It was stated that applications are being accepted for the Tax Collector job with the school district.

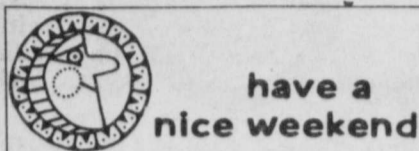

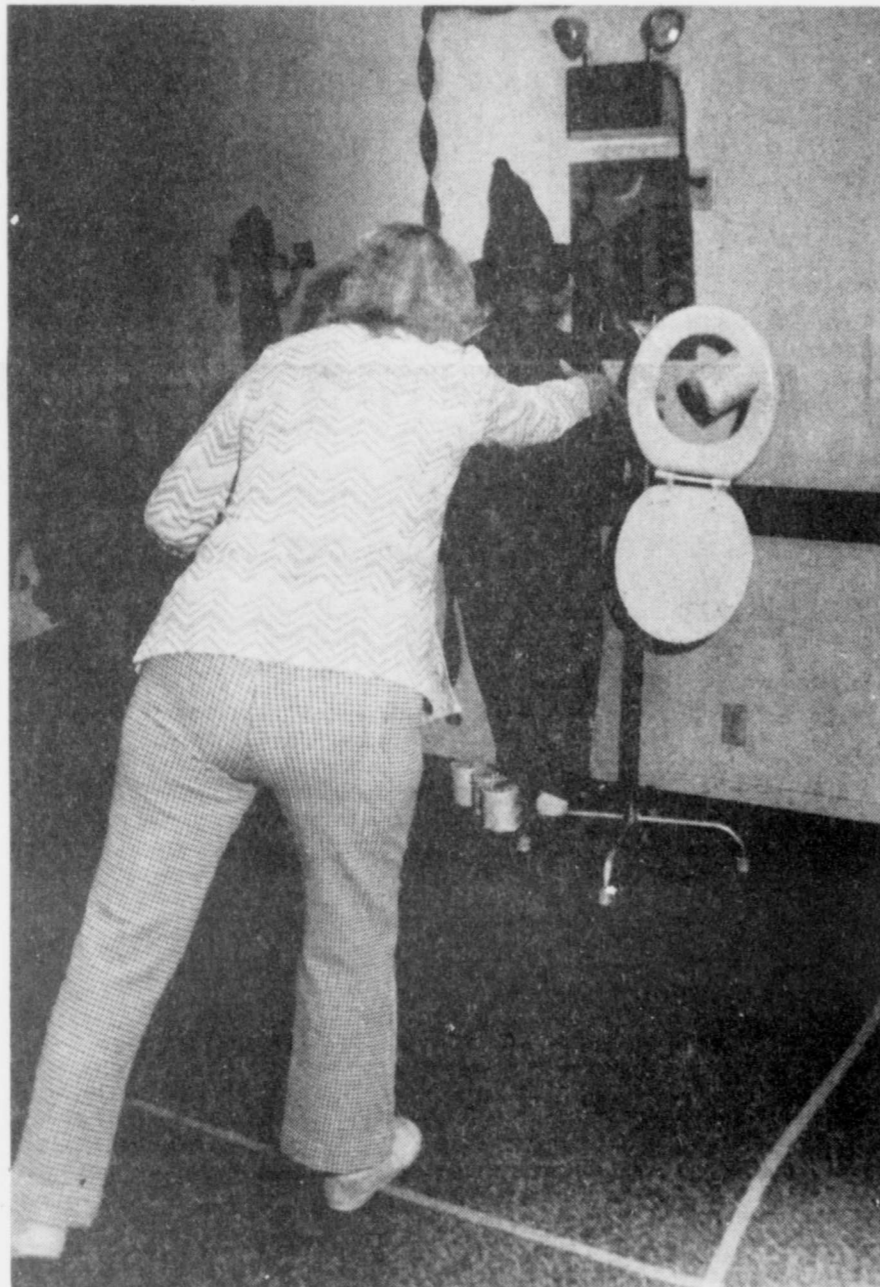

Agricultural Briefs

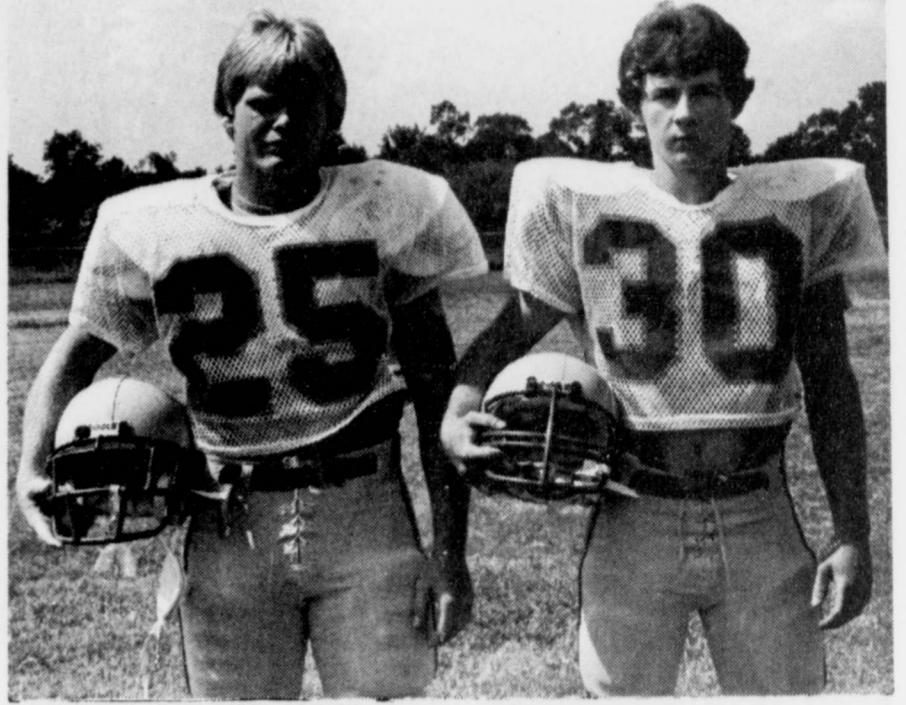
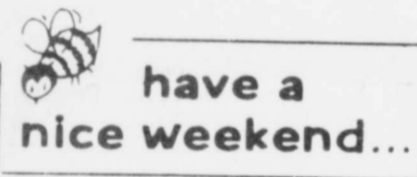
Recent rains have been a boost to most winter pastures in East Texas, with small grains, ryegrass and clovers growing well in most areas. Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., cautions producers against turning cattle into the pastures too early.

The plants need to develop a good root system and be well anchored in the ground before grazing begins. Generally, plants are six to eight inches tall before the root system is adequately developed. If the soil is wet and boggy, cattle will pull up many of the plants during grazing. Reeves suggests watching the cattle when they are first turned on winter pastures to determine if they are pulling up the plants. If the plants are being pulled up, take the cattle off and wait until the soil is a little drier and the plant roots are firmly attached.

If the temperature warms considerably, producers should watch for armyworms. A few isolated cases have been reported.

If the winter pasture was not fertilized when planted, Reeves suggests applying fertilizer as soon as possible. A rule of thumb is 50 to 60 pounds each of actual nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium per acre.

If fertilizer was applied at planting, keep following soil test recommendations and watch the plants. If areas around manure piles remain green and other plants are light green or yellow, an application of nitrogen is probably needed.



Farm Credit Initiatives Set

Regulations for implementing President Reagan's Farm Credit Initiatives have been completed and are being distributed to Farmers Home Administration field offices, Charles W. Shuman said recently.

The regulations provide for a one-time debt set-aside program for FmHA borrowers and loan guarantees for non-FmHA borrowers.

In addition, Shuman has developed guidelines which County Supervisors will use in signing contracts with local non-Government lenders and farm management specialists. These specialists will provide additional advice and assistance to financially distressed farm borrowers.

In both cases, the action will restore farmers to a positive cash flow position.

"With field office training underway, we will have everything in place for the successful launching of this program," Shuman said.

Under the plan announced recently by the President for farmers experiencing serious financial difficulty, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent, to a maximum of \$200,000, of a borrower's debt for five years without interest.

For non-FmHA borrowers, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a loan if the lender is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the debt.
