

Billy Kilmer To Speak At Banquet

Billy Kilmer will be the featured speaker at the Rivercrest Athletic Banquet next Tuesday night. The football star will be a special added attraction to the evening.

Admission will be \$3.50 for adults and \$2.50 for students, and will begin at 7 p.m.

Kilmer, a former quarterback of the Washington Redskins, will be at Rivercrest some time after 6 p.m. that evening to visit and sign autographs. His speech will occur immediately after the banquet meal, and after the talk, the crowd will adjourn to the auditorium for the presentation of awards.

Billy Kilmer went to UCLA and was

an All American running back. He was one of the first and only players to be drafted in three different sports for the pros, football, basketball and baseball.

He is now a Dallas businessman, and will soon return to Florida. His wife, Sandie, is a senior flight attendant for Delta Airlines. His hobbies include golf and his racing horse "Ramond Earl".

As quarterback for the Washington Redskins, Kilmer's first big win was against the Dallas Cowboys.

Articles said of Kilmer "he does not throw picture-perfect passes. He does not have classic running form. What

distinguishes him is that impalpable but vital ability to get the most from himself and his teammates. His greatest accomplishment is not any single thing he's done on the field, rather it's the fact that quarterback Kilmer is out there."

Kilmer came back from an injury that hospitalized him from November 1962 to May 1963, and not only surprised people by being able to walk again, but to play football! This characterizes the courage and determination Kilmer has shown.

Awards that will be presented at the athletic banquet are:

Outstanding Track-Each year a

male varsity athlete is selected by the coaches for outstanding achievement in Boys Track. The name of that athlete is placed on the plaque to signify that contribution.

Gary McConnell Athletic Award-While a student at Rivercrest High School, Gary McConnell participated in football and track. Gary exemplified a Christian attitude toward both athletics and his personal life. Gary was a team-oriented player who responded positively to coaching and was very popular with his peers, displaying strong leadership qualities and outstanding citizenship. Each year the high school coaches select

the name of a male varsity athlete, who best fulfills the qualities listed above, to be placed on this trophy.

Booster Award-From time to time there is that person or persons who go far beyond the normal requirements of time and effort to support athletics at Rivercrest High School. When the coaches feel that such a person makes this outstanding contribution to the program, they present a small plaque in an effort to convey both their appreciation and that of the athletes.

Fighting Rebel Award-Each year the high school coaches select a male varsity athlete, preferably a senior, to receive this award. He must have

participated in at least two varsity sports, and be a good player, and show a strong desire to compete.

Rebelette Award-This award is presented in recognition of accomplishments which exhibit those values that should be reinforced by participation as a Rebelette. The following criteria determine the recipient of this award: academic, athletic, and citizenship. Teachers, sponsors and coaches rate each girl with whom they have had contact in the three areas on a scale of one to five. The Rebelette with the highest point total is the recipient of this award.

FmHa Loans Processed

The Texas State Director of Farmers Home Administration, J. Lynn Futch, announced recently that approximately 90% of the farm loan applications received from farmers to finance their 85 crops have been processed. Field personnel are using all of the tools available such as the Debt Set-Aside Program, limited resource loans, subordinations, rescheduling, and reamortization to assist farmers in developing a workable farm plan. The state Director estimates that more than 95% of the Texas farmers, who farmed in 1984, were able to get financing if they chose to continue to farm

in 1985.

Futch reported that FmHA has made more than 4,300 farm loans in the state for about \$286 million this year. Applications continue to be processed. The fiscal year ends September 30, 1985.

Farmers Home Administration is a Rural Credit Agency of the United States Department of Agriculture serving the needs of farmers unable to obtain credit through their regular lenders. FmHA programs operate as a supplement to credit made available by other lenders, not in competition with them.

Pond Management Field Day Set

Interest is growing in the pond management field day scheduled for Tuesday afternoon, May 14 at the Thomas Ray farm in the Red Oak community northeast of Blossom.

This event is being planned to provide information on such things as pond fertilization, weed control, stocking and rotenoning. Actual demonstrations are planned to give those in attendance a better idea of how to manage their ponds for increased fish production. It will begin at 1:30 p.m.

Assisting with the field day will be Wildlife and Fisheries Specialist, Billy Higginbotham and Ed Schwile, biologist with the Soil Conservation Service. Both provided excellent information at a similar field day last year on the Tom Watson farm near Sumner. Due to the interest in pond management, as evidenced by last year's event, the directors of the Lamar SWCD and extension service felt that another session should be held. This time, however, it is being held in the eastern part of the county.

Those planning to attend are encouraged to bring samples of pond weeds or fish which they might need identified. It would also be good to jot down any particular questions on pond management so that they could be answered during the discussion part of the program.

Folding chairs can also be brought since all for the afternoons program is planned around ponds at the Ray Farm. A canopy shade is planned for convenience also.

Humidity Could Cause Problem In Plants

By Herb Brevard
Cloudy, humid weather could bring
disease problems in ornamentals and
vegetables, says Dr. George Phillely,
plant pathologist for the Texas
Agricultural Extension Service. Some
problems are still being experienced
with damping off on some vegetable
crops. The major cause of damping
off is planting the crop before the soil
warms adequately for that particular
crop. Precautions to take include
treating the seed with a fungicide
before planting, rotating the crops
and planting on a raised seedbed. The
last report, and usually the most ex-
pensive, is using a soil fungicide.

May beetles are very active across
East Texas, according to Dr. James
Robinson, extension entomologist.
The beetles are the adult stage of the
white grub which infests lawn and can
cause considerable damage. The
beetles feed at night and go into the
ground in the day time. Heavy
feeding by the beetles can cause
damage to the young growth.
Dr. Sim A. Reeves, extension

agronomist, says that if arrowleaf
clover is getting too tall, it can either
be cut for hay or heavy grazing pasture
will keep the growth under control. If
the clover is too thick, it smother out
the grasses. Plants must have
sunlight to manufacture food. Drying
the clover for hay may be a problem,
but Reeves says that crimping the
stems will help the clover dry
quicker.



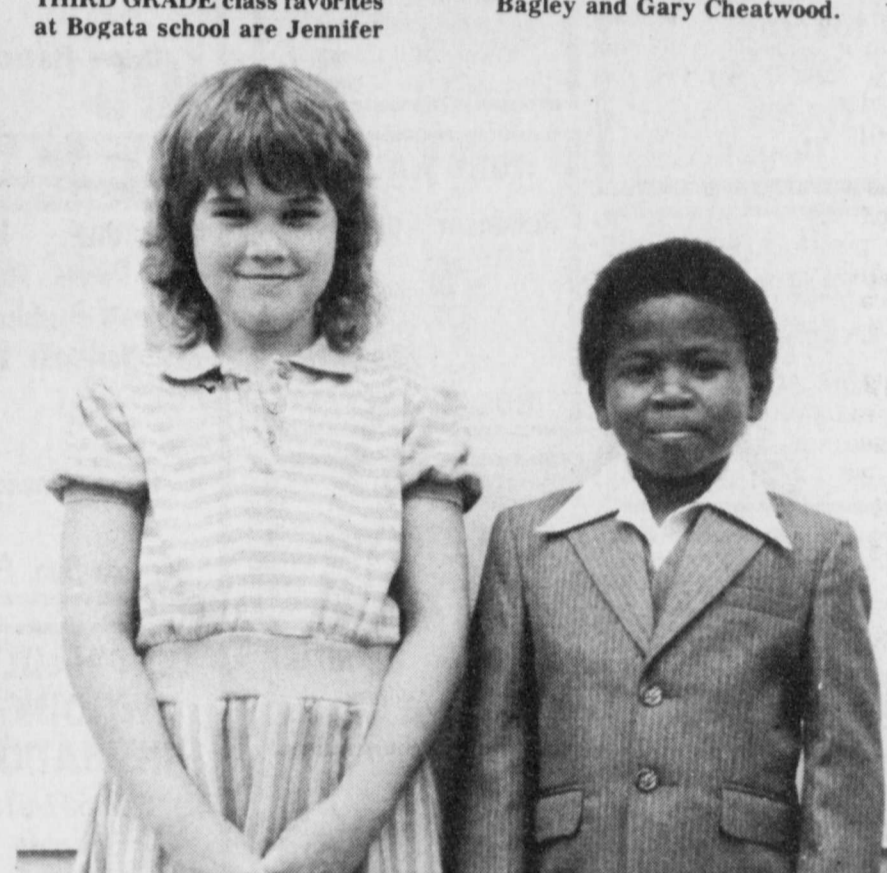
