Under the picture of the 1925 graduates, unable to attend was my brother, Wayne Ferguson of Brady, TX who is recovering from heart surgery, instead of Wayne Humphreys. He is recuperating at home now before going back to Audie Murphy VA Hospital in San Antonio for further surgery this week. He regretted so much that he could not attend his 60th reunion.

We always look forward to the Bogata Homecoming, seeing old friends and all the activities but Hubert, my husband, has developed a heart condition and his doctor advised against going, much to our dismay.

Seeing the pictures of the former Bogata Bulldogs brought back a lot of memories, Hubert played on the very first team the Bogata Bulldogs had, we think about 1924. Phillip Grant was the coach. He was from Deport and he imported some boys from Deport to help make up that team. We think they were Ossie Barnard, Edd Barnard and Troy Stalls. Others Hubert remembers on that team were Lee and Tobe King, Robert Dodd Jones, Sid Hamilton, G.B. Stanton, Alvin Woods, Hubert's brother Teddie Lee and others that he can't recall. After 60

years it isn't so easy. They played without full uniforms, they did manage to get shoulder pads and some helmets. When they played out of town, they went in a truck, taking 12 players. It was too bad if more than one player got hurt bad enough to be pulled from the game. They were willing to take on any team, no matter if they had more experience than they, they had the old Bulldog spirit, encourage by their coach Phillip Grant. They had no football field, they played in a pasture not far from town. The Bogata Bulldogs have come a long way since those days.

Many of us on the side lines had never seen a football game before. I guess we made up the first pep squad, our teacher, who was my aunt, Gladys Ferguson Bryson, stood with us, trying to explain about the game. I'm sure she had a pretty difficult time. It is a lot different today, the fine shows that the cute cheerleaders put on, leading the spectators to cheer on their team. But everything has to start somewhere and we were fortunate enough to see the beginning of football in Bogata.

We look forward to the Bogata News each week. It is like a letter from home, wish we could have more Bogata locals.

Basketball Camp Set At Rivercrest

The Rivercrest coaching staff will hold a basketball camp May 27-May 31. The camp director will be Coach Wake Wood. The registration fee for each participant will be \$25.00 that will be placed in the basketball athletic fund for boys and girls activities next year.

Transportation will be provided to and from Rivercrest. The camp will be for both boys and girls. Any Talco-Bogata student who will be in grades 4-7 next year is eligible to attend.

The buses will leave Bogata and Talco at 8 a.m. The buses will leave Rivercrest at 11:30 a.m. daily and be back in the communities at approximately 11:40 a.m.

The students will be taught the fundamentals of basketball. The students will be drilled daily on proper form of

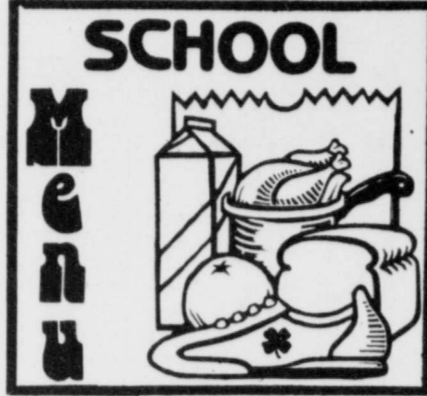

Control Weeds For Good Fishing


If you have a pond with a weed problem, spring is a good time to control the weeds with herbicides. If you wait until summer, treatment could help cause oxygen depletion and fish die off.

Oxygen depletion can occur during spring months, but the risk is greatly reduced. The major factors contributing to oxygen depletion are amount of aquatic vegetation, water temperature, pondage of fish and weather conditions. In most years the amount of aquatic vegetation is less and water temperatures are cooler in the spring, which reduces the risk of fish die off after treatment. If this spring is unusually warm and weather conditions within two weeks of treatment include several windless, cloudy days, an oxygen depletion may occur. Personnel at the USDA Soil Conservation Service and county extension offices can provide information about

approved herbicides for aquatic use. They will apprise you of precautions when using aquatic herbicides and assist in locating chemicals. The most important first step is to treat your pond as soon as possible to avoid an oxygen depletion and fish die off.

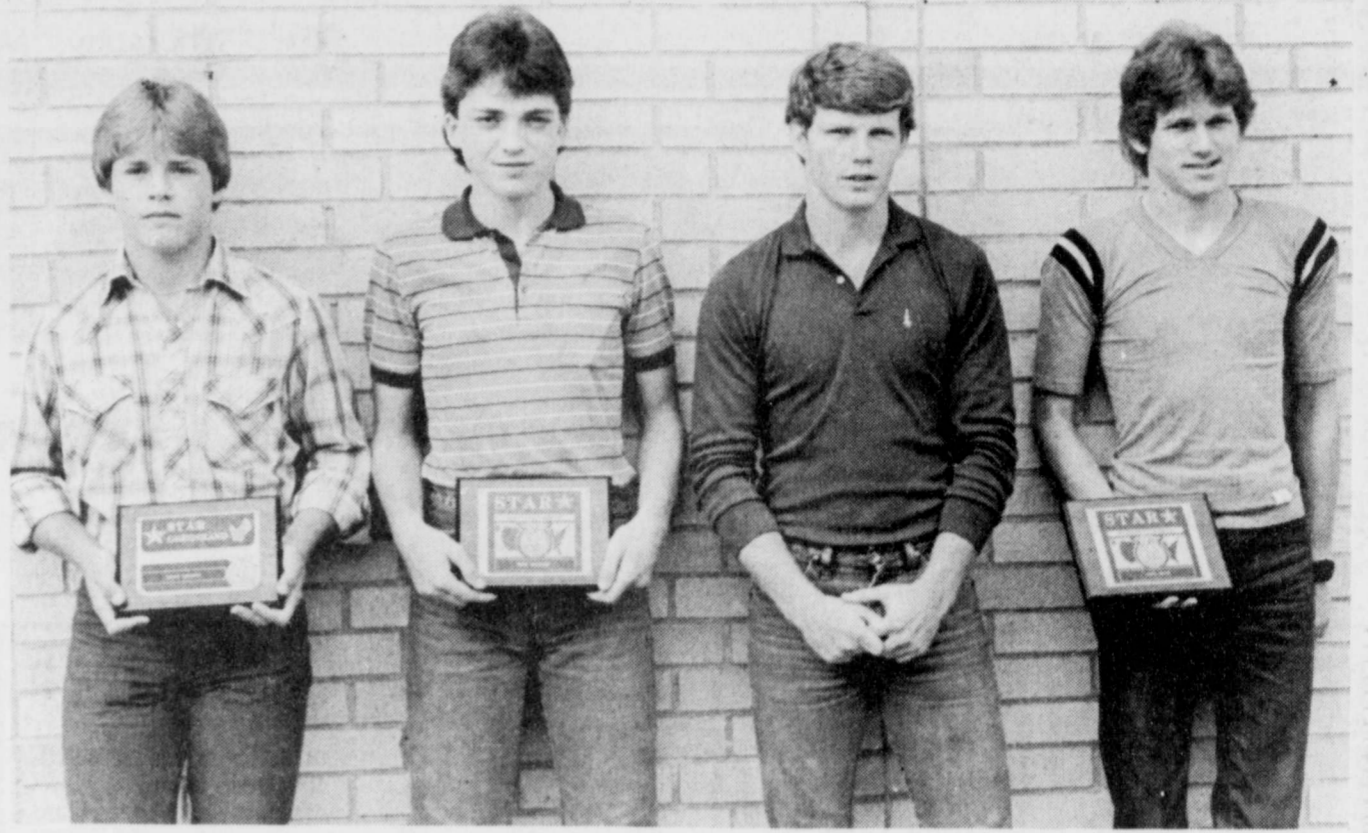

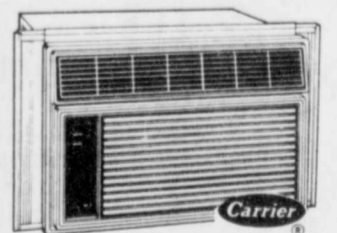
