

Talco-Bogata Board Considers Teachers

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, March 6 at 7:00 p.m. with all members present.

The major item on the agenda was the consideration and employment of teachers for the 1984-85 school year. Principals from

the three campuses met with the Board and Superintendent to discuss the evaluations that had been made of teachers and the efforts that had been made to try to improve teacher effectiveness thereby improving the instructional program. The Board continued to em-

phasize that a thorough job be done in personnel evaluations so that the Talco-Bogata Schools would have as strong and as effective instructional program as possible for our young people. All teachers requesting employment were reemployed for the

1984-85 school year. Claire Jessee, Band Director, met with the Board to discuss the various band programs in the school district. For a number of years there has been a conflict in the scheduling of the junior high programs in that students as a rule had to make a choice between

athletics and the band program. Plans are to schedule the junior high band program at the first period of the day beginning with the 1984-85 school year so as to avoid this conflict. It is believed that this change will have an improved effect on the size and number in the junior and senior high

bands. Information was presented to Board members concerning the various insurance programs and coverage being carried. After studying these policies and from recommendations to be made by the insurance servicing agent at the April meeting, it is likely the amount of coverage being

carried on facilities will be increased. In other matters, the various financial reports were approved; the Textbook Committee Report was approved; and approval was given to installing hand rails at the front of Rivercrest as an aid to those who may need it for safety. Also, a progress report was made to

the Board on House Bill 246, known as the Curriculum Revision Bill, which will call for some far reaching changes in the school curriculum beginning with the 1984-85 school year. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, April 10 at 7:00 p.m. with the public cordially invited to attend.

Local Sales Tax Figures Show Slight Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent checks totaling \$53.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Texas is pulling out strongly from the trough we were in last year," Bullock said. "Along the border, January sales were well above last year in Laredo, Brownsville and El Paso. Among the 20 biggest sales tax cities, only Midland and Odessa are still running behind last year. Overall, sales tax receipts are up more than 12 percent."

March checks reflect sales made in January and

reported to the Comptroller in late February.

Locally, Bogata received net payment this period of \$685.47, for a 29.33 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$2,369.26. Clarksville received \$10,284.48 for a 6.43 percent increase over last year.

Talco received a net payment this period of \$981.77, bringing this year's total to \$6,488.80, this period's payment marking a 3.28 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$2,094.91. Mt. Pleasant increased by 25.55 percent over last year, as they received \$62,964.25 for this

period.

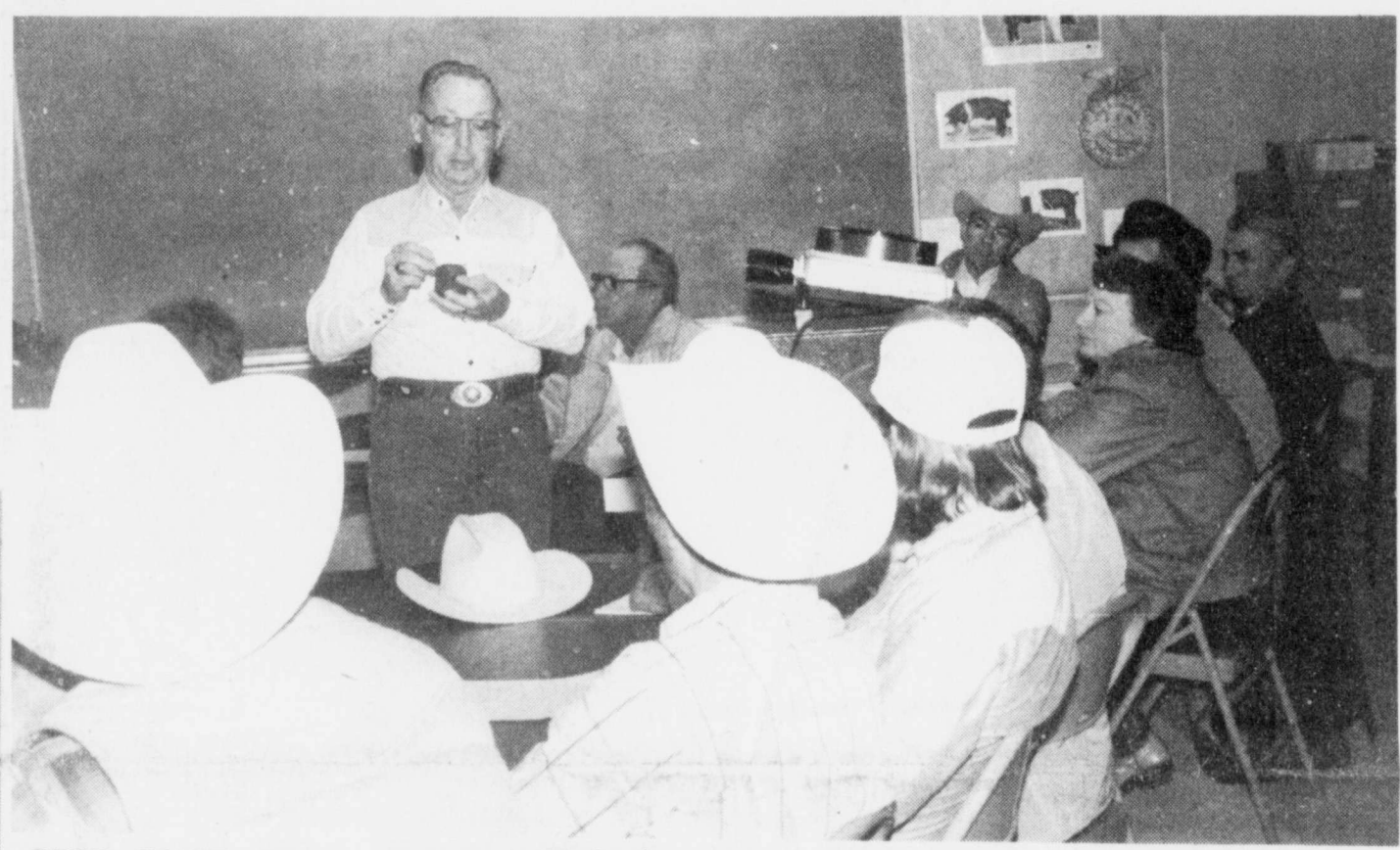
Blossom received \$844.01 last year, with no rebate this period for 1984, marking an 0.37 percent decrease.

Deport received no rebate this period, with a \$579.60 payment being made the previous year for the same period.

Paris received \$111,733.97, or an 8.26 percent increase over last year's payment.

Bullock said Houston received the largest check,

\$9.7 million, which brings the city's 1984 total to \$37.2 million, up five percent over what it had received by this time last year.

His wife, Marcia is founder and president of Flame Fellowship, International. She was also voted as mother of the year in Dallas. They have four

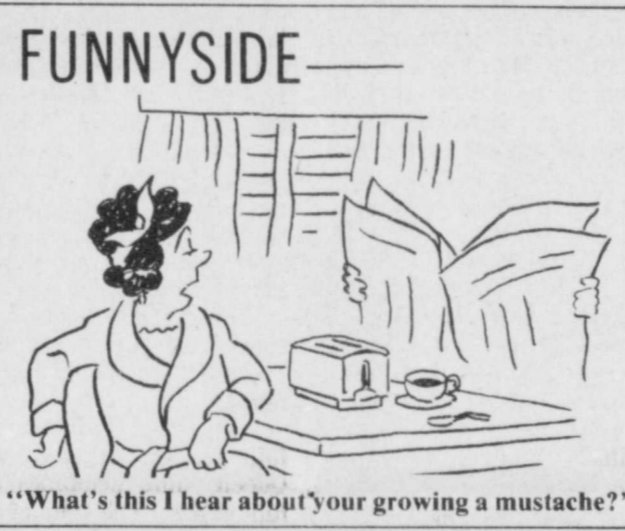
Margie Rice To Present Demonstration

\$20.00 trophy, please contact the County Extension Office at 427-2493.

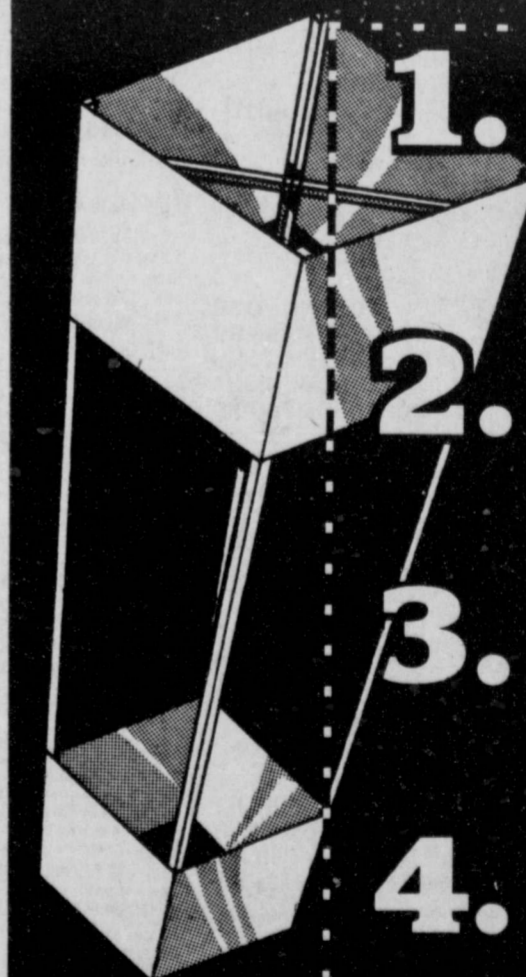

1. Never use any metal or foil parts in a kite—metal conducts electricity, so use only wood, paper or plastic and string.

2. Always fly your kite in wide, open areas—away from any trees, antennas or power lines.

3. If your kite should get caught in a power line, DO NOT try to pull it down. Call our office to get it down for you.

4. Never fly your kite in wet, stormy weather. High-flying kites can attract lightning, so fly your kite only on clear, sunny days.

Have fun flying your kite, but be sure to do it safely.

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 3/4 cup chopped pitted dates
- 1 tbsp. freshly grated orange peel
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1 egg
- 1 can (8 1/2 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Syrup, undrained

Combine 1 tbsp. flour, pecans, dates and orange peel. Combine remaining flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Beat in egg until blended. Beat in 1/2 flour mixture until blended. Beat in 1/2 undrained pineapple until blended. Repeat, ending with flour. Stir in floured fruits and nuts. Turn into well-greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Bake in 350°F oven 60 to 70 minutes until cake tester inserted comes out clean. Stand in pan 5 minutes. Turn onto wire rack to complete cooling. Makes 1 loaf.
