Weekly Agricultural Update

behind us and more ahead, plants should be prepared for transfer into the greenhouse or home, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension in the home freezer for Service. One phase of that preparation is making sure the plants are free of pests such as spider mites, mealy bugs, aphids and others. By controlling the insects or mites prior to moving the plants indoors, many problems will be reduced or eliminated.

Dr. Robinson says he receives numerous calls each year concerning the control of insect pests in the home pantry or food storage areas. Several beetles and weevils infest flour, meal, cereal or seeds stored for a long period of time. Stored food items should be kept in sealed containers to prevent infestation. If seed crops such as peas and beans are

With a few cool nights harvested from the home garden, they may be infested with insects at the time of storage.

Light insect infestations may be controlled in some items by placing the items seven days at zero degrees or colder. Other items such as peas and beans may be placed in a shallow pan and heated in the oven for 30 minutes at 130 degrees fahrenheit. Robinson points out that these are only temporary measures

The best control of pantry pests is through strict sanitation practices. Food storage areas should be thoroughly cleaned with soap and hot water. After clean-up, treat the area with an approved insecticide. Avoid contaminating dishes, cooking utensils and food with the insecticide. Avoid spilling food in storage

Dear Abby: In response to a letter in your column, a lot of people contacted Members of Congress about the social security "notch". Unfortunately, the writer's letter is not entirely correct.

There is a notch between benefits for those born in or slightly before 1916 and those born in or after 1917. Here's why:

In 1977 Congress enacted a new benefit formula for all who turn age 62 after 1978 putation set out in amendments in 1972 (when we "indexed" social security benefits) vastly overcompensated for inflation. This was a chief cause of the long-range financial troubles facing social security shortly thereafter, and by the time Congress corrected this problem, relative benefit levels had already climbed higher than any time in the history of the program. These are the high benefits enjoyed by people born in or just before 1916. A line had to be drawn somewhere, and any delay would have made the problem worse. Already it would cost about \$9 billion in the first year - more thereafter -- to go back to

the old formula. Your writer's reference to the birth years 1917-1921 was particularly confusing. He must be referring to the five year phase-in (from 1979-1983) for the new formula. But the new formula does not affect them alone -- it affects everyone born after The new formula 1916. provides steady new benefits levels which, for a worker with average earnings, will equal about 41 percent of one's final wages. This will be true for all future retirees.

The problem is not with anything in the recent 1983 amendments or with the 1977 formula. The problem is with the 1972 over-indexed formula. Because of this there is no help possible other than to raise overall benefit levels for new retirees -- and to enact very substantial tax increases to pay for these new benefits. In all honesty, I do not think that is likely to happen.
