

County Re-Appraisal Notice Being Sent

More than 2,000 notices of Re-Appraisals have been sent out this week by the Red River Appraisal Board, according to Harold Quillan, Chief Appraiser.

Quillan explained that the Notices are not sent to those

whose appraisals have not essentially changed from last year or were not rendered by the owner at a different value.

"These Notices are primarily being mailed out to those owners whose ap-

praised values have been increased by more than \$1,000," he said. "In addition, the Notices were sent to all owners of new property."

The Notices, Quillan said, are to advise the owners of

the new value. Then, he said, any taxpayer who desires may contact the Appraisal Office for an explanation of the values and changes.

If the owner is still not satisfied, he will be given an

opportunity to sign a Notice of Protest and all given an appointment to meet with the Appraisal Review Board which will begin meeting Friday, Nov. 18th, and will convene Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays until

such time as all protests are heard.

The Appraisal Review Board is the final authority within the present taxing system as to values.

The Appraisal Review Board this year will consist

of three holdovers from last year, Henry Burl Barton, Bill Jennings, and Tommy Burks. They will be joined by John O. Williams, Avery, and Jerry Jones, Talco.

Any person who did not receive a Notice of Re-

Appraisal but desires an explanation of his valuations is also invited to visit the office any time during business hours, Quillan said. The office is located on the northeast corner of the square.

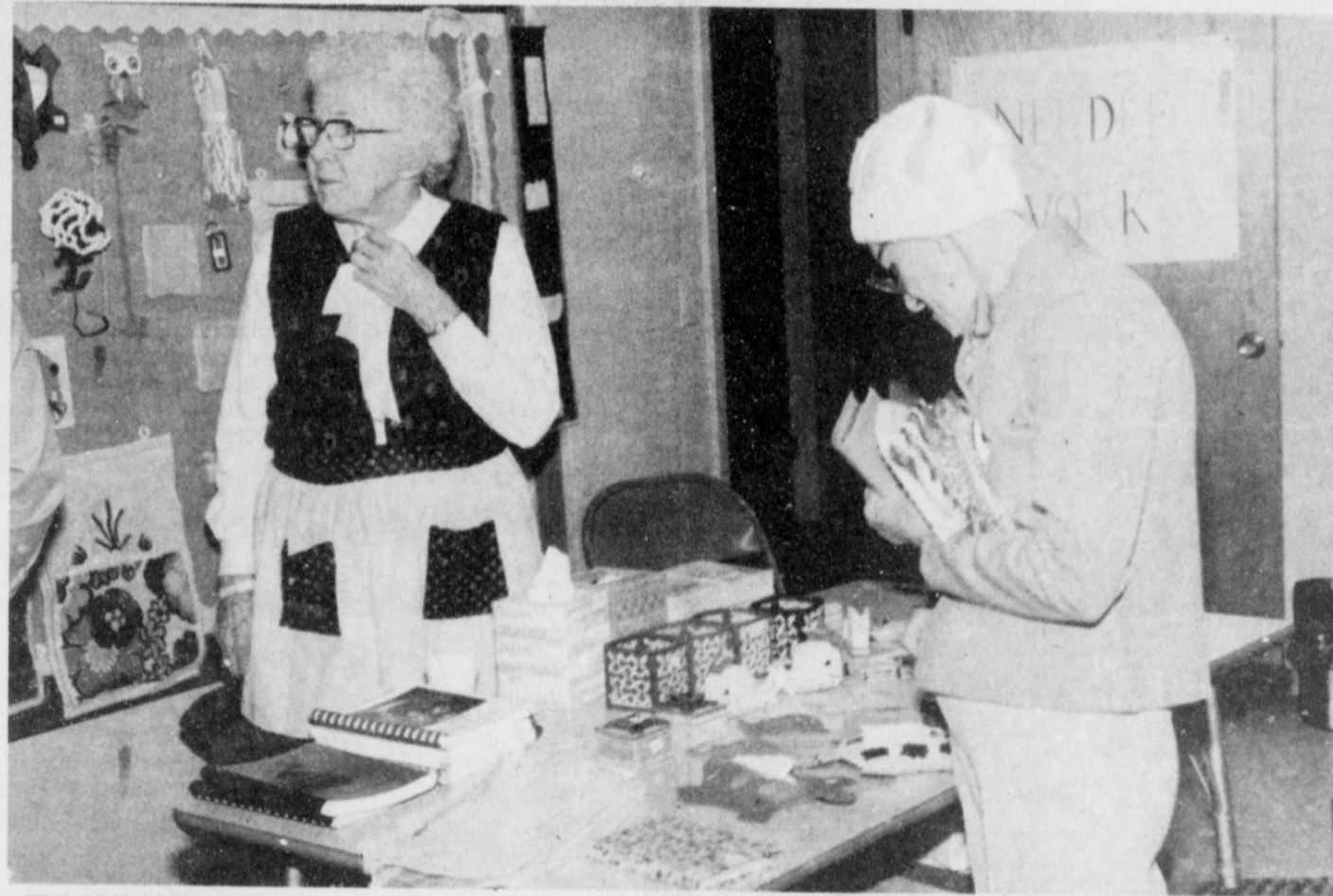
Damon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ward of Bogata and a 1982 graduate of Rivercrest High School and past president of the local FFA chapter.

Local Sales Tax Checks Out Early

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent city sales tax rebate checks a full week early because many taxpayers paid by the 20th of last month—as all taxpayers will be required to do this month.

"We're sending these checks early because 134,000 Texas taxpayers paid before the deadline," Bullock said. "This kind of cooperation among taxpayers is helping us avoid new and higher taxes. It's obvious this change will help local governments put these tax revenues to work faster in their cities."

Starting in November, all taxpayers will be required to file by the 20th of the month instead of by the last day of the month.

The earlier deadline set by the Legislature will bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Bullock said this month's early payments "show that Texas merchants have accepted this change in the same spirit it was suggested—to save us from a tax increase."

Bullock's office has been working with trade and professional organizations to inform taxpayers of the change.

History Of The Early Days Of Bogata

We have just had the pleasure of reading a History of Bogata written in 1930 by Jack Rodgers, a young Bogatan then studying at "East Texas State Teachers College" in Commerce. A true scholar, Rodgers later taught in Bogata schools before moving to West Texas. For fourteen years he was President of Odessa College. Rodgers is now retired and lives at Alamogordo, New Mexico.

Rodgers based his account largely on interviews with old timers who had themselves lived through much of the town's colorful early days. This "oral history" approach to the past is now very much in fashion among historians, and from Rodgers' lively pages we can see why.

We decided it would be a good idea to publish Rodgers' paper and thus to share it with our readers. Knowing about the past certainly makes it easier to understand and appreciate what we have today.

So... here's the first installment of Rodgers' study. If your appetite for local history was whetted by reading Iva Lassiter Hooker's delightful history, still in print, or even if you missed it, we think you'll enjoy this one!

I am especially thankful to Mrs. Lucy Hudson, and to Mrs. Neil Howison, granddaughters of the first settler of the town, and I feel that this history would not have been possible without their kindly help and suggestions in preparing this story.

I realize that, without authentic records, dates may sometimes not be the exact ones, but I have not knowingly recorded any date that I have at least tried to get as nearly as possible correct.

HISTORY OF BOGATA

The first settlement of what is now Bogata, formerly Maples Springs, was made in 1836 by William Humphries, a number of whose descendants are now living in and around Bogata.

This early pioneer moved from Mississippi to Texas, and selected Maples Springs for his home because of the advantages provided by nature for the section, including wood and water. Or perhaps he had a vision of the future, when Blossom Prairie would indeed "blossom" forth and become the garden land of Texas.

This family camped near the bank of the small branch which now is called Maples Springs Branch and which flows through the present city of Bogata, and near the spot where the Orus Cooper home now stands. The camp had been formerly an old Indian camp and was advantageous in location. Maple trees lined the banks of the small stream, and the stream was fed then, as now, by boiling springs; hence the early name Maples Springs.

Humphries, soon after arriving, built his first home near where he first camped, near the present Orus Cooper home, and took up a claim of approximately 1200 acres of land. However,

from some cause or other, possible because the new home was surrounded by trees and the family could be taken unawares by an Indian attack, a new home was built on what is now the Jack Gray place, on the edge of the prairie, where a view of the surrounding country might be had. Here the family lived for some time. The old cistern which is there to the present day was built by Humphries himself.

This early settlement was at the southern edge of Blossom Prairie which furnished abundant grazing for live stock through the spring and summer. Ten miles south was the Sulphur River with an abundant growth of cane on which stock grew fat through the

fall and winter. Cuthand Creek bottom, which was only four miles east of the settlement, had a similar growth of cane. As this early settler grew prosperous through raising livestock, other settlers began to take advantage of the favorable location offered. Many families came from Mississippi, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, as well as other parts of Texas and a thriving village was established.

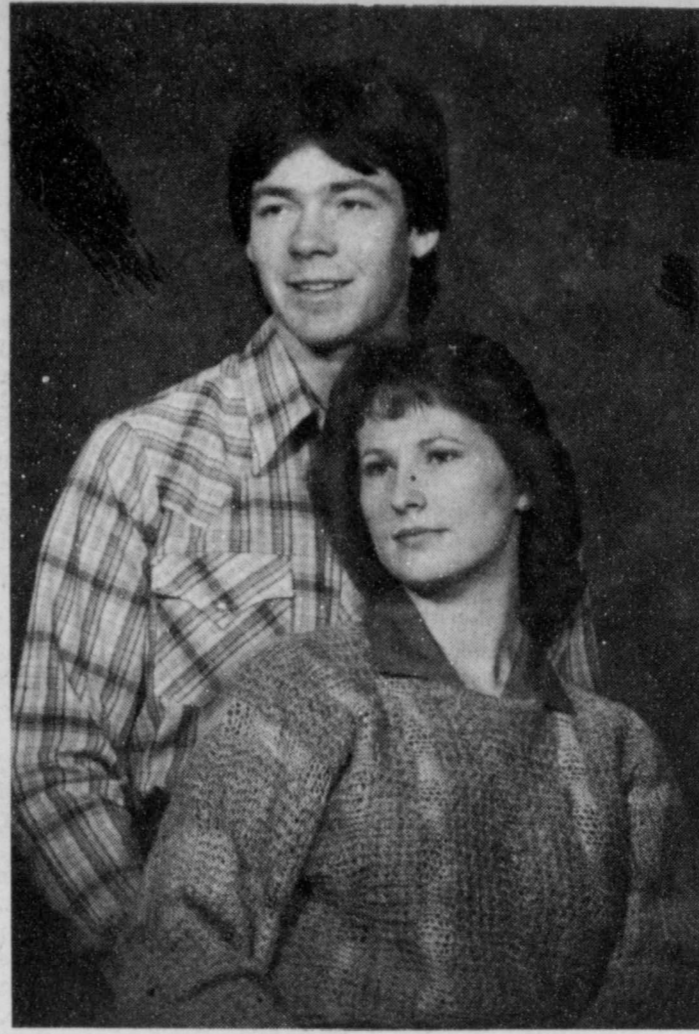

Gables Celebrate 50th Anniversary

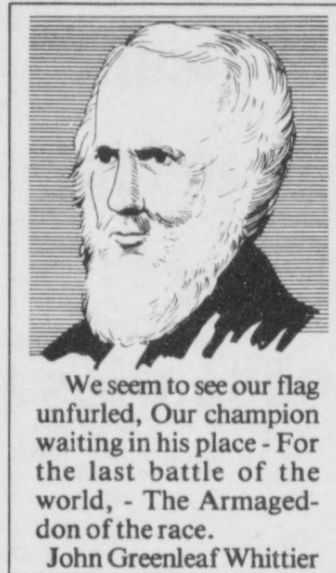

The Tetanus-diphtheria (td) vaccine is also available to adults.

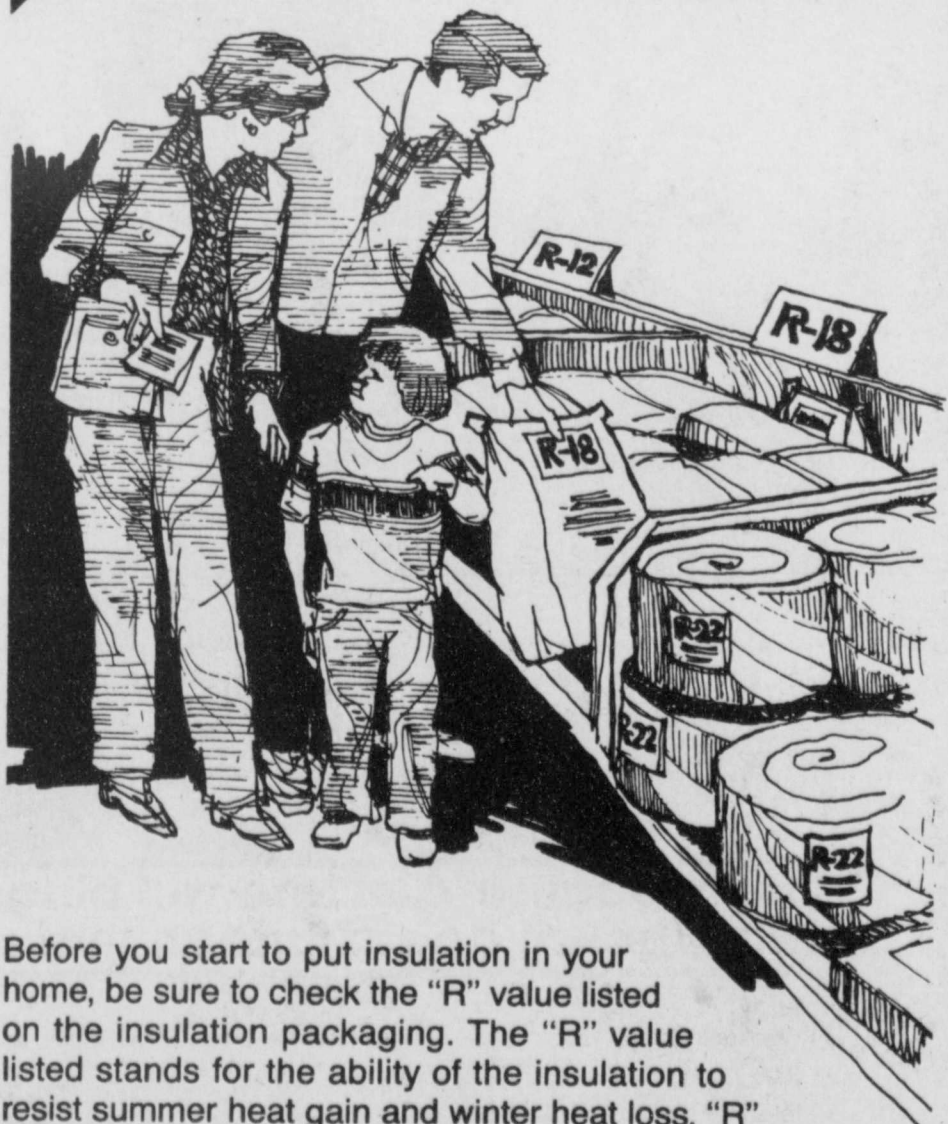

"Pick a Phone, Any Phone?"



Just because a phone will plug into your wall jack, it doesn't mean that it will work.

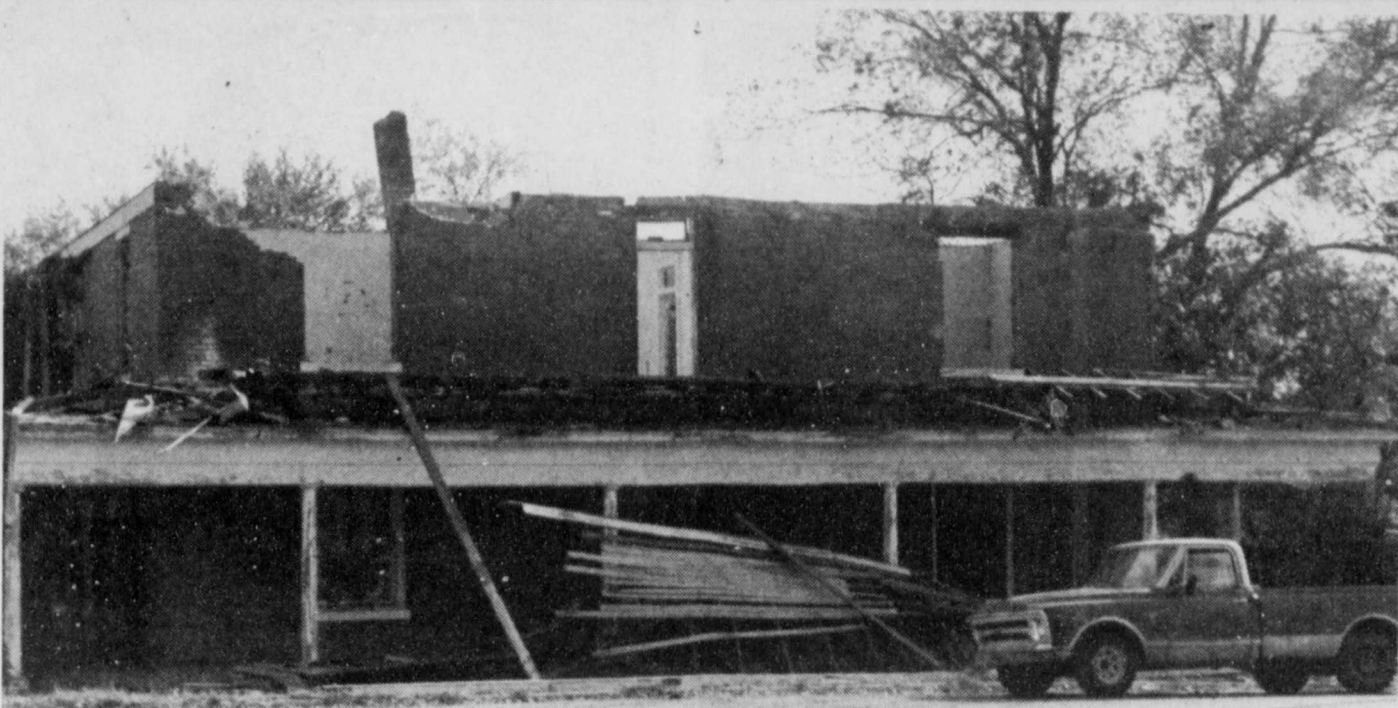

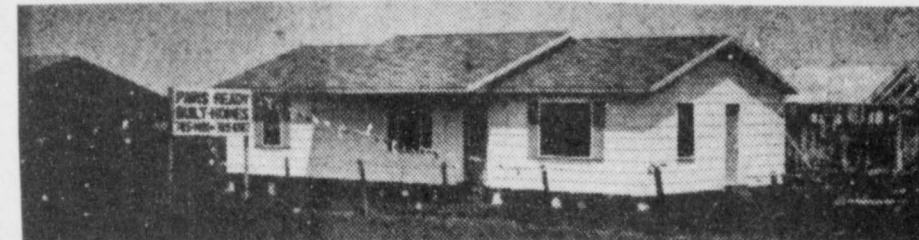

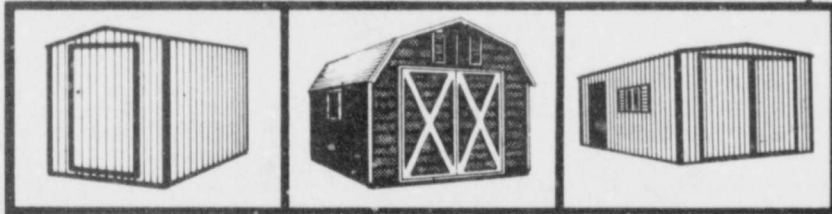

NOTICE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS:
SECTION 11: TITLE AND SCOPE.
A. Title - This Ordinance shall be known as the "Dangerous Building Ordinance" and may be cited as such.
B. Purpose - It is the purpose of the provisions of this Ordinance to provide a just, equitable, and practicable method, to be cumulative with and in addition to, any other remedy provided by any other ordinances, rules and regulations of the City of Bogata, or the laws of the State of Texas, buildings, structures, or vacant lots which from any cause endanger the life, limb, health, morals, property, safety, or welfare of the general public or their occupants, may be required to be repaired, vacated or demolished.
C. Scope - The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all dangerous buildings, structures, or vacant lots, as herein defined, which are now in existence or which may hereafter be constructed in this City.
SECTION 2: DANGEROUS STRUCTURES PROHIBITED.
All unoccupied dwellings or buildings of any type, kind or character, whether residential or recreational and/or commercial; large accumulations of trash, rubbish, waste materials and junk, and the unattended growth of weeds, and of unscrupulous or unattended vegetation of any type, which add any one or more of the following defects shall be deemed "dangerous structures":
1. Those of which interior walls or other vertical structural members lean, list or buckle to such an extent that a plumb line passing through the center of gravity falls outside the middle third of its base.
2. Those which, exclusive of the foundation, show 3/8" or more damage or deterioration of the supporting member or members, or 50% of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or other cause is determined by the fire marshal to be a fire hazard.
3. Those which have been properly distributed loads upon the floors or roofs or in which the same are overloaded or which have insufficient strength to be reasonably safe for the purpose used.
4. Those which have been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals, or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the City of Bogata, Texas.
5. Those which have become or are so delapidated, decayed, unsafe, unsanitary, or which so utterly fail to provide the amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit for human habitation, or are likely to cause sickness, or disease, or so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety, and general welfare of those living therein or in close by.
6. Those having light, air, and sanitation facilities which are inadequate to protect the health, morals, safety, or general welfare of human beings who live therein or close by.
7. Those which have parts thereof which are so attached that they may fall and injure members of the public or property owned by the public.
8. Those which because of their condition are unsafe, unsanitary, or dangerous to the health, morals, safety, or general welfare of the people of the City of Bogata, Texas.
9. Whenever any building, dwelling, or other structure, because of obsolescence, delapidated condition, deterioration, damage, inadequate exits, lack of sufficient fire resistive construction, faulty electric wiring, gas connections or heating apparatus or any other cause is determined by the fire marshal to be a fire hazard.
10. Whenever any portion of said building, dwelling or structure remains on a site after the demolition or destruction of the said building, dwelling or structure, by natural causes or otherwise, so as to constitute such building, dwelling, or structure, or portion thereof, an attractive nuisance to children or hazard to the public or their property.
SECTION 3: UNINHABITED BUILDING, DWELLING OR STRUCTURE.
The term "uninhabited building", "dwelling" or "structure" as in this Ordinance shall mean any house, building, dwelling, shed, barn, warehouse or other such structure and any appurtenances thereto which have been unused, unoccupied, abandoned, vacant, or vacated as a regular place of residence, living, storage or business activity for a period of not less than thirty (30) days. Provided, however, that any such house, building, dwelling, shed, barn, warehouse or similar structure unused, unoccupied, abandoned, vacant or vacated as a regular place of residence, living, storage or building activity on the effective date of this ordinance, shall be deemed an uninhabited building, dwelling, or structure thereafter for purposes of this ordinance.
SECTION 4: DANGEROUS STRUCTURES CONSTITUTE NUISANCES.
All "dangerous structures" within the terms of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be public nuisances, and shall be repaired, vacated or demolished as set out herein.
SECTION 5: STANDARDS FOR REPAIR, VACATION OR DEMOLITION.
The following standards shall be followed in substance by the building inspector and the board of adjustment and appeals in ordering repair, vacation or demolition:
1. If the "dangerous structure" can reasonably be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this Ordinance, it shall be ordered repaired.
2. If the "dangerous structure" is in such condition as to make it dangerous to the health, morals, safety, or general welfare of its occupants, it shall be ordered to be vacated.
3. In any case where a "dangerous structure" is 50% damaged or decayed, or deteriorated from its original value or structure, it shall be demolished, and in all cases where a building or a structure can not be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this Ordinance, it shall be demolished. In all cases where a "dangerous structure" is a fire hazard existing or created in violation of the terms of this Ordinance or any ordinance of the city or statute of the state, it shall be demolished.
SECTION 6: ESTABLISHMENT OF THE OFFICE OF BUILDING INSPECTOR.
There is hereby created the office of the Building Inspector and the holder of said office will be the acting Fire Marshal of the City of Bogata, Texas, or such other person as shall be appointed by the City Council.
SECTION 7: DUTIES OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR.
The Building Inspector shall have the following duties:
1. Inspect or cause to be inspected at his discretion all public buildings, schools, halls, churches, theaters, hotels, tenements, commercial, manufacturing or loft buildings for the purpose of determining whether any conditions exist which render such places a "dangerous structure" as set out in this Ordinance.
2. Inspect any building, wall or structure about which complaints are filed by any person to the effect that a building, wall or structure is or may be existing in violation of this Ordinance.
3. Inspect any building, wall or structure reported by the fire department or police department of the City as probably existing in violation of the terms of this Ordinance.
4. Inspect buildings and structures in the City to determine whether they are "dangerous structures" within the terms of this Ordinance.
5. Report his or her recommendations and/or findings for all buildings and structures found by him or her to be "dangerous structures" to the City Council.
6. Report to the chairman of the Board of Building Standards any noncompliance with the orders provided herein.
7. Appear at all hearings conducted by the City Council regarding any violation of this Ordinance and present testimony to the "dangerous structure" and the "dangerous structure" his findings and recommendations.
SECTION 8: DUTIES OF THE CITY COUNCIL HEREIN.
The City Council shall have the following duties:
1. Upon receipt of a report from the Building Inspector, as provided for in this Ordinance, review said report and if probable grounds exist for the vacation, repair or demolition of said building, wall or structure as shown by the land records to the City Clerk, to appear before the City Council on the date specified on the notice to show cause why the building or structure reported to be "dangerous structure" should not be repaired, vacated, demolished in accordance with a statement of particulars set forth herein.
2. Hold a hearing and receive such testimony as the Building Inspector or the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee, or any other person having an interest in said structure as shown by the land deeds of the County Clerk offer relative to the "dangerous structure".
3. Make a written finding of fact from testimony offered pursuant to the subsection as to whether or not the building or structure in question is a "dangerous structure" within the terms of this Ordinance.
4. Issue an order based on the findings of fact made pursuant to this section commanding the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee, agent, and all other persons having an interest in said building or structure as shown by the land records of the County Clerk, to appear before the City Council on the date specified on the notice to show cause why the building or structure reported to be a "dangerous structure" should not be repaired, vacated, demolished in accordance with a statement of particulars set forth herein.
5. That if the City of Bogata, Texas, shall incur expenses for the repair, vacation or demolition of said building, such costs will be charged against the land on which the building or structure existed as a municipal lien as provided for by Vernon's Ann. Civ. Stat. Art. 1015b, or to said lien against the property, which shall be established by the City Council, and the City Council shall have the authority to establish rules and regulations for its own procedure not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.
6. No Council Member shall act in any case in which "she or he has a personal interest. The City Council shall re-establish rules and regulations for its own procedure not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.
SECTION 9: MUNICIPAL LIEN.
That in cases where the City of Bogata, Texas, incurs expenses for the repair, vacation, or demolition of "dangerous structures" the City Council shall have the authority to establish rules and regulations for its own procedure not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.
SECTION 10: EMERGENCY CASES.
In cases where it reasonably appears that there is immediate danger to life or safety of any person unless the "dangerous structure" is immediately repaired, vacated, or demolished, the Building Inspector shall report such facts to the City Council and the Board shall recommend to the City Council that such structure be immediately repaired, vacated or demolished. The cost of such emergency repair, vacation or demolition of such "dangerous structure" shall be collected in the same manner as provided above.
SECTION 11: NOTICE REQUIREMENTS.
That all notices given to owners, occupants, mortgagees, lessees, agents and all interested parties shall include the following:
1. The date of such notice.
2. A proper legal description of the property in question.
3. The name of the owner, if known. If unknown, then to "The owner of Lot _____ Block _____ of the Addition to the City of Bogata, Texas," or any other proper legal description so that the property owner may be properly identified.
4. A statement of the particulars which have been made deeming the structure or building "dangerous structure".
5. An order executed by the City Council setting the date, time and place of a public hearing for the determination of whether the building or structure in question is a "dangerous structure" whether or not such structure should be repaired, vacated or demolished.
6. State the provisions of the Ordinance or other relevant ordinances being violated.
7. State the penalty provision of this Ordinance for such violation.
SECTION 12: SERVICE ON OWNER OF PROPERTY.
In all cases, except emergency cases, the City of Bogata, Texas, shall send notice as set out herein by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee or all other persons having interest in said building or structure as shown by the land records of the County Clerk to the last known address of each, and a copy of such notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the "dangerous structure" to which it relates. Such mailing and posting shall be deemed adequate service. In the event that the owner, occupant, mortgagee, lessee or all other interested parties cannot be determined or located, adequate notice shall consist of publishing such notice in the local newspaper for three (3) consecutive weeks and placing notice in a conspicuous place on the "dangerous structure" itself to which it relates.
SECTION 13: ADMINISTRATIVE LIABILITY.
No officer, agent, employee, or City Council Member of the City of Bogata, Texas, shall be personally liable for any damage that may accrue to persons or property as a result of any act required or permitted in discharge of such person's duties under this Ordinance. Any suit brought against any officer, agent or employee of the City as a result of any act required or permitted in this discharge of such duties under this Ordinance shall be defended by the City of Bogata, Texas, until the final determination of the proceedings therein.
SECTION 14: VIOLATIONS.
1. The owner of any "dangerous structure" who shall fail to comply with any notice or order to repair, vacate, or demolish said building or structure given by any person authorized by this Ordinance to give such notice or order, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined as provided in this section for each offense and for each day that such failure to comply continues beyond the date fixed for compliance.
2. The occupant or lessee in possession who fails to comply with any notice to vacate and who fails to repair said building or structure in accordance with any notice given as provided for in this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined as provided herein for each offense and for each day such failure to comply continues beyond the date fixed for compliance.
3. Any person removing the notice provided for in this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined as provided herein.
4. That any person, firm or corporation who shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in violation of this Ordinance shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$200.00 and each and every day's violation thereafter shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
5. That any person, firm or corporation who shall be guilty of removing the notice as provided for herein shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in violation of this Ordinance and shall be fined \$50.00 for each violation.
SECTION 15: PROVISIONS DEEMED CUMULATIVE.
The provisions of this Ordinance to be cumulative of all other ordinances or parts thereof governing and regulating the same such matter as that covered herein; provided, however, that all prior ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of any inconsistency or conflict.
SECTION 16: SEVERABILITY.
It is hereby declared to the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases are separable, and if a phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section in this Ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this Ordinance of unconstitutionality or invalid phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections.
SECTION 17: LIABILITY CLAUSE.
Neither the City of Bogata, Texas, nor any authorized agent acting under the terms of this Ordinance shall be liable or have any liability by reason of orders or work done in compliance with the terms of this Ordinance.
SECTION 18: EFFECTIVE DATE.
This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Bogata, Texas, which publication shall be sufficient to constitute the title of this Ordinance and state a penalty provided therein for violation thereof.

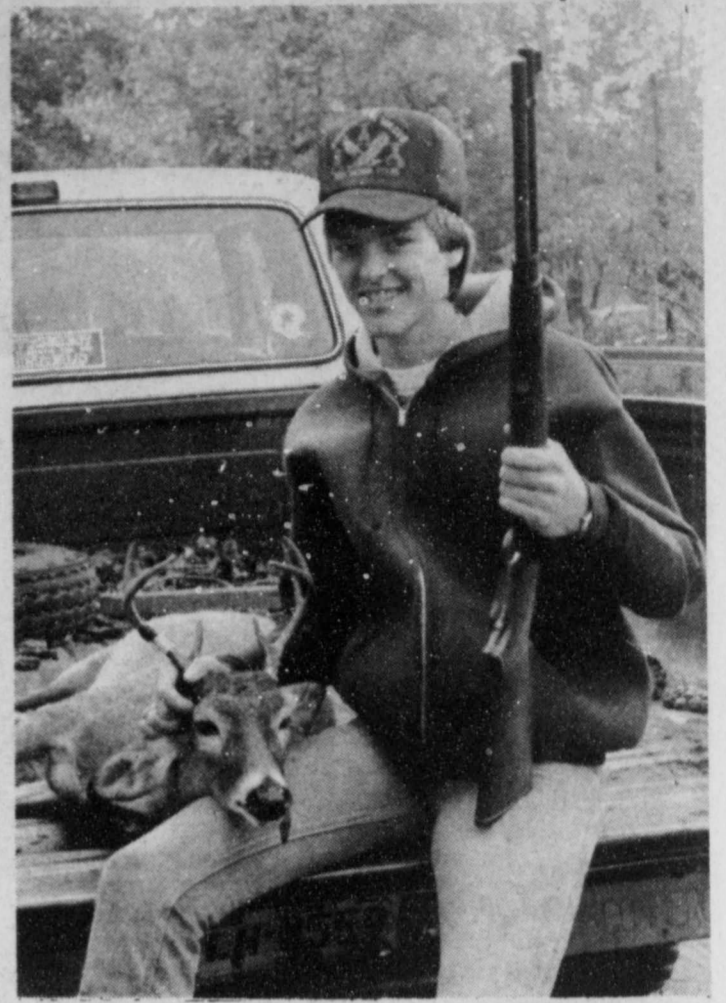

Weekly Agricultural Update

Weekly Agricultural Update... More than 200,000 Texas grown Christmas trees will be available the holiday season, says James Chandler, forester for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. These trees are available in 27 counties from 46 choose-cut operations and 33 wholesalers. This is the largest number of trees available since Christmas tree production began in Texas. Brochures listing those producers with trees for sale are available from county Extension agents throughout the area or from the Extension foresters.

Burning chemically treated wood in the fireplace or wood stove can be hazardous to your health, according to Chuck Stayton, forester-wood products for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Chemically treated wood can give off toxic vapors. Several reports in medical journals document health problems resulting from burning chemically treated wood. Since many people burn wood scraps for kindling or as a substitute for round or split logs, they should be particularly careful about the wood used. If there is a doubt about whether the wood has been chemically treated, Stayton suggests not burning it and obtaining wood from a different source.
