Offensively the bright spark was Anthony Brown with 26 points. Brad Anderson had a good game coming off the bench and scoring nine points. Tony Jasso was unable to play against Harleton due to sickness. The Rebels have lost Jody Thornton for the season due to an injury unrelated to basketball.

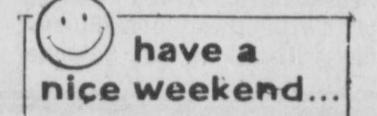
The Rivercrest girls took an early lead in the first quarter 16-8. They added another 11 in the second

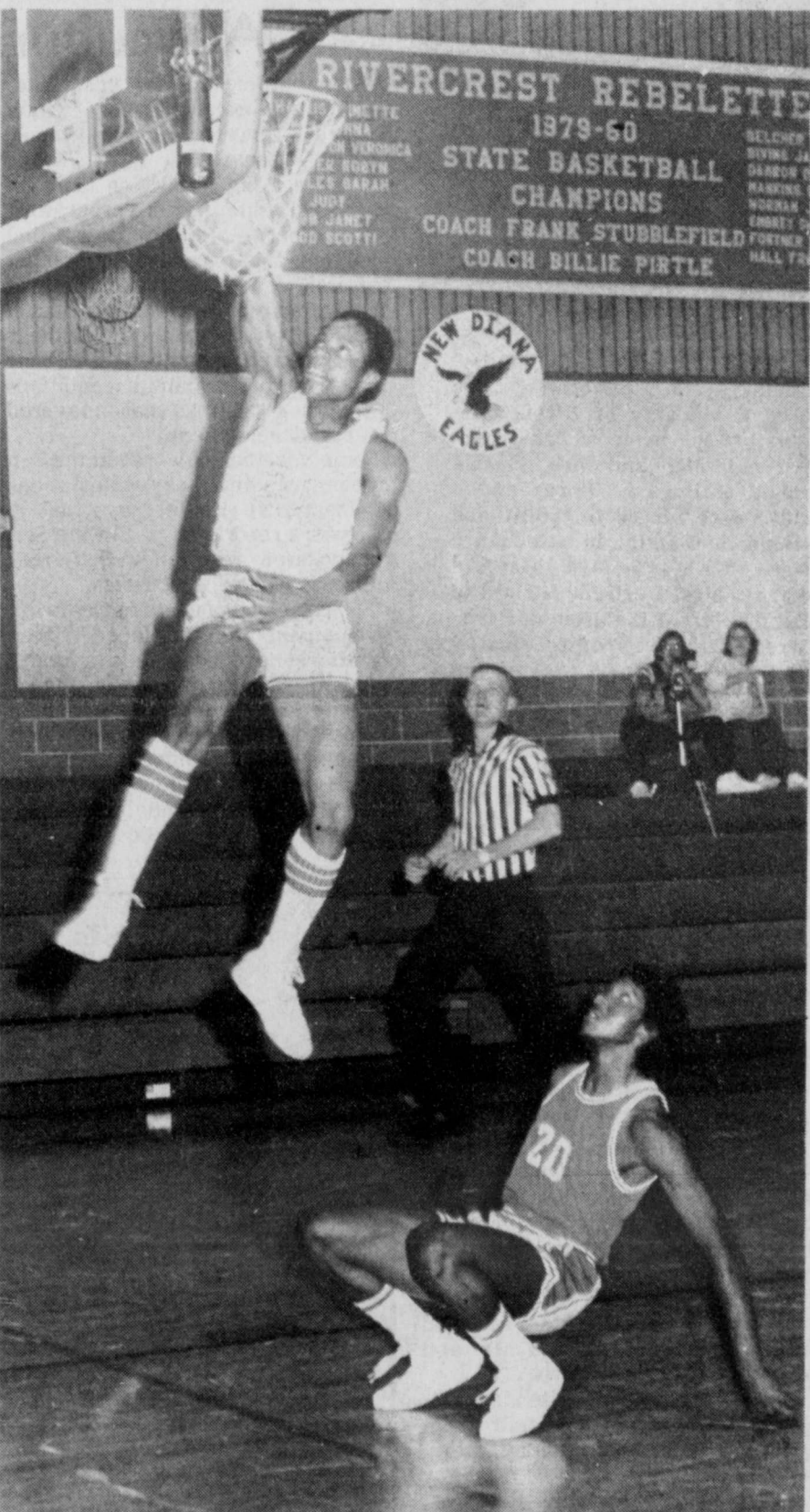

Titus County Oil And Gas Contribute To Economy

The sale of crude oil and natural gas for Titus County wells made an important contribution to the county's economy in 1983 and accounted for \$58.1 million of the \$38.3 billion wellhead value of Texas

petroleum production last year. In its annual survey of the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Texas

Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association reported that the county ranked 135th among 254 counties on the basis of the value of its marketing petroleum production.

The county's wells produced 2,000,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$58.1 million and 20.6 million cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$46,285. Owners of royalty in the county received \$7.3 million as their share of the output, the association noted.

In addition to paying property taxes to cities, counties and school districts, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$2.7 million. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$2.7 million while natural gas levies totaled \$3,741.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 319 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$7.2 million.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas producers spent a reported \$19.9 million in drilling 22 wells, including 5 widecat wells. This effort resulted in completion of 13 oil wells. Some \$8.1 million was lost in drilling 9 dry holes. As of April 1, 1984, there were 524 producing wells in the county.

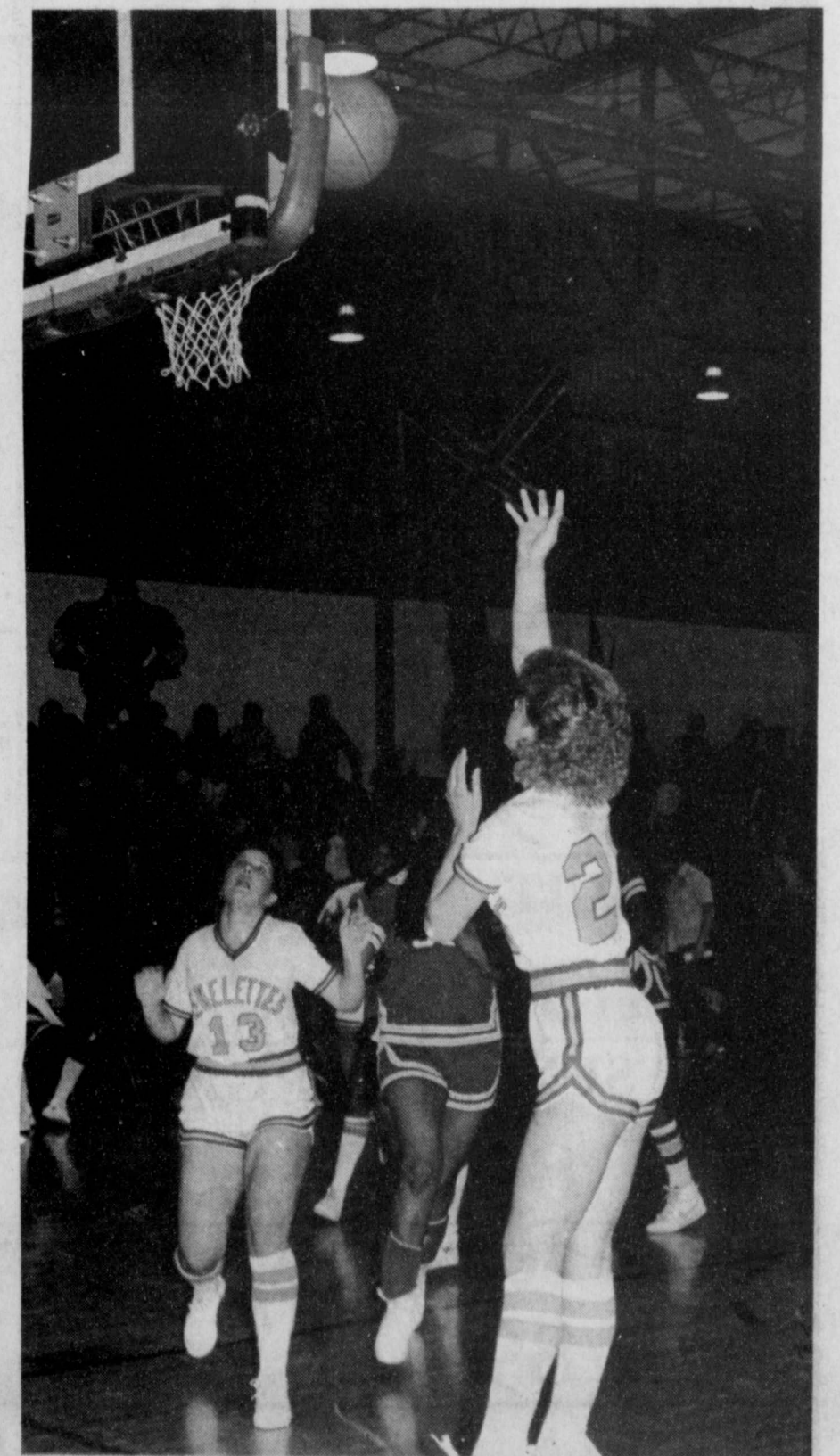

Deport Radio Club

In about 1922 people of Deport became aware of radio as a wireless method of communication and entertainment.

There were no radio receiving sets as we know them today. The few receivers in existence were homemade from locally available materials such as oat meal boxes, copper wire, tin foil, old binding posts, etc. Later the various components were manufactured and could be ordered from supply houses in Dallas or elsewhere. The School Superintendent, a Mr. Ward, as well as some of the high school boys were interested in the newfangled apparatus. Some of us had built receivers by using round oatmeal boxes for cylinders on which to wind up a few panes of window glass with alternate sheets of tin foil to use as condensers or capacitors. A piece of galena crystal with a cat whisker of thin brass wire served as the detector. With these constituents, beginning with a long wire antenna,

and wired together and adjusted, voice and code signals could be heard by using an old time telephone receiver as an earphone.

Store ordered parts became available, but were a little expensive for boys of our financial status. Prof. Ward was interested and encouraged us to organize a radio club and pool our resources and purchase the various parts.

Well, we organized the club and Prof. Ward was elected president. We ordered the parts which consisted of variable condensers, machine wound induction coils, transformers, choke coils, gridleaks, three sets of earphones, and most important, were three of the new de Forest vacuum tubes.

We had to buy batteries because no one had yet come with a rectifier tube that could change high voltage alternating current to smooth direct current that was required for the plate circuits of the tubes.

The little brick building just north of the old First State Bank Building

was not occupied and was available for the club laboratory and meeting room. A table, a few chairs, and a bread board were brought in and we were ready to begin operations. I don't remember who all the members were, but Prof. Ward and Rob Lovin were two of the senior members. Jerry Reece, Russell Grant, Eugene Latimore and Curtis Glover were among the junior members. Mack Glover was a little too young to become a paying member, but he hung around and absorbed everything that went on.

One night, after we had been in operation a few weeks, the equipment was all assembled on the bread board in the center of the table. Prof. Ward was at the controls, three people had the three sets of earphones in use, while the rest of us were sitting or standing around straining our ears trying to hear a sound. The room was empty except for our table and club members assembled in the rear.

You could hear a pin drop because of the attentive silence around the radio, and then a couple of men came in the front door and clomp! clomp! clomped! the length of the building, with the sound of their heavy boots echoing from the floor to the ceiling and back. Everyone put a finger to his lips and tried to schish them to less noise. When they came up to the table, they looked it over a bit, then someone whispered that we were trying to hear some music on the radio.

One of the men, I think was old man Jimmie Curbow from Fulbright, answered in a loud voice, "If you want to hear some real music, come with us down to Halesboro, we are going to turn a bunch of wolf hounds loose."

Note: Two of the members continued on in electronics after the club had served its purpose. Jerry Reece became an electronic technician and radio operator and went with Admiral Byrd to the South Pole. Mack Glover grew up to become a successful radio and television technician and merchant.

Agricultural Weekly

The weather thus far this winter has been excellent for winter pastures. However, extremely cold weather, diseases or insects could still have a big impact on the total success of winter pasture programs.

Dr. George Philley says that conditions are excellent for another leaf rust epidemic on wheat. Leaf rust overwintered in many areas in Texas. It was found on volunteer wheat in mid-December in Lamar County and very mild conditions during the Christmas season favored leaf rust development.

Some varieties of wheat in the San Antonio area have heavy infestations of wheat rust. Philley says that in past years reports of rust in the San Antonio area were followed by rust outbreaks in Northeast Texas.

The basic components for leaf rust development are in place. Winter conditions have been mild and the fungus is present and increasing. A seige of cold weather would help reduce disease development and inoculum build-up more than any other factor. If mild weather continues, there is a potential of another epidemic.

Philley says it is too early to consider chemical control. At this time, cold weather is needed to stop disease development rather than relying on chemicals. Producers are advised to check their fields regularly for symptoms of leaf rust as well as other diseases and insects.

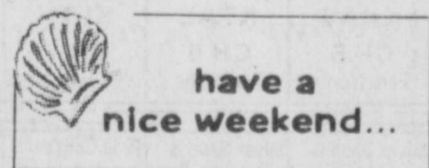

Greens Suffering From Spot

By Herb Brevard

East Texas gardeners traditionally have a small patch of mustard or turnip greens for home consumption during late fall and early winter. Normally, very few insects or diseases infest these plantings. However, this year some reports of fungal leaf spot have been received says Dr. George Philley.

The disease, which can be seed-borne, forms spots about one-fourth inch or smaller in diameter on the leaves. The spots are white in the center and may cover the entire leaf surface.

If the problem appears every year, fungicide applications should begin when the plants come up. Maneb and zineb are two recommended fungicides. Philley cautions that there is a 10-day waiting period between application and harvest.

If plants are currently infected with the leaf spot, all the infected leaves should be picked and destroyed. All other harvestable leaves should be picked and eaten. Another method is to cut all the leaves about two inches above the ground and begin a fungicide spray program, keeping in mind the 10 day waiting period.

Philley says that cooler weather may slow disease development. The wet, rather mild weather in October was very conducive to the development of the leaf spot.

The spray program, following the removal of infected leaves, should give fairly good control of the disease. Follow all label directions for applying the fungicide.
