The burglars took the cash register and about \$30 in change, all cash being removed from the business. Red River County Sheriff's Department has the two burglaries under investigation.

Barbara Russell Is CF Chairperson

Mrs. Barbara Russell has been the chairperson of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's campaign in Talco & Bogata to help "give a child some breathing room." On behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis community, the children, their families and their friends, thank you to the people who helped raise \$820.28 for research, public education, and patient care. Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children and young adults. It is an inherited disease that attacks the lungs and digestive system. A thick sticky mucus is produced which blocks digestion, obstructs breathing, destroying lung tissue and eventually causing the death of the child. Through research funded by

donations and collected by volunteers, the average life expectancy of a child with CF has been extended from three years twenty years ago to twenty years today. Cystic fibrosis is a recessive gene disease, so that for a child to have CF, both mother and father must carry the gene. Unfortunately, one out of twenty of us is an unknowing carrier of the CF gene, and there is no way of telling who is a CF carrier until a baby is born with cystic fibrosis. The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation continues to support the research that will find a carrier test. Thank you for your contribution. Sincerely, Andrea Rutledge Campaign Director

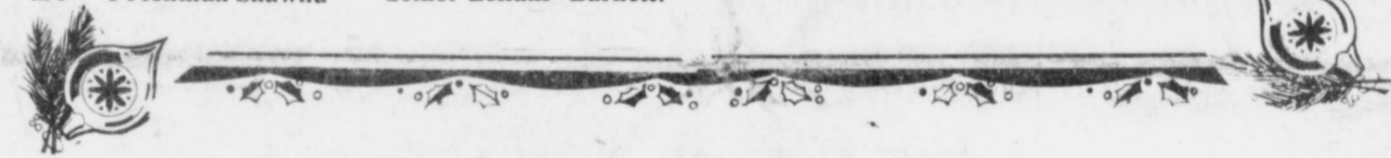

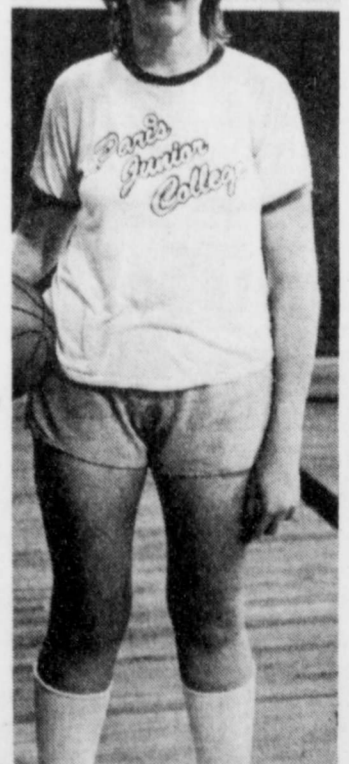
of Paris, said Steve Brown, new director of choral activities for PJC. Highlighting the program will be the presentation of the John Niss Beck composition, "Visions of St. John." Taken from the book of Revelations, the work details the tribulation of the last days as envisioned by St. John and culminates with the vision of the

"Heavenly City." Beck's composition has been performed only twice in Texas and never in the East Texas area, Brown said. The PJC Chorale, the college's leading choral ensemble, is comprised of singers from every area of study at the college as any PJC student may audition. Brown said. The Dec. 4 concert will be the first under the direction of Brown, who came to PJC this fall from North Texas State University, where he was instructor and assistant choir conductor. He holds bachelor and master's degrees in music education and will receive his Ph.D. in December.

Veronica Howerton PJC Key

Veronica Howerton, 1982 graduate of Rivercrest High School and a sophomore at Paris Junior College, is the tallest member of PJC's Lady Dragons basketball team and perhaps one of the tallest women basketball players anywhere. "In the two years Veronica has played for PJC, only one other team we played had a woman player as tall as she is," said Mickey Flippen, PJC athletic director. Veronica whose nickname is "V," is 6 foot 5 inches and plays center and post for the Lady Dragons. Veronica is the "key to our season," said Lady Dragons' Coach Roy Tom Stone, explaining that she is improving this year and that if she "matures to her ability, we will have a really good year." She led the Lady Dragons to a 35-27 victory over Cooke County last week with a total of 18 points, and played her "best game of this year" Saturday against Rogers. A resident of Talco, Veronica was all-district four years and all-Red River Valley three years while at Rivercrest. The team made regionals for two years and placed second in the state one year, Veronica said; her coach was Frank Stubbelfield who is still at Rivercrest. "V" started playing basketball in the ninth grade because she thought the sport would be fun. A physical education major, she hopes to get a basketball scholarship and continue her

education at a four-year university. Eventually, she wants to coach basketball in junior high or high school. The daughter of Raymond and Jane Howerton of Talco, Veronica has two sisters. Her older sister did not play ball but the younger one, a sixth grader and 5 foot 7



plays basketball. Veronica's father is a mechanic in Mount Pleasant. At most PJC games, a group of "Veronica Howerton fans" may be seen in the stands, yelling for "V," who is easy to spot since she is four inches taller than any other Lady Dragon. But, in case you miss her, she's number 55.

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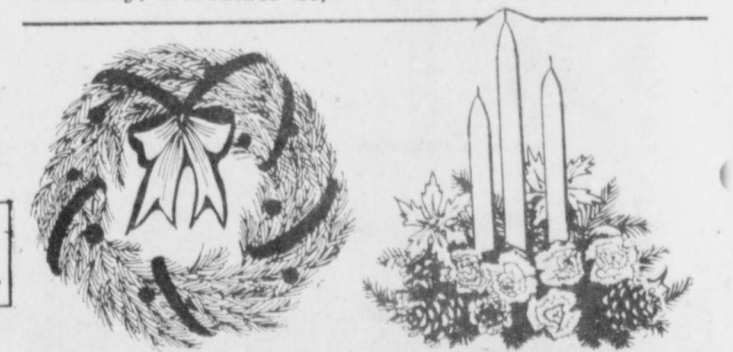

Weekly Agricultural Briefs

Proper nutrition and economical winter feeding programs are imperative for producers that expect productivity, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Cattle prices have been low and the condition of pastures and cattle varies across East Texas because of differences in rainfall.

Winter feeding is always a problem for the beef cattle producer. Dry pregnant cows can be maintained through the winter on a seven percent protein ration if sufficient dry grass is available, Grooms says. Later, supplemental protein in the form of salt limited rations, range cubes, molasses blocks or liquid supplements can adequately meet the protein needs before calving.

These protein supplements can also be used while the cows are cleaning up the pastures. The important consideration is to get the cows in condition prior to calving if they are to calve and rebreed or

schedule. Grooms says cows that are in thin-to-poor condition may need a higher protein and energy ration to gain sufficient weight to be in condition for calving and rebreeding.

Once the producer starts feeding hay, the hay feeding should be continuous. Feed the poorer quality hay to dry cows and save the higher quality hay for cows with calves, Grooms points out. The nutritional requirements of the lactating cow is almost double the requirements for maintaining a dry cow.

Now is a good time to have hay tested for nutrient content so that hay quality and class of livestock can be considered when feeding. Dry cows can be fed a lower quality hay than is fed to cows with calves.

Reeves suggests feeding hay which is stored outside first to eliminate possible loss of quality. Feed supplements will be more expensive this year, thereby making forage testing more important.

Entry deadline for the Texas State Hay Show is December 15. County Extension agents have information on the show and entry requirements. There is no entry fee and all producers are encouraged to enter. The state hay show is January 24, 1984 in Houston during the American Forage and Grassland Council meeting.

The Texas Forage and Grassland Council is hosting that national meeting next year. Reeves says that all forage producers are welcome to attend the meeting. Numerous presentations on producing forages, forage quality and feeding forages will be given. Additionally, many exhibits will be set up for viewing.

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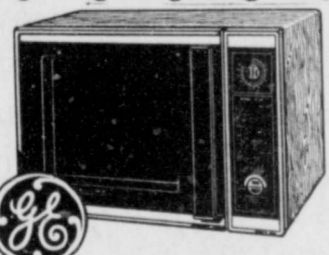
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

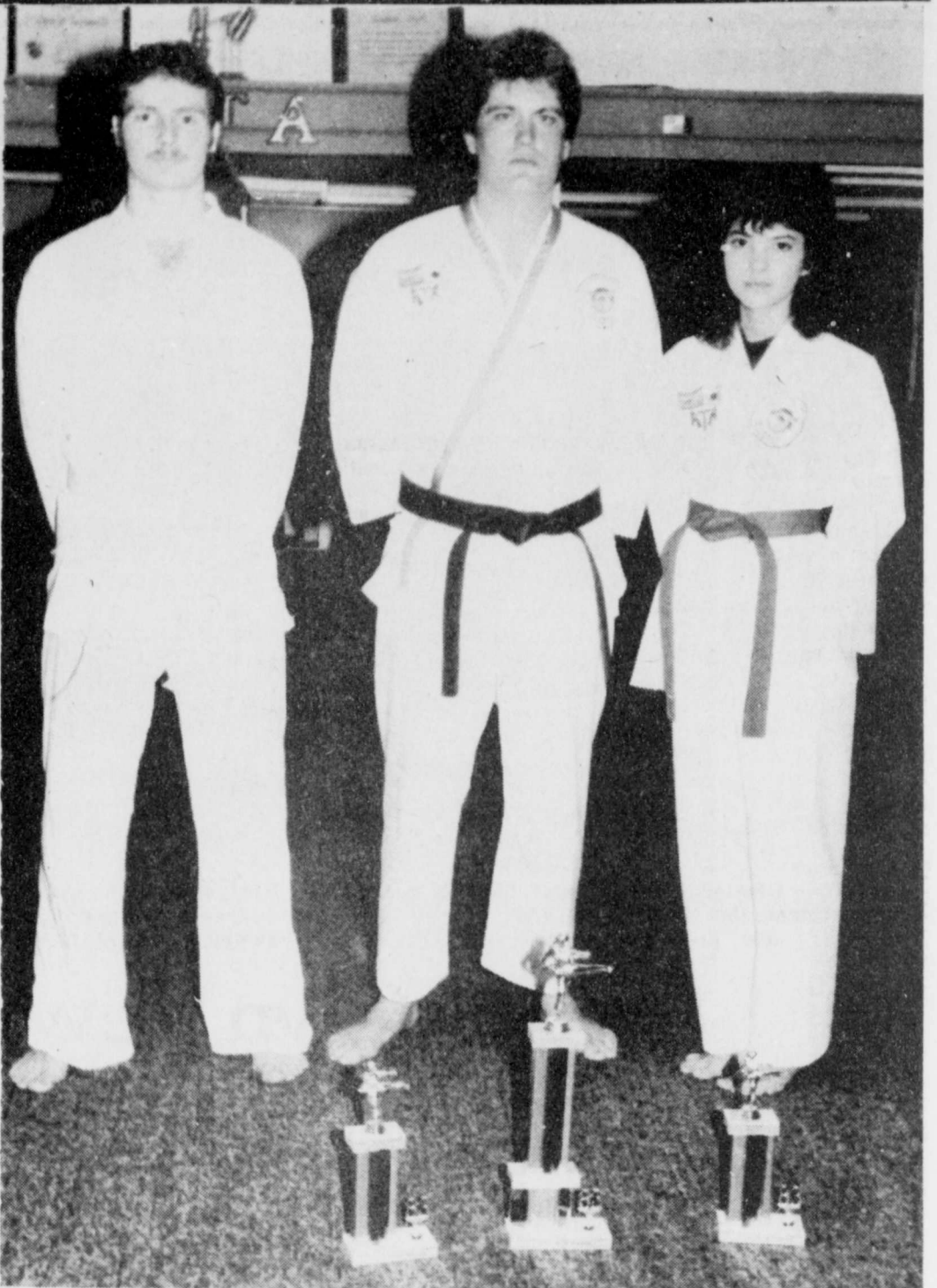

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East Texas Eating

Bright red, fresh cranberries contribute a refreshing tartness to the traditional Thanksgiving dinner for many of us. They fit beautifully, too, into meals from now on through the holiday season.

Fresh Cranberry Mold is one of my favorite cranberry dishes. I make it much more often, now that I've its preparation to the food processor. It can be tucked away in the refrigerator, jelling within

20 minutes after you assemble the ingredients. It can be done just about as fast with the blender, but I have a tendency to "blend" the ingredients finer than I like, with that appliance. Prior to the blender and food processor method days, Fresh Cranberry Mold was most of the afternoon project.

This recipe makes a big, delicious molded salad. Or it will make several smaller salads. It keeps well in the refrigerator. Do try it-for your Thanksgiving dinner if

you get your paper soon after it comes off of the press-or in the coming holiday season.

Fresh Cranberry Mold
1 envelope unflavored gelatine
1(3 oz.) box cherry Jello
½ cup cold water
½ cup boiling pineapple juice or juice from can + water
¾ cup sugar
1 orange, cut in pieces and seeded
2 ½ cups cranberries
a 15 ½ oz. or 20 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
½ cup sliced celery
½ cup pecans
1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Lettuce (to unmold on)
Mayonnaise (½ cup, approximately)

Stop machine. Add pineapple. Process only until mixed. Turn into 6 cup mold, or smaller molds. Chill until firm. Dip the mold in warm water (up to the rim) after loosening the salad around the edges with a thin spatula or knife. Invert onto lettuce leaves. Serve with a dish of mayonnaise in the center.

Fresh Cranberry Mold is delicious with turkey in any form, with chicken, with beef or pork. It is a very pretty salad, too. The cooks who attended the cooking school that I conducted at Rivercrest last month were delighted with its taste, appearance, and texture. Do try it.

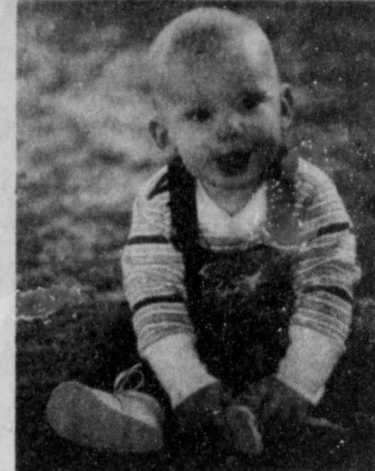

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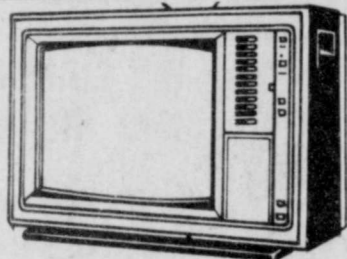

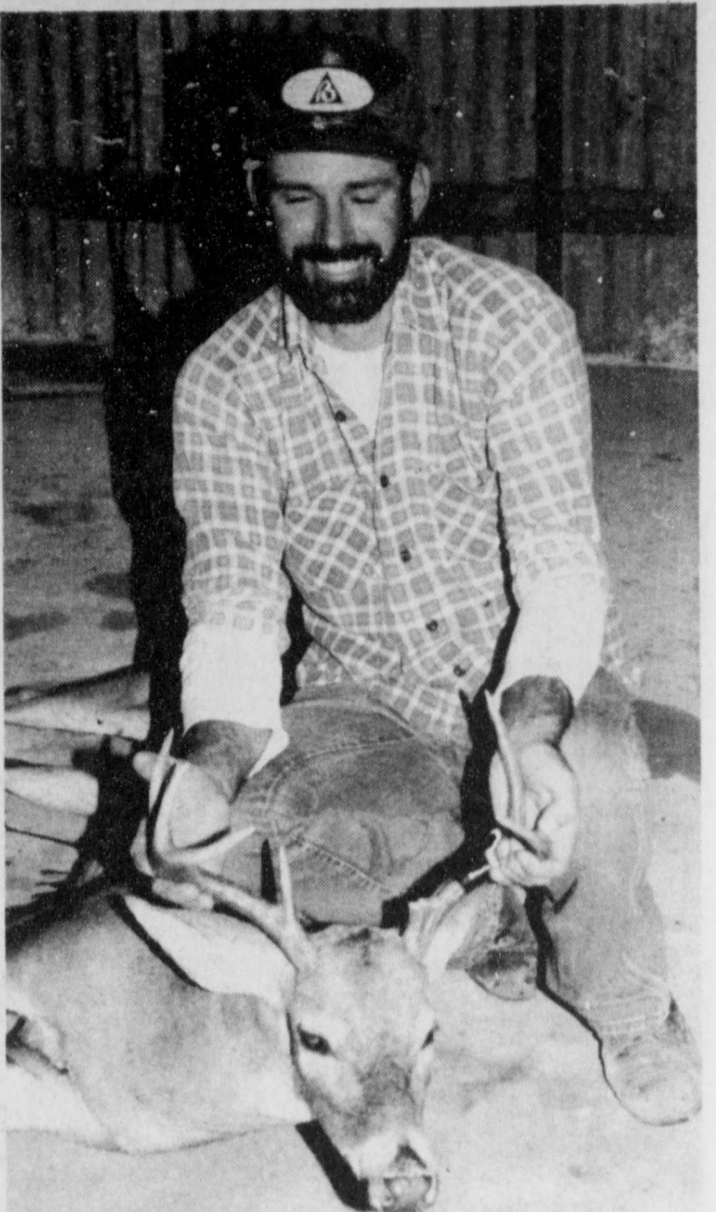

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

Until my husband retired a few months ago, we spent our whole married life living in a New York apartment building. We knew absolutely nothing about building maintenance. If a faucet dripped or a light bulb failed, we picked up the phone and someone came by to take care of it. We have just moved into our first home. It is in the Midwest, on a very beautiful small lake, but 15 miles from the nearest town. I understand we may be in for the worst winter in decades and it bothers me. There will be no one to call when something goes wrong with the plumbing, lighting or heating. My husband doesn't even know how to turn off the main water line. I wonder if it would help if we got some books on home maintenance from the library and read up on some of the things we know nothing about.

Do-it-yourself books are available at public libraries and book stores. Some are very detailed and clearly explained how many small problems around the home can be handled. Become acquainted with some of the professionals in the nearest town—plumbers, electricians, etc.—before an emergency arises. If your home is very old, you should have plumbing and wiring inspected before the severest weather arrives. The plumber can tell you whether or not you have pipes that should be insulated and how to shut off the water in the event of an emergency. The electrician should be consulted about the steps you need to take when a fuse is blown, the adequacy of your electrical system, etc. You will probably have to pay a service charge for the call, but it's a good investment. Another good investment would be supplemental sources of heat and light. Ask the professionals.

Early Registration Set At PJC
