FERGUSON WAS NOMINATED GOVERNOR SUBMISSION EFFECTIVELY DEFEATED

FERGUSON ENDORSES PRESIDENT WILSON

The position of Mr. Ferguson, Democratic nominee for Governor, on the National Democratic Administration, is fully expressed in the following statement, which he gave out Tuesday July 28th:

"In the last few days the idea seems to have gained some prevalence that I would be opposed to the endorsement of the Wilson Administration at the coming El Paso convention. While in my speech at Marlin and other places during the campaign I questioned the propriety of President Wilson, and other high officials, attempting to dictate or suggest to the people of Texas who they should vote for for Governor, and while I in no way recede from that position and still think that it was unfortunate that President Wilson should have been drawn into the Texas campaign, yet I deem action on his part only as personal indiscretion and it should in no manner be the cause for dissension between Democrats and their allegiance to Democratic policies and platforms.

"For this reason I want it distinctly understood that I am in favor of and it would please me to see the people of Texas in their various county conventions next Saturday instruct their delegates to the El Paso convention to vote for indorsement of the present Democratic Administration and to approve the sincere efforts of President Wilson in carrying out the will of the people, as expressed through their representatives at the Baltimore convention.

"I consider the principles set forth at the Baltimore convention binding upon all Democrats at least until such time as another National Democratic convention shall be held and hope that the El Paso convention will so declare."

CUNNINGHAM ENDORSES WILSON

Judge J. E. Cunningham of this city, one of Governor-elect J. E. Ferguson's strongest supporters, one who delivered many speeches and met several speakers in joint debate in behalf of Mr. Ferguson's candidacy, stated this morning in reference to the State convention at El Paso that he thinks the convention should endorse the Wilson administration and confine the platform to such state issues alone as were laid down in Mr. Ferguson's opening speech at Blum, Texas.

The question of free raw material, which Ex-Senator Bailey has stated he will endeavor to have the El Paso convention place in its platform, is a national issue, according to Mr. Cunningham, and should be ignored by the Ferguson forces. Continuing Mr. Cunningham said:

"My judgment is that Ex-Senator Bailey supported Col. Ball for governor with a view of getting control of the political situation in Texas, failing in this he will now seek to hammer the administration of Mr. Ferguson. I think the wise course for the Ferguson forces at El Paso would be to endorse the Wilson administration and confine the platform to such State issues alone as were laid down in Ferguson's Blum speech. National prohibition, national woman's suffrage and the question of free raw material are exclusively national issues and should not be included in the platform at El Paso. An expression on any one of these issues, would necessarily mean an expression on all of them and would embarrass the incoming administration. Mr. Ferguson has been nominated by prohibitionists as well as anti-prohibitionists, and by those who favor a tariff on raw material and by those who oppose it, and an expression on any one of these national issues would be very unwise."—Abilene Reporter.

Jake Walters has come out to an interview, stating that if Mr. Bailey was going to El Paso to embarrass Ferguson with any resolutions against the Washington administration, he was going to get all the fight he wanted. There is one thing in the political record of Jake Walters, his worst enemies cannot deny, and that is, that he is independent and does the right thing at the right time. When he made his race for senator he made it on his own platform. He interfered at Austin and advised that the anti support Morris Sheppard, because the people has endorsed him, and he, Walters would not let prohibition swerve him in carrying out the endorsement of the people for Mr. Sheppard, though Sheppard was a prohibitionist. Now Mr. Walters has accepted the challenge of Mr. Bailey, who thinks he's wanting trouble, and is going to get it in the best way. The conduct of Mr. Walters should be followed by some politicians, who do more sensational things than wise ones. For two decades, there have been a bunch of trouble makers, that have thrived by political bush-whacking. They have never had any definite policies to support. They have sought on all occasions to stay in the lime light by making trouble all the time. Be it said the credit of Mr. Walters is not one of these. The only fault a pro can find with Mr. Walters is that he is an anti. His prominence and political prestige has never made a fool of him, and he always shows good judgment. A POLITICAL SOLILOQUY

Well, the Democracy of Texas spoke Saturday, and by a majority ranging from 25,000 to 40,000, has chosen Jas. E. Ferguson as its choice of the gubernatorial candidates for Governor. It has been one of the hottest and one of the worst mudslinging campaigns Texas has ever witnessed. Political rings and political bosses were disposed of by Mr. Ferguson in short order, before the campaign was barely started. His success is one of the most remarkable in American politics. He boldly announced for the high office, promising rest to legislation on the liquor question, and was vindicated by the vote of the people on submission, which was defeated by something like 30,000 votes. He also with accustomed boldness tackled the tenant question, that all other politicians and statesmen were willing to let slumber on as it has for all time. When the writer read his first announcement in the daily papers, he was impressed with the potentialities of the issues he tendered. Our judgment told us he was a winner, but our loyalty to prohibition beclouded us and we yielded our judgment to the judgment of the majority of the prohibition forces. We never indulged in any slanders or said anything in the columns of the Free Press, that will taste like crow to either of the editors of the Free Press when we go to swallow. We can now give Mr. Ferguson our hearty support, and sincerely wish for his election as will follow his nomination and predict for him a successful administration, and believe he will introduce a new era in Texas

politics. Mr. Ferguson confounded and scattered the political colons who have been exploiting Texas, and in doing this rendered a service that many prohibitionists have shown appreciation for by voting for him. He was elected because of his personality, and in north Texas, the pros showed they were willing to give him a chance. If Mr. Ferguson maintains his habit of doing his own thinking and planning his own policies, he is going to make a success of his administration. We believe he is capable of being the governor of all Texas. If there are those politicians who rallied to his support think he will run things for a cortorio of politicians they are going to be sadly disappointed. His record as a banker, when he opposed alone the Aldrich banking scheme, indicates a personality, inconsistent with ring politics. We predict that Mr. Ferguson will strive to accomplish some fundamental progressive policies, and will have the people behind him if he can rise above resentment and a desire to punish former enemies. Those who have opposed him should now co-operate with him and help him to do all he can for the commercial, economic and social advancement of Texas. It will do no good to nag and oppose him. We hope that he will be able to forgive his former opponents, and have a desire to make all Texas a governor, and that he will not have a resentment against the national administration, as will be a source of discord. He will do well to help solidify state and national democracy.

There is a general complaint among consumers that many of their local grocers and merchants have a tendency to substitute when certain brands of goods are asked for. This they do without consulting the customer, taking a chance that the patron is "easy-going" and will not mind. Those who are not so hazardous offer a substitute with the explanation that they have the brand requested, but that the trademarked article is too expensive, for which reason they wish to offer something "just as good, if not better" and give the customer the benefit of the lower price. If the consumer "bites," the merchant sells the inferior article at a big profit. Should he not be so discreet as to keep the advertised article, he does not always say so. Instead, he wheedlingly offers the substitute for examination, dwelling upon its superior merits and low sale price.

He assures the customer that as soon as the article is well known as the advertised goods the sale

price will take a jump, so now is the time to avail oneself of the wonderful opportunity. The pacified customer, either partially or wholly convinced, buys the much-lauded article, and helps to swell the heavy profits of the merchant.

The woman who requests a certain brand of tea, for example, has a right to receive exactly what she asks for. The woman who knows good tea will not buy a nameless grade, any more than she would purchase a nameless watch!

These are a few of the reasons why women favor standard of price. Mrs. Christine Frederick, who appeared before the House Judiciary Committee recently, summarized her position and that of the Housewives' League by saying:

WORKING FOR GOOD ROAD

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas R'y Co. has been arranging for some time to run a Special Good Roads Demonstration train over its lines in Texas for the general benefit of the public and I have been in correspondence with Mr. T. L. Peeler, industrial commissioner of the Katy, in regard to the matter. They propose to stop the train at places where they are assured of a good crowd of representative citizens and deliver lectures on the best methods of building good roads, exhibit samples of road materials and models showing sectional views of road construction, etc.

I presented the question to a number of our citizens, to the Mayor and County Judge, all of whom were pleased with the prospect of securing first-hand information from expert road engineers, without cost, and promised their co-operation in securing a good attendance, County Judge Smith agreeing to try to have the county commissioners and road overseers in attendance. I communicated these facts to Mr. Peeler and am in receipt of a letter from him saying that the special train will stop at Haskell reaching here at 3 o'clock p. m. Friday Aug. 7th, and remaining until 4:30.

Mr. Peeler writes that the train will carry the officers of the Texas Good Roads Association, a representative of the A. & M. College and the Good Roads Dept. of the U. S. Government, a representative of the National Good Roads Association and representatives of the M. K. & T. Railway Co. of Texas, and that these experts will lecture on the scientific construction of roads, exhibit models of approved road construction, samples of best materials, etc.

This furnishes an opportunity seldom offered to get correct, high class information on a vital subject, without cost to us, and all should avail themselves of it. Even if we are not prepared to make use of it now it must prove of great value at some future time, whenever we do enter upon the building of roads. It is an especially good opportunity for our county commissioners and road overseers to secure information that will prove of great value to them and through them to the people they represent, and I sincerely hope to see every one of them present on August 7th at 3 p. m.

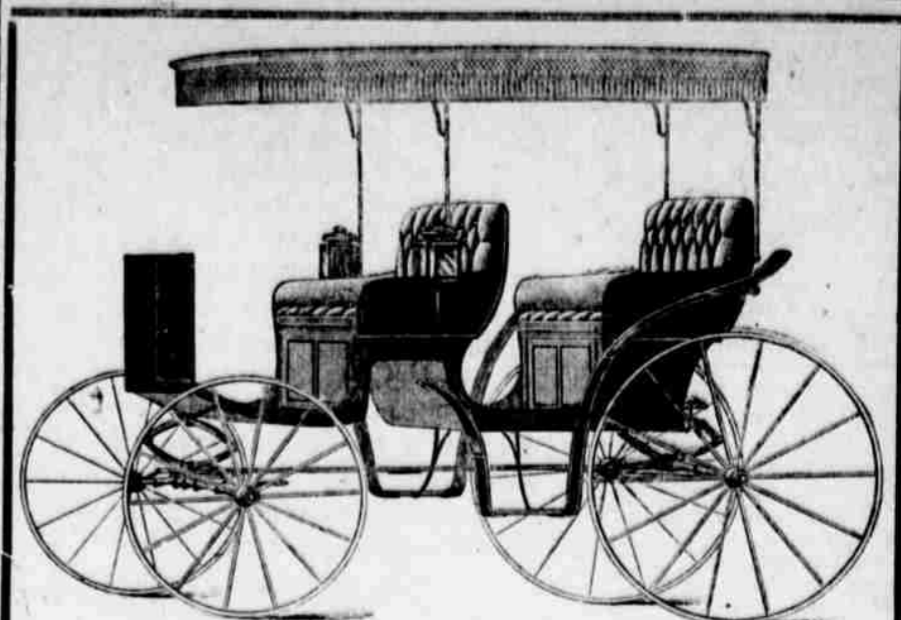

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Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Articles XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution—Providing for Authorizing Counties Bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to Build Seawalls

[S. J. R. No. 22.]

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls by adding Section 7a, so as to authorize such counties to build sea-walls and designate sea-wall reclamation districts for the protection of life and property from storm overflow, and to build or condemn land for sea-wall and reclamation districts, the county to have State's title to the roads and bay shore line to low tide within the district, and the right to issue district bonds for acquiring and developing the district and building the sea-walls, and when district is developed as townsite to sell such portions of the land as not reserved for public use by the county.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas be proposed to the voters of the State of Texas for their adoption in accordance with law, and that the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to add Section 7a of Article XI, and that Section 7a of Article XI shall read as follows to-wit:

Section 7a. Where protection against the waters of the Gulf of Mexico is needed for protection of life, health, property or the sea-wall, any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico may acquire title to the land for said sea-wall or sea-wall reclamation district as designated by the county Commissioners' court by purchase or condemnation of all the land desired for sea-wall and land for the sea-wall reclamation district from the sea-wall to bay shore tide line boundary of the property abutting on the bay, and the State hereby cedes to the county, for such district, for reclamation and general uses of the district, the title to bay shore lands in the district between the property tide line boundary and the low tide line of the bay shore, and any land in the reclamation district that may have been retained by the Republic of Texas or the State for roads when the lands adjacent were platted and sold, and the county is given the right to dredge in the bay or in the gulf for fill for the district, and right to sell the land when reclaimed and laid off as townsite or otherwise, and where condemnation is used to acquire the land the proceedings to be as under the Statutes for condemnation for railroads, provided that the condemnation shall vest title in fee in the coun-

ty, and county may issue bonds or other evidence of district indebtedness for acquiring the property, building the sea-wall, reclamation developments and all incident thereto as expenses of sea-wall and reclamation district, with lien on land and such terms and conditions as county, through its commissioners' court may deem best, and the county commissioners' court shall appoint two persons who are owners of land within the district, and who desire to sell for reclamation and buy back from the county when reclaimed, who, with the county judge as chairman, shall continue a sea-wall reclamation district commission, whose compensation shall be fixed by the court, and this commission has power to make all rules and regulations for acquiring the land of district sea-wall building, reclaiming and plating land of district, issuing bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for same, subject, however, to all such rules, regulations and acts of the commission being authorized and approved and ratified by county commissioners' court. The district must bear all expenses of sea-wall and purchase of the land and expenses of filing (filling) same and other expenses, and the same shall not in any way involve the credit of the county or be a basis for a tax by the county on general lands of the county unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the property taxpayers of the county voting at a special election therefor. It is further provided that any owner of land in a proposed district may subscribe and pay for the district commission, when organized, as the pro rata of his land of the expense of the wall, reclamation, plating as town lots on a basis such area of land is to be the whole land of the reclamation district and sea-wall, and at any time before the completion of the district may surrender the bonds and receive from the county a bond for title for his land in town lots, less streets and alleys deducted therefrom, for which on surrender deed may be demanded from the county after the district is walled, filled and platted into streets, alleys and lots, and bonds so bought shall so provide. It is further provided that no district shall be formally designated by the county commissioners' court until owners of at least one-half of the proposed area of district petition therefor, and subscribe out for bonds for repurchase from the county as herein provided. This amendment may be acted on without delay of legislation in aid thereof, or legislative action may be had in furtherance thereof if desired by the county, acting through its commissioners' court.

Be it further resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas for their ratification and adoption at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and at such election those favoring the ratification and adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls," and those opposing the adoption and ratification of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." Proclamation of such election shall be made by the Governor, as required by the Constitution and the law, and there is appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the ex-

pense of advertising and holding such election.
(Note.—S. J. R. No. 22 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 24, nays 1; and Senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 27, nays 0; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 114, nays 0.)

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution, Providing for the Initiative and Referendum.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION.
To amend Section 1, of Article 3, of the constitution of the state of Texas, so as to give to the people, or reserve to them, the power to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any act of the Legislature.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read:
Section 1. The legislative powers of this State shall be vested in a Senate and House of Representatives, which, together, shall be styled "The Legislature of the State of Texas," but the people reserve to themselves power, as herein provided, to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any law, or any part of any law enacted by the Legislature. The Legislature shall provide by law for submitting to the vote of the people, upon the petition of twenty per cent. of the qualified voters of the State the enactment of laws and the approval or rejection of any law enacted by the Legislature.
Be it further resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas: that the above and foregoing is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Texas for members of the Legislature, for their adoption or rejection as a part of the Constitution of this State, and shall be voted on by such electors at the regular election of officers to be held throughout the State, on the Second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and those voting for the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 1 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum;" and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum." And the foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four consecutive weeks, commencing at least three months before the election at which it is to be voted upon, in one weekly newspaper in each county in this State, in which such a newspaper may be published. The Governor shall make proclamation of such election upon said proposed amendment by publication as aforesaid, and as required by the Constitution and laws, and the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is now appropriated out of any fund in the Treasury nor otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of making such proclamation and publication and holding said election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, Amending Section 24, Article 3 of the Constitution Increasing Compensation of the Legislature and Extending Length of Regular Session.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION.
Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section No. 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.
Section 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of State officers, or at a previous general election, in case a general election for the State shall be sooner ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, and extension of term of regular sessions, so that the said Section shall read as follows:
Section 24. The members of the Legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200.00) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the Legislature is held, payable in equal installments on the Twentieth days of January, April, July, and October of the year in which the regular session is held, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held in the year next succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes, and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.
Sec. 2 The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, at the first general election to be held in this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution increasing compensation of the Legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the Legislature." Those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot the words: "Against amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution increasing compensation of the members of the Legislature and extending the term of regular sessions of the Legislature."
Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated, out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.
(Note.—S. J. R. No. 26 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 26, nays 0, and Senate concurred in house amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 1; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 101, nays 22.)
