Harold Holt, Stanley Jessee, Kyle Hatley and Scotty Goates. The defensive squad of the Como-Pickton Eagles was worked overtime as the Rebel offense controlled the contest. Jeffery Bivins totaled 123 yards rushing for the night. Randy Galloway ran for 77 yards and two touchdowns. Kelly Jeffery made some

key passes to James Anderson for two scores. The Rebels chalked up two touchdowns during the first quarter. It was Randy Galloway crossing into the endzone for both scores. The first from the 12 and the second from the 6. Stanley Jessee's extra points were good on both attempts. The score was 14-0 in favor of the Rebels.

Rivercrest continued to pound the Eagles in the second quarter. In a fourth and seven situation from the Eagles' 15 Kelly Jeffery lofted a pass to James Anderson in the right hand corner of the endzone for the score. Jessee's extra point kick was through the uprights giving the Rebels a 21 point lead. Near the close of the first

half Greg Russell plowed into the endzone from the one gaining some tough yardage up the middle. Jessee was true on the kick to bring the tally to 28-0 at halftime. The Rebel Marching Band announced their Band Sweetheart and Band Beau during the halftime ceremonies. Last years

downs to the Eagles 5. The Rebels rushed for a whopping 299 yards while holding Como-Pickton to 46. Rivercrest also dominated the passing game with 3 of 9 for 71 yards. 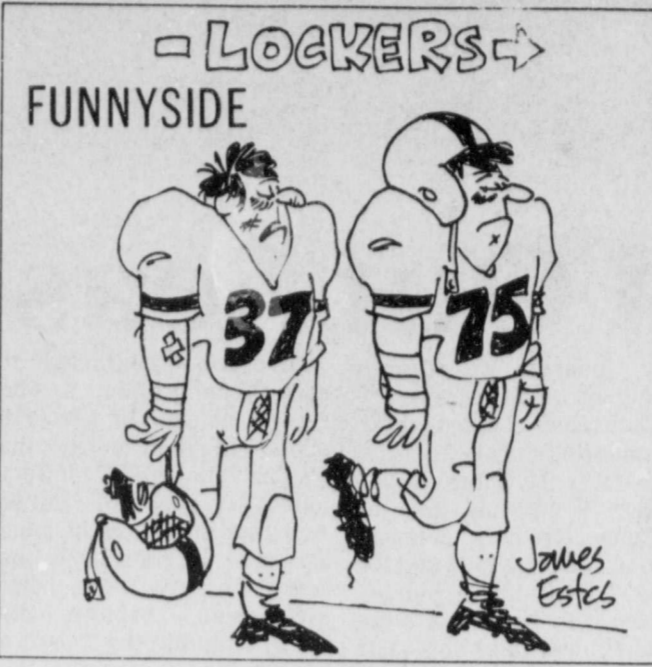

Footprints From The Past

Sometimes it takes very little to get a person to thinking about the past and as I was cooking some steaks on the grill today I got to thinking about when I was a small boy and into my early teens and how on a cold winter night Mother would put some sweet potatoes in some coals from the fire place and let them bake there while she would make some bread and put it in the dutch oven to bake. If you are too young to know what a dutch oven is I will tell you that it is a big old iron thing that looks like a big frying pan except that it has three short legs and a heavy iron lid that is built up around the edges so it will hold some coals from the fireplace so you can put the pan on some hot coal and put some on the lid so the bread will cook on both sides and if you have never had the good fortune to eat bread cooked in a dutch oven you do not know what you have missed as it bakes the best bread in the world. Well as I was saying Mom would put the sweet potatoes on in the coals then she would put the

bread on so they both would be done about the same time and she would get some fresh back bones out of another pot that she had been cooking and then we would have us a meal that was fit for a king or just anyone. Dad always said that it was just what he would have ordered from a restaurant if he had the chance. He said that coming out from a hard day in the cold it was just right to make a hungry man quit work a little early and come home.

I can remember that when we were small that we lived on the farm and Mother had a sister who lived in Detroit and Mother always went to visit her at least once a year and as you had to go by wagon she would stay for a week and as the kids were in school we could not go so Dad would stay and look after us and see to the cooking and that we got off to school on time. I don't know what Dad put in the biscuits that he baked, but he would make up a batch and put them in the dutch oven and let me tell you they

were might taste, especially if you had some good sorgum syrup to sop them in along with some good home grown ham and red eye gravy. I don't know how the rest of the kids felt but I was always afraid that we would have to go with Mom and not get any of Dad's good biscuits besides we got to do some things that we were not allowed to do any other time, like stay up late after we got our lessons. The lessons always came first no matter what after the lessons Dad would tell us stories of the things that he did when he was a small boy. He would also tell us stories of what life was like when his parents were small, how they came to this country when things were not too settled and how you had to grow all you had to eat and had to spin the most of your clothes with a spinning wheel, tan your own leather and make your shoes.

I could sit and listen to the tales he would tell and try and imagine what they were like then and just see me being chased by some big old bear of hiding from a band of Indians who were on the war path and just looking for some little boys scalp.

When it got time that we had to go to bed we would all sleep in the same room as we were afraid to go into the other room to sleep.

An Environmental Review Record of this project has been made by the City of Bogata which documents the environmental review of the project. The Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request.

The City of Bogata will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Bogata is certifying to HUD that the City of Bogata and Mayor John Hood, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Bogata may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer or applicant approved by HUD; (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD at, P.O. Box 2905, Fort Worth, Texas 76143. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after December 9, 1983 will be considered by HUD.

Local DPS Officers Warn Of Holiday Traffic

Local Department Public Safety officers are warning East Texas motorists to be extra cautious during the forthcoming Thanksgiving holiday period due to an expected increase in traffic. "Many families will extend Thanksgiving Day into a four-day holiday weekend which may include long-distance driving. This will increase their exposure to the hazards of driving," said Sergeant Arvel Shepard, DPS, Mt. Pleasant. Defensive driving under such conditions would necessarily include trip planning such as having the family car serviced by a professional mechanic. "Leave early so speeding will not be necessary," the safety official said. Taking a restbreak from driving every two hours is one way to stay alert so dangerous situations can be seen in time. Since alcohol affects judgement and the decision making process and also slows reaction time, avoid drinking and driving. "Driving is no time to have the senses dulled," he added. "Many serious traffic accidents will occur," he said, reflecting on the 40 deaths that resulted in Texas during the Thanksgiving weekend last year. "So deciding to use safety belts, even on short trips at home, is a wise decision," he said. DPS troopers will be patrolling the highways watching for traffic law violators and assisting those who have motor trouble. "But" he added, "Only those drivers who violate the rules and who have not planned ahead will need the services of a trooper."

Colored Leaves Abound In Fall

It's a quiet revolution that happens each fall. Slowly but surely Mother Nature goes about painting leaves on trees and shrubs to produce a riot of red, purple, orange and yellow for spectacular fall displays.

Just what is taking place is enough to cause even the most avid skeptic to marvel. It's all tied to chemical processes in leaves as the summer season gives way to fall and the approaching winter.

"Leaves are actually little factories that manufacture food to support a tree's or other plant's growth," points out Alan D. Dreesen, a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

They are busy producing food during spring and summer, but as fall approaches, their work slows down as temperatures and daylight hours change. Chlorophyll-the green pigment in leaves-breaks down and other pigments, mainly yellows and oranges, become visible and gives leaves their fall splendor.

At the same time other chemical changes are occurring to form additional pigments varying from red to blue, notes the forester. These give rise to purplish leaves on such trees as dogwoods and sumacs and brilliant orange or fiery red and yellow leaves on sugar maples. Some trees, such as quaking aspen, birch and hickory, boast only yellow colors while many oaks and others display predominant brown or bronze leaves.

"Leaf colors will vary greatly from year to year, depending on weather conditions and the amount of chlorophyll and other pigments in leaves," explains Dreesen.

Warm, sunny days in the fall followed by cool nights with temperatures below 45 degrees F. are ideal for the formation of brilliant red colors, he points out. These conditions enable leaves to produce a lot of sugar during the daytime but slow down the movement of these sugars from leaves at night. Consequently, trapped sugars form the red pigment that is so vividly displayed in leaves of the red maple,

flowering dogwood, sweetgum, black tupelo or blackgum and sassafras.

"A lot of warm, cloudy, rainy weather in the fall, on the other hand, will produce leaves with less red coloration because of the reduced sugar production in leaves," notes Dreesen.

"Fall leaf color can also vary from tree to tree," he adds. "For example, leaves directly exposed to sun may turn red while those on the shady side of the same tree or on other trees in the shade may be yellow. Some leaves simply turn dull brown from death and decay."

Where can one find an abundance of showy fall displays?

The eastern United States and southeastern Canada boast large areas of deciduous (trees that shed their leaves) forests with favorable weather conditions for vivid fall colors, notes the forester. Some mountainous areas of the western U.S. also offer vistas of fall colors along with eastern Asia and southwestern Europe.

While arranging for all the fall leaf colors, Mother Nature is also preparing the twigs that hold leaves to gradually sever themselves from the branches, says Dreesen. When the leaves finally fall, due to their own weight or a sudden burst of wind, they enrich the forest floor, returning part of the nutrients that were used by the tree.

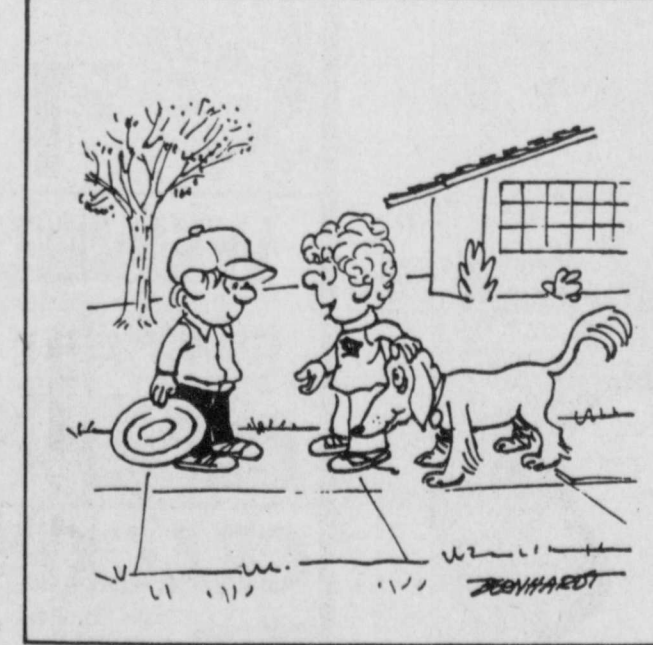

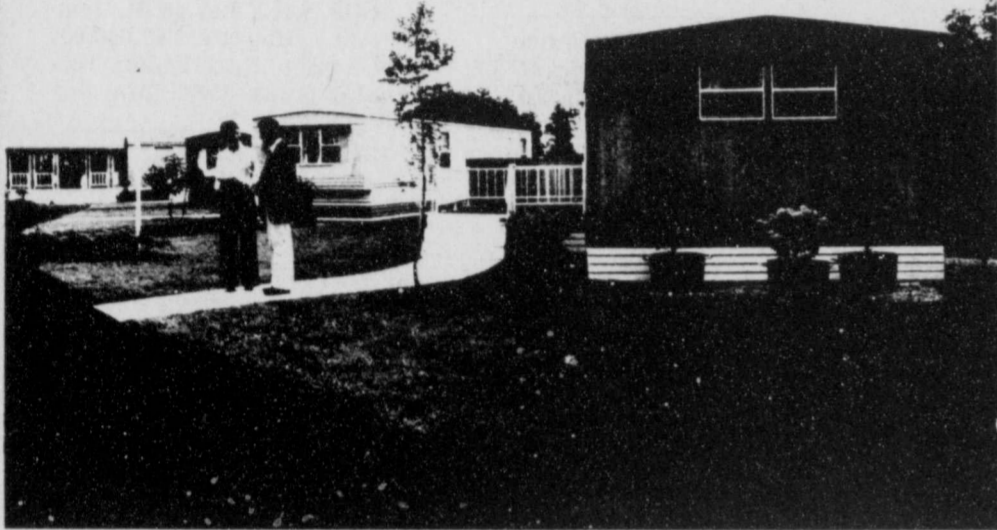
