## Bogata Lions Club Five Years Old

In 1980, several concerned men from the Bogata area received a charter from Lion's Club International to begin a local club. The club was organized with 35 charter members and officers were selected and installed at a charter night banquet held on Friday, June 13, 1980 at the Rivercrest High School Cafeteria. The sponsoring club was the Detroit Lion's Club.

Lion's Club International is a civic oriented organization designed for the benefit of communities where they are located. They are a support to research in the field of diabetes and eye disease. Lion's Clubs support a crippled children's camp in Kerrville and they operate a seeing eye dog training school and help in

the placing of trained dogs. Another area of benevolence is the providing of eye glasses to the needy.

Through the five years of service in Bogata and the surrounding area, the club has been able to aid several people. Families have had food and clothing supplied to them through the efforts of the club. Donations have been made to several families who have suffered adverse circumstances and to families who have lost their houses and possessions in fires. Eye examinations and the purchase of eyeglasses have been funded either partially or in full by the Club.

The first major Club project was to restore the Community Center. This was a large project for the newly

organized club, but with the support of the community and funds provided by various ones, the buildings and grounds are now attractive and usable. Funds received from the rent of the building provide for it's upkeep. This has proven to be very useful for the community.

The Bogata Lion's Club has also been involved in community activities, such as sponsoring the Frontier Day activities, including the pancake breakfasts and the Christmas parade. They have also provided some repair work on the baseball field.

There are two major fund raising projects each year: operating the concession stand at the rodeo and the sale of light bulbs. It is a concern of

## Seminar Set At PJC

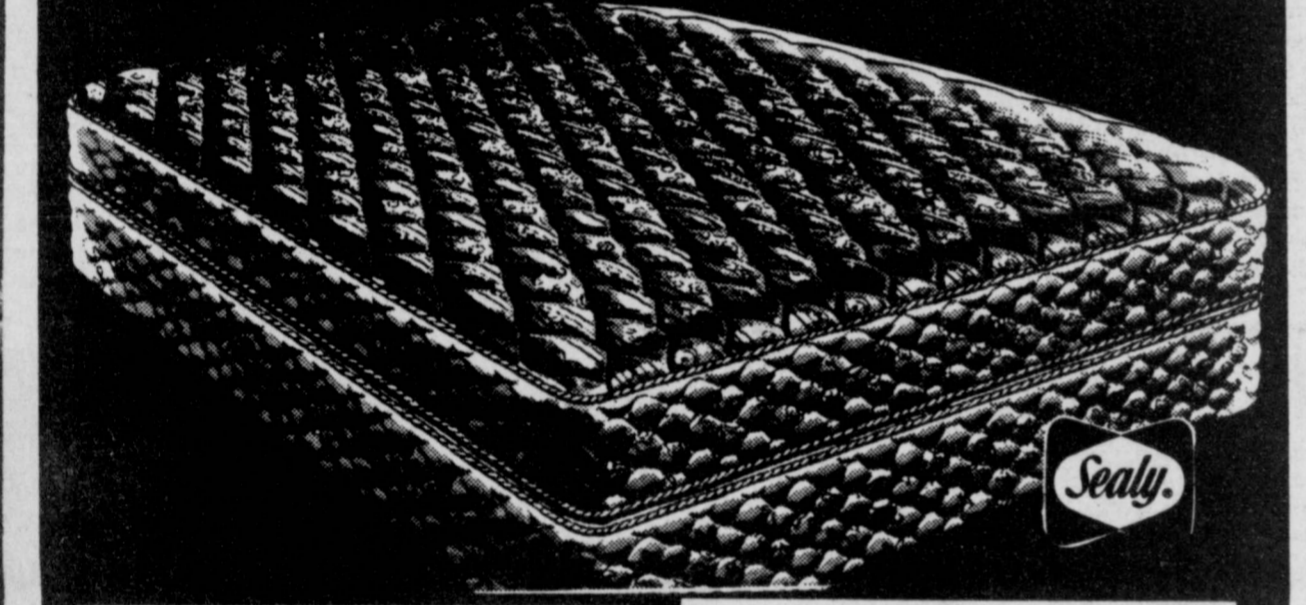

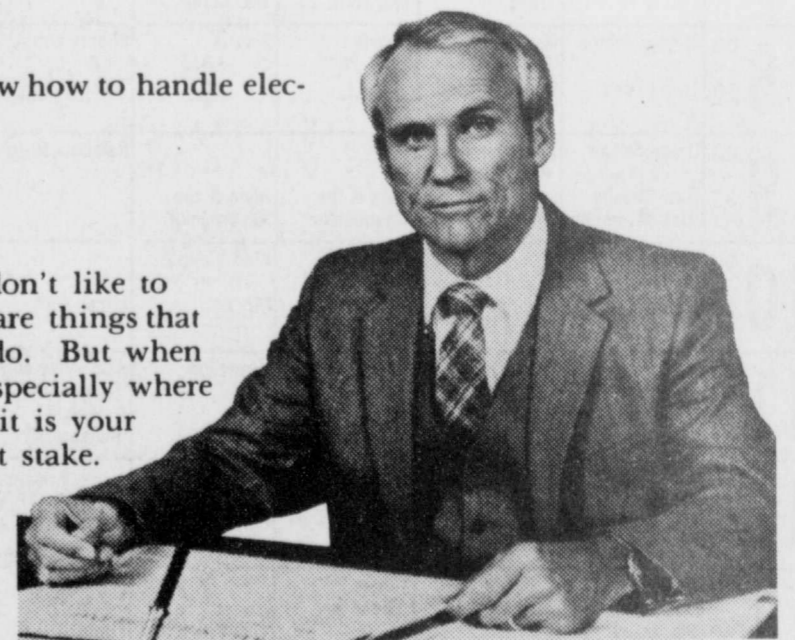

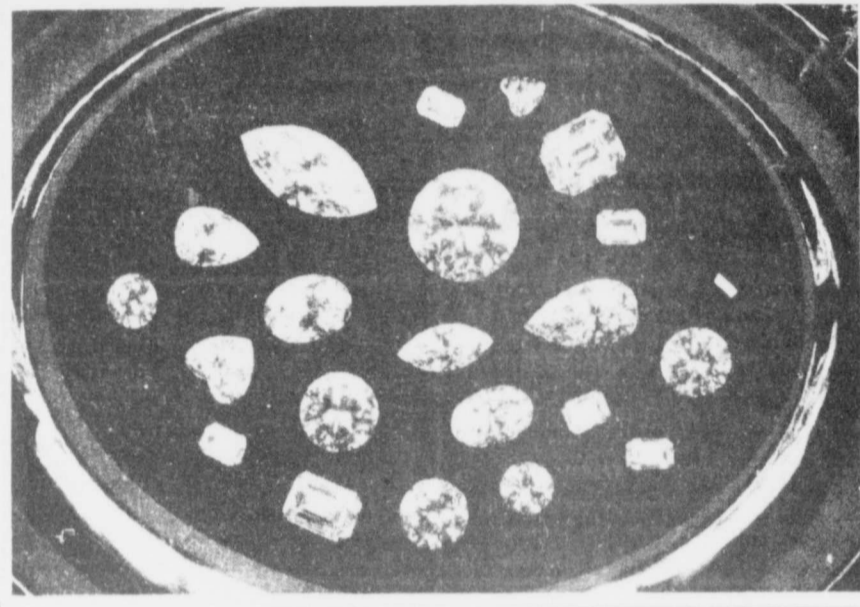
