What's The News? The Weather!

For nearly a full week, the weather has been the major event throughout the area.

Residents are tired of the ice turning every footstep into an adventure and every vehicle trip into a nightmare.

The first cold front moved into the neighborhood last Thursday, dumping snow so dry and powdery that youngsters were cheated out of the fun of snowmen! The tiny crystals would not stick together enough to make snowballs or snowmen, even though all area schools were turned

out. The next day saw yet another few inches of snow fall, as people skidded and slipped in their rounds to do only those things that were necessary. Those that could, stayed home, confidently expecting the white froze everything back solid.

Things were slowly improving by Monday morning, and people scrambled to stock up on dwindling supplies of groceries, make doctor or pharmacy visits, and generally prepare themselves for the predicted onslaught of yet another cold front,

this one to contain rain, turning to ice.

Surprise...the front hit sooner than expected, and by eleven Monday morning, steps, rails and everything exposed to the weather were coated with glazed ice, while sleet and rain pelted out of the gray skies.

The precipitation continued until after nightfall, while power company employees kept a watchful eye on groaning electric lines and trees began to crack and squeal in protest as the ice slowly built up.

Roads were a solid sheet of ice,

although the highway department sanded bridges and slick spots, and city employees used city maintainers to scrape down main streets.

Schools continued to provide youngsters with an unexpected holiday, and all basketball games and other sports had to be cancelled, leaving a lot of make-up games to be played when the weather finally does thaw.

Cattlemen have watched in dismay as their livestock ate their way through stack after stack of hay, the only alternative letting them weaken

from lack of food. The extreme shortage of hay during the past summer has made the ice and snow even more of a problem. Numbers of ranchers reported calves being born during the bitter weather.

What is next? According to the weather prognosticators, a thaw should arrive during the latter part of the week, and hopefully this area, not accustomed to northern type weather, can breathe a little easier and pick up where they left off in daily life.

Post Office To Accept Bids On New Building

Bids will be accepted for construction of the new Post Office in Bogata, according to Bill McMillan, manager of the real estate branch, FREBO, U.S. Postal Service.

An assignable option to purchase land is held by the post office for a site on the west side of North Main Street in Bogata, and bids will be

confined to that site. Bid package, available from the post office, will contain complete plans and specifications, and architectural services are not required of bidders.

Four consecutive 5-year renewal options will be available on the building, and the Postal Service will pay all utility bills after occupancy.

School Trustee Election To Be Scheduled

A school trustee election will be held in the Talco-Bogata Schools on Saturday, April 6, 1985 for the purpose of electing three school trustees. The terms of Jerry Russell and Eddy Brown of the Talco area are expiring and the term of Drue Pirtle of the Bogata area is expiring. One trustee is to be elected from

the Bogata area for a three-year term; one trustee is to be elected from the Talco area for a three-year term; and one trustee is to be elected for a one-year term and may come from the Bogata or Talco area according to the number of votes

received. All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election shall be in writing, signed by the candidate and filed at the superintendent's office at Rivercrest by March 6, 1985.

Howard Will Not Seek Hall's Office

The following is a press release received from the office of Sen. Ed Howard on Wednesday, February 6, 1985:

President Reagan's forthcoming announcement of Congressman Sam Hall's appointment to the Federal Judiciary has prompted many of my friends and supporters to encourage me to run for Congress in the first congressional district of Texas. A number of national leaders in both political parties have also called and encouraged me to make this race.

After much soul searching and prayerful consideration, I have decided that my duty to the people of Texas at this time is in the Texas Senate. I will not be a candidate for Congress in 1985.

State government needs all the help it can get from responsible conservatives in meeting our current budgetary crisis during this legislature. It is important that we avoid a tax increase yet still meet our obligations to the people. I would not feel responsible if I were to walk away from the forthcoming debate over what amounts to the financial future of our state.

My decision was difficult for the strength of Texas in Washington has been the influence of our congressional delegation. I am profoundly grateful for the many expressions of encouragement from friends and supporters who feel I could serve effectively in the House. My duty at this time, however, is clearly in the Texas Legislature.

Talco Past... Ladies organize

Many years ago, some Talco ladies organized a home demonstration club. In a few years they found that some of the members were unable to get very much out of it, because they did not have a garden, orchard, poultry or livestock and in 1931 for a short time, Titus County had no

home demonstration agent. So at this time, it was decided rather than abandon our club, we would each buy a book and continue as The Talco Book Club.

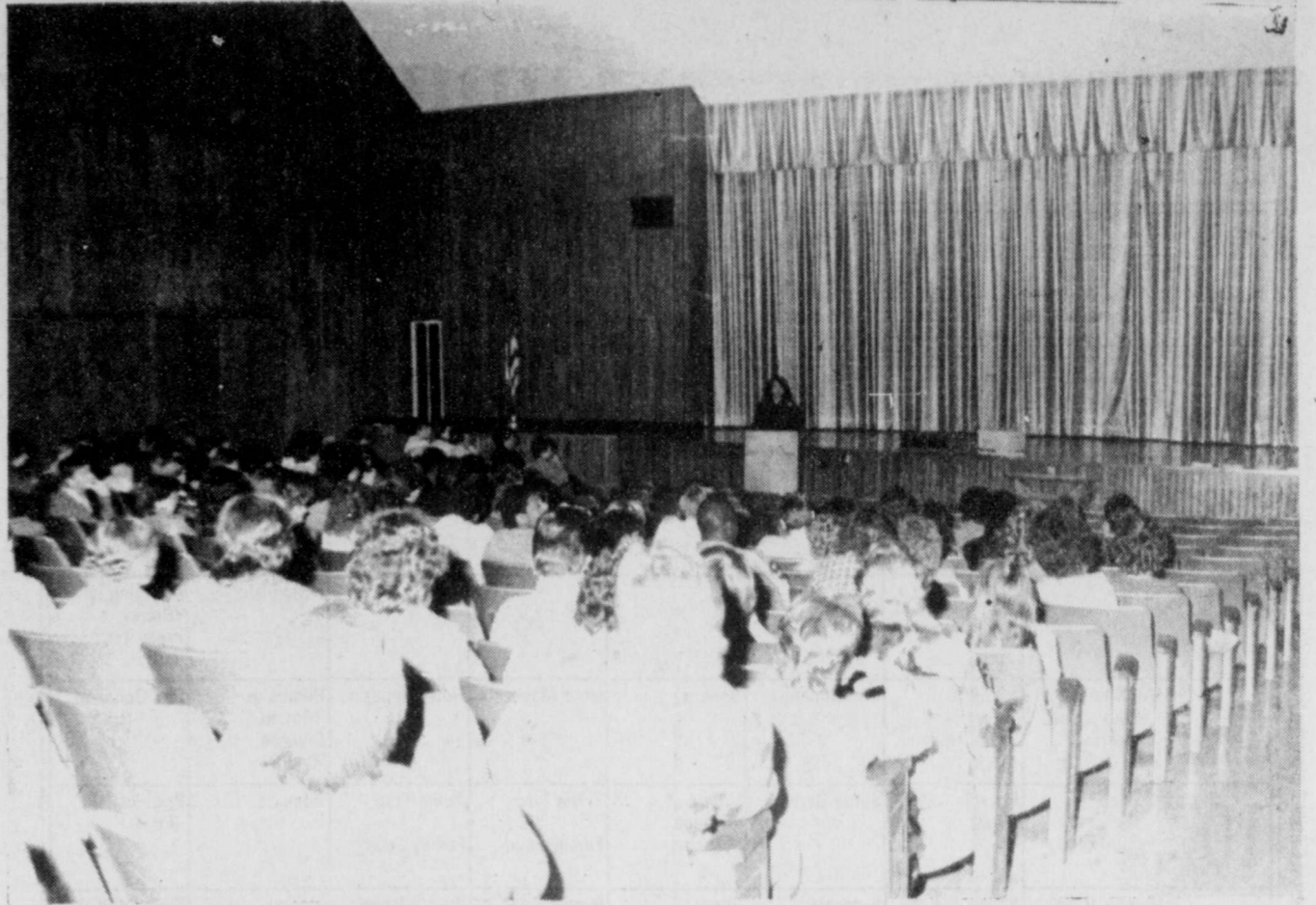
Then in 1936 came the oil boom and with it, the height of excitement. I shall never forget the last meeting we had that year. It was in the home

of Mrs. Wilton Kelley. It hink every member was present but we did not get much out of the meeting because about the time the program would get interesting, there would be a knock at the door and someone's husband would need her to go sign some important papers. This kept up until our meeting was about ruined but no one seemed to care when there were prospects of getting our hands on some of that liquid gold we had heard so much about. We decided that no one would have time for the club with so many added duties brought on by the hustle and bustle of those oil boom days and agreed to disband for a while.

The later part of 1937 after we had become reconciled to the great change in our little town and almost exclusively with strangers, we began to miss the fellowship we had enjoyed so much in our club. We reorganized this time calling it the Book Lovers Club which has been in progress ever since and I hope will always be.

No great achievements were made in these 13 years, but that was not the purpose to begin with. It was reorganized mainly for the association of friends and to have something in which to be interested other than everyday problems. We believe it has been an inspiration to each of us to make an effort to improve our lives, we have studied and worked together, increasing our knowledge, our ability to understand people and also our treasury has always had a fund for flowers or little gifts to members who were sick or lost a loved one and to members moving away. The fund was started by each member giving one penny at each meeting but was increased to five cents in 1944. Every year a donation of \$5.00 was given each to the Red Cross drive and March of Dimes and in 1943 a \$25.00 war bond was purchased. In 1945 the Book Lovers Club assisted the Fine Arts Club in sponsoring a Teen Age Club. Also sponsored a Halloween Carnival to raise funds for the Teen Club.

Every year since we have sponsored a Halloween Carnival, assisted by the Fine Arts Club until 1949 when we were assisted by the American Legion Auxiliary. We have cleared around \$1,500 from Halloween Carnivals the past five years. Out of this we have donated \$75.00 to the school library, \$101.72 for improving the city hall, \$25.00 to the American Legion for use of their building for carnival, \$10.00 to the McKinney VA Hospital, 8 baskets of fruit to shut-ins on Christmas of 1948, \$10.00 to Mrs. George Wimms for a book review, \$20.00 for a lawn mower in 1947 when we took the care of the cemetery, our project. Paid \$12.00 on having the

Pete Jack Takes Revenge!

In the early 1920's, the town urchin or town brat in Deport was Pete Jack Barrett. Pete Jack's father owned and operated the town taylor and dry cleaning shop, so Pete Jack was around pretty well all the time. He was a little runt that wouldn't weigh more than fifty pounds soaking wet. He liked money, and would sing for pay. He sang in a thin high pitched tinny voice and his repertoire consisted of most of the old songs as well as some of the songs that were popular at the time.

Pete Jack would stand on the hood of a car or on a box or crate and sing as long as someone would pitch him a coin. Everyone liked him and he became the object of lots of teasing and jokes. Buck Mathis would especially give him a bad time by sneaking up to him and pinching him.

Back in those days the barber shop was usually located next door to the taylor shop in order that the steam boiler could furnish hot water for

Cloar, Cynthia Barber, O.F. Stevenson, S.A. Tidwell, Geoffrey Gieger, L.L. Morris, L.B. Davis, A.L. Rodgers, Nell Warner, Legrand Cato, Lena Kelley, J.C. Westbrook, W.R. Singleton, D. Parr, Felix Jones, C.E. Jones, Joe Hall, H.J. Hill, Kate Moore.

Two of the charter members are still living, they are Mrs. B.L. Gieger and Mrs. J.L. Cato.

Buck and the chicken left the bathroom at the same instant. The hen flew to the rear of the building, and Buck ran to the front. Buck wouldn't go back to get his clothes until someone caught the chicken and turned her out into the street.

Buck never knew who chickened him out and Pete Jack never told.

HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

ABOUT YOUR WILL

If you are old enough to draw Social Security and don't have a will, you are years late. Your beneficiaries would have been in for a lot of grief had something happened to you. However modest your estate, lack of a will, spelling out in clear language what is to be done with it, creates a costly, tangled web that may reduce it to nothing. The state could get most of your assets; your relatives may be hounded for unpaid debts.

Making a will is easy and inexpensive. In some states, a handwritten will is valid, and keeps your wishes a secret. Your will, however, should be stored in a safe place, such as a safety deposit box and someone you trust should know where to find it.

You can get an attorney to prepare your will at a reasonable price. You just spell out your wishes and your will is written accordingly. If you decide to write your own, you can do it without legal language, but you must write clearly and concisely. State your wishes quickly and plainly, so that nothing may be misunderstood. Completely identify all the people named in your will, by full name. If there is a cash distribution to your heirs, allot percentages, rather than dollars, so that a changing economy won't upset your plans.

You can change your will any time, naming new beneficiaries or a new executor. If this is done, it's best to write a complete new will. Never mark over, erase, or insert new language between the lines of your will. You can add to a will, but it's better to do it over, from scratch, to avoid controversy or conflicting statements.

Arkla Gas

Customers of Arkansas Louisiana Gas Company who find they have difficulty in paying for the use of natural gas in heating this winter now have a plan to help pay those bills.

Sherman Tate, Arkla vice-president for community affairs, said the Arkla Special Assistance Program was designed to provide a wide variety of plans to assist in these payments, either through

programs developed internally at Arkla or through dozens of federal, state, local and private organizations which have agreed to work with Arkla in helping its customers.

The Special Assistance Program is aimed specifically at helping customers who are elderly and on fixed incomes, who are handicapped, or who have low incomes. Arkla representatives, at all its local offices in the five state area in which it operates, are available to talk with customers to see if they qualify for one of the Arkla plans.

If they are unable to qualify for the primary Arkla Special Assistance Program, Tate said the company has a secondary plan known as the Agency Assistance Program which would bring together a customer and an outside agency to work for a solution.

There are 166 locations of these agencies in Arkansas, Louisiana, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas served by Arkla.

Last year, Arkansas Louisiana Gas Company lost \$4.4 million in unpaid bills. Tate said some of this loss was attributed to customers who could have paid, but elected not to do so and had no intent of ever paying.

But others, he pointed out, were unable to pay because they didn't have the money at the time and would have fulfilled their obligations if there had been some way to do so.

Tate said it was important that persons interested in knowing more about the program contact their nearest Arkla office as soon as possible for details. The company has started an advertising awareness campaign which will include information in all its monthly bills as well as plans to meet with various groups and organizations to explain the procedures and the program.

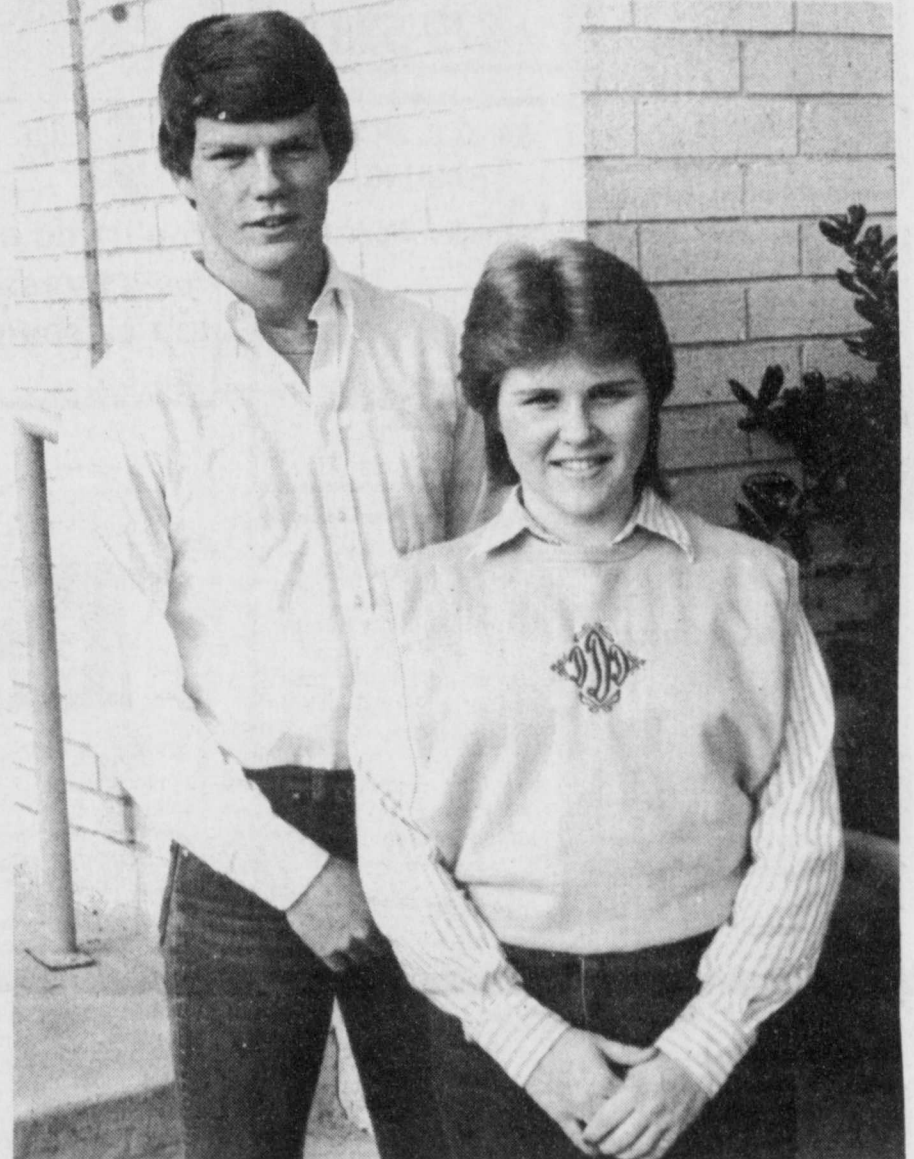

Family Meetings Improve Communication

Our hectic lifestyles mean much of the communication between parents and children is conducted through notes and short bursts of information, according to Bonnie Kyle, County Extension agent. Yet, family relations experts tell us that good communication is important in preventing family problems.

One way to insure adequate communication in your family is to hold regular family meetings. Families with children of any age can benefit from family meetings. But it may be easier to start when the children are young, since they are more likely to have a positive attitude about the meeting.

She says a family meeting is simply a regularly scheduled time when all family members share their plans, wishes, complaints, questions and suggestions about matters of concern.

The meetings may not catch on with the children at first, because they represent a change. Listen to the messages behind their complaints but continue to meet on a regular basis. Go over the ground rules of the meeting and the specific how to's, so they will be more comfortable participating.

Select a convenient time and place for the meeting by consulting everyone involved. Post a notice of the meeting on the refrigerator door or in some other visible place.

Discuss the purpose of each meeting and agree on some ground rules. They may include the length of time for meetings; one person speaks at a time, no interrupting; no distractions such as telephone calls, television or pets will be permitted.

Family members who do not attend the meeting must accept the consequences of decisions made when they were not there.

Family members can't outvote each other, all members must agree on a decision.

Parents and children take turns leading the meetings.

Include some family fun at each meeting so it becomes a positive experience.
