the Rivercrest tourney. North Lamar and Detroit start at 3:45 with both of these teams considered dark horses.



Old Clippings Reflect Talco Past

While Mes. Tommie Lou Austin of Bonham was here a couple of weeks ago to put Mrs. Ivy Smith's property on the market, she came across some clippings and booklets on the history of Talco. 

Consider toy safety by looking for sharp points and corners, needle-like metal rods, small objects that can be swallowed or fabrics that burn easily.

Determine whether you have storage space available for the toy.

If a toy requires constant adult supervision, consider whether you have the time or interest to spend

In conclusion, if there are doubts concerning toy buying, check an annual copy of Consumer Reports regarding their evaluation of the toy

stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor, difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, Moody outlines these

1. Allow plant material to dry thoroughly before grazing. 2. Feed animals a hay or a supplemental before turning in on plants

that may contain prussic acid. 3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning. 4. Call a veterinarian immediately

if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. 5. Have suspect plant material

checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostis Lab at College Station of Amarillo.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed, points out Moody.







The moisture level ranged from 13 to 14 percent and grade was excellent.

Many producers are experiencing grade problems with their soybeans. In fact, many beans will not grade and producers who have such beans should check with their insurance adjuster before harvesting if they have insurance on the crop.

The three weeks of rain about ruined some of the acreage in the area. It appears to be worse on beans that were ready for harvest before the rain began. The degree of damage also seems to vary with the varieties. Producers are encouraged to be observant of the present condition and learn. If a variety is affected more severely than others, then perhaps we should forget about it in future years.
