The amount of the rains has varied from several inches at a time to only a mist, but it has been some time when there was a single dry, un-

dampened day. According to weather forecasters, it will be late in this week before there will be any change...and whether that change will last for long is still to be seen. If the present weather conditions continue through into winter, rural agri-business will surely suffer.

Give us a break, somebody, lets have just a little clear, crisp, autumn weather for football...and all the other activities of fall, too!

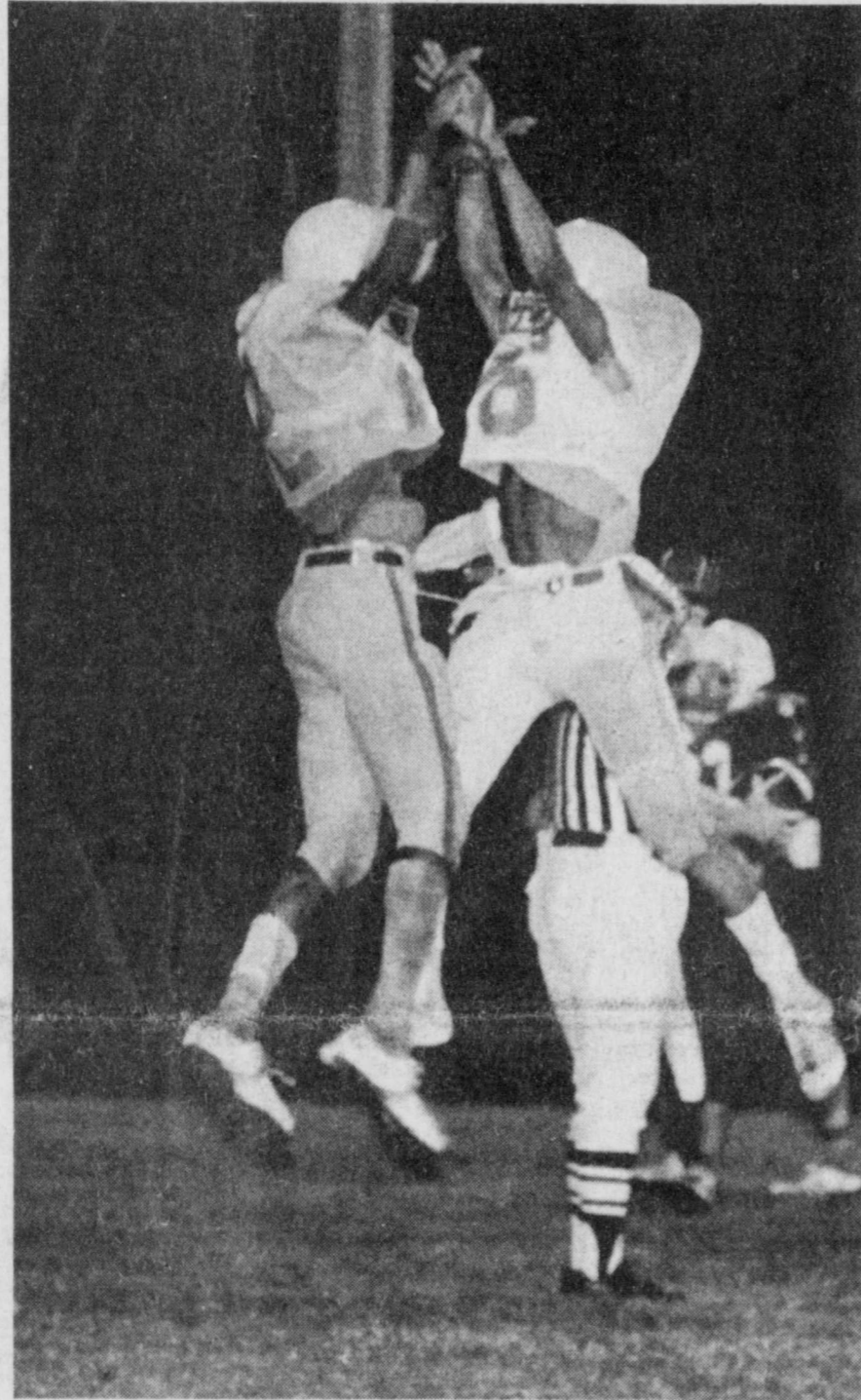

Rivercrest Rebels Top Redwater Dragons

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Redwater last Friday night to claim a victory over the Dragons 23-13. The rain held back for the evening, but previous rain left the field muddy and slick.

The Rebs started out slowly in the first period, fumbling on their first possession. The Dragon offense controlled the ball for most of the quarter and carried it into the endzone with 4:39 remaining. Their extra point kick was good. The Rebels were down 7-0.

Rivercrest began to move the ball in the second period but couldn't get into score territory. Their first opportunity came two minutes into the quarter. The Rebs failed on a fourth and goal from the nine yard line and the ball changed hands. Again in the last seconds of the half with a second and four situation, the Rebels had no time outs to stop the clock. The halftime score stood at 7-0 in favor of Redwater.

Rivercrest came out for the second half fired up and ready. Senior halfback Charlie Roberts led the way with an exceptional 149 rushing yards for the night. An on-side kick by the Rebs gave them possession on

the Dragon 38. The successful kick seemed to turn things around for the Rebels. With 8:16 left the Rebs scored their first points of the evening. Senior fullback Greg Russell plowed through the Dragon defense from the one yard line for six points. Russell carried the conversion over the line for two-Rivercrest led 8-7.

Redwater took the advantage early in the fourth quarter with a nine yard pass into the score zone. The conversion failed and the Dragons led 13-8. Halfway through the final period of play, the Rebels combined the running of Charlie Roberts and passing by quarterback Bobby Thomas to work their way to victory. Thomas connected with wingback James Anderson for a 14 yard touchdown with 5:57 left in the game. Charlie Roberts carried in the two point conversion for a Reb lead 16-13.

The Rebels were still not finished. Reb halfback Kyle Roland gets the credit for setting up the Rebs in good field position. Quarterback Bobby Thomas pitched out to Roland who

John Easley kicked the extra point for a final score of Rebels 23 - Redwater 13.

"We went into the game a little overconfident because of Redwater's ratings and scores. We had a breakdown in the first half but started doing things right in the second half. They started hitting the holes and blocking men like they were supposed to," said Rebel head coach Terry Giddens.

The Rebels made 22 first downs and rushed for 218 yards. They completed six of seven passes for 86 yards for total yardage of 304. The Rebels punted twice for 66 yards and fumbled once. They were penalized ten times for 75 yards.

The Dragons made 16 first downs and 116 rushing yards. They completed five of nine passes for 58 yards and a total yardage of 184. The Dragons punted three times for 108 yards and had one fumble. They were penalized seven times for 65 yards.

Rivercrest is now 2-2 in district play. They will host the Maud Cardinals Friday night in Rebel Stadium with a 7:30 p.m. kickoff. Come out and give these boys your support!

Wood of Bogata, for the \$7 prize money and Paul Lyles missed six games and picked Daingerfield 48-0 for third place.

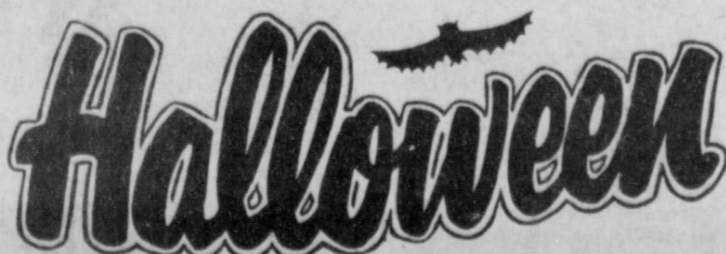
Tobe King, last week's first place winner, missed seven games, and Mike Sparks missed seven games,

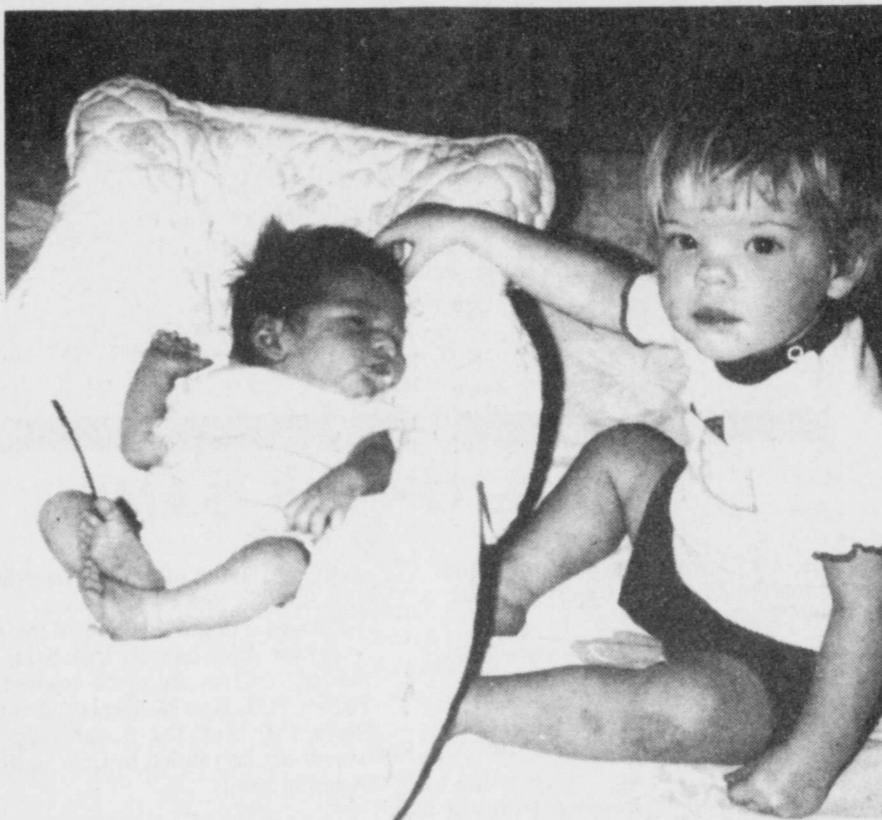

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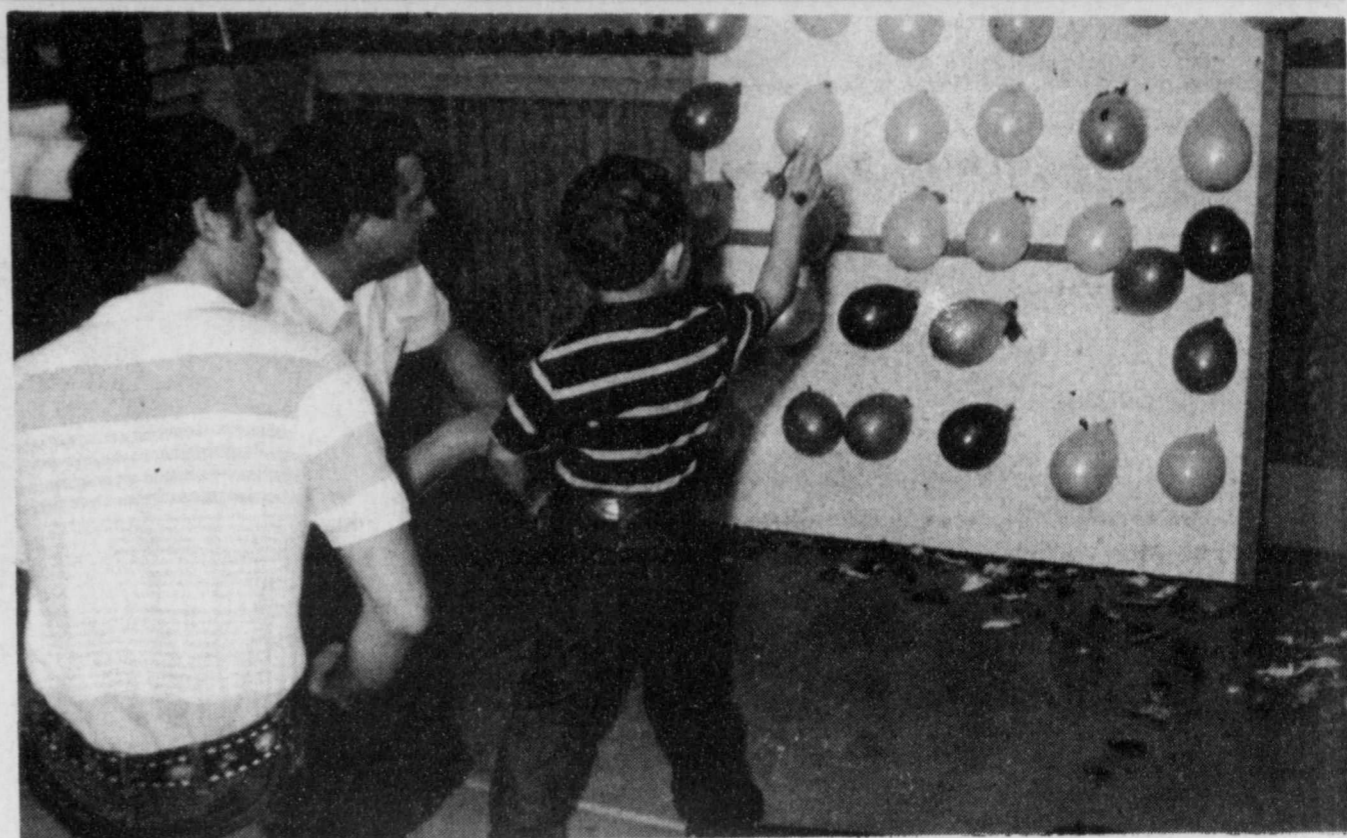

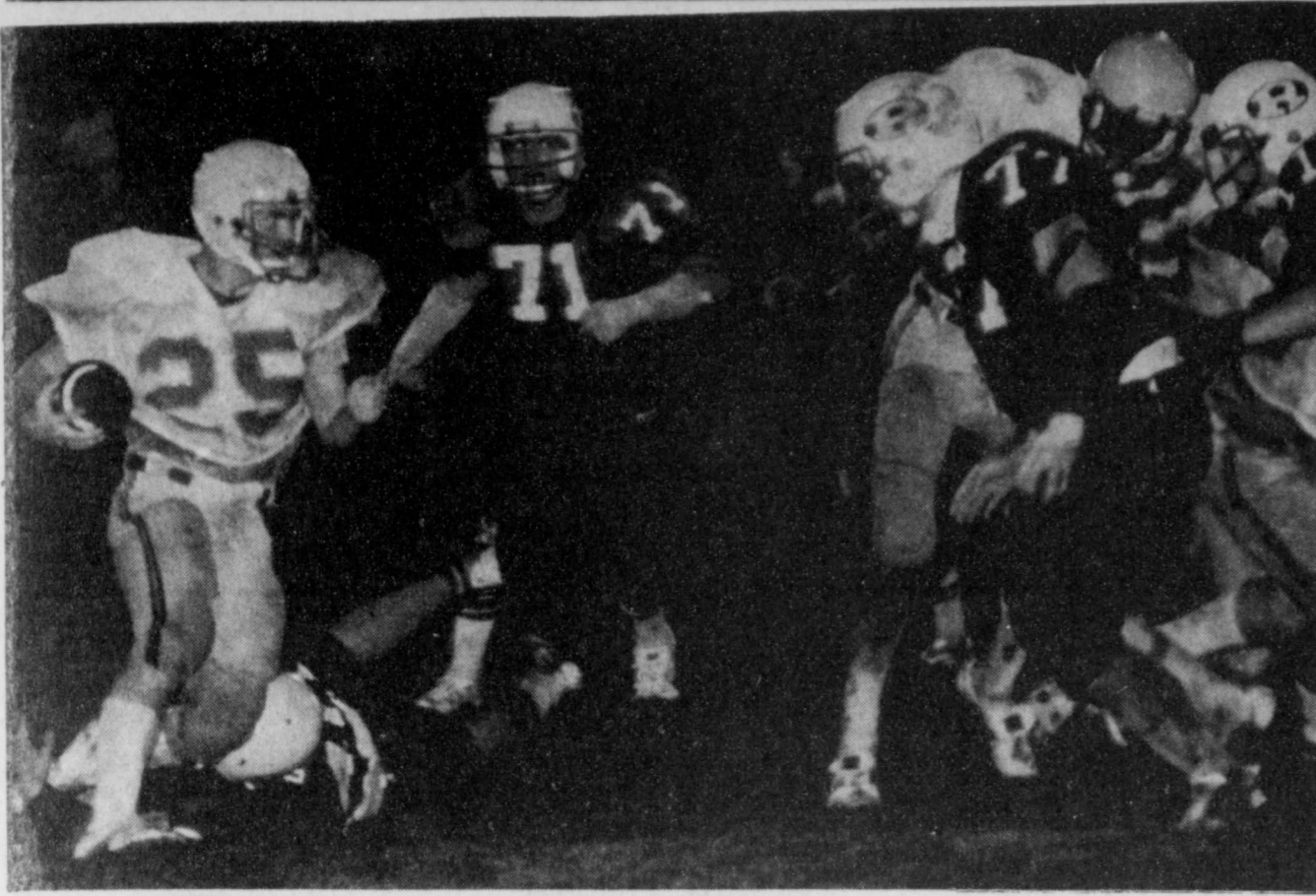


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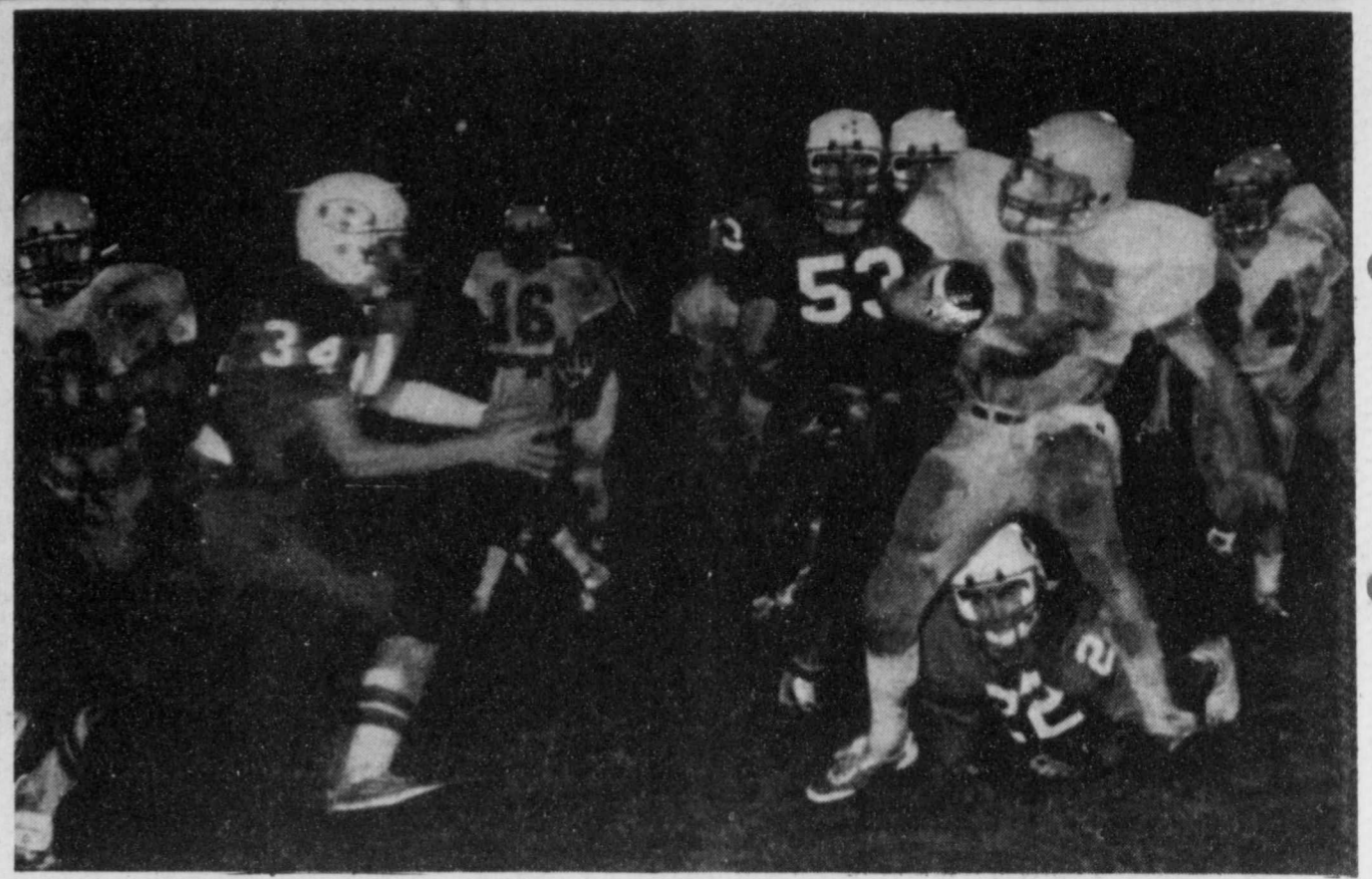
