

Rebels Take Third In Celeste Tournament

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Celeste for basketball action over the weekend. The Rebs took third place in the tourney by defeating Celeste 75-45.

Rivercrest met Anna in their first round of play. The Rebels trailed at the end of the first quarter 10-8 but rallied with 18 points in the second period to take the lead at the half 26-12.

Rivercrest scored eight in the third quarter to Anna's 13, for a quarter

score of 34-25 in favor of the Rebels. The final period was closely matched with Rivercrest hitting for 14 and Anna 16. Giving the game to the Rebels 48-41.

Scoring for the Rebels were James Anderson with 14; Anthony Brown with 10; Bobby Thomas and Chris Anderson each with eight; and Tony Jasso, Russell Rozell, Brad Anderson and Jody Thornton each with two.

The Rebels advanced to meet Farmersville Friday night in their

second round. Rivercrest scored 52 points but Farmersville came up with 55 for the win.

The Rebs hit 11 points in the first quarter to their opponent's 14 and added 14 more in the second period for a halftime score of 33-25 in favor of Farmersville.

Rivercrest outscored their opponent in the second half but came up short at the final buzzer. The Rebels hit for 10 and 17 respectively to Farmersville's nine and 13. The final tally was 55-52 Farmersville.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Anthony Brown with 21; James Anderson with nine; Chris Anderson with eight; Tony Jasso with seven; Bobby Thomas with five; and Ricky Kennedy with two.

Rivercrest met Celeste Saturday afternoon in the game for third place in the tournament. The Rebels soundly defeated their hosting team 75-45 to take the third place honors.

The Rebs led at the end of the first quarter 24-6 with points coming from Anthony Brown, James Anderson

and Tony Jasso. Rivercrest racked up another 28 points in the second period to lead at the half 52-19.

In the third stanza, Brad Anderson put through twelve points of the sixteen recorded by the Rebels. Celeste came up with 14 for a quarter read out of 68-33 in favor of Rivercrest. Scoring was slow for the Rebel team in the final period with seven being added to their already substantial lead. Celeste scored 12 and handed the third place title to Rivercrest.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Anthony Brown and James Anderson each with 18; Brad Anderson with 14; Tony Jasso with 12; Jody Thornton with six; Chris Anderson with three; and Bobby Thomas and Russell Rozell each with two.

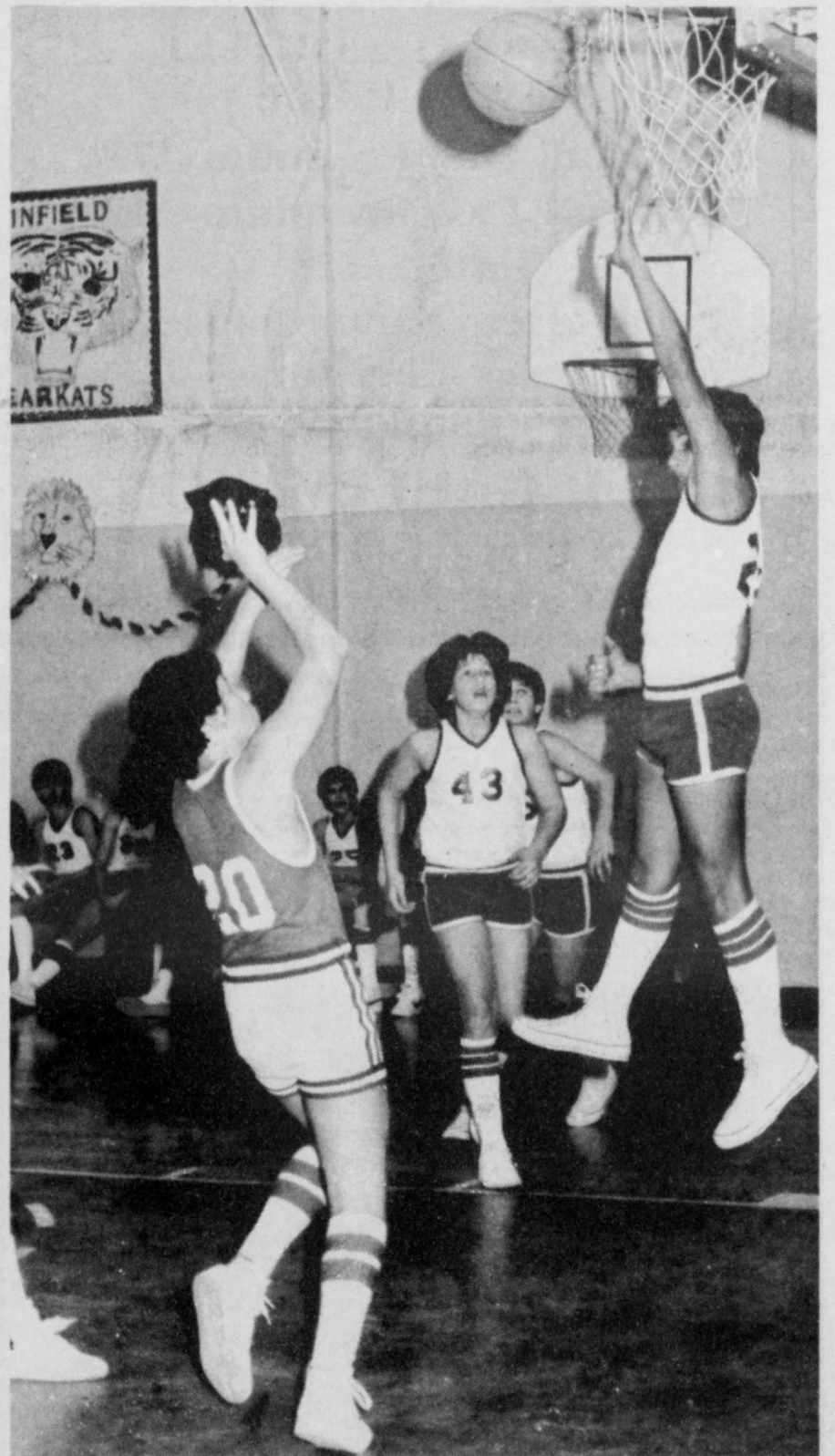

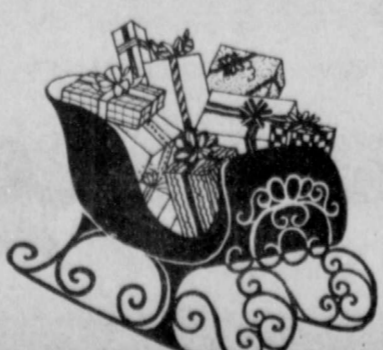

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Paul D. Payne
 Farmers and ranchers will soon be turning their attention to income tax matters and the Farmer's Tax Guide can be of tremendous value on matters concerning rule changes, etc. A good supply of the guides arrived in our office last week and interested individuals can stop for a copy.
 Fighting root knot nematodes in home gardens is a tough battle, and the first step is to get a good soil sample so that the tiny insects can be properly diagnosed.
 The fall months are usually the best for taking soil samples for nematodes, microscopic worms that feed on plant roots. During this time, nematodes are generally in the free living stage and can be recovered easily by checking soil samples.
 To obtain a soil sample, take soil from an area where plants were grown this summer or from the root zone of existing plants. An area where beans, squash, cucumbers or susceptible tomato varieties were grown is the most desirable. Sampling areas where onions, sweet corn or other resistant plants were grown will give an inaccurate picture of the nematode population. Take samples from an area 6 to 8 inches deep after the top 1 or 2 inches of soil have been removed.
 Send samples to the Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University along with a completed information sheet which is available at the County Extension Office. The information sheet is a key part of the nematode test and is critical to developing recommendations for controlling nematodes. Nematode test cost is \$5.00 per sample.
 If your garden is infested with root knot nematodes, you may want to fumigate all or part of your garden. Vapam is a broad spectrum liquid fumigant that can be used to treat gardens. It will reduce the nematode population enough to allow you to grow a successful crop.
 An area treated in your garden this fall should provide protection for nematode sensitive crops such as okra or lima beans next spring.
 Resistant varieties can also be found in seed catalogs. If you order seeds this winter for next year's garden, remember to select varieties that have root knot resistance.

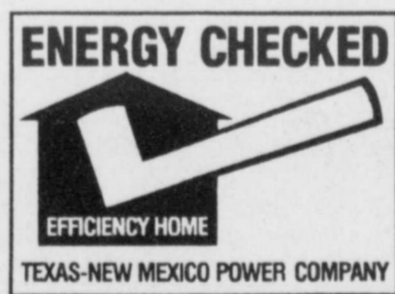

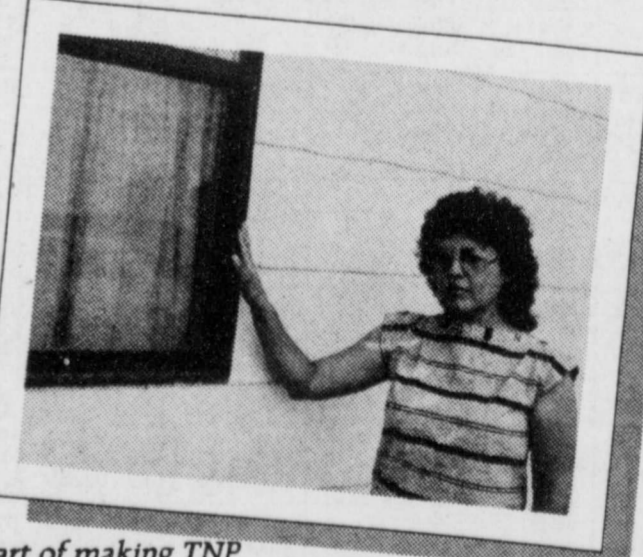

Trimming The Tree's A Tradition

Of all the preparations for Christmas, probably one of the most delightful is the trimming of the tree.

How did this charming custom begin? Some suggest that the tradition dates back to pre-Christian beliefs in the magical powers of evergreens. The ancient Romans, for instance, decorated their homes with greenery for the festival of Saturn, or Saturnalia. This important feast was celebrated during December.

The association of trees with Christmas became defined during the Middle Ages, when miracle plays were performed, often in church, to teach stories from the Bible.

In the miracle plays, an evergreen tree was used to depict the Garden of Eden, with apples hung from the boughs to symbolize the forbidden fruit eaten by Adam and Eve.

Although the miracle plays gradually fell into disuse, the evergreen tree remained as part of the holiday tradition in Europe. Cookies were added to the apples, and yet another form of decoration was borrowed from "pyramid trees" that were also popular during the sixteenth century: candles.

In the 18th century, sugartrees, trees trimmed with sweet meats, were popular. These gilded nuts and fruits gradually evolved into Victorian glass shapes, precursors of today's ornaments.

It was Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, who popularized the custom of the Christmas tree in England. However, America was introduced to the "Tannenbaum" by Hessian soldiers during the Revolution and by German settlers in the mid-eighteenth century.

UIL Reschedules Competitions

A year ago, when H. Ross Perot and the Select Committee on Public Education were emphasizing the idea that students were out of class far too much of the time, a large number of district marching contests and the state contest were scheduled during regular school hours. But the University Interscholastic League has responded to the challenge of educational reform.

This year, the League held district and regional marching band contests on Saturdays or at night, with no loss of class time.

"The music programs came under considerable fire when loss of school time was mentioned," said Richard Floyd, UIL music director. "And some of the criticism was valid. So last spring, music people started looking at the marching band contests, with the idea to schedule every district and regional contest on Saturday."

Then, in September, planning began to reduce the state meet contest in Austin to one day. Even that one day was carefully studied.

"We, and by that, I mean the UIL staff, people from the University and Austin Independent School District, went to the drawing board," Floyd said. "We tried to schedule all larger groups so that their earliest commitment would be 2:30 p.m. Most did not have obligations until 4 or 5 p.m., so unless they lived beyond a reasonable driving distance, most students would stay in school until noon, then board buses and come to Austin for the contest."

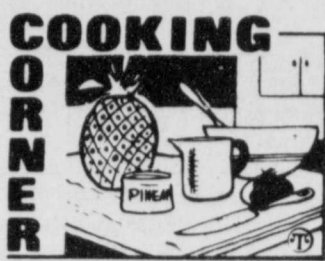
Fifty-three bands participated, and Floyd estimated, between 28,000 and 30,000 persons filled the stands.

"The contest went off extremely well," he said.

The best of the 53 bands was San Antonio McArthur, which won the coveted Governor's Cup. Conference champions included Asherton, Dripping Springs, Robinson, Georgetown and MacArthur. For Georgetown, the victory was its fifth in a row.

Ag Update

Agricultural producers will soon be faced with figuring their tax liability for 1984. According to Wayne Taylor, now is the time to do final planning to reduce the tax burden.

Producers should determine where the business now stands from the records kept during the year. To get an estimate of the tax liability before the end of the year a little simple arithmetic will help. Total income from all sources to date and project income to be received for the remainder of the year. Next, total expenses to date and project expenses for the remainder of the year. Then, look at last year's tax return and estimate personal deductions and depreciation.

Subtract total operating expenses, estimates of itemized personal deductions and depreciation from the

projected 1984 income to obtain a rough estimate of taxable income for 1984.

Taylor suggests reviewing the position shown and then make business decisions accordingly. If additional machinery or equipment is needed and these purchases were being considered anyway, tax liability for cash basis taxpayers could be reduced by making needed investments prior to January 1. In some instances, good buys on various supplies can be found and should be purchased now if they are going to be needed.

Good tax management is a part of good business management, Taylor says. Large investments for machinery or equipment should not be made if the current cash flow will not service the added debt.

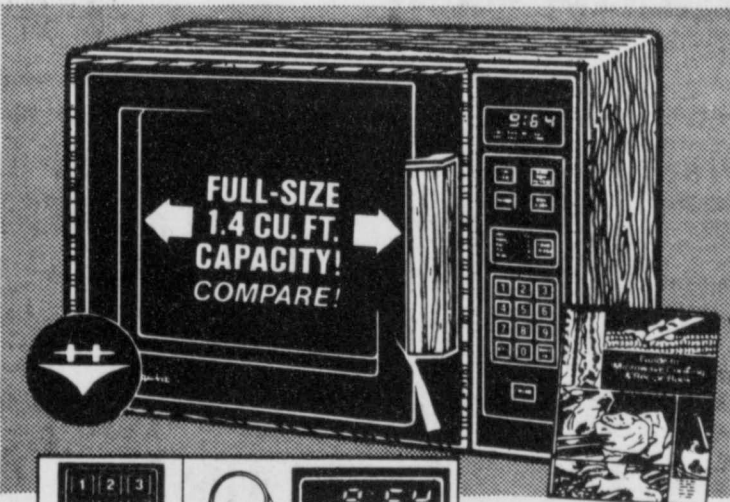

Post Office Offers Christmas Tips

The Postal Service advises that with a little bit of care, holiday cards and packages can arrive on time and in good condition.

In addition to mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, apartment or house number and street number, and the city, state and ZIP code reserved for the last line.

It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure your return address and ZIP code are on the outside of the parcel as well.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 3-1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if you follow a few simple suggestions:

Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item, including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also are good cushioning materials. Padded mailbags are a good way to mail small items.

Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in mail processing equipment.

Tips For Improving Game Land

Hunting season is in full swing by December. Charles VanDeaver, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Clarksville, encourages sportsmen to be observant while hunting.

"You might learn some ways to improve the habitat of your favorite game for the 1985-86 hunting season," VanDeaver said. "For instance, inland duck hunters will likely see more ducks on stock tanks and farm ponds this year. During the summer drought, water levels receded lower than usual, exposing more pond bottom for a longer period of time.

VanDeaver said Japanese millet, which is commercially available, can be planted along the water's edge next summer. Even if fall rains do not flood your plantings, surface feeding ducks will feed on dry land.

"Your hunting sport may be deer, quail, turkey or pheasant," VanDeaver said. "While hunting, keep in mind that good habitat is the key to success. Identify the important characteristics of good habitat for your game. After the season closes, come to the SCS office for assistance in improving the habitat of your favorite game animal."

The local SCS field office gives technical assistance to landowners, operators and others through the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District.
