

Superintendent Named At Talco-Bogata

Harold Cowley, who is presently serving in his fifth year as superintendent of the Iowa Park Schools, has been elected as the new superintendent of the Talco-Bogata Schools, replacing Talmadge Morgan, who is retiring. Mr. Cowley has his roots in East Texas, being born in Titus County and grew up there on a small farm. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Cowley and has one brother, Alfred.

Mr. Cowley was graduated from Winfield High School at the age of 15. He attended Paris Junior College for two years and received the Bachelor of Science Degree from East Texas State University with a major in

agriculture and a minor in general science. He did graduate work at Midwestern State University and was awarded the Master's in Educational Administration from that institution. He has done post-graduate work at ETSU.

Mr. Cowley and his wife, the former Lou Jane Rawson, were married in 1954. They have one son, James, who is currently a junior at East Texas State University. Mrs. Cowley, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Brice Rawson of the Tira Community in Hopkins County, is also a graduate of East Texas State University. She received the

Bachelor of Business Administration and the Master's of Library Science from that institution. She teaches business courses at Iowa Park High School.

Prior to being named superintendent of schools at Iowa Park, Cowley served as assistant superintendent from 1970 until 1980. In Iowa Park schools, he also held the position of elementary school principal for three years. Before going to Iowa Park in 1964 as a vocational agriculture teacher, Cowley had taught vocational agriculture in Harrold Schools for nine years.

Mr. Cowley's educational affiliations include: Texas Association of School Administrators, Region IX Association of School Administrators, Region IX School Masters, and Texas State Teachers Association (Life Member). He is currently serving as president of Texhoma Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa.

He is active in church and civic organizations and has served as vice-president and on the board of directors of Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce. He is on the Board of Directors of Wichita County United

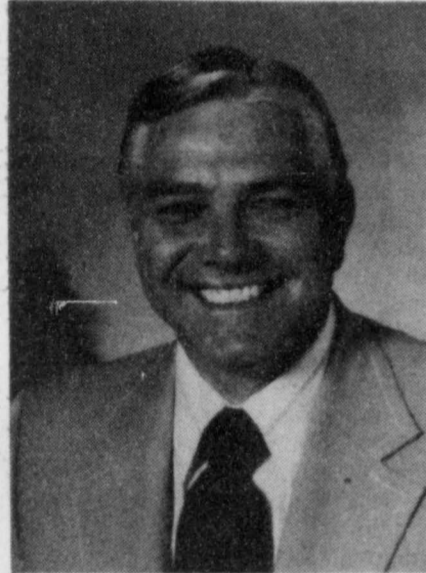
Way and past chairman of the Iowa Park United Way. He has served as secretary of the Wichita County Livestock Board of Directors. He has been involved in the Boy Scouts serving as Troop Committeeman, Treasurer of Troop 37, Assistant Scoutmaster and acted as an adult leader for an expedition to Philmont.

Cowley is currently chairman of the Administrative Board of the First United Methodist Church at Iowa Park; he is past chairman of the Board of Trustees and has been a lay speaker.

Under Cowley's leadership Iowa

Park schools have developed curriculum guides according to State mandated criteria with reference to House Bill 72 and House Bill 246, has established one of the strongest vocational offerings for a school of its enrollment, has maintained a financial management and accounting program modeled by other schools, and has been recognized as one of the premier school districts in the State for its academic standards.

Mr. Cowley will assume his duties as superintendent of the Talco-Bogata Schools on July 1.

The Bean Poles

Swain and Rose Lawler lived down the road from us. That spring, come gardening time, Rose and my Mother each planted pole or climbing beans in their gardens.

They didn't think that bush beans were fit to eat, they had to have the climbing kind. Bean poles were not easy to come by on the prairie, and the two men, because of crop pressure, had not taken time to go to the woods for them.

The beans began to run so the two women decided to go get the poles. Rose knew where there was an ash thicket, a couple of miles away, on Brushy Creek. There should be plenty of poles there.

One Saturday after dinner, while Dad and Swain had gone to town, Rose and Mother got Marion and I to hitch the mules to the wagon, then loaded all the kids and two axes and headed for the creek. We found plenty of good straight slender poles.

Everyone was so busy cutting and loading poles that no one saw a black cloud building up in the west. When it began to thunder, we realized that a rain storm was approaching.

We immediately loaded up and started home. Before we had gone very far, big drops of rain began to

splat down on us and we could see the storm coming up fast. Marion, Rose's oldest son, put the mules into a fast trot. We could see the rain streaking down across the prairie behind us as the lightning flashed and the thunder boomed. That just increased our speed.

We got home when the storm hit. We unhooked the team and turned them into the lot with the harness on, and ran to the house. By the time we got inside, the hail was coming down on the sheet iron roof with a deafening roar. When it was over, the ground was covered with balls of ice.

The runnign beans were beat into the ground, but we had plenty of poles for next year.

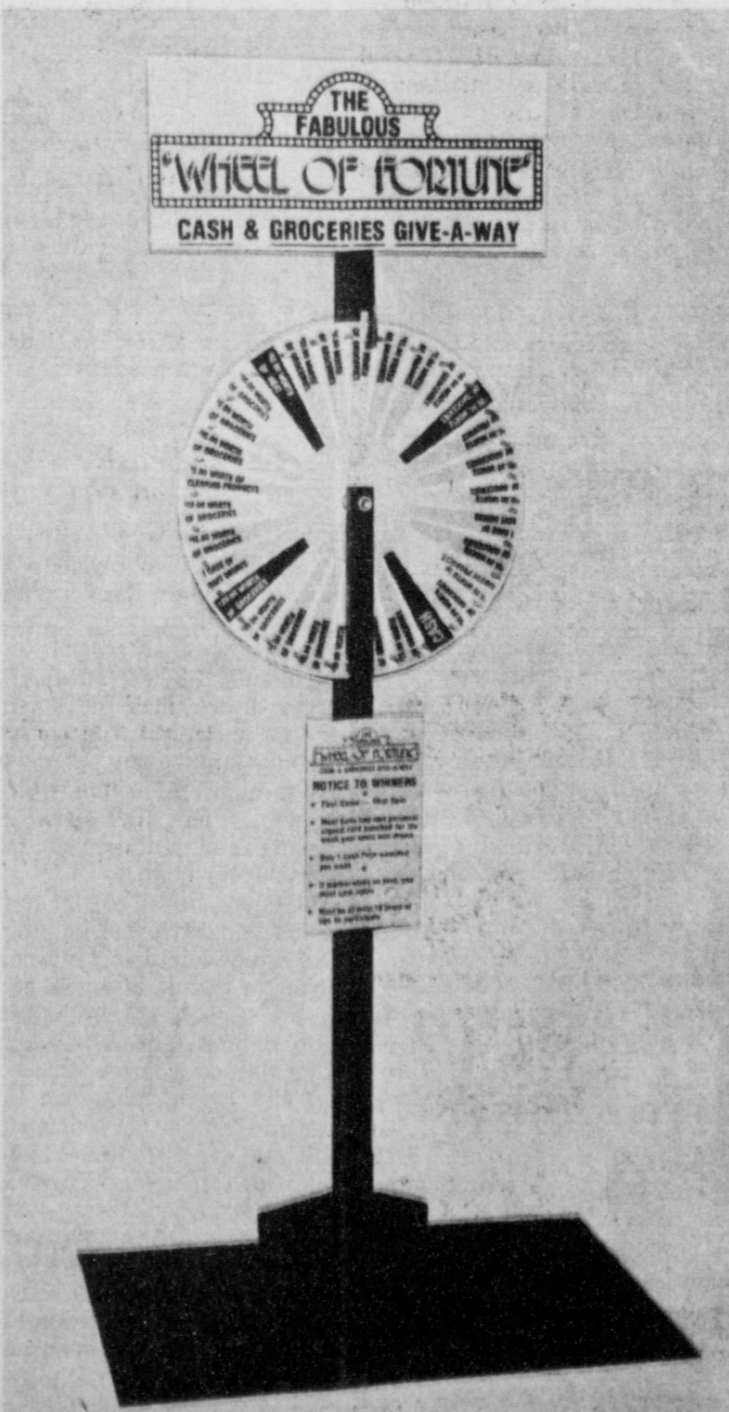

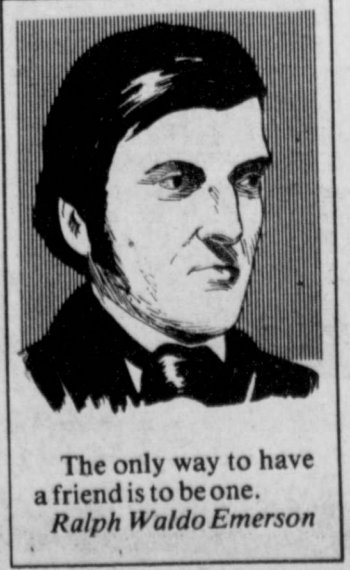
Mrs. Bertha N. Wims Dies At Age 71

Mrs. Whitney Celebrates 81st Birthday

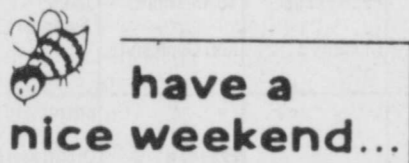
