Survey Points To Unemployment, Economy As Concern Of Most Texans

The economy ranked as the most important issue facing the United States, while unemployment was named as the most important issue facing Texas, according to a recent poll commissioned by the Texas Foundation for Conservative Studies.

The TFCS is a policy research and education organization that seeks to define critical problems facing Texas and develop practical and conservative solutions to these problems.

The TFCS commissioned Arthur J. Finkelstein and Associates to conduct the poll. A sample of 606 adult Texans were interviewed.

Accuracy level of the poll is within +4 percent at the 95 percent confidence level.

Texans interviewed were asked a series of questions, one of which was: in your opinion, what is the most important issue facing the United States today?

The top ten results were: the economy 29.7 percent, unemployment 20.5 percent, nuclear weapons freeze 11.6 percent, inflation 5.0 percent, foreign affairs, 3.8 percent, national defense and military 3.0 percent, war and peace 2.5 percent, taxes 2.5 percent, nuclear war 1.7 percent, energy 1.5 percent and crime 1.5 percent.

percent. "There were differences by areas. In Houston, the economy was more important than in the rest of the sample. Dallas, Houston, Austin and Beaumont were more concerned with the nuclear weapons freeze than the rest of the state," Collins said.

According to Collins, those Texans who called themselves conservatives showed greater concern for national defense and war and peace than the rest of the sample.

When asked what they felt was the most important issue facing Texas,

unemployment ranked as the number one issue with 28.5 percent of the responses.

The other results were: economy 12.7 percent, education 6.6 percent, illegal aliens 5.8 percent, teachers' salaries 5.0 percent, inflation 3.5 percent, oil and gas situation 3.1 percent,

water 2.5 percent, taxes 2.0 percent and overpopulation 1.7 percent.

"Area differences were also evident in the responses. In Dallas, Abilene and Wichita Falls, concern for the education issue was higher than in the rest of the state. Lubbock and Amarillo led the state in

concern for the water issue. While El Paso, Midland and Odessa were more concerned with the illegal alien issue than the rest of the state.

"Beaumont and Port Arthur led the state in concern for unemployment, with 71.4 percent of the

people there naming it the number one issue in Texas," said Dick Collins, president of the TFCS.

This year the TFCS has published studies on state spending and bureaucracy, crime victims' restitution centers, state severance taxes on oil and gas, and the Texas prevailing wage law.

Accident Injures Three Near Talco

Texas Highway Patrolman Frank Munsinger investigated a two vehicle accident, just north of Talco on Highway 271 on Wednesday, August 3 at 7 p.m.

A late model Plymouth Arrow, driven by Sheila Lennon, 36, of Dallas was northbound when she pulled to the right shoulder then started making a U-turn in front of an 18-wheeler driven by Edgar Owens, 35, of Hughes Springs, who was also northbound.

Owens hit the left front fender of the Lennon vehicle with his right front fender. On impact, Teresa Gibbons, 33, of Arlington, a passenger in the Plymouth was thrown from the car and landed in the grass on the right of the roadway. Lennon was trapped in her car for approximately 45 minutes to

an hour before rescue workers freed her.

The Owens truck loaded with tubing landed bottomside up with its bed across both lanes, its cargo all over the highway and the cab in the ditch.

All three were taken to the Titus County Memorial Hospital by ambulance. Lennon was later transported by helicopter to the St. Michael's Hospital in Texarkana where at last report, she was listed in guarded condition in intensive care.

Teresa Gibbons was taken by helicopter to Hugley Hospital in Ft. Worth. Owens was treated and later released.

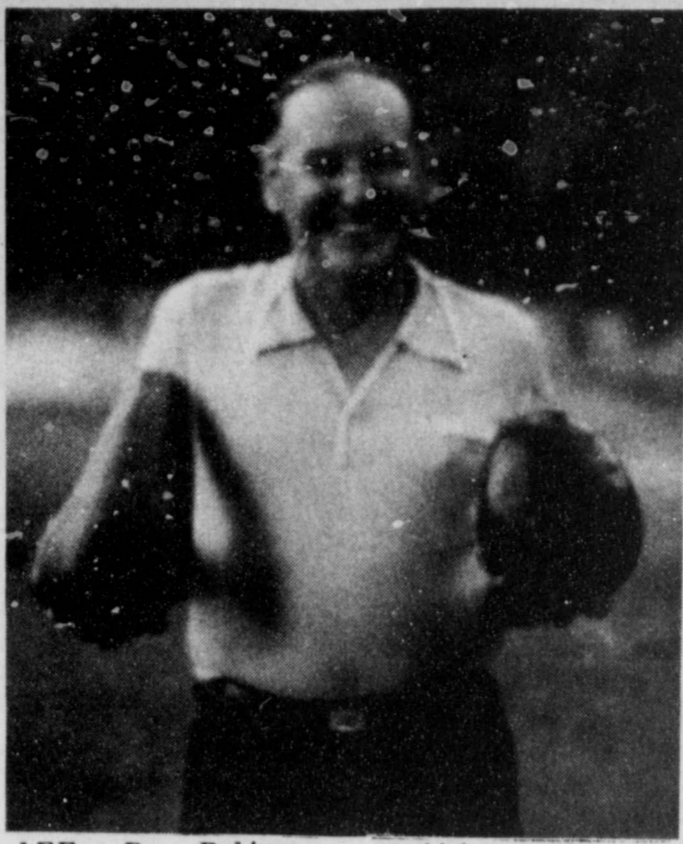

Footprints From The Past

Was sitting in front of the air conditioner Sunday afternoon and go to thinking about how we used to spend our Sunday afternoons when I was growing up. There was no air conditioner or T.V. so we had to make do with what we had.

We used to go to a lot of singings held around the country. There were some country schools where they would have a singing every Sunday in the summer, and some pretty good singers would come. One of the best country quartets that I had the privilege of listening to was one from Deport that consisted of Sam Monk, Pony Cogbill, Morris Hooks and Johnny McLemore. I have heard some of the best, or they were supposed to be the best, like the Stamps Quartet, but for my money, I liked the Deport group the best.

When I was young living south of Deport in what was called Lone Oak and Sam Monk would hold a singing school in the school house every summer and I never

could sing, but Mr. Monk would tell me that he had to have me come to the school so I could sing bass for him. Since I have thought about it, I know that all he wanted was just for me to come to the school so he would have enough pupils to hold a school. Anyway, all the young people in the community would go, and at the end of the school we would have a big singing. It was an all day thing with dinner on the ground. All the ladies of the community would fix their favorite dish and we would all sing all morning and at lunch time, the ladies would have the dinner all spread out under the trees, and believe me, after you have been cooped up in a hot building all morning singing, it sure was a relief to get out in the open and have a good lunch.

I think that the Stamps School of Music sponsored all different singing schools and also the singings around the country and at the end of the summer they would sponsor a singing school in Dallas for a week and at the end of the week they would get all the ones who were in

the school to help them and they would have a big blow out that would last all Friday and then on Saturday they would start at ten in the morning and sing all day and all Saturday night and they would have all the best students and also some of the best quartets that they could get to come and help them. It was a big thing back in those days and people from all over the state and from other states would be there and some very good singing as there were some very good singers and some were professional singers would attend. It was quite an honor to be invited to appear on one of their programs at the end of their singing school.

They would have very big crowds every night and on Friday and Saturday they would have more than they could seat and they had a very big building on Jefferson Street in Dallas.

The Stamps bunch was also a music pulshing HOUSE FOR GOSPEL MUSIC. They had their plant on Bishop Street in Oak Cliff. The singing

schools and the singing convention were quite a thing in the late twenties and early thirties, but they all have died out now, I guess, for the only place that you can go and hear good singing is out at Lone Star and if you have not been out and heard them singing, you should make a special effort to do so and I do know that the good people out there will make you feel right at home, so go out some night soon and hear them sing.

Weekly Agricultural Briefs

Area beef cattle breeders with bull consignments for the 18th annual Red River Valley All Breed Bull Sale should be making plans to make those entries with the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce.

Entry deadline is October 1, but changes in brucellosis testing this year make it necessary that a decision be made earlier. This sale is scheduled for November 28.

The brucellosis restrictions that will apply to bulls entered in the sale will require bulls from non-certified brucellosis free herds to have two negative tests 60 days apart. The last test must be made within 30 days of the sale. Therefore, the first test must be made prior to September 28 and there must be at least 60 days from that date to the second test.

Bulls from certified free herds may move without being tested. All bulls must have a TB test and Leptospirosis vaccination as well as fertility test. Bull consignments must be between one and five years of age and weigh at

least 1,000 pounds. They must also be registered. The entry fee is \$25 per bull which applies to the sale commission of 10 percent of

the gross sale price up to \$1500.

There is a part of Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA) that has not received much publicity. We have seen how you can place up to \$2000.00 per year into an IRA without being subject to tax until retirement, but little has been said about the other parts of the same law.

Primarily, we speak of the person that works for a company who has a retirement program of their own for the employee. Without the use of IRA, when an individual retires from a company and receives a lump sum settlement, this amount is immediately subject to taxation. However, if the amount received from the retirement program, less voluntary contributions, is deposited within 60 days to an IRA, tax can be avoided until withdrawals begin. The taxes will normally be less when the total annual income has been decreased by retirement.

The economy ranked as the most important issue facing the United States, while unemployment was named as the most important issue facing Texas, according to a recent poll commissioned by the Texas Foundation for Conservative Studies.

The TFCS is a policy research and education organization that seeks to define critical problems facing Texas and develop practical and conservative solutions to these problems.

The TFCS commissioned Arthur J. Finkelstein and Associates to conduct the poll. A sample of 606 adult Texans were interviewed.

Accuracy level of the poll is within +4 percent at the 95percent confidence level.

Texans interviewed were asked a series of questions, one of which was: in your opinion, what is the most important issue facing the United States today?

The top ten results were: the economy 29.7 percent, unemployment 20.5 percent, nuclear weapons freeze 11.6 percent, inflation 5.0 percent, foreign affairs, 3.8 percent, national defense and military 3.0 percent, war and peace 2.5 percent, taxes 2.5 percent, nuclear war 1.7 percent, energy 1.5 percent and crime 1.5 percent.

percent. "There were differences by areas. In Houston, the economy was more important than in the rest of the sample. Dallas, Houston, Austin and Beaumont were more concerned with the nuclear weapons freeze than the rest of the state," Collins said.

According to Collins, those Texans who called themselves conservatives showed greater concern for national defense and war and peace than the rest of the sample. When asked what they felt was the most important issue facing Texas,

unemployment ranked as the number one issue with 28.5 percent of the responses.

The other results were: economy 12.7 percent, education 6.6 percent, illegal aliens 5.8 percent, teachers' salaries 5.0 percent, inflation 3.5 percent, oil and gas situation 3.1 percent.

water 2.5 percent, taxes 2.0 percent and overpopulation 1.7 percent.

"Area differences were also evident in the responses. In Dallas, Abilene and Wichita Falls, concern for the education issue was higher than in the rest of the state. Lubbock and Amarillo led the state in

concern for the water issue. While El Paso, Midland and Odessa were more concerned with the illegal alien issue than the rest of the state.

"Beaumont and Port Arthur led the state in concern for unemployment, with 71.4 percent of the

people there naming it the number one issue in Texas," said Dick Collins, president of the TFCS.

This year the TFCS has published studies on state spending and bureaucracy, crime victims' restitution centers, state severance taxes on oil and gas, and the Texas prevailing wage law.

Owens hit the left front fender of the Lennon vehicle with his right front fender. On impact, Teresa Gibbons, 33, of Arlington, a passenger in the Plymouth was thrown from the car and landed in the grass on the right of the roadway. Lennon was trapped in her car for approximately 45 minutes to

an hour before rescue workers freed her.

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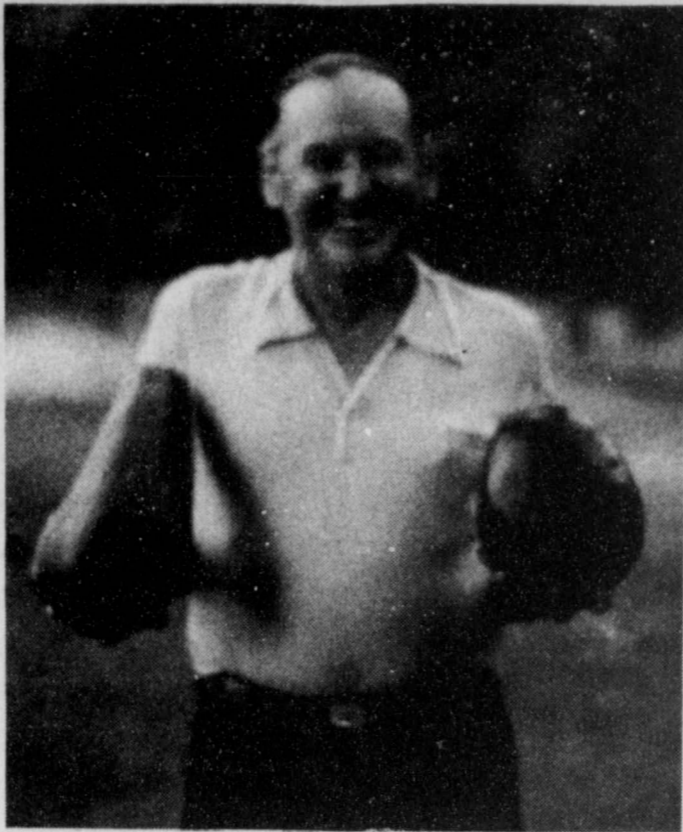

Footprints From The Past

Was sitting in front of the air conditioner Sunday afternoon and got to thinking about how we used to spend our Sunday afternoons when I was growing up. There was no air conditioner or T.V. so we had to make do with what we had.

We used to go to a lot of singings held around the country. There were some country schools where they would have a singing every Sunday in the summer, and some pretty good singers would come. One of the best country quartets that I had the privilege of listening to was one from Deport that consisted of Sam Monk, Pony Cogbill, Morris Hobbs and Johnny McLemore. I have heard some of the best, or they were supposed to be the best, like the Stamps Quartet, but for my money, I liked the Deport group the best.

When I was young living south of Deport in what was called Lone Oak and Sam Monk would hold a singing school in the school house every summer and I never

could sing, but Mr. Monk would tell me that he had to have me come to the school so I could sing bass for him. Since I have thought about it, I know that all he wanted was just for me to come to the school so he would have enough pupils to hold a school. Anyway, all the young people in the community would go, and at the end of the school we would have a big singing. It was an all day thing with dinner on the ground. All the ladies of the community would fix their favorite dish and we would all sing all morning and at lunch time, the ladies would have the dinner all spread out under the trees, and believe me, after you have been cooped up in a hot building all morning singing, it sure was a relief to get out in the open and have a good lunch.

I think that the Stamps School of Music sponsored all different singing schools and also the singings around the country and at the end of the summer they would sponsor a singing school in Dallas for a week and at the end of the week they would get all the ones who were in

the school to help them and they would have a big blow out that would last all Friday and then on Saturday they would start at ten in the morning and sing all day and all Saturday night and they would have all the best students and also some of the best quartets that they could get to come and help them. It was a big thing back in those days and people from all over the state and from other states would be there and some very good singing as there were some very good singers and some were professional singers would attend. It was quite an honor to be invited to appear on one of their programs at the end of their singing school.

They would have very big crowds every night and on Friday and Saturday they would have more than they could seat and they had a very big building on Jefferson Street in Dallas.

The Stamps bunch was also a music PUSHING HOUSE FOR GOSPEL MUSIC. They had their plant on Bishop Street in Oak Cliff. The singing

schools and the singing convention were quite a thing in the late twenties and early thirties, but they all have died out now. I guess, for the only place that you can go and hear good singing is out at Lone Star and if you have not been out and heard them singing, you should make a special effort to do so and I do know that the good people out there will make you feel right at home, so go out some night soon and hear them sing.

Weekly Agricultural Briefs

Area beef cattle breeders with bull consignments for the 18th annual Red River Valley All Breed Bull Sale should be making plans to make those entries with the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce.

Entry deadline is October 1, but changes in brucellosis testing this year make it necessary that a decision be made earlier. This sale is scheduled for November 28.

The brucellosis restrictions that will apply to bulls entered in the sale will require bulls from non certified brucellosis free herds to have two negative tests 60 days apart. The last test must be made within 30 days of the sale. Therefore, the first test must be made prior to September 28 and there must be at least 60 days from that date to the second test.

Bulls from certified free herds may move without being tested. All bulls must have a TB test and Lep-tospirosis vaccination as well as fertility test.

Bull consignments must be between one and five years of age and weigh at

least 1,000 pounds. They must also be registered.

The entry fee is \$25 per bull which applies to the sale commission of 10 percent of

the gross sale price up to \$1500.

There is a part of Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA) that has not received much publicity. We have seen how you can place up to \$2000.00 per year into an IRA without being subject to tax until retirement, but little has been said about the other parts of the same law.

Primarily, we speak of the person that works for a company who has a retirement program of their own for the employee. Without the use of IRA, when an individual retires from a company and receives a lump sum settlement, this amount is immediately subject to taxation. However, if the amount received from the retirement program, less voluntary contributions, is deposited within 60 days to an IRA, tax can be avoided until withdrawals begin. The taxes will normally be less when the total annual income has been decreased by retirement.
