

Farmers Don't Get Much Of Food Dollar

Figures released by the American Farm Bureau Federation should cause consumers to stop and think! Whether one is directly in contact with agriculture...and few people in this area are unfamiliar with it, or if food is only something that is found packaged on a supermarket shelf, these figures are startling, and discouraging to the farmer.

The AFBF says that marketing costs are where our food dollar goes. Seventy-three cents of each consumer food dollar goes to marketing! The biggest portion, 33 percent, goes for labor costs, while the remaining 40 cents covers a multitude of marketing charges from advertising to transportation. Largest among the marketing charges are packaging,

taking around eight cents of each dollar, about five cents for inter-city transportation. Energy, rent and depreciation costs about four more cents of each food dollar, while before-tax profits earned 4.5 cents. Advertising, taxes, insurance, professional services, promotion, bad debts and miscellaneous items

are lumped under other costs, and take about 2.5 cents.

Broken down into different classes of food, variations appear, largely because of how much, or little, processing is required between the farm and the table.

A one pound loaf of bread had an average retail price in 1983 of 54.2

cents. Its farm value was only slightly more than a nickel, with the wheat used to make that loaf of bread worth only 4.3 cents to the farmer!

Animal products such as beef, broilers, pork, milk and eggs ranged around half as much farm value as retail price, some less, and some a

little more than fifty percent.

Fruits and vegetables stand close to farm values by a little more than one-third of the retail price. A 10-pound bag of potatoes selling for 162 cents had a farm value of only 62.9 cents.

Rebels Drop Season Finale To Ore City

The Rivercrest Rebels closed out their football season in Ore City last Friday night with a 24-12 loss. The team played a hard and exciting game, refusing to let up on the Ore City players. Rivercrest was hampered with injuries on their defensive squad. Senior David Mauldin suffered an ankle injury and junior Paul Yeatman was sidelined after being knocked out on a play.

The Rivercrest defense held Ore City's first drive for a touchdown and they settled for a 21-yard field goal with 7:24 left in the quarter. Ore City led by three.

Junior halfback Jerry Simpson put the Rebels in scoring position with a 38-yard scamper to the Ore City 22-yard line. With 4:19 remaining in the first period, halfback Kyle Roland carried in a reverse from eight yards out for the six points. The extra point was no good, the score was 6-3 in favor of Rivercrest.

Rebel Jerry Belcher intercepted an Ore City pass on their 22 yardline but the Rebels fumbled it back to Ore City on their second play. Ore City worked their way down to the Rebel three and with :53 seconds scored with a quarterback keeper. The point after was good for an Ore City lead, 10-6.

The second quarter was plagued by yellow flags. With a combination of 27, 23 and 29 yard pass completions, Ore City managed to score again with 7:50 left in the first half. The extra point was good. Ore City led 17-6 at the half.

In the third quarter with 6:32 left, Ore City scored again with a 12 yard TD pass. The PAT was good for a 24-6 Ore City lead.

The Rebels were determined not to let Ore City score again. Their defense got tough and the offense exploded. With 11:01 left to play, senior linebacker Greg Russell recovered an Ore City fumble on the O.C. 37-yard line. The Rebels kept the ball on the ground and put together an excellent running attack, using halfback Charley Roberts, fullback Greg Russell and quarterback Bobby Thomas as weapons. The Rebels scored the final touchdown of the game with 7:54 left to play. Bobby Thomas carried the ball in on a keeper play from the one for the score. The conversion failed for a

final score of Rebs 12-Ore City 24.

Rebel Head Coach Terry Giddens said, "I believe we played the best ball we have played all year. Ore City has a good team and we played as well as anyone against them. The boys could have quit because they were out of the playoffs but they kept going and didn't give up. Our senior boys did an exceptional job this year. They were a good group of boys to work with."

The Rebels finished the season with a 3-7 record. Ore City went undefeated.

The Rebels made 21 first downs and rushed for 135 yards. They completed three of nine pass attempts for 38 yards with no interceptions. The Rebels had a total of 173 yards. Rivercrest had one fumble and were penalized for 45 yards. They punted four times for 149 yards.

Ore City made 24 first downs and rushed for 151 yards. They completed 9 of 19 passes for 145 yards with one interception. Ore City had a total of 296 yards. They had four fumbles and were penalized for 80 yards. They punted three times for 120 yards.

Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$99.5 million in local tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," Bullock said. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect for the new items and services that became taxable October 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the city halls in December."

Houston's check was the largest, \$16.9 million. Dallas received \$11.4 million.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in Sep-

tember and the third quarter and reported to the Comptroller by October 20.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,441.60 for a \$11,365.01 total to date, marking a 2.26 percent decrease from last year.

Deport received \$1,537.67, a 12.66 percent increase, with the yearly total being \$8,619.55, compared to \$7,650.73 last year.

Bogata received \$2,781.24, a 4.62 percent decrease from 1983, for a yearly total of \$21,023.13, compared to \$22,041.72 last year.

Talco received \$4,342.60 for this period, bringing the 1984 total to \$21,873.49, compared to \$21,532.58 for the same period in 1983, making a 1.58 percent increase.

A Look At The Past

One time, I think it was the summer of 1920, or 1921, Sam Bell, Uncle Charley Barnard, and my father, decided that the three families would to Dalby Springs in south west Bowie County for a vacation. The group consisted of Sam Bell and daughters Reecy and Doris, Charlie Barnard and daughter Lera and sons Harold (Joel and Homer, and Mack and Maggie Barnard and sons Clifford, Osie, and Ed, and daughter Gladys. Chlor Williams a cousin of the Barnards was also a member.

Dolby Springs at one time had been a thriving Health Spa, with mineral springs flowing water the color of coffee or strong tea. By the time of our visitation the boom days of dolby were long passed. it was a deserted sandy land ghost village in the piney woods. There was one rundown country store in operation. The other buildings and most of the houses were empty and falling down. There were three old vacant and sad looking hotel buildings still standing. it was really a deserted and dilapidated looking place.

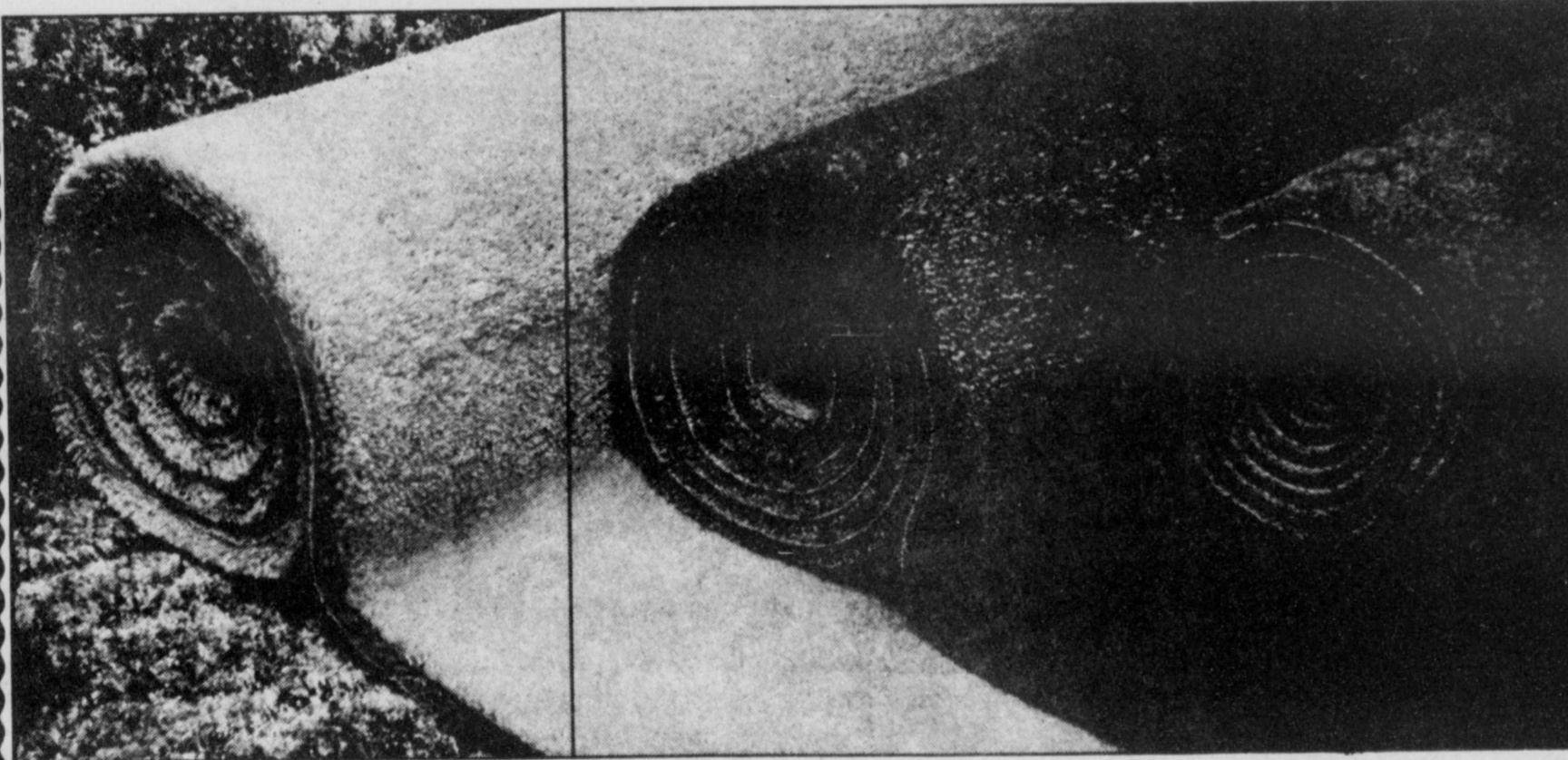
Our party with three cars loaded with camping equipment arrived in the afternoon. We soon located a camp site in the shade of some sweet gum trees near a spring where we set up our tents. The older people soon settled down to a routine of drinking the mineral water and relaxing in the quiet park like camp. The kids spent most of their time exploring the old empty houses and hotels. About the third nite in camp a summer thunder shower came up, and there was enough wind to blow some of the tents down. The next day after some discussion it was decided to move into one of the old vacant

hotels to be safe from the weather. We would sleep inside, but do our cooking and eating outside near a red water spring in front of the building. Some trash and junk was removed from the dining room and after it was swept out, preparations were made for the beds. The cots for the grown people were located in the center of the big room and the pallets for the kids were placed on each side with the boys on one side and the girls on the other. During the day the boys had fabricated and told some ghost stories about how some people a long time ago had been murdered during a hold up and robbery, and that there had been heard unexplainable noises and seen moving shadows around the old building.

In the afternoon, and without being observed by any one, some of the boys removed the mudchains from the cars and stashed them in the hallway of the third floor. During the evening meal around a camp fire, the ghost situation was discussed by the children, especially by the boys. Come bed time while the adults were directing the bedding arrangements by the light of a dimly burning oil lantern, Harold, Joe Barnard and I sneaked up to the third floor hall way. We picked the end of a chain in each hand and ran down the two flights of stairs, screaming yelling and rattling chains. When we reached the landing on the ground floor, every one had left the big dining room. We saw the last one as he dived through an open window. While we were laughing and surveying the empty room, I felt some one grab my arm and spin me around. It was Dad and Uncle Charlie. When they got through with us we didn't have any more ghost problems.

Dad didn't think that was a suitable subject for conversation at

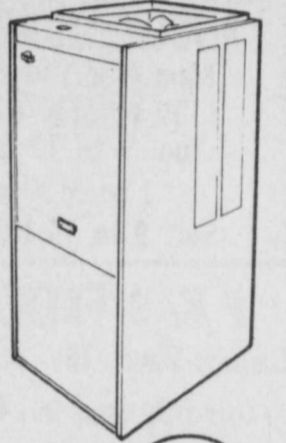

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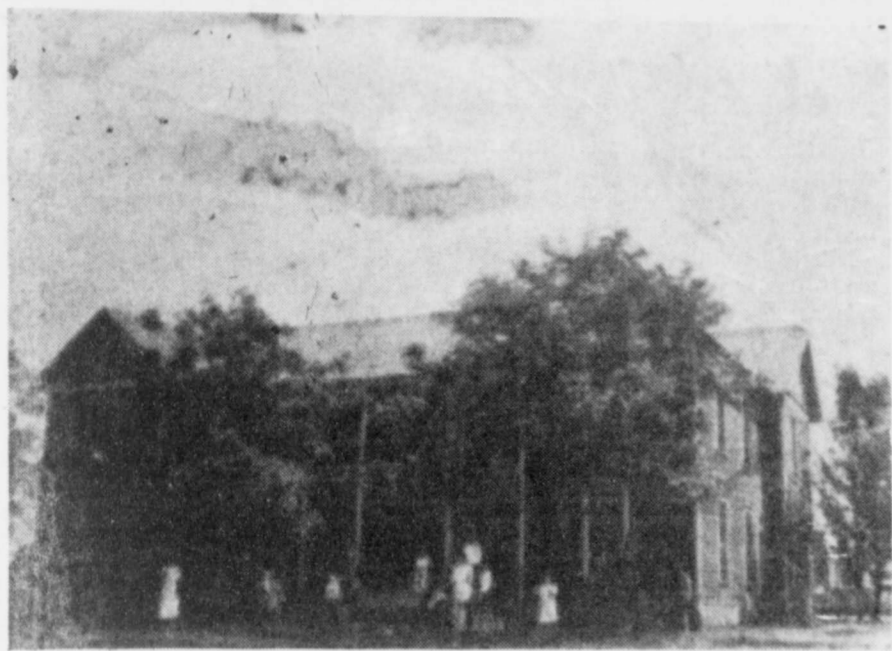
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THE BURKE HOUSE, one of the most popular hotels in Northeast Texas, was owned by Mrs. L.R. Burke and her daughters, Mrs. Fannie Smith and Misses Gramp and Minnie Burke. According to the "Blossom Bee", January, 1911, was built in 1893 and from the beginning became a stopping place of every salesman making Blossom and people desiring to take mineral baths. The Burke House was a two-story frame building near the depot, had one of the finest mineral wells in town. It was electrically lighted, with an office, large dining room, and many well-arranged rooms and furnished bedrooms. It had a reputation of having "something good to eat" all the time and first class beds and sanitary rooms. Mrs. Burke is listed as one of the pioneers of Lamar County. Coming to Texas in 1868, with her husband, Rev. W.M. Burke, and family from Georgia (both Georgia born). Her husband, an able, Baptist preacher, died in Blossom in 1878. She reared a large family of children, some of them holding high positions with the Texas and Pacific Railway Company. The house still stands in Blossom today, and is still in good repair. A few years ago, the house was remodeled by removing the upper story. The house is located across from Blossom School and is owned by Mrs. Myrtle Smith.

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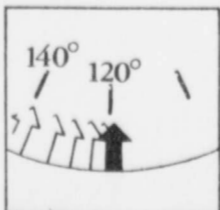

Brucellosis Vaccination Required For Heifers

Regulations relating to the brucellosis vaccination of heifer calves in the Class C Area of Texas have been amended by the Texas Animal Health Commission and will become effective November 5.

The changes were made in response to recommendations from the livestock industry during recent hearings favoring an increase in vaccination for brucellosis control, explained Bob Moody, county agent.

The new regulation is in two parts.
1. Heifer calves born after Jan. 1 of this year which are between 4 and 12 months of age and acquired and used for breeding, grazing, dairying or confinement in a dry lot not under quarantine must be officially vaccinated according to the amended regulation.

2. Heifer calves born after Jan. 1 of this year which are unvaccinated when they are over 12 months of age may change ownership only after being spayed or consigned to a livestock market to be spayed or "S" branded prior to the sale; or consigned directly to slaughter, quarantined feedlot or quarantined pasture.

Producers should start making plans now for vaccination of all eligible heifers, the agent reminds.

State funds are available for free vaccinations. Producers should contact their own private veterinarian or their area Texas Animal Health Commission office for complete details. The new regulation applies to the 113 counties making up the Class C Area of Texas.

It is important that livestock producers make sure their calves are properly identified when vaccinated. A tattoo in the right ear is proof of vaccination, but the procedure must be done correctly. The person doing the vaccination should clean the ear carefully, rub the ink in thoroughly and press the tattoo pliers firmly.

A vaccinated calf is worth more, but if not properly identified it will cost the producer later on, reminds the agent.

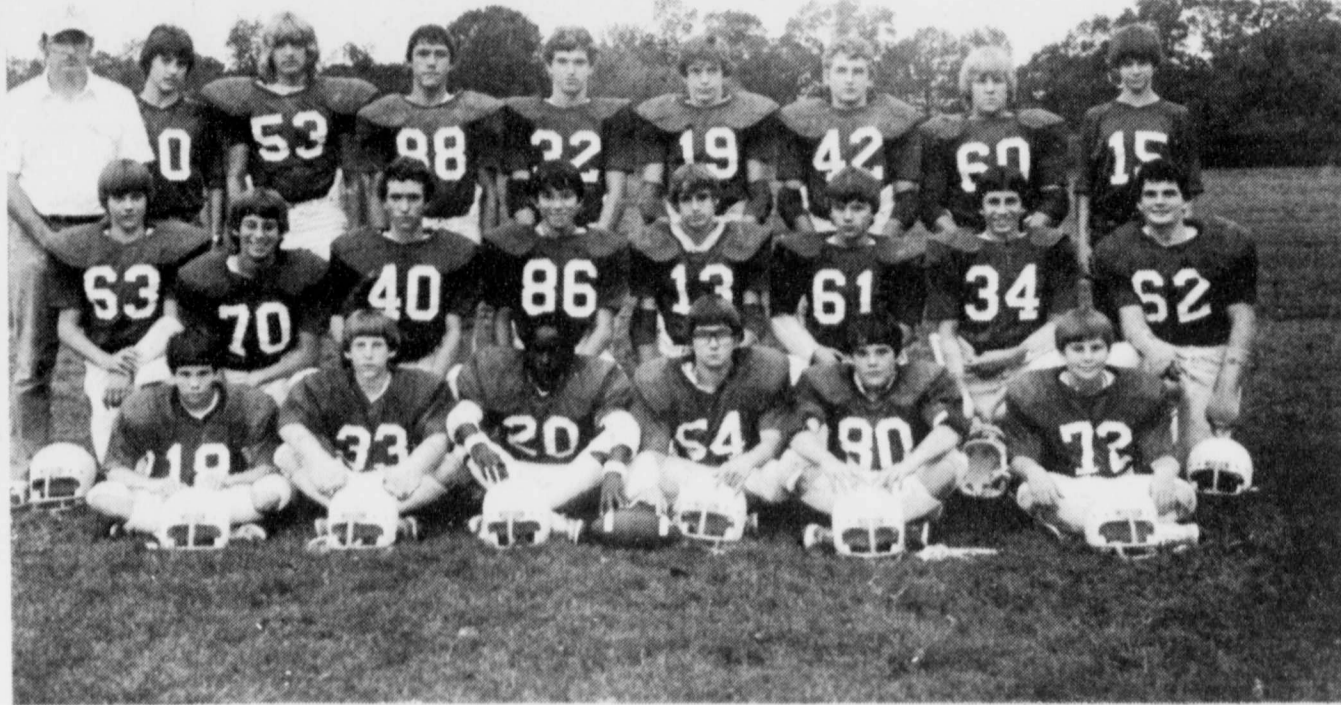

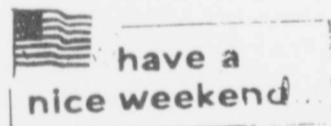
