The scholarship, valued up to \$15,000, covers all tuition costs for the Computer Information Systems Program. Students can earn up to a Bachelor of Science degree upon successful completion of all coursework.

Finalists for the DeVRY Inc. scholarship competition were selected from a group of more than 1,200 applicants. Scholarships are granted on the basis of college board scores, high school academic record and an essay written by the student. McCoin's topic was "How The Computer Information Systems Specialist Becomes The Heart of Modern **Business Operations.**'

In addition to the scholarships awarded at DeVry in Dallas, other institutes in the U.S. are presenting a total of 68 full tuition scholarships to high school students. Value of the 75 scholarships to be awarded in 1985 is approximately \$1,102,000.




Backyard Hamburger Party Fetes Two-Steppers





Do not burn the small grain stubble. Wildlife benefits are lost as well as organic matter; it also exposes the soil to erosion. The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District and U.S. Soil Conservation Service encourages soil protection through proper use of small grain residues.

We were near Pattonville, so we squawked up to a blacksmith shop and stopped. Before the car came to a halt, Osie jumped out and another little boy who was about his age jumped on him. Osie always welcomed a fight, and before we realized what was going on, they were rolling and tumbling in the road, pulling hair and gouging eyes.

Dad pulled them apart, then told the blacksmith about the car's squealing problem. The blacksmith soon located the trouble, and removed the dust pan from under the car. The high center in the road had pushed it up against the exposed flywheel and the geer teeth that mesh with the starter pinion, were rubbing against the bottom of the pan.

After the problem was corrected, we got back into the car and continued on home.

On the other hand, if you are one of the many area beef and dairy producers who got good fly control from the ear tags last year, then continue to use them. Fly control from the ear tags more than likely will not be as good as it was a couple of years ago, but may be worth the gamble.



All of the ear tags that are on the market have the same family of insecticides in the tag. Therefore, if cattle have built up resistance to X-: Brand of tags, they will also be resistant to Z-brand of tag. Changing

brands will do no good. Research scientist have gone back to their laboratories to develop a new group of insecticides to use in the ear tags, but it takes time, a lot of money and piles of red tape before one can be available. We hope it is soon.

In the meantime, producers should go back to the old remedies, sprays, dusts, rub-ons, dips, etc. Most of the methods will do a good job but frequent application of materials is a must. 


