

Rebelettes Take Second Place In Tourney

The Rivercrest Rebelettes met the Cooper Bulldogettes in their opening game in the Rivercrest Invitational Tournament held last weekend. The Rebelettes were led by Delores Simpson who scored ten points during the contest. The Rebelettes trailed 25-24 at the half but managed to gain and hold the lead during the second half. Rivercrest took the game

49-45 and advanced to meet Roxton. The Rebelettes overcame the Lionettes in overtime play 46-43. Delores Simpson tipped in a missed free throw to tie the game at 41 with 23 seconds left in regulation play. Kristi Foxworthy put through two free throws with four seconds left in overtime to give Rivercrest the needed edge. Mary Savage led the scoring with 10 points.

The Rebelettes went on to meet the West Lamar Leopardettes. Both teams went into the contest undefeated but it was West Lamar who kept their record intact. The Rebelettes were defeated 39-32. Stacy Griffin led the Rebelettes with ten points. West Lamar's Mitchell scored nine of her 11 points in the fourth period to counter the Rebelette attack.

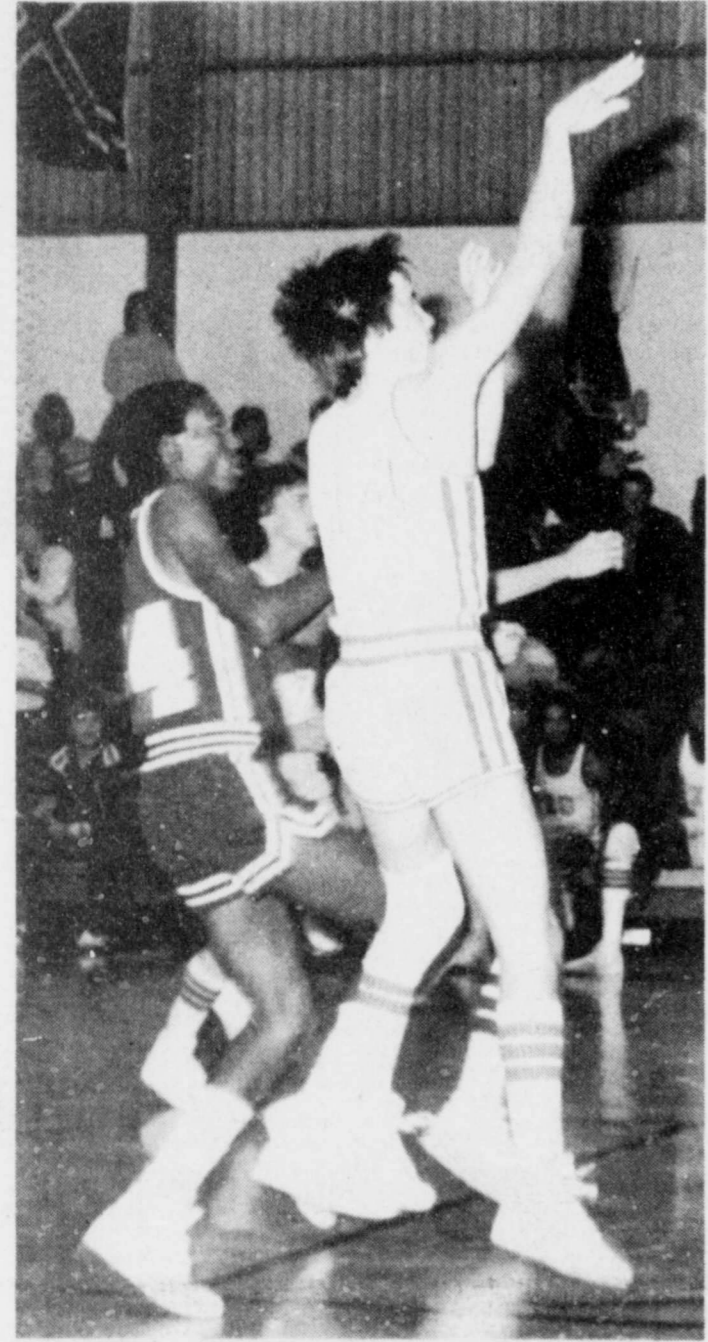
The first period ended with the Rebelettes down 12-10. After leading 20-14 at the half, the Leopardettes led Rivercrest until two inside shots by Stacy Griffin and a shot at the buzzer by Kristi Foxworthy tied the game at the end of the third stanza. West Lamar was just too quick in the final quarter. They gained a seven point lead and held it for the win. The Rivercrest Rebelettes defeated the Cooper

Bulldogs 50-44 in their first round of the tourney. The Rebelettes led at the end of the final three periods and at one time held a 12 point advantage in the third quarter. In the final period, Cooper managed to narrow the gap to four with one minute to go. Rebel guard, Kelly Jeffery stole a pass and drove the length of the floor to score the final points of the contest. James Anderson scored 14

points and Anthony Brown added 11. Kelly Jeffery and Scott Branch contributed eight and seven, respectively. Rivercrest advanced to a match with the North Lamar Panthers Friday. The Rebelettes fell to the Panthers 53-39. North Lamar outscored Rivercrest 15-7 in the second period, extending a 14-12 first quarter lead to 29-19 at the halfway mark. Defense

enabled the Panthers to hold their lead for the victory. Anthony Brown scored 14 points and Scott Branch hit for 10. West Lamar defeated the Rebelettes 64-35 Saturday to claim third place in the tourney. Scott Branch was the only Rebel to score in double digits, totaling 10 points. The Leopards jumped to an early 18-5 lead that held throughout the match. The

Rebs went into the halftime locker room down 35-17. West Lamar scored 16 points to Rivercrest's one in the third period. The Rebs closed the gap in the final period but couldn't overcome the Leopard's lead.

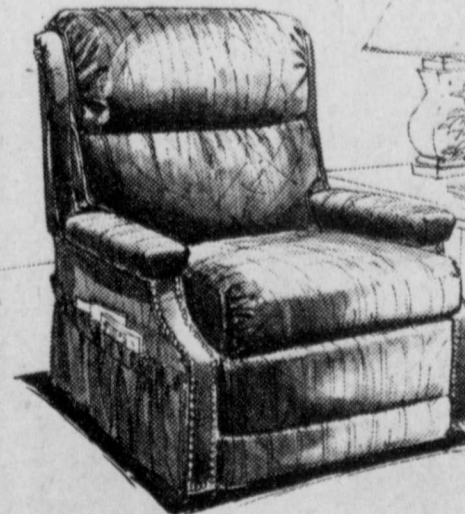


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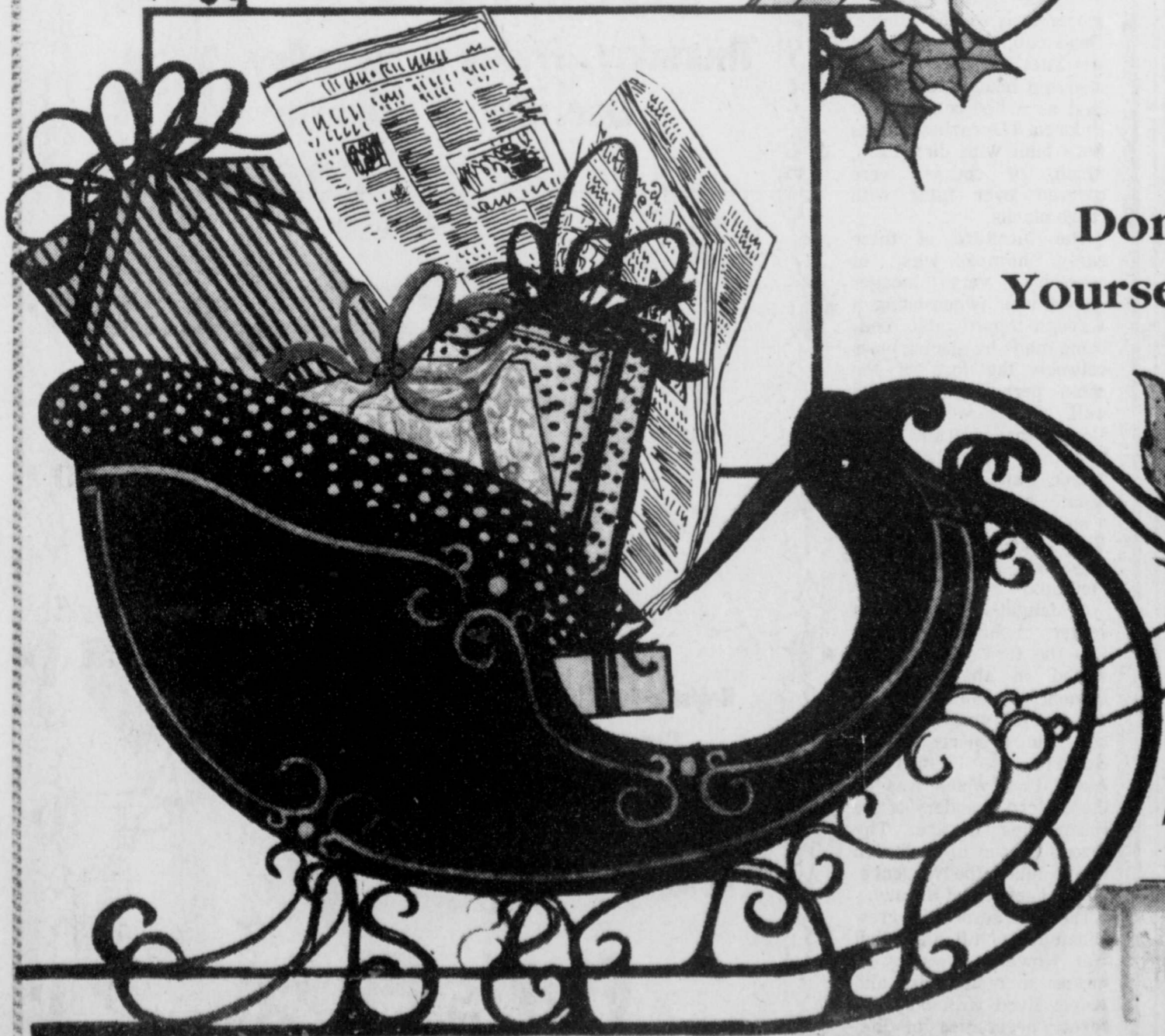
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History Of The Early Days Of Bogata

This is the second installment of the "History of Bogata" as written in the 1930's by Jack Rodgers. There will be more to come each week, so if you are interested in history, especially on a local level, here is some more!

These early pioneers had many skirmishes with the Indians who were plentiful in nearly all parts of Texas at this early day. Some renowned Indian fighters

aided in protecting this early settlement from these marauders. One of these men was Henry Stout for whom the settlers had the highest regard. Stout lake, a few miles southeast of the settlement, was named after this man. As a matter of personal interest rather than a historical fact it is well to note that the eldest child of this Henry Stout was; fifty-seven years older than his youngest child, the

youngest child being born when Stout was in the seventies.

The Indians were not so successful in killing as in the art of marauding and stealing. Anything of any value to the settlers were placed in the most inconspicuous places available so as to be secure from the thieving hands of the Indians. When an Indian raid was expected, all the settlers congregated the women folks at one of the houses, most often the Humphries home, and, leaving some of the eldest men and the youngest boys to protect them, the most able bodied men would sally forth to meet the marauders.

other little hamlet of the Southland. However, they were in no immediate danger of hostility from the enemy, but they sacrificed much in sending food and clothing to the Confederate soldiers. Although money was a rare medium of exchange in these days, the settlers added their bit to the cause of secession.

The people, up until the close of the Civil War, had not raised any cotton in quantities. Larger plots of ground were now cleared in the wooded sections and sod was turned on "Blossom Prairie" so as to start the cultivation of corn and

cotton in quantities to care for the needs of the growing population, as well as to be able to have a "money" crop, and provide for the ever increasing demand of the foreign markets.

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The early settlers of Maples Springs experienced the same difficulties and hardships as any other small settlement of Texas at that time, and as volumes have been written concerning this early life, little needs to be said about it. Cloth was spun or woven or brought from far away markets at a rather fancy price. Animal skins were called into use in many instances, not only for household use but also for use as clothing. Owing to abundant game found in the woods, the early settlers experienced no difficulty in providing themselves with plenty of fresh meat, and this, together with the corn and other products raised in the family "patch" of four or five acres, and the fuel and water that was available in the very front door of the settlers, afforded the settlers a seemingly carefree existence. Later, when these people wished for luxuries they drove overland, in their ox-wagons to Jefferson, Texas, usually carrying something to trade and returned with many products of the outside world.

It might be well to note the type of houses used by the earliest settlers, and a few things might be said about their mode of living. As wood was plentiful, the first houses were built of logs. They seldom had windows with glass till a much later date, as glass was then considered a costly luxury. If a window was left it was covered over with a skin or cloth, which could be removed or left in place according to the weather. A door was usually made for these windows so as to be able to fortify the house. A door was left in one end and a bar was also made for the door in the event of fortification. Roofs were made by making rough shingles from the trees, when the proper tools were available. These cabins were small at first later, possibly a small sideroom being added to be used as a bedroom for the children. The earliest cabins were built with dirt floors, which, of course, were covered over later with rough planks.

The furniture of these early homes was, of necessity, very meager indeed, usually consisting of a rough topped table, beds being made by placing poles between the logs of the cabin, perpendicular to the wall. Chairs were a few stools made from logs. Cooking utensils were scarce, and meals were usually cooked outside over a small campfire, a family being indeed fortunate if they had indoor cooking facilities.

A daughter of the first settler of Maples Springs was the first person to be buried in the new settlement. She was buried on the plot of ground that is now the property of the Bogata Cemetery Association, which was on the eastern boundary of the Humphries Estate. The second person to be buried was a child of the Neugent's, the first settlers of Rosalie.

The little settlement grew unhampered till the Civil War. However it was by no means a metropolis, and people lived with only the barest necessities of life. With the Civil War came the same suffering in this little community that was experienced in nearly every

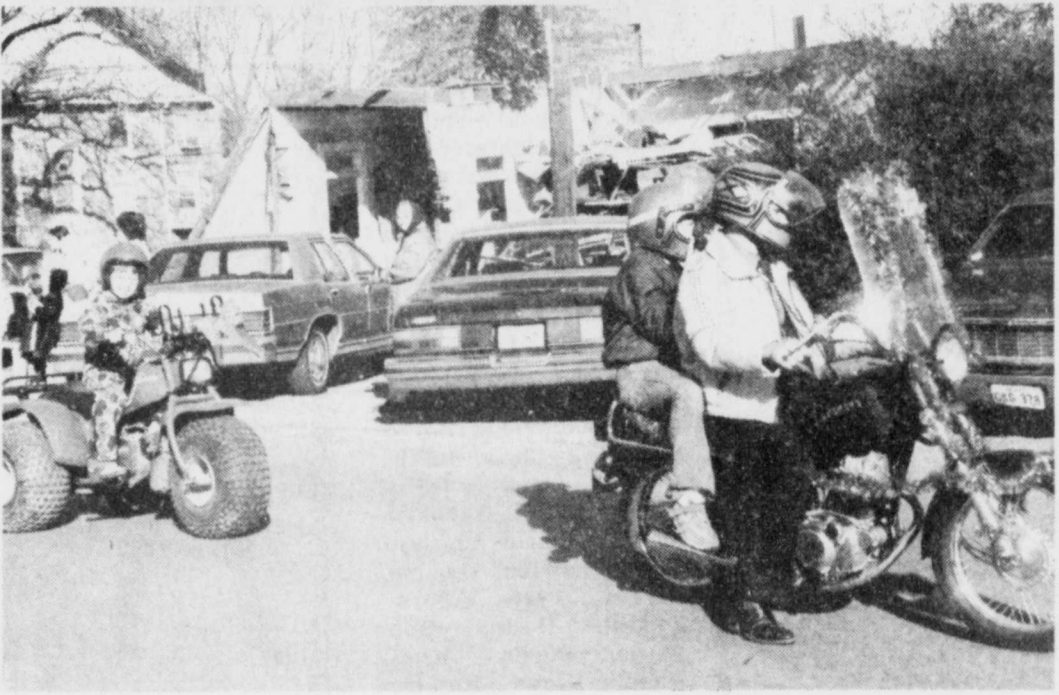

Healthy Lawns Should Start Now

Many of us have been
looking forward to the end of
lawn chores. However, now
is an excellent time to do a
few things that will make
our lawns healthier and
more appealing in time to
come.

Fertilizing in the fall can
produce great benefits. We
can prolong the green color
of our lawns and help
Bermuda and St. Augustine
recover early in the spring.
A dense turf will also be
promoted which helps resist
winter weed invasion. Fall
fertilizer prepares the lawn
for winter dormancy
through the nutrients that
come from the fertilizer.

Nitrogen is the key, and
fertilizing with a nitrogen-
rich fertilizer in the fall will
promote a good survival
rate in the winter and an
early recovery in the spring.
A 3-1-2 ration of fertilizer is
best. The first number
represents the nitrogen, the
second, potassium, and the
third, phosphorus.

Examples of 3-1-2 fer-
tilizers are 15-5-10 and 12-4-8.
If you use a 15-5-10, you
should apply between 7 and

14 pounds per 1,000 square
feet of lawn. If you use a 12-
4-8, the rate is 8-16 pounds
per 1,000 square feet.

In newly developed yards,
it's too late to plant a per-
manent lawn. To prevent
tracking in mud and sand,
you might consider planting
cereal rye, wheat or oats to
provide a soil stabilizing
effect. In the spring, this can
be turned under, and you
can plant your permanent
lawn.

If you don't care to look at
your Bermuda or St. Augus-
tine, you can overseed
with the rye grass or wheat.
The planting rate for rye
grass is at least 5 pounds per
1,000 square feet. When your
winter lawn reaches a
height of about three inches,
it's time to mow. Set your
mower at a height of two
inches.

Overseeding and fall
fertilization can be done at
the same time. If you do
overseed with a winter
grass, another application of
fertilizer six weeks later will
be needed. This overseeded
grass should slowly die out
next spring with the return
of warm weather, and the
permanent summer grass
will take over.

Your permanent lawn
should continue to be mowed
at the normal height until
dormancy. Watering should
also be continued as needed
but slack off on the
frequency to harden the turf
for winter.

For spring weed control,
apply pre-emergent her-
bicides at the end of
February and early March.
Dacthal, balan or betasan
are excellent herbicides for
the control of warm season
grasses.

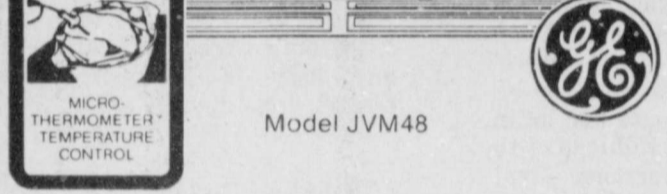
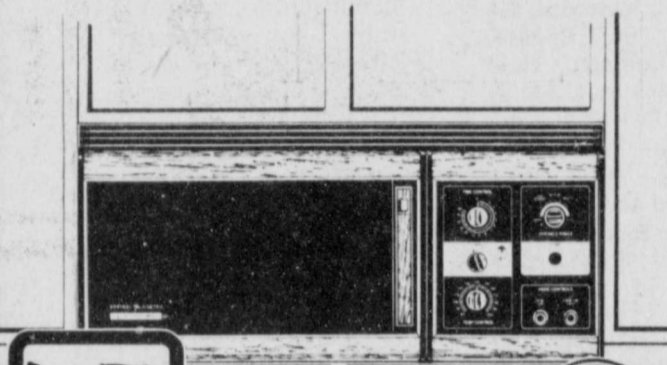

Ham 'N Turkey Sandwiches

- 2 cups Bisquick baking mix
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 package (2 1/2 ozs.) sliced turkey
- 1 package (2 1/2 ozs.) sliced ham
- 8 slices Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup coleslaw, well drained
- Mustard Topping (below)
- Margarine or butter, softened

Heat oven to 425°. Mix baking mix, milk and oil until soft dough forms; beat 20 strokes. Smooth into ball on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Knead 5 times. Roll into rectangle, 14 x 10 in.; cut into 4 rectangles, each 7 x 5 in. Cut turkey and ham slices into fourths. Layer 1/2 each of the turkey and ham slices, 1 cheese slice and 1 tbsp. coleslaw crosswise down center of each rectangle, spreading Mustard Topping between each; repeat. Bring up 5-in. sides of dough and seal; pinch ends. Place on cookie sheet; brush with margarine. Bake until brown, about 15 min. Let stand 5 min. before cutting. 4 sandwiches.
