Rebels Capture Second In Princeton

The Rivercrest Rebels took Blue Ridge by storm 99-39 in last Thursday's first round of the Princeton tournament. There were five Rebels scoring in double digits. Rivercrest hit for 28 points in the first period. Outstanding defensive play held Blue Ridge to four. The second quarter was much the same as the Rebs added another 32 to their already substantial lead. The score was 60-11 at the half. Blue Ridge tried to come back in the third period with 16 points but Rivercrest answered with another 16 of their own to bring their lead to 76-27. The Rebels hit for 23 in the fourth to bring the final score to 99-39. Scoring totals were James Anderson with 22, Scott Branch with 20, Anthony Brown with 16, Kelly Jeffery with 14, Tony Jasso with 13, Randy Galloway with eight, Kyle Hatley with four and Bobby Wisinger with two. Rivercrest moved on to meet Tom Bean in Friday's second round. The Rebs led at the end of each quarter.

There were four scoring in two digits. Rivercrest scored 12 points in the first period to Tom Bean's nine. Kelly Jeffery hit for six and Branch, Anderson and Brown each added two. The Rebs marked up 14 in the second quarter to bring the halftime mark to 26-20. They allowed their opponent 11. Coach Wood's defensive squad went to work in the third period. They allowed Tom Bean only six points while offensively the Rebs added another 14. The quarter score was 40-26. Scoring totals were Branch and Brown each with 16, Anderson and Jeffery each with 10 and Jasso and Wisinger each with two. Rivercrest advanced to the finals Saturday night against their host, Princeton. They led at the end of the first three quarters but at the end of the fourth the scoreboard read 59-59. Princeton dominated the

overtime period with ten points to the Rebs two, for a final of 69-61, Princeton. The Rebels scored 14 points in the first period and allowed their opponent only six. Anthony Brown hit for eight, and Scott Branch, Kelly Jeffery and Randy Galloway each added two.

The Rebs marked up twenty in the second period. Defensively they allowed their host only eight. The Rebs led at halftime 34-14. In the third quarter, Princeton started to close the gap. They scored nineteen points to Rivercrest's eight. This effort

brought the quarter score to 42-33. Rebels still leading. The Rebs came back with 17 more in the fourth stanza but Princeton answered with 26 to make a tied score at 59. Princeton controlled the overtime period to claim the

first place spot in the tourney. The Rebels took second place. Scoring totals were Brown with 21, Branch with 16, Anderson and Jeffery each with seven, Galloway with six and Jasso with four.

TEXAS NICKEL

I recently sat down to look at an old cookbook, published in 1932, and containing recipes of an even older time. It wasn't hard to find delicious sounding dishes, but it is amazing how much ingredients and directions have changed. Measurements were often entirely different, advocating the use of a lump of butter or lard the size of a walnut, or making a paste as thick as good gravy. A cook, advising how to cook bear steak said that "Bear should be cooked much like any other steak, but needs a very hot fire. It should be cooked in a very, very hot oven, if your oven is not so good, then you will have to cook it overdone." To cure hams, the recipes listed "500 lbs. of meat, a peck of sugar" and other large size quantities. A truly awesome recipe was for beaten biscuits. Think about it the next time you pop open a can or pour out the biscuit mix! "Take 3 pints of winter wheat flour, 1/4 lb. of lard, ice water and milk enough to make a stiff dough, mix in salt and beat with a CLUB for 25 minutes!" Although the recipe promises the

biscuits to be absolutely delectable, I wonder if they weren't very hungry after doing all that beating! The thrifty attitude of our forefathers came through clearly in the cookbook, which advocated wasting absolutely nothing. Listed in the preserving section were directions for calf's feet jelly, spiced cantaloupe, preserved oranges and cucumber catsup, plus many other more prosaic recipes. There were detailed recipes for hog's head cheese, baked calf's head, smothered catfish, terrapin and turtle soup, plus all kinds of things to do with livers, hearts, gizzards and various other less than choice cuts of meat and game. The abundance of eggs, sometimes as many as a dozen in a single dish, rich cream, milk and butter was astonishing. But most of all, to me, was the revelation of the amount of hard work and time that went into cooking before the age of pre-cut meats, pre-measured ingredients and other convenience foods. Also lurking in the back of my mind is the idea that a lot of those foods were very, very good!

Comptroller Sends Out Sales Tax Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$52 million in local sales tax payments to the 980 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax. For the second straight month the checks came earlier than usual, thanks to

taxpayers meeting the state's new earlier reporting deadline of the 20th of the month. "This payment is up 23.3 percent over the payment we sent out last December," Bullock said. "Part of this

increase comes from our continued economic recovery and part comes from the cooperation Texas taxpayers have given this office in making earlier tax payments and that way avoiding a state tax increase."

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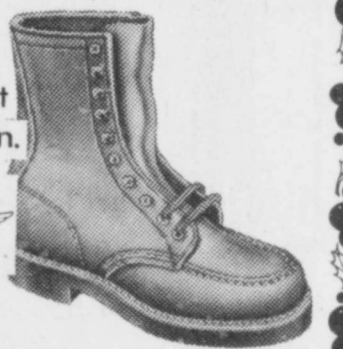
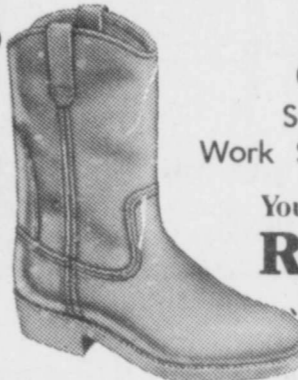
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Why?

Well, for instance, let's look at a phone that will be used on a party-line. Since customers share a common line to the telephone company switching office, each

phone has its own special ringing-cycle setting which allows the phone to know when it should ring on the party-line.

Even if you have a 'Private Line', you still may have problems.

Single-line customers may also have special dialing or ringing requirements that are not apparent. So, they purchase a new phone and sadly discover that it won't work. This is especially true for customers who may be

considering a cordless telephone or even a universal dialing telephone, a clock radio that offers telephone access capability or any other special telephone service.

Trading in your dial phone could be asking for trouble.

The joy of owning your very own 'Touch Tone' phone could turn into tragedy if your phone line is designated for a dial or pulse phone. A pushbutton 'pulse' phone will work on most lines, since it also duplicates the signal of a regular dial phone. However, a

'Touch Tone' phone emits a 'beeping' tone that requires special equipment to recognize the signal. Some dial phones, even if you have Touch Call Service, are not compatible under certain circumstances.

So, if you decide to buy a new telephone, take the time to stop by your neighborhood GTE Phone Mart and see if your particular line has any special limitations. It could possibly save you a lot of frustration and money.

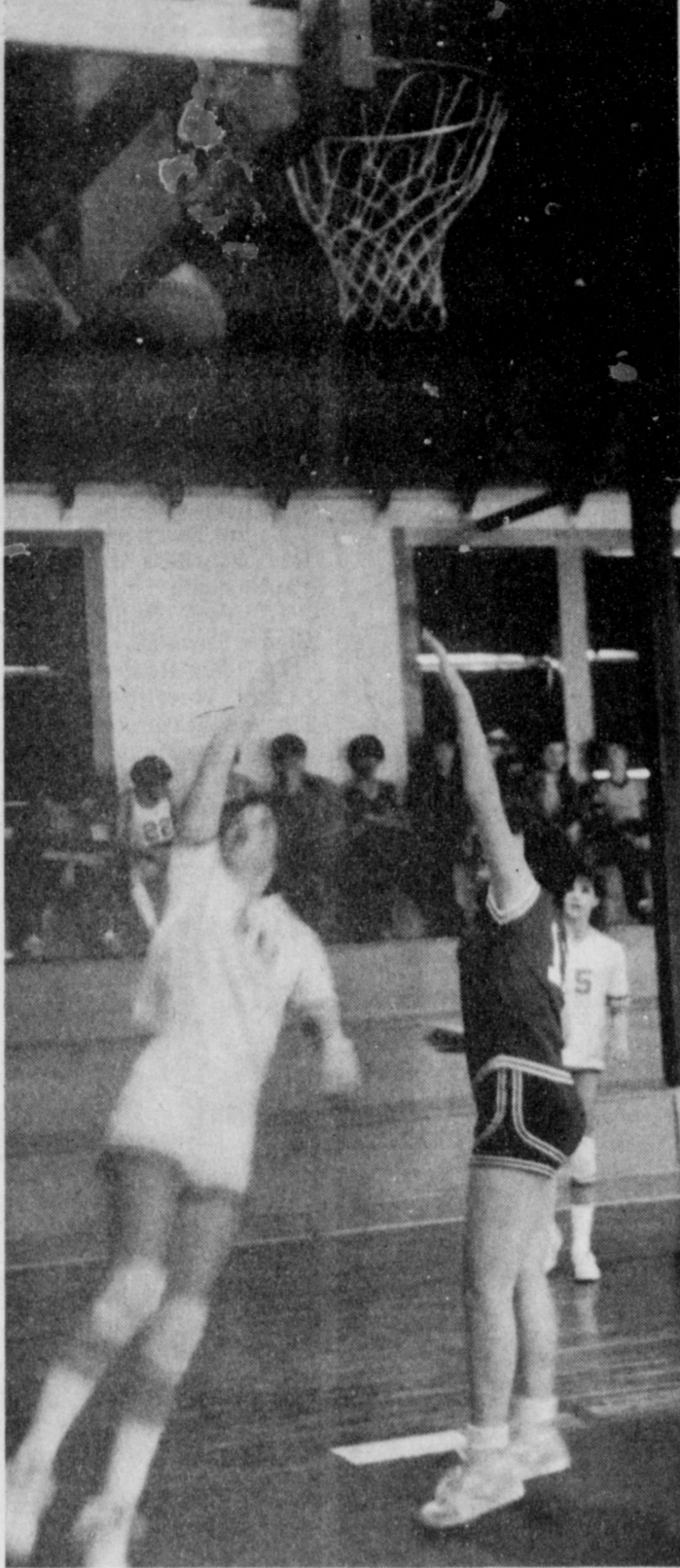
