

To the Editor:

The February 11 meeting of the Commissioners' Court raised more questions than it answered.

We were told that some commissioners were ready to commit the County there and then, without consulting the public under the provisions of the Texas Constitution, to spend more than half a million Judge Whiteman firmly opposed proceeding without putting the matter to a vote of the taxpayers.) We were not told why the court had not explored possible cheaper estimates for repairing the present building, nor why we should accept the estimates of a firm that had overestimated by nearly 100 percent the cost of a new building.

We were told that the County has available an unobligated fund of nearly half a million dollars. We were not told why this sum has been quietly accumulated over the past two years, in the face of such crying needs as that for improved county roads, so long neglected that in bad weather our children cannot get to school, our mail cannot be delivered, and our farmers and ranchers cannot get to their lands. Has there been a secret plan all along to put aside enough money to pay for a new courthouse without consulting the public through a bond election? Members of the Court are well aware that a bond election would almost certainly fail.

We were told that our historic courthouse is no longer satisfactory and should be replaced. We were not told why we need to proceed with such suspicious haste--why, if a new courthouse is truly needed, we cannot take time to find an endowment that would enable us to save "Old Red" the centry-old building that has always symbolized our belief in self-government and the American system of justice.

Those are important issues, doubtless with some right on all sides. I, for one, do not believe that it is necessary for the Commissioners' Court to take a "father knows best" attitude and attempt to throw curves and fast balls of half-truth past the public. (At the February 11 meeting, one commissioner actually asked whether the members of the Court could not meet to discuss the matter privately? Why is the public interest threatened by having press and public present?)

In my view, the taxpayers of Red River can be trusted to make reasonable decisions if they are given the facts. They could well decide whether to spend more than half a million dollars for a new plastic courthouse with a life expectancy of some twenty-five years and of even shoddier construction than our brand new jail, whose roof won't shed water and whose utility bills rival those of Old Red. It is high time for the Commissioners to level with the public.

Winter Pastures Need Fertilizer

By Herb Brevard

As soon as it is dry enough to get equipment in the fields, fertilizer so high, this additional nitrogen should be applied to winter pastures, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With adequate moisture available in most areas, the plants will be able to immediately utilize the fertilizer.

Reeves says apply about 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. However, this depends on when the last application was made. Nitrogen is generally used within a 45 day period. If nitrogen was applied less than 45 days ago, the next application could be delayed.

When the weather warms and the winter pasture begins growing, dark green color of the plants indicates that they are not suffering from lack of nitrogen. Dark green color around manure piles and a yellow color on the other plants indicates a need for

Since the price of winter pasture is application should be very economical and will more than pay for itself in additional forage.

Reeves says it is also time to think about preemerge herbicides for controlling weeds in hay meadows. The highest quality hay is produced in the spring. An acre of land will produce just so much forage under a given set of conditions. If left uncontrolled, weeds will make up a large percentage of the total forage produced and will reduce the quality of the hay tremendously.

Good Bulls Crucial To Cattle Operation

By Herb Brevard

Most East Texas cattlemen are either ready to put out bulls or will be in the near future. Serious time, thought and consideration should be given prior to the breeding season, says Dr. Randall Grooms.

If the cattleman uses the right bull, he will maintain daughters and granddaughters in the herd for the next 20 years. If he picks the wrong bull, without genetic merit, it can be very costly adn expensive in sacrificed production.

Eighty-five percent or more of all genetic improvement is made through the herd sire, Grooms says. If cattlemen select bulls of known superior genetic merit, genetic progress can be made very rapidly.

Many breeds are now publishing sire summaries that give accurate breeding values of birth weights. weaning weights, yearling weights and maternal values

Commercial cattlemen may be able to use the truly superior bulls if their management program allows for artificial insemination. If they are not geared for AI, many top sons of these bulls are available after completion of their yearling performance tests.

Commercial cattlemen seeking genetic improvement should select sons of trait leaders that excel in their weanign weight and yearling weight ratios. Ratio expresses the relative standing of an individual in his contemporary group, with 100 equaling the average. Ratios above 100 are the superior individiuals.

Grooms says that care should be given to select bulls without extremely heavy birth weights and from cows that excel in milking ability. The idea commercial bull would have 100 plus ratios for weaning and yearling weights and a small birth weight.






