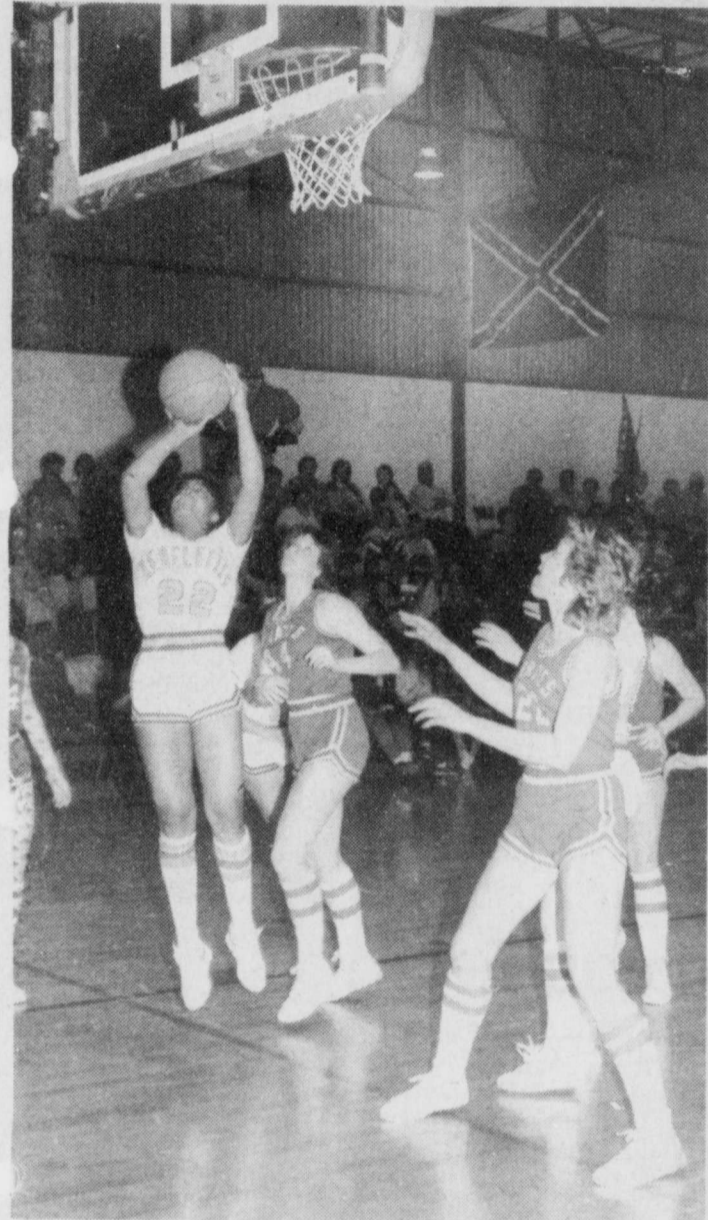
Rivercrest added 16 and 20 respectively in the third and final periods for a winning score of 61-38.

The Rebettes traveled to Big Sandy last Friday night to claim another victory 60-37. The Reb fems had little trouble with the Wildcats.

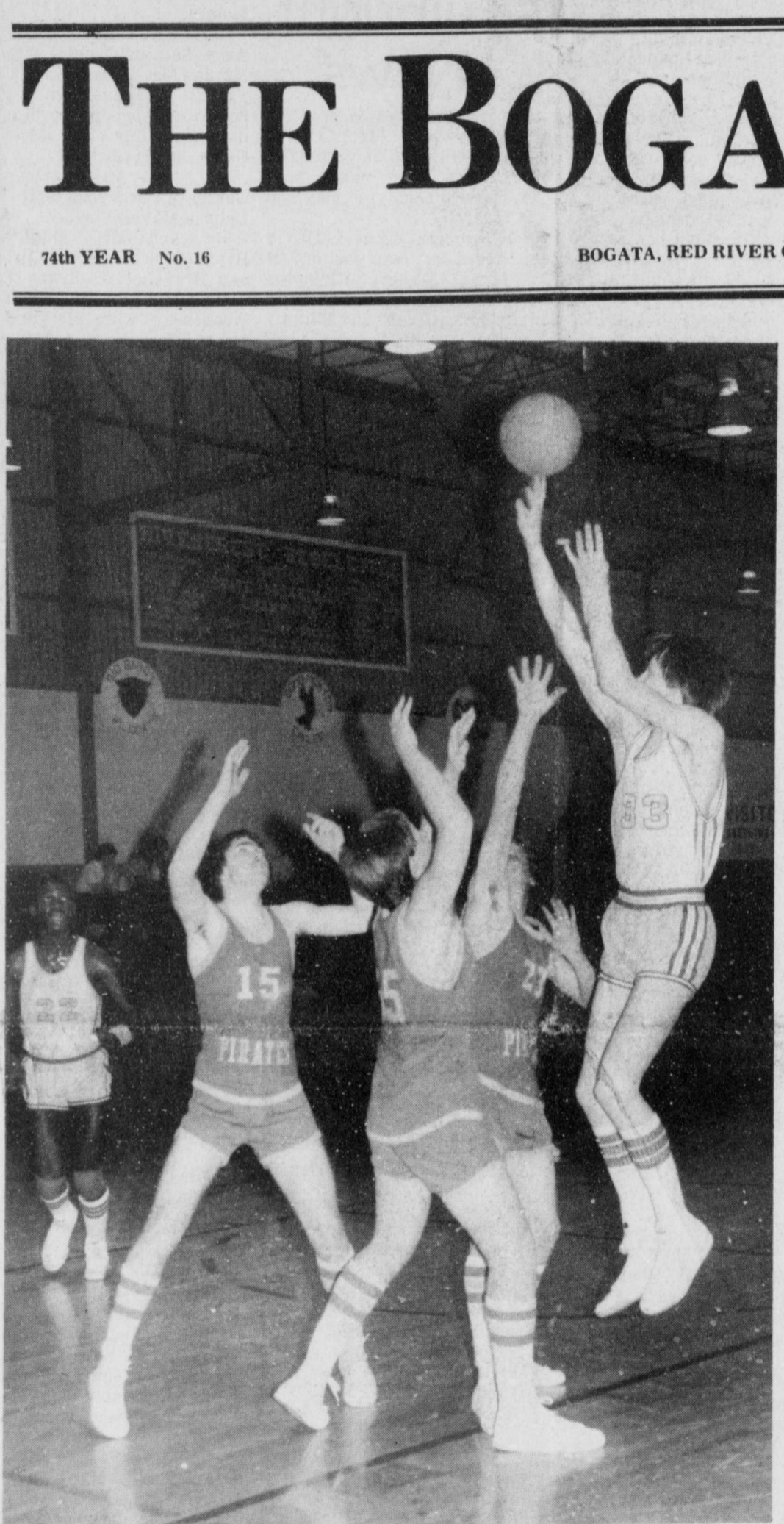
Pam Ward had one of her better games on offense against Big Sandy. Mary Savage played her usual offensive game scoring 14 points," said Coach Stubblefield.

H. Drue Pirtle, of Jolntown, has announced that he will be a candidate for reelection as County Commissioner of Precinct 1, the southwest territory.

Pirtle has been serving in the office since being appointed by County Judge Wm. S. Whiteman on September 16, 1983 following the resignation of Bruce Scott.

Pirtle is a native of Jolntown community and attended Paris Junior College, later receiving a BBA degree with a major in accounting from ETSU in 1956. He moved to Longview and worked in public accounting for over three years before joining Oleum Incorporated, an independent oil firm, being promoted in various capacities with the company to that of vice-president in 1973 and treasurer in 1975.

Following a merger of the company with Diamond Shamrock in 1979, Pirtle became self-employed in the oil industry. He built a home near Jolntown and moved there in June, 1981, operating the Pirtle Farm and raising Simmental cattle.

He and his wife, Tommie Joy, are active in the Jolntown Missionary Baptist Church and other community affairs. They have two children, a daughter, Lana, 10 and a son, Clay, 8.

Jim Chapman Running For Texas State Senate

Jim Chapman, two term East Texas District Attorney, announced recently that he will be a democratic candidate in the race for the state senate. He will run against incumbent Ed Howard.

Chapman, 38, a native East Texan, listed crime, education, utility regulation, unemployment and care for the elderly as issues that should be addressed by the Texas Legislature.

"The criminal justice system is broken and needs fixing," Chapman told supporters as he made an announcement tour of the 15 Northeast Texas Counties that make up State Senate District 1.

Chapman said that education is now an issue, but it is one that should have been addressed before now.

"Jim Chapman is dedicated to working on the improvements needed in our educational system—real improvements, not just throwing money at the problem."

Chapman called for in-

creases in pay for qualified competent teachers and an incentive plan to compensate career teachers who have demonstrated the degree of competence and professional development that make them unique in the classroom experience.

Chapman called for better care of the elderly in nursing homes and "a new partnership between government and industry and our Chambers of Commerce to attract new industry."

"Those people who through no fault of their own cannot help themselves, who don't want a handout, but a helping hand, deserve that," Chapman said.

On the subject of utility regulation and high utility bills, Chapman said that he wants to work on legislation that will make "the public utility commission a watchdog for the people who pay bills, rather than a lapdog for the industry."

Chapman has served two terms as District Attorney in the 8th Judicial District, which covers Delta, Franklin, Hopkins and Rains Counties.

He currently serves as a director of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and he is on the board of the National District Attorneys Association.

Chapman pointed to his strong Democratic credentials, noting that he was part of a group of district attorneys who campaigned for Gov. Mark White's election in 1982 and to his service as a Hopkins County delegate to Texas Democratic Conventions since 1976.

He has been active in the Jaycees, having been named Jaycee of the Year in 1972 as well as having been named to the Outstanding Young Men of America, a national Jaycee honor.

Chapman and his wife, Betty, an English teacher in the Sulphur Springs School District, have two children, Jennifer 10 and Trey 7.

He is a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason and a Shriner.

East Texas Eating

Potatoes, satisfying to eat, easy to cook, and versatile in preparation—are an East Texas favorite. I suspect that our grandparents a few generations back brought their liking for this staple vegetable—and perhaps a few seed potatoes with them—when they came to the United States from England, Ireland, Scotland or wherever.

Actually, potatoes were introduced into this country about the same time Sir Walter Raleigh is credited with introducing them to Ireland. The earliest known potatoes were unearthed in the area of South America that is now Peru or Chile.

Today the potato is one of the most important vegetables in the world. It is prepared in countless ways. Though I long for the first freshly dug new potatoes that we raise in our garden later in the spring, right now I find the long, firm white russet potatoes very enjoyable in a variety of ways.

Smooth, creamy mashed potatoes served warm remains one of my favorite potato dishes. A good baked potato is right behind. Here are some other pared down and dressed up versions.

Sour Cream Cheesy Potatoes

Place a 2-inch layer of seasoned mashed potatoes in a casserole dish. Top with a layer of sour cream, then a covering of grated Cheddar cheese. Heat in a 350 degree oven for 10-15 minutes until hot throughout. Remove from oven. Sprinkle with snipped chives, green onion tops or chopped onions. Serve warm. Is delicious even after it cools. Reheats nicely. And, makes delicious Potato Cakes.

2 cups mashed potatoes (seasoned), leftovers work great!
2 Tbsp. chopped onion
2 Tbsp. flour
1 egg beaten slightly

Drop by large spoonfuls into hot fat in a large skillet. Saute until golden brown on bottom. Turn. Cook until golden on other side. Serve immediately.

Quickie Paprikaed Potatoes

Scrub large russet potatoes. Quarter each potato. Dip into melted butter or margarine. Sprinkle with paprika and lemon pepper. Microwave on high for 3-4 minutes for each potato included. If a crusty exterior is desired, the potatoes in a toaster oven or under the broiler for just long enough to brown them.

Spring is just a few weeks away and with it comes stock show season for Lamar County 4-H members. These are some of the dates and details on area shows.

The first show will be Honey Grove on March 10. Entry fee is \$3.00 per animal and entries must be received in Honey Grove before February 28, there will be no late entries. All entries must be in place before 9 a.m. on Saturday, March 10 and will be released at 4 p.m. the same day.

Show categories will be: beef breeding cattle, dairy cattle, market lambs and market steers.

The next show will be Camp County Show in Pittsburg. The show dates are March 21, 22 and 23. Entries sent before March 14 will be \$5 per animal and all late entries are \$7. All animals must be checked in before 10 a.m. Thursday, March 22 and will be released around 12 noon on Friday the 23rd.

Divisions will be dairy females, beef breeding cattle and open steer show.

Saturday, March 24 will be the Hallsville show. Categories are beef heifers, no bulls; junior barrow, junior market lambs, market steers and feeder steers. Entries sent before March 23 will be \$4.00 per head and late entries, the day of the show will be \$5.00.

All animals must be checked in before 9 a.m. on the 24th and should be released after all judging is completed.

The Lamar County 4-H Council will hold its monthly meeting Thursday, February 9 at 7 p.m. in the meeting room at the Paris Police Department.

As you know we have two important items to discuss, the election of officers for 1984-85 and the finalizing of plans for the Council Retreat.

Now that basketball season is ending, I hope to see all council officers and members on the 9th.

This is a reminder that all members wishing to have birds for the county show must have the birds ordered before the 10th of February. The cost will be \$.30 per bird and they will arrive about the 6th of March. You need to pay for the birds when you order them.

Orders will be handled by the Prairiland Ag Department for orders or more

information call the extension office or the Prairiland ag department at 982-6233.

Saturday, February 11 is approaching fast. All 4-H and FFA members with lamb projects for the April show must have their lambs toothed beginning at 9 a.m. at the county fair barn. This is mandatory for lambs to be eligible in April.

The county showing and fitting clinic for beef exhibitors is almost here. Due to the great weather that we have been having, everyone with cattle should be spending as much time leading, brushing and training your projects as possible.

We have a full day planned, so please try to attend and do not forget that Jack Cross will be on hand to trim feet on your cattle, the cost is \$10 per animal and this is a very important part of having your calf properly fitted. We begin at 10 a.m. so please try to come a little early.

An early reminder that all parents and members that plan on attending the Houston Livestock Show are urged to attend a special meeting on Monday, February 13 at 7 p.m. at the Paris Police Department.

We have dairy exhibitors, calf scramblers, livestock and dairy judges, chicken showman and one junior beef heifer exhibitor going.

As you can see, this is an elite group and we need to coordinate our efforts to prevent confusion, so please make plans to attend.

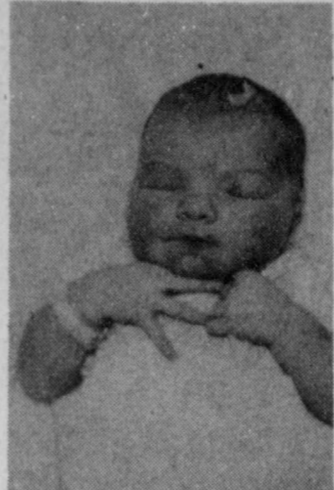

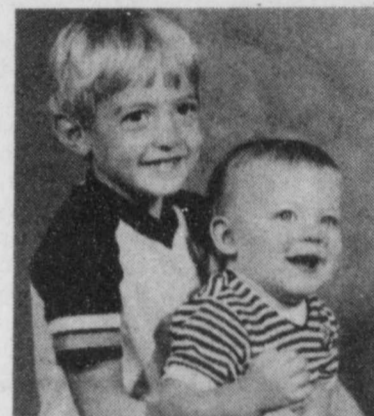

Variety Of Community Service Courses Set At PJC

Courses on interior design, cake decorating, vocabulary development, bookkeeping, beekeeping and sign language are among those scheduled this month by Paris Junior College's community services office.

Several of the courses and programs are free, and others require advance payments by paying the fee in the office of the Alford Center. More information on any of the courses may be obtained by calling the office at 785-7661, extension 445 or 447.

A private pilot's ground school will begin Wednesday, February 15.

Classes will be from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. for 14 weeks, and the fee is \$105 plus a navigational kit, to be purchased from the Paris Flight Center. Instructor is Bill Boothe.

Walt Reep will teach principles of interior design and decoration beginning Thursday, February 16 from 9:30 until 11:30 a.m. and continuing for four consecutive Thursdays.

The course will cover furniture styles, color theory, furniture arrangement, window treatments, Oriental rugs,

accessories and decorating ideas. Reep, formerly interior designer at Almand's Interior Design Studio in Longview, is manager and interior designer at Reep's Furniture. Fee for this course is \$15.

A beginning cake decorating class will start Thursday, February 23 from 7 to 9 p.m. Ed Crawford will teach all the basics of cake decorating for beginners. Fee is \$42 for six lessons on Thursday nights.

Ernestine Morriss, business teacher at Detroit High School, will teach bookkeeping starting Monday, February 27 from 5:15 to 7:15 p.m. Classes will be on Mondays and Wednesdays for four weeks and the fee is \$35.

Dr. Don Black will teach a spring course featuring all new material in vocabulary development. The course will be taught from 7 to 8 p.m. for six Tuesdays beginning February 28.

The spring course will give special attention to words and phrases indigenous to east Texas. The course is for those addicted to words, and the moderator will preside over an informal investigation of the origin, usage and construction of interesting words. Fee is \$15.

Also beginning Tuesday, February 28, is a course in beginning sign language to be taught on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 to 9 p.m. for four weeks. LaQuinta Long will teach the course in American Sign Language, fingerspelling as taught by the Texas Schools for the Deaf. Fee is \$25, and eight two hour lessons will be taught.

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

Local Boy In Calf Scramble

Charles Bradley Branch, a 14 year old 4-H member from Bogata will participate in the 1984 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble on February 25 in the Astrodome. The calf scramble is an exciting part of rodeo action starring Merle Haggard and Sylvia as part of that matinee's performance.

Brad, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Branch, will compete for one of the 280 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the 1984 rodeo.

The calf scramble is a "year long" event that begins with athletic competition in the Astrodome and ends with qualitative competition in the show ring.

It involves the turning loose of two dozen or so energetic youngsters and half as many wild, young calves in one arena. Those who manage to grab a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line are provided with a \$600 calf purchase certificate.

The calf is raised by the winner for a special show ring competition to be held at next year's show. History Of The Early Days Of Bogata

"In 1892 the lot where the present school building now stands was given to the school by Mr. Clatterbuck for school purposes. On this ground a frame building was erected. The building was a two-story structure and was the largest school that had ever been in Bogata. This building was made into a real school. The school was organized and built up by Mr. Billie Miller, his wife, and two assistants. He organized the whole town for school, and about twenty-five pupils came in and boarded in order that they might have the benefit of his wonderful instruction.

"Mr. Mullins taught the next term of 1895 and 1896. He was followed by Mr. Slough who taught three terms. The first graduating class was held at this time. Mr. Billie Miller came back in 1899 and taught three terms. The next three terms were taught by Gwaltney, Spencer and Street, respectively.

"Mr. C.I. Coston very successfully taught the next two terms. Then followed Messrs. Eugene Holmes, D.S. Clark and Ross Houston from Clarksville, who taught the three terms respectively.

"Contemporary with Mr. Houston, Mr. Watson with the aid of the Baptist denomination of the city, built a Baptist College in the south part of town near where the Gibson home is at the present time, and Watson was president. This school was taught only part of one term, due to the fact that it had not the financial sustenance to exist. Possibly the people of the city did not realize what an institution of this kind would mean to the city in the future if given the proper support. The school was for the purpose of teaching Fine Arts, Foreign Languages and Philosophy.

"Howard Miller was superintendent of our public schools during the terms of 1909-10 and 1910-11. Mr. Miller was followed by Ross Houston who taught two terms.

"Mr. R.E. Roberts came next and taught three very successful terms and was offered the fourth but he thought best to decline the offer. Mr. Roberts conducted the first graduation class since 1900. It was during his second term that our present brick grade

school building was built. "Mr. F.M. Storey was principal during Mr. Roberts' last term, and was elected superintendent for the term 1916-17. It was during this term that theme writing and literature was given much impetus.

"The term 1917-18 was superintended by A.W. Harris, now of Bryan High School of Dallas.

"Murray H. Fly taught the next three terms from 1918 to 1921. The pupils and teachers did all they could to gather material useful in making garments and suits for the boys in the World War. The first aeroplane passed over Bogata about this time and caused much excitement. It is reported that Mr. Fly jumped from a second story window to the ground when he saw all the school children running about on the school ground, thinking that something very serious was happening either to the building or to the pupils.

"The first free text books were issued during Mr. Fly's first term and the school received its first units of affiliation. The second term that Mr. Fly taught the eleventh grade was added. This was a great asset to the school for it enabled the pupils to go to school one more year at home and thereby save much expense, as well as to cause students from surrounding districts to be transferred to the Bogata district and thereby be benefitted by the added work.

"Mr. Fly was followed by W.J. Holloway. Our athletics developed very much during this time. Our basketball boys won the county, district, by-district field meet but were defeated at the state meet by El Paso at Austin.

"The next two terms were superintended by W.E. Smith, now of Moulton, Texas. Mr. Smith was an excellent school man and we pupils have a high regard for his ideals and there will always be with us pleasant remembrances of him and his wife and their service to us and to our school.

"The present school term, 1925 and 1926 is under the supervision of R.C. Marshall and we have had a successful term thus far. We now have eight literary teachers, an expression teacher and a music

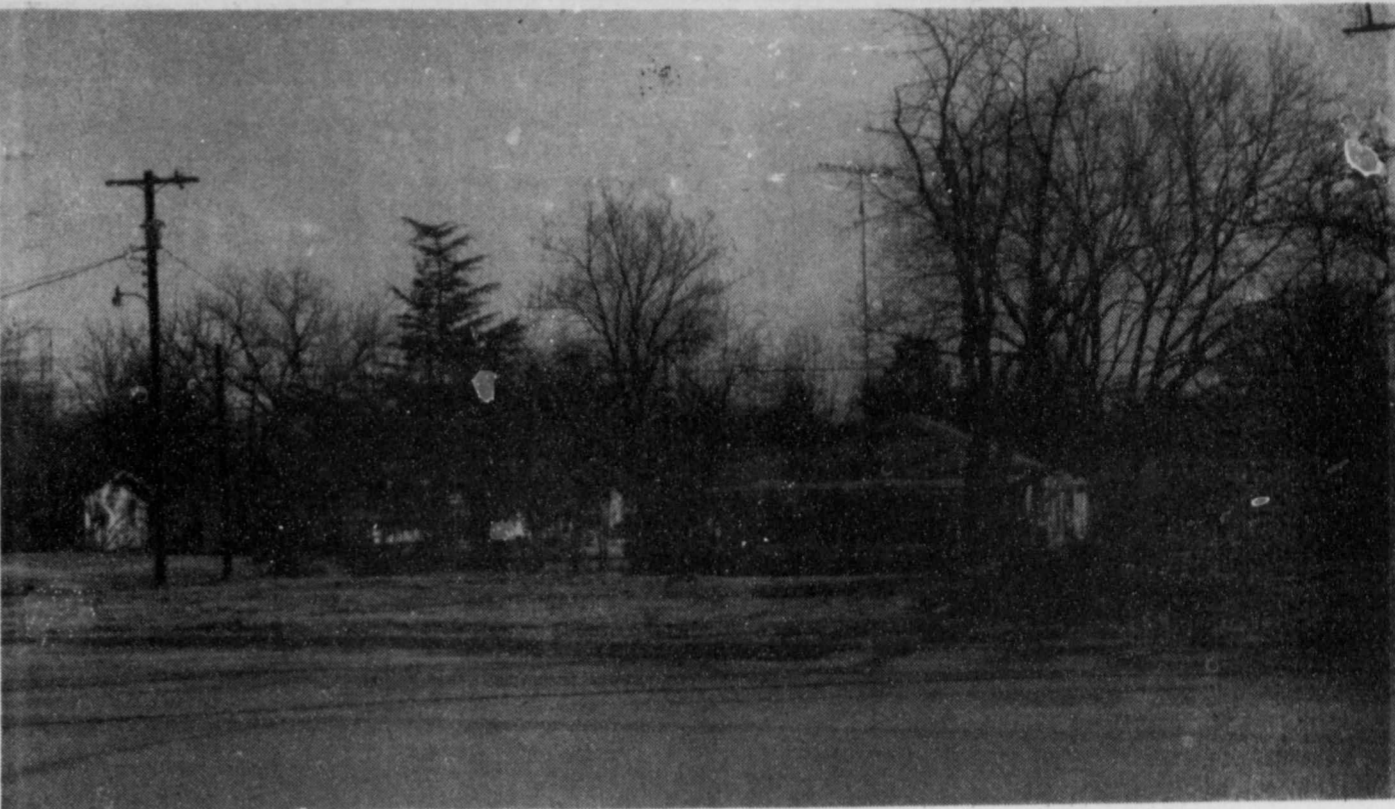
teacher." Mr. R.C. Marshall taught three terms at Bogata, and much progress was made in school work. He was offered the fourth term but declined the offer. He went to DeKalb where he superintended for two years.

The terms 1928-29, 1929-30 were under the supervision of Mr. F.L. Branson. The term 1930-31 was also under his supervision. At the end of the second term of Mr. Branson's administration, bonds were voted for the construction of a new high school building, the old building to be taken for a grade school building. The building was built in the summer of 1929. It is

modern throughout and is a credit to the efforts of Mr. Branson and those who cooperated in the movement.

The Bogata school now has nine literary teachers, ten including the Home Economics instructor and the Vocational Agriculture teacher. There will also be a Speech instructor and a music teacher. Bogata High School has fourteen and one-half units of affiliation, and it is hoped soon that others may be secured.

This history of Bogata schools was taken from the copy of the Oak Leaf for December 21, 1925, published by students of Bogata High School.

COOL MEALS

For a delightful mushroom soup, saute sliced vegetables in butter. Mushrooms need tossing with lemon juice to prevent darkening. You have to make certain the leeks have been thoroughly washed since they tend to be gritty (with earth) unless grown on small hills or with "paper collars," as French gardeners do. Both half-and-half and dairy sour cream add creaminess. Why not cook in the morning and let it chill until dinner?

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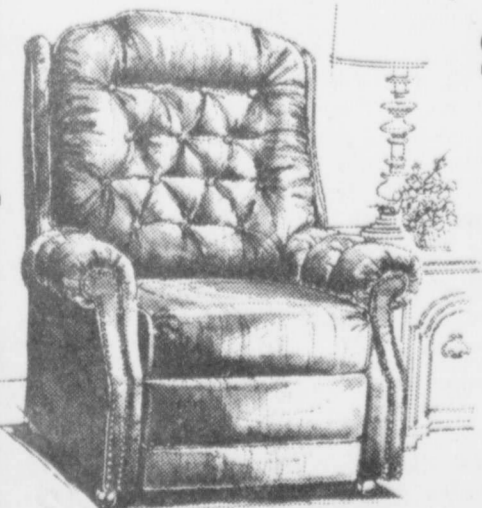

Agriculture Update

By Herb Brevard
Producers thinking about putting fertilizer on winter pastures now may need to wait a few weeks. Until temperatures are warm enough for plants to grow, the fertilizer will not be utilized.

Some of the winter pastures received severe damage from the December freeze. Producers should make sure the plants are alive before fertilizing. Also, enough plants must be present to justify additional expenditures for fertilizer.

With supplies becoming depleted for many producers, proper care of winter pastures could be critical in carrying the cattle through the remainder of the winter. Much of the winter pastures are being grazed extremely close to the ground. This practice could cause additional loss of plants and therefore decrease the amount of forage available during the next few months.

When temperatures warm sufficiently and plants begin to show signs of life and grow, fertilizer should be applied. Proper fertilizer rates and good grazing management could extend the grazing season, thus reducing the amount of hay and supplement needed for the cattle.

Congressman Says Farmer Subsidizing

 "When people complain about the cost of agricultural programs, they should be reminded that the only subsidy is to the American consumer who is getting the best quality food for the lowest portion of their income of any country in the world," Congressman E. de la Garza told an audience of more than 125 persons attending the Build East Texas annual meeting in Nacogdoches, January 30.

del Garza, chairman of the House Agricultural Committee, said that agriculture is the only sector of the American economy bringing dollars back to this country from foreign trade. "I am more concerned about keeping one young farmer on the land than keeping up with Russia on the number of missiles," the congressman told the group. "We must have agricultural producers to feed the hungry."

del Garza praised the Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Station for their contributions to the production capabilities of this country. He said that with more

organizations such as BET the agricultural sector could become even more efficient than it is today.
