has Fly Fever in his herd, there is no other alternative to vaccination.

It could be too late this year for cattlemen to begin aureomycin feeding or vaccination since it will take about a month for animals to build up immunity. On the other hand, one of these may be the only option available.
