

Queen's Contest Now Open

It is time for the upcoming annual Bogata Frontier Days and Rodeo, scheduled for June 27-28 and 29.

There will be a queen and princess contest held in conjunction with the rodeo. The current Bogata Rodeo Queen, Kristi Bankhead of Cunningham, will crown the new queen on Saturday night, June 29.

All queen contestants must be between the ages of 14 and 19. Queen contestants will be judged on 1/3 horsemanship, 1/3 appearance and 1/3 personality. Each candidate will be required to ride in the grand entry each night at the rodeo and in the rodeo parade. Activities will be held all day Saturday.

The crowning will be held Saturday night during the rodeo.

Local Sales Tax Shows Slight Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$109.2 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Houston's check for \$18.3 million was the largest. Dallas received \$13.4 million. San Antonio received \$6.6 million.

Locally Deport received \$2,197.08, bringing the 1985 total to \$4,956.85, marking a 14.87 percent increase over

last year.

Paris received \$258,123.58, showing a 9.14% increase over last year.

Bogata received a check for \$3,405.84, making the 1985 total \$10,679.81, for a 7.22% increase over the 1984 total for the same period.

Talco received \$1,639.13 for the period, making the 1985 total \$9,477.24 while Blossom received \$1,886.18 for a 16.47% increase over the 1984 total of \$5,335.53.

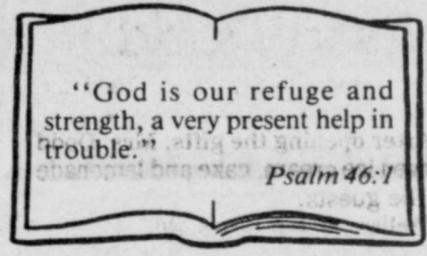

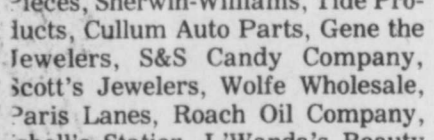
Wayne Huffman To Go To Africa

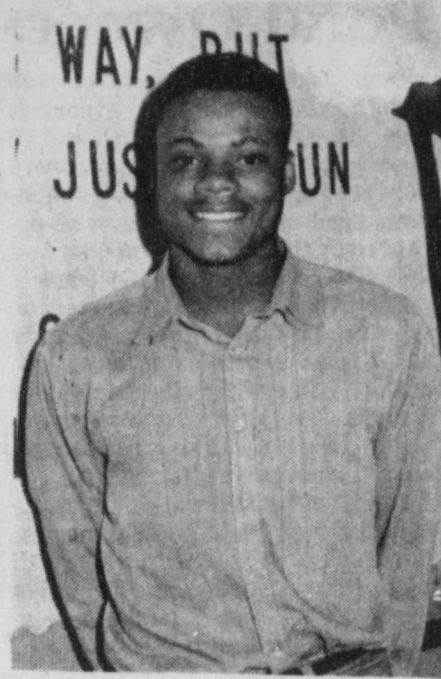

Jerry Jones Makes Hole-In-One



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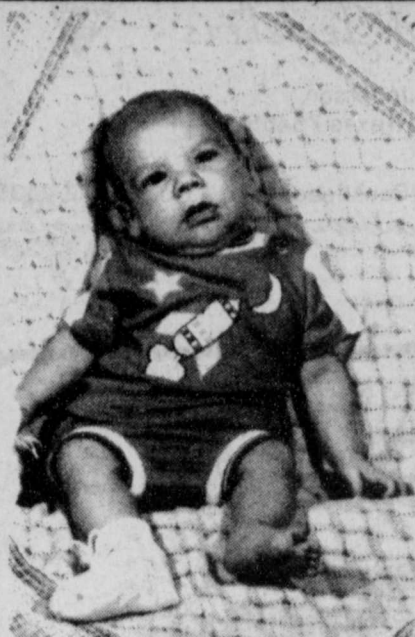

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Pond Owners Receive Fish

Over 2,600 catfish, 1,628 of both black and florida bass, 300 red ear, 800 blue gill, 150 hybrid sunfish and 72 pounds of fathead minnows were delivered to local pond owners Monday, April 29. The delivery was arranged by the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The fishpond stocking program is sponsored by the Red River County S&WCD as a service to local landowners. Since the federal and state agencies no longer stock private waters, the small fish must be purchased from private hatcheries.

Landowners receiving the fish included Edward Usrey, Ben Townes, Harold Peek, Van Brock, Ellsworth Eggleston, Charles and Douglas Dawson, Willard Koehn, George Beaman, Bob Simpson, Joe Hansen,

George Marshall, Cecil B. Anderson, Tommy Burks, Gestler Bearden, Rayford T. King, Carl Smith and Ross Strate.

All fish delivered to Red River County are hatchery produced and purchased from a licensed operator.

Most of the channel catfish will be fed and should grow about two pounds a year. The fathead minnows will be used to furnish forage for the bass and channel catfish.

The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District will continue to have a fish delivery each spring if landowners show enough interest in stocking their ponds.

For further information on fishpond stocking recommendations, contact the personnel at the local Soil Conservation Service office.

PJC Schedule Summer Youth Courses

Area youth from age four through high school will have the opportunity to take mini-courses at Paris Junior College for the fourth consecutive summer, according to June Jones.

The summer youth program, entitled "Thinking Can Be Fun at PJC" will include courses in art, music, reading, Spanish, microcomputer, tennis, mathematics, wildlife, photography, science and study skills. In past years, many area youth have taken advantage of the summer study program, Mrs. Jones said, explaining that some 300 students took courses last summer.

Most of the courses will be offered during a three-week period from June 3-21, except for courses in art (mural techniques) and tennis which will continue until July. Varied courses are scheduled for different age groups and instructors will be teachers from PJC and area schools as well as other community residents.

Registration for the courses will be held on Tuesday, May 21 from 2 to 6 p.m. in the Alford Center on the PJC campus. No telephone or mail registration will be taken, but the registration will be handled by age groups so lines will be avoided. Parents should register for their

children, and all fees are required on the registration day. An attempt has been made to arrange classes so that the various age groups can stay all morning at the college. For example, students in grades 3-5 may take music at 8:30 a.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays and stay for Spanish from 10:15 to 11:45 a.m. so that working parents may pick the child up at noon. Afternoon courses from 1 to 2:30, 1 to 3 or 1 to 4 also are scheduled.

Brochures with complete schedules of courses will be mailed in the Lamar County area, but persons not receiving the information by May 15 may obtain schedules in the Alford Center at PJC. Fee for any three week course on Mondays-Wednesdays or Tuesdays-Thursdays or Friday computer is \$25.00, and \$15.00 will be charged for courses meeting only on Friday except for the computer course.

Project activities funded by the grant will include two workshops available to the public free of charge and an oral history and video history project which will continue through

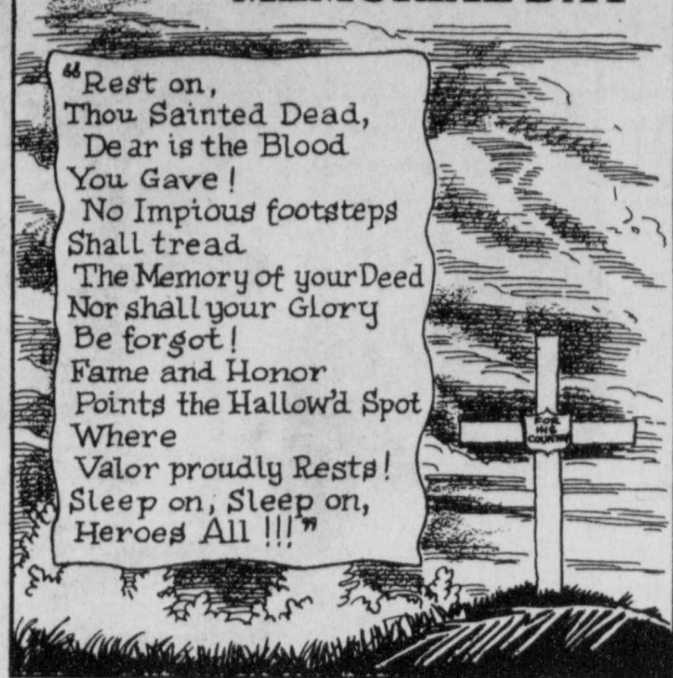
June of 1986, said Ms. Harvill, director of the project.

The oral and video history workshop will be scheduled sometime in September, 1985.

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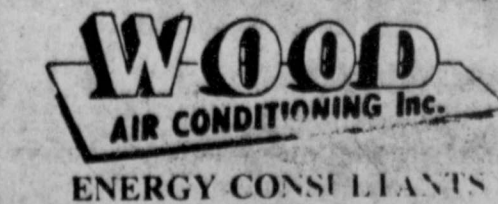
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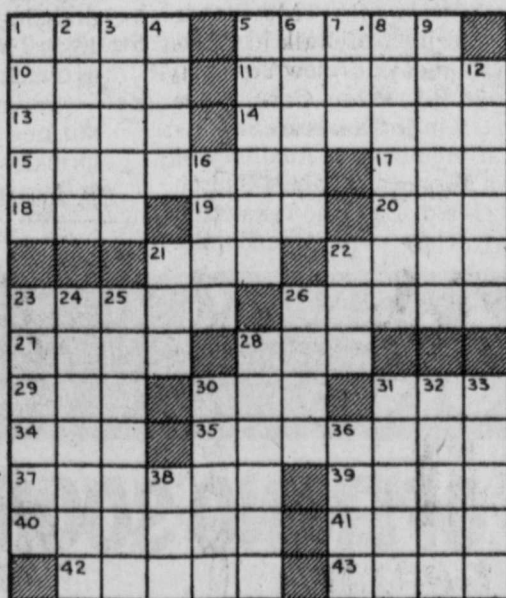

Area Producers Cutting Hay

Many producers throughout East Texas are cutting hay. Particular attention should be given to the fertilizer needs of the hay meadow, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist.

Fertilizer should be applied according to the yield potential of the meadow. Reeves says that coastal and other improved bermudas have the highest yield potential and should receive slightly more nitrogen than weak meadows or meadows with common bermuda or bahia.

On the good meadows, approximately 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre should be applied. On the weaker meadows, 70 to 80 pounds of nitrogen should be sufficient.

Reeves points out that it takes almost as much potassium as nitrogen to produce hay. If potassium was not applied in the last fertilizer application, it should be applied after

the first cutting.

It is too late to control weeds in hay meadows before the first cutting. Weed control should have been accomplished prior to the lush growth of the grasses.

Hay should be thoroughly dry before baling. This is always a problem in the spring. If the hay is baled while the moisture content is too high, it will mold and probably be of very low quality. Crimping the stems of the hay, particularly clover or small grains, will speed the drying process.

Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist, says that calves should be vaccinated for blackleg, malignant edema and Black's disease when they are two months old. The spores of these diseases live in the soil for many years and unvaccinated calves are always susceptible. Losses occur every year in unvaccinated herds.

Summer Camp Registration Set

Camp Gambill, a resident camp for girls operated by the Red River Valley Girl Scout Council, is still accepting registrations for summer camp. The camp is located five miles northwest of Paris on FM 2820. It is open to all girls ages 6 and 17.

The summer camp program will begin June 2 and continue through July 6. Openings still remain in several of the sessions.

One-week sessions with openings include June 23 through 29, June 30 through July 6. Fee is \$70.00.

Looking For Home Brew

In the 1920's many negro farmers and farm laborers lived in and around Deport. These people were always ready to celebrate Saturday night. Many of these celebrations were dances. To make the dancing a little more lively, and noisy, some home brew was necessary. This was a time of prohibition and home made alcoholic beverages were unlawful, but there was always a local brewer who would take the risk and make a crock of beer for a party and at the same time make a small amount of money for himself.

Cube and Kate Shuman had moved to town and left their house out on the prairie east of Deport vacant. The negroes selected the empty house for their party one Saturday night.

Since the place hadn't been occupied for some time, blood weeds had grown up six or seven feet high around and in the barn yard. That

was an excellent place for the brewer to hide his brew crock.

That night, Clay Guest and I decided to go out to the dance and see if we could find the beer. We knew that it should be in the weed patch. It was black dark and no moon.

While the dancers in the house were shimmying and gyrating to Jim Kidd's guitar and George Kilgore's fiddle, we were down on our hands and knees in the weeds crawling around like a couple of coons fishing for crawfish, feeling for the crock jar of brew. Suddenly we began to realize that there was someone in the weed patch besides us.

Then a big flashlight came on, and there we were, in the spotlight with Pluto Roberts, the constable, looking down on us. He was also looking for the beer, but instead found us.

Since we didn't have any contraband in our possession, he gave us a lecture and sent us home.

Congressman Hall Receives Award

First-District Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. was recently honored as the recipient of the prestigious Award of Merit by the Federal Administrative Law Judges Conference.

Congressman Hall, who was recently nominated and confirmed as a federal district judge in Texas, is among a handful of public figures to receive the award. Others include U.S. Senators Howell Heflin of Alabama and Charles Mathias of Maryland. The award ceremony took place during an annual meeting at the conference in Alexandria, VA.

Congressman Hall will be sworn in as a federal judge in Marshall on May 28.

He was cited by the administrative law judges for his work in Congress on complex judicial matters as a ranking member of the House Judiciary Committee. In recent years, Congressman Hall has served as

Chairman of the Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations.

The Federal Administrative Law Judges Conference was founded in 1947 as part of the massive reorganization of the federal government under the direction and leadership of President Harry S. Truman.

In a speech to the group, Congressman Hall warned that a sweeping change in the structure of the administrative law judges may be difficult at this time.

"Each agency of government is different, and each of its cases that must be administered and adjudicated by administrative law judges is different," Congressman Hall said.

Congressman Hall has served in the U.S. House of Representatives for the past nine years. President Reagan signed his commission to serve as a federal judge on May 10.

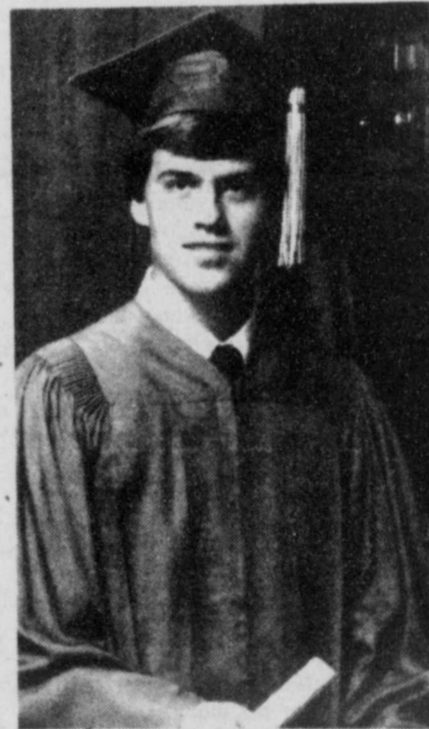

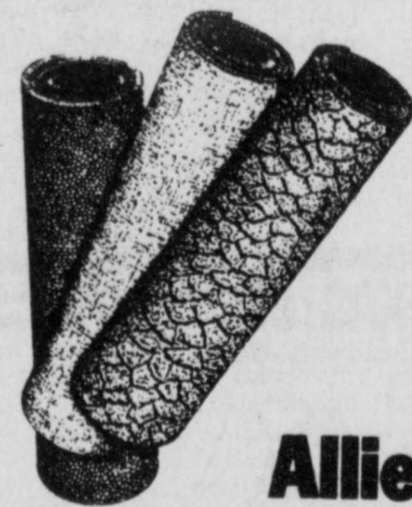

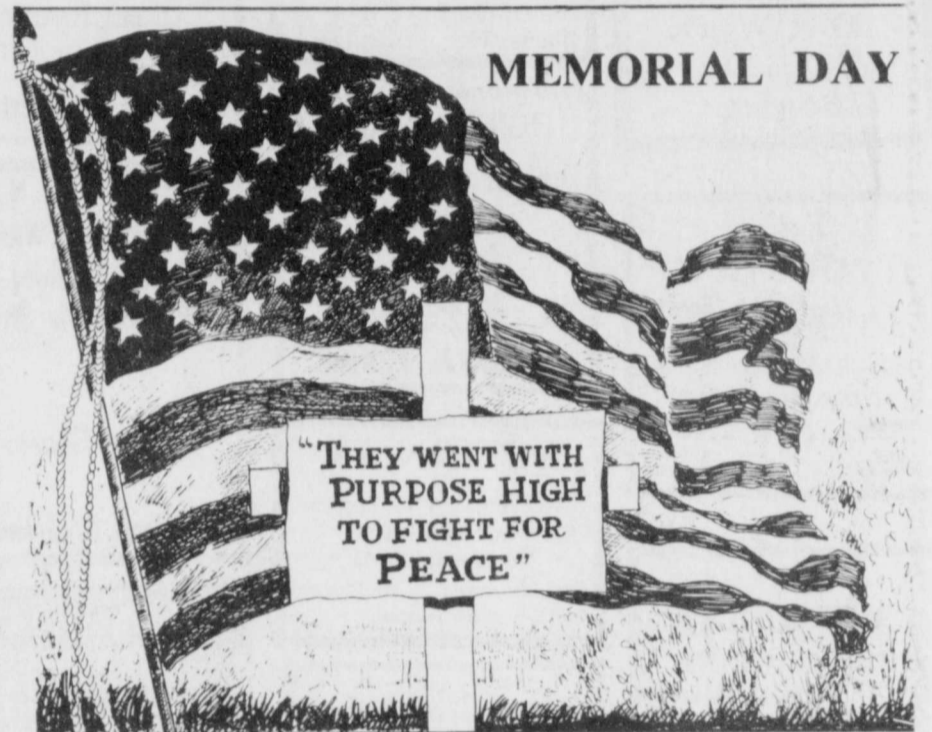
