

Rebels Gain Their First District Victory 20-10

The Rivercrest Rebels improved their district standing to 1 and 1 when they defeated the Redwater Dragons last Friday night 20-10.

The Dragons took an early lead with a touchdown in the first quarter. They recovered a fumble on the Red 33 to set up the score. The extra point made it 7-0 at the end of the first period.

Rivercrest gained a one-point advantage as Randy Galloway crossed the line from the six and then went over for the two-point conversion. Greg Russell, Rebel fullback, gained yardage to set up the score. The board read 8-7 with 5:26 remaining in the half.

Kelly Jeffery dashed for two touchdowns only to have them both called back - the Rebs were penalized for

holding on both runs. One run was 50 - the other 68 yards.

The Rebel defensive squad held the Dragons to a field goal in the third quarter. Joel Mangrum, Jack Jones, Lonny Sheffield and Jeffery Bivins were instrumental in stopping Redwater and limiting them to the 34 yard field goal.

On first and 10 from the Red 40 Jeffery was caught

behind the line of scrimmage for a loss of 5. Galloway hauled in a 37 yard Jeffery pass for a first down on the Dragon 48. Galloway picked up 11 more and Charlie Roberts added six. Galloway gave Rivercrest another six points with a beautiful 25 yard sprint across the goal line. The conversion failed. The score was 14-10,

Rivercrest.

Rebel kicker, Charlie Martin, booted a 60 yard kickoff to the Dragons waiting at the 21. A combination of Shane Wright, Rusty Screws and Stanley Jessee forced the Dragons to punt the ball away.

Rivercrest had the ball 1st and 10 on the 45. Roberts picked up 10 for another first down. Greg Russell also picked up 8 yards in the

series. From the five yard line on 1st and 10, Charlie Roberts plummeted into the endzone to bring the score to Rebels-20 and Dragons-10. There was 4:22 left in the 4th quarter. The conversion was no good.

Redwater tried to put together a passing series but a stray loft was picked off by Rebel Rusty Damron with 22 seconds left to play.

Damron was in on several key defensive plays.

The Rebels ran out the clock and gained the victory 20-10.

Rivercrest had 18 first downs to Redwater's 10. They gained 275 yards rushing and allowed the Dragons only 125. The Rebs completed passes for 57 yards to the Dragons 80.

Rivercrest was penalized for 41 yards to Redwater's 20.

Rivercrest will host the Maud Cardinals next Friday night, October 7, for the Rebel Homecoming. There will be a pre-game ceremony to crown the 1983-84 Homecoming Queen at 7:00 p.m. The nominees are Leilani Barnett, Melissa Brown, Kristi Foxworthy and Pam Ward.

Criminal Counts Mount Against Blackmon

Eddie Blackmon, Jr. of DeKalb, has had 53 criminal counts returned against him by a Tyler Federal grand jury.

The counts allege a vast and complicated plan for money manipulation in his farm equipment dealerships and personal finances.

Blackmon has been charged with mail fraud, interstate transportation of stolen vehicles, making false financial states of FDIC bans and selling stolen

vehicles.

Charged with him was a Blackmon Machinery Co. Employee, James Black, also of DeKalb, who will face 22 mail fraud counts.

The indictments allege criminal dealings from September of 1981 through May of 1983.

Blackmon and Black were arraigned in Texarkana before U.S. District Judge William M. Steger on October 3.

The charges state that

listing of various items of farm machinery invoiced by John Deere to Blackmon as being on hand, when the items had actually been sold and payment made from one source or another to Blackmon. Double-financing was charged, and the indictments claim that Blackmon, Black and Dallas Telford determined the date on which a John Deere representative was to inspect the dealership, and induced owners of equip-

ment to return them to the shop for inspection and servicing. Then, the machinery would be refinished to look new, and would be noted by the inspector as on the floor and not sold.

Nineteen charges of mail fraud have been issued, stemming from the fact that John Deere mailed invoices with the falsified figures to Blackmon Machinery.

Eighteen counts charge Blackmon and associations

with attempt to defraud the Mid-South Leasing Company of Shreveport, Louisiana. The charge states that Blackmon Machinery acted without the authority of John Deere and sold two tractors and a combine to Mid-South. Blackmon then allegedly leased them from Mid-South for use on his farms, and sold the machinery later to other farmers.

Other counts were also listed, accusing Blackmon of

several other forms of fraud, including charges that Blackmon made false statements to obtain loans to three Red River County Banks. Since the banks are members of FDIC such representation becomes a Federal violation.

A Bowie County Grand Jury has also brought in 33 indictments against Blackmon, charging him with violations of Texas State Law.

Blackmon and Black pleaded not guilty of all charges on Tuesday.

Special music will be presented by the First Baptist Church of Ore City.

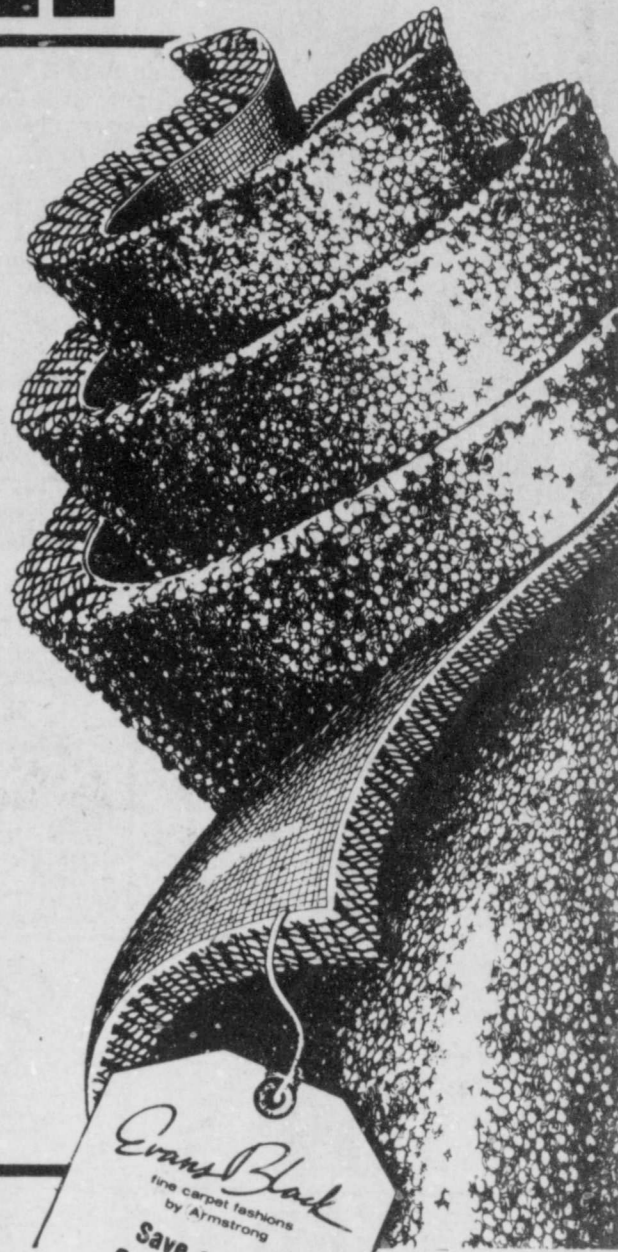

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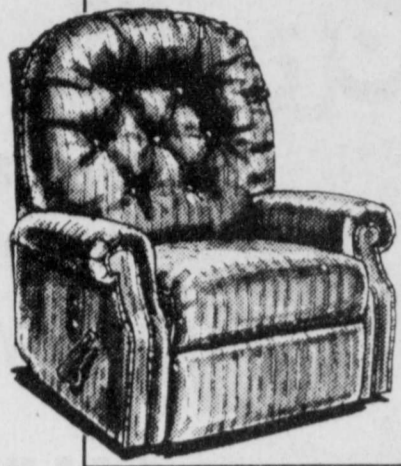
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Eighty Year Old Talco Man Still Active

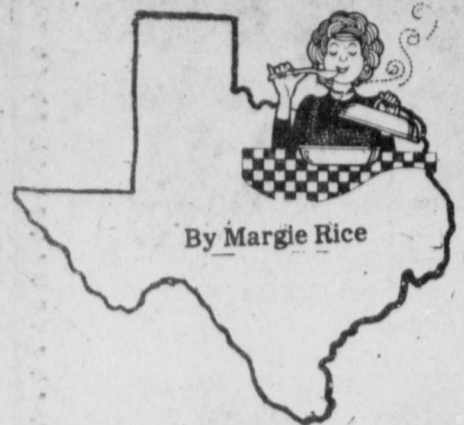

East Texas Eating



Cool fall evenings call for a little heartier supper than many of us have preferred during the summer. It is even nicer if you can put the meal on to cook in the slow-cooker in the morning and have it ready-to-eat when the family gathers for supper. Corned beef brisket

or other cuts can fill both bills. And, corned beef can provide a pleasant change of tastes for your family.

The corned beef brisket can cook slowly all day in the slow-cooker (Crock Pot etc.) while you are working at other tasks. Then, 30-40 minutes before serving

time, potatoes can be added to the simmering stock, and a few minutes later, wedges of cabbage can be put in to steam to tender goodness. There you have supper in a pot!

A nice bonus with corned beef is that left-overs (for planned overs) make

delicious sandwiches and even the very last fragments of the meat and vegetables can be cooked into a hearty hash.

Corned Beef
1 (3-4 lb.) corned beef brisket
1/2 cup chopped onion
If desired: 1 garlic clove, 1 bay leaf

Place the corned beef in a slow cooking pot. Barely cover with water. Add onion, garlic, and bay leaf. Cover and cook on low for 10-12 hours.

NOTE: The corned beef can be cooked conventionally—in a pot on the stove. Cover with water and cook at a simmer, about 1 hour per pound, or until a fork can penetrate to the center.

Corned Beef and Cabbage
Slow cooker: Lift corned

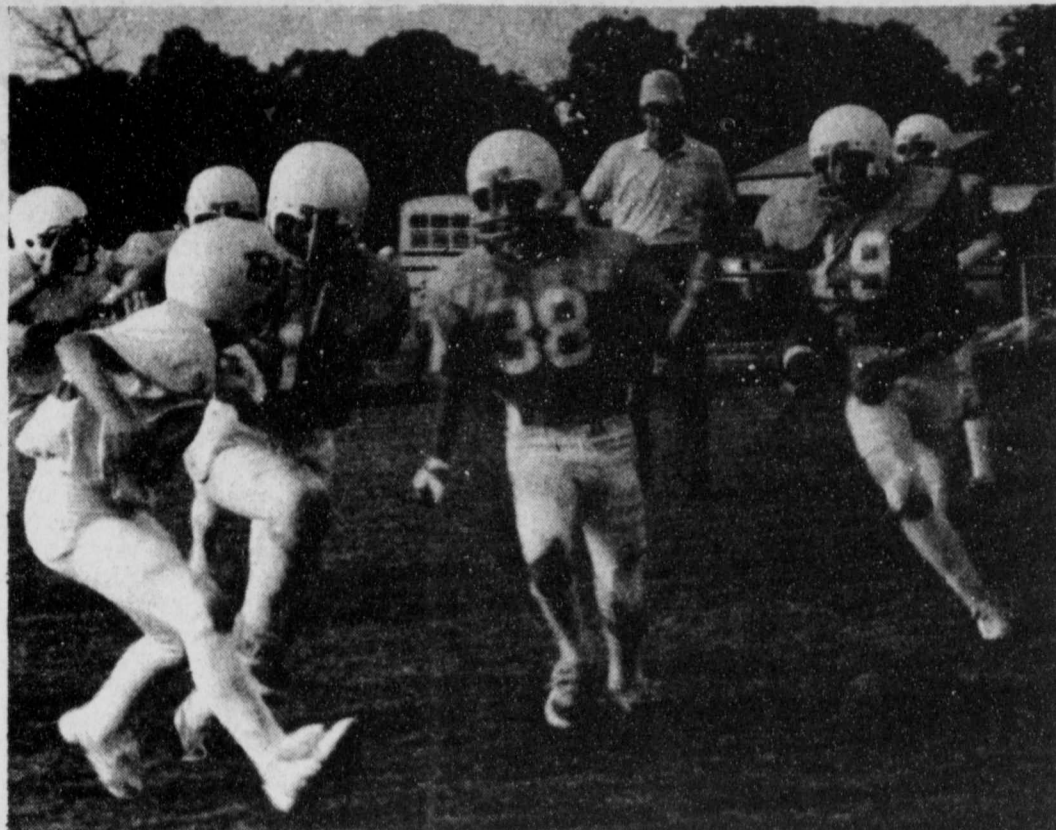
beef out of pot. Turn control to high. Drop wedges of cabbage into the simmering liquid. Cover and cook 20-30 minutes or until cabbage

Corned Beef Hash

Chop the left over corned beef, potatoes, and cabbage. Brown the mixture in a hot skillet in 2 tablespoons vegetable oil until a brown crust forms.

Corned Beef with Potatoes and Cabbage

Add small or quartered, peeled potatoes, to the simmering stock after brisket has been removed. Simmer for about 15 minutes. Add cabbage and simmer another 20-30 minutes—or until cabbage is tender. Serve hot

If a cotton shirt or blouse has been treated with a durable press finish, it probably won't wear as well as an untreated one. Durable press finishes reduce the strength of fabrics from 40 to 50 percent. During the finishing process the cellulose molecules are broken. As a result the fabric becomes weaker and less durable.

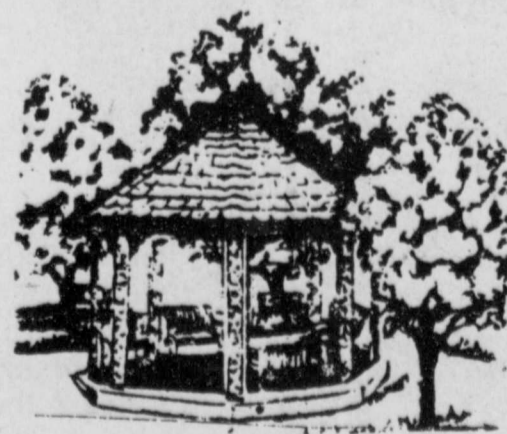

Weekly Agricultural Update

With a few cool nights behind us and more ahead, plants should be prepared for transfer into the greenhouse or home, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. One phase of that preparation is making sure the plants are free of pests such as spider mites, mealy bugs, aphids and others. By controlling the insects or mites prior to moving the plants indoors, many problems will be reduced or eliminated.

Dr. Robinson says he receives numerous calls each year concerning the control of insect pests in the home pantry or food storage areas. Several beetles and weevils infest flour, meal, cereal or seeds stored for a long period of time. Stored food items should be kept in sealed containers to prevent infestation. If seed crops such as peas and beans are

Trent Stephens, Rt. 1 Pattonville, died Sunday, Oct. 2, in Hermann Hospital, Houston.

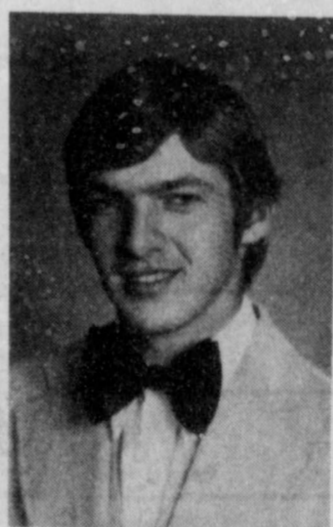

"Notch Year" Question Continues

The question concerning "notch years" in social security continues! Some people have said there was no truth in it...others that it is true...others that it is somewhat true. So for now we are going to publish a letter from Congressman Sam B. Hall to a constituent concerning the subject, and that is all we can do. The copy of the Chairman's remarks inserted in the Congressional record are quite lengthy, but apparently this issue, like most government issues, is quite confusing and difficult. Read on: Thank you for your recent expression of concern regarding the social security program. I am enclosing herewith a copy of the response by the Chairman of the Social Security Subcommittee to "Dear Abby", along with a copy of the Chairman's remarks that were inserted in the CONGRESSIONAL RECORD on the "notch" issue. You will note that the benefit formula was changed in the Social Security Act of 1977 to address a financial problem that threatened the solvency of the social security system. In 1977, about half of the existing long-range

deficit in the social security system was the result of what the Subcommittee described as unintended effects of the cost-of-living increase provisions of the 1972 revisions in the Social Security Act. In 1972 the Congress initiated the policy of indexing social security benefits for inflation. The committee advises that the indexing formula adopted in 1972 was flawed in that it resulted in providing excessive adjustments in benefits which were draining the resources of the social security trust fund and driving the system to bankruptcy. The Chairman advises that the corrections made in the indexing formula in 1977 will not be overturned for reasons of economics. He further informs that to return the program to the 1972 indexing formula would cost the social security system \$9 billion a year that it does not have. I trust that this information is helpful to you and I will continue to give this matter careful attention. However, it appears highly unlikely that the Social Security Subcommittee will entertain legislation to reinstate the 1972 indexing formula. Sincerely, Sam B. Hall, JR.

because the benefit computation set out in amendments in 1972 (when we "indexed" social security benefits) vastly overcompensated for inflation. This was a chief cause of the long-range financial troubles facing social security shortly thereafter, and by the time Congress corrected this problem, relative benefit levels had already climbed higher than any time in the history of the program. These are the high benefits enjoyed by people born in or just before 1916. A line had to be drawn somewhere, and any delay would have made the problem worse. Already it would cost about \$9 billion in the first year - more thereafter - to go back to the old formula. Your writer's reference to the birth years 1917-1921 was particularly confusing. He must be referring to the five year phase-in (from 1979-1983) for the new formula. But the new formula does not affect them alone - it affects everyone born after 1916. The new formula provides steady new benefits levels which, for a worker with average earnings, will equal about 41 percent of one's final wages. This will be true for all future retirees. The problem is not with anything in the recent 1983 amendments or with the 1977 formula. The problem is with the 1972 over-indexed formula. Because of this there is no help possible other than to raise overall benefit levels for new retirees - and to enact very substantial tax increases to pay for these new benefits. In all honesty, I do not think that is likely to happen. With best wishes, I am Sincerely, J.J. Pickle, Chairman Social Security Subcommittee
